## INFLUENZA QUARANTINE REGULATIONS

BE IT HEREBY ORDERED by the City Health Officers, City Council Concurring that,

ALL PERSONS away from home, on returning to Miami must go to their homes at once and remain isolated—receiving no callers—for a period of seventy-two hours.

ALL PERSONS who have contracted the disease are required to remain quarantined until released by their physician.

PERSONS not residents of Miami shall not be permitted to come in by rail or otherwise without a health certificate, it being the duty of the City Marshal to see that they are not permitted to remain here.

This quarantine is not to effect the necessary business of the people living in the rural districts, but they are hereby advised to attend to business in the quickest possible time and avoid crowds as much as possible.

MEETING THE TRAIN is forbidden except it be absolutely necessary, and also congregating on the streets or in any public place.

Among the country patients is the Hodge family on the old Homer Kitchie place. They have eight cases in the one family, or rather two families, Mr. Hodges and son. However there have been no complications with any of them and they are getting along nicely.

J. E. George who had a severe attack of acute indigestion last week has been improving this week.

## WAR WORK CAMPAIGN.

Because of the "Flu" quarantine it will be impossible to get the workers together for a conference on the United War Campaign next week.

This will make doubly necessary for us to work all the harder. We wish to put Roberts County over the top in one day, Monday, Nov. 11th. ## Camp Publicity Letter

Camp Travis, Nov. 1st, 1918

It will not be long now before Texas and Oklahoma will have another division to follow the 90th and 35th across the Atlantic. As soon as the 218th Engineers Regiment arrives from Camp Humphries, Va., where it is being organized, everyone of the recruited units will have joined the 18 or Cactus division now in the midst of its intensive training at Camp Travis. Already three brigadier generals have arrived and the division is rapidly growing to war strength by the constant addition of recruits out of the depot brigades.

Rapid progress is being made in the training of the division. The school of fire for instruction in shooting with pistol and rifle has begun its work. The 35th infantry and the 19th infantry have each put in a week on the rifle range at Camp Bulls and now snipers and observers are receiving field training there. The school for gas defence which has been giving instructions to infantry units now is receiving students from the artillery regiments. Machine gunners and artillerymen are well along with their work.

Conquering of the influenza epidemic has started the machinery of the depot brigade again grinding and recruits, held back for several weeks, now are pouring into camp Travis by the hundreds from Texas and Oklahoma. Since the 165th Depot Brigade was organized here little more than year ago, more than a quarter million men who but yesterday were civilians, have written homefolks; "I am now in the depot brigade," but few of those who read knew just what a depot brigade is supposed to be.

AIN'T GOT IT YET. The City Dads played some trick on a few of us fellows this week. The Chief editor went to Anacolis Sunday night on a very important mission and while we were away they passed a quarantine order making us stay at home for seventy-two hours upon the return. We have been at home ever since except what time we have spent at the office under locked doors. The quarantine provides that if you leave your home you must stay under "kiver" until your time is up for taking the flu and our time will be up this afternoon at six o'clock, so unless we take it between now and then we'll be out with the boys tonight.

The quarantine is very strict, and some have objected, but personally we approve of the method to help stop the flu. Just anything to help stop an epidemic with such a high mortality rate. It is better to keep a well man quarantined a few days than to let the influenza started and make some good citizen stay in the balance of time.

And, too there are very few bitters without a little sweet and we have found several virtues in the quarantine. We have a chance of getting acquainted with our wife; she can't run us away from home; bill collectors are barred from the office and the front door is locked against book peddlars.

Smoking is becoming very popular since it has been said that it will ward off the flu.

A great many retail stores over the country are saying, "We regret that we must go on a strictly cash basis." Regret, fiddlesticks, it would be a lot better for every store and all their customers if they would all sell for cash over the counter. We can't see why a man should regret getting the money for his wares.

Since we went back to the sun time it looks like we are saving some daylight. Really we ever could figure where this part of the United States ever saved anything by advancing the clocks an hour and we would prefer to just stay with the sun time the year through.

Weekly newspapers all over the United States are advancing their subscription price to \$2.00 per year. It is getting to where you can hardly get by at that, and near half the local newspapers in the country have already advanced to \$2.00.

Another story is going the rounds: A colored soldier in France had been very seasick on the way over. He was talking about the voyage when he said, "I is a 'Merican cultured gentlemen, born and bred. I is a United States Citizen, but lemme tell tell you dat if de 'Lantic ocean don't freeze over or dey don't build a bridge across it, I is a European nigger from here on."

Sam Braswell of the Clarendon News says that unless his county goes over the top with the War Work Campaign, he won't send a single copy of the News to one of the boys in France which tells of their failure. "Right, Sam, if we can't send the boys good news, lets not send them bad news. The boys who see their home town failing to support them are not going to have a very warm feeling for that town when they return home. It looks as tho the coming Thanksgiving will be one of the greatest the world could ever have. It is probable that the whole world can again be at peace on a Thanksgiving day for the first time in five years, and that could certainly be something to be thankful for.

NOTHING ON CON. JONES.

A press dispatch from Palestine, N. C. states that Congressman Jones of the 18th district of Texas is now a private in the Tank Corps and on Kitchen Police duty, washing dishes and cleaning up the kitchen. Still that is nothing on Mr. Jones. He followed the plow when a boy and washed dishes 'too. He also washed dishes for his board part of the time while attending the public school. Jones is a worker and that is what set him up in life to where he is today. You can't help but admire a man who builds himself up with honest labor. Jones is an American—able to do anything from plowing cotton to sitting in the halls Congress, and do it right.

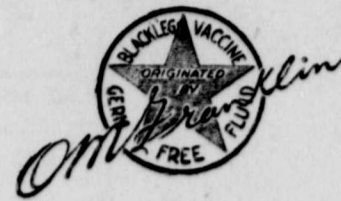

### War Time Sweeteners

AMERICA has several excellent war time sweeteners that will be used largely during the shortage in the sugar supply.

They are maple sugar, syrups, honey and molasses and may be used in preparing desserts and other dishes requiring sweetening.

When a cup of syrup or honey is used to replace a cup of sugar the liquid in the recipes should be decreased one-fourth. One-third of a cupful of sugar is equivalent to one-third of a cup of honey, about one-half cup of syrup and about one-half cup of corn sugar. One-fourth of a cup of sugar is equal to about one-half cup of syrup or one-third cup of corn sugar. One tablespoon of sugar is equal to one tablespoon of honey, about one and one-half tablespoons of syrup and one and one-third tablespoons of corn sugar.

Sugar may be saved by the use of raisins, dates, figs, dried pears and fruit pastes used on the breakfast cereals.

Fruit marmalades, butters and jellies should be used to take the place of the ordinary sweetening at a meal and not as accessories to it. Fruits may be preserved without sugar. It may be added when sugar is more plentiful.

Preserving demands this year a thin syrup instead of a heavy syrup.

If sugar is used one-half of the amount may be replaced by another sweetener.

Drying is a means of preserving (without sugar) apples, cherries, strawberries and black caps.

When ready to use they may have added the needed sugar in the form of a syrup. When sugar is more plentiful fruit juices may be made into jellies or may be used as fruit juices with or without sugar, as beverages, fruit gelatins and frozen desserts.

Fresh fruits supply the place of sugar in the diet. They should be used freely. Desserts where sugar is scarce may be made of gelatins, junkets, custards, puddings and cakes.



### LEND AS THEY HAVE GIVEN

If appeals to reason could reach the deepest emotions, our Government would have all the money it needs.

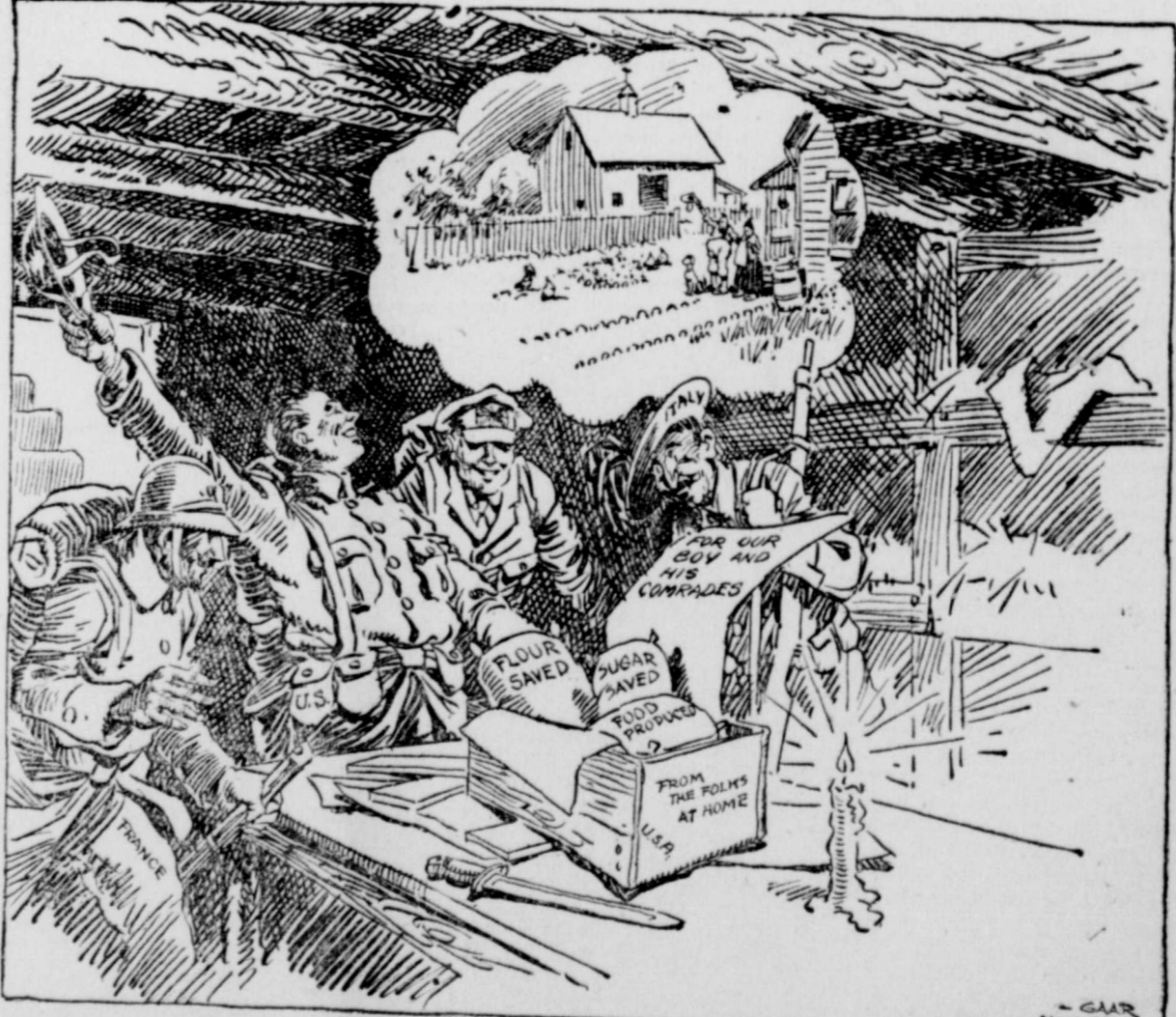
The torpedoing of one of our troop ships would bring it, in a grim determined hurry, but at the same time it would be perilous for our future. The wrath of our country would be aroused to the fury of hell, and we might commit some overt act that would count against us at the peace table. To avoid such a possible tragedy, and consequent result, it is the duty of every citizen to furnish our Government with all the funds it needs without the asking, so as to eliminate the enormous expense of these bond drives and release for other war activities the splendid services of the hosts of men thus engaged.

I want to say a word to the hundred dollar a month man without dependents in an endeavor to bring him to a realization of his responsibility in this great war, which we will win; and what I say to him can be applied, in the same ratio, to every man earning one hundred and twenty-five dollars and upwards, per month. It costs our Government close around eighty dollars per month to maintain each brave man that is fighting for the liberty of the world. Based upon the cost of the most menial labor the soldier is, at least, a hundred dollar man. He, therefore, is not only giving up his home ties; is not only offering his life, but he is actually giving our Government, with no expectancy of return or hope of reward, twenty dollars every month, in order that you may have an opportunity of earning your one hundred dollars per month in perfect safety.

Are you giving twenty dollars per month to our Government to help win the war? No? Well, will you not lend our Government twenty dollars every month for the duration of the war at 4 1/2 per cent interest? Is it not the least you can do, and, honestly, is it not your duty to do, the most you can?

After this war is won, probably before, there is going to be another Draft. A Draft Before the Board of Public Opinion, and all men are going to be classified. There will be a class for the miser and a class for the slacker, and—may God pity them, for their fellow-man will not.

### A BOX FROM HOME



Food savings of millions of Americans during our first year of war enabled this government to send enormous food shipments abroad for our fighting forces and the Allied nations.
