When the front feet slip backward a horse is likely to fall and injure his knees, while side slipping generally causes him to come down broadside. Shoeing with rubber pads, or the use of emergency appliances may lessen the chance of slipping, but as there M always the possibility of a horse falling, even when well shod, careful driving and precautions against overloading are important additional means for reducing these accidents and injuries to a minimum.

# **Hidden Fish on Coast**

Schools That Escape the Eye in ing time on small, scattered bunches **Crow's Nest Readily Seen** From Plane.



Flight Made by Navy Craft Bares Worth as Locator and Time Saver-Act as Guide to Steamers.

New York .- A new use for airfish for which the fishing fleets along the coast may search vainly for days can be detected from a seaplane, according to a report by W. W. Welsh of the bureau of fisheries.

The report of Mr. Welsh followed a trip he made in a naval seaplane from the Cape May naval air station. The flight was made at from 500 to 1,000 feet and at a speed of 70 miles an hour. At the time of the flight no

schooling fish were breaking water on the surface, and none could be seen from the crow's nest of a vessel or from fishing piers.

"The plane ascended rapidly to about 800 feet, and most of the trip was made at that altitude," Mr. Welsh reported. "Few schools of fish were seen at first, but as my eye grew accustomed to the conditions many small schools of menhaden were observed, corridors is used as a picture gallery; all moving at some depth, and none of them breaking water. Some schools were so near the surface that they appeared as a reddish brown granular mass, ameboid in character and changing form constantly.

### Large Schools Observed.

"Deeper schools had the appearance of large masses of sunken gulfweed, and others were so deep that they could be distinguished chiefly by the shadow they caused on the suspended particles in the water. From a comparison with other objects seen at known depths it is estimated that the depth of the schools varied from about two feet to ten feet, or possibly more.

"One school of silver fish was observed breaking water. Those were possibly weakfish, certainly not menhaden, as they lacked the characteristic color of the latter. A school of porpoises was clearly seen and could be followed under water.



## PLANT ELMS AND LINDENS


For the Parkway They Have Many Advantages Over Others That Might Be Selected.

A correspondent asks advice regarding the kind of trees to plant in the parkway in front of his home.

"Several people advised elms," he writes, "but they are such slow growers, and as I am not young I would like to plant some kind that I will have a chance to enjoy. I am also thinking of planting four fruit trees in the yard, probably three cherries, as they seem to do better than most fruit trees, and a pear or an apple."

The American elm is by far the best tree for this purpose. It grows fast enough, starts to branch high and does not obstruct the view. It arches beautifully, high up over the street, and is a long-lived, hardwood variety, not seriously affected by insects and fungus pests.

The American linden might grow a little faster, but the tussock moth likes it too well. The American ash grows faster, but it soon gets shaggy, is susceptible to boring insects and drops its leaves in August. The sycamore is good and a faster grower, but its bark is shaggy. The hackberry is just as good as the elm, but slower growing. The red and pin oaks are better, but no one has the patience to plant them. Do not plant cottonwood, box elders, soft maples, nor poplar where an elm, hard maple, hackberry, oak or gingko will grow.




