

The three lagoons or lakes that will be used to store the excess Other business of the commission water from the sewer have been completed as well as the drying beds. The drying beds will take care of the solid part of the sewerage as the lagoons handle the water.

> What is probably the most important part of the disposal plant -the separation tank-is now under construction, says Henry Minter, city secretary.

The exact date that the contractor, Panhandle Construction Company of Lubbock, will start laying the lines is still not known, Minter says.
