"Crawling with cops" was an apt description for this burg Thursday evening just prior to the Sheriff Chas. Lovelace Appreciation night program. Law enforcement officers and their cars were everywhere, it seemed. The lawmen were here, of course, to attend the special program.

Probably never before have so many lawmen converged on Bovina at one time. Not even when the post office was robbed a few years ago.

The program itself, thanks to the great attendance and good planning was a tremendous success. It was a fitting tribute to a great sheriff.

If you didn't pay your poll tax last Monday or before, you can consider yourself just a spectator in forthcoming political battles for the next 12 months.

One of the ironic things about paying for that poll tax receipt this year is that it will entitle you to vote for or against an amendment to the state constitution which would abandon that same tax in years to come.

Texans, you'll remember, failed to outlaw the tax in a similar amendment election a few years ago.

Even now, the tax is no longer a requirement for voting in national elections or for national offices, Texans, surely, will abolish the tax this year.

We've read about rulings which said that Texans never intended for the poll tax to discourage Negroes, for instance, from voting. We think that's probably right. But it was set up to keep people who didn't, or don't have, a dollar and sixbits from voting and that, ladies and gentlemen, isn't right.

There are people, and you know some of them and may even be one, who would like to increase the cost of a poll tax to \$10. There are others who would like for it to be \$100. Still others, though we're getting into what is certainly a minority now, would prefer the cost to be \$1000 or more.

People who favor the present poll tax say, "If a person isn't willing to give \$1.75 to vote, he shouldn't be allowed to vote, anyway."

Most of them haven't stopped to consider that there are some individuals who could use the same words except substitute \$1,750 for the \$1.75 and feel the same way about it.

So, it's our theory that a man who can't afford to spend \$1.75 for his "voting right" is just as entitled to express his preferences at the polls as is the man who could and would gladly pay the \$1,750 for a poll tax.

Frankly, we feel that the big reason Texas still has a poll tax is because people basically hate to see changes made. Everyone who votes in Texas elections is accustomed to the poll tax. They have never known anything different and haven't thought about the situation enough to realize that is probably isn't right.

Often, it's hard to get things, or voters, stopped when you get them to going one way.

Planspeople aren't supposed to be sissies about severe weather.

However, if the current cold spell continues for another couple of weeks, and the wind gets up to go with it, there's going to be some complaining in these parts about a rough winter.

Though the weather has been colder than a frog and the temperatures have dropped down near the zero mark on several occasions, this spell has, for the most part, been without a lot of wind. That has made it easier to stand.

Improvement Project Gains Momentum Clinic Fund Totals Over \$3,000 Now

Gaining momentum since the first of the year, Bovina's Community Improvement Project will be benefited by a Mexican dinner in the school cafeteria Sunday and several other projects which are slated to be scheduled in the next few weeks.

Sponsor of the Mexican dinner is the Bovina chapter of American G. I. Forum. All profits will go to the CIP fund, which is designated to build a clinic for the community.

Serving will begin at 12 noon Sunday, announces Mike Barraza, one of the G. I. Forum officers, and will continue until 2 p.m. or when people stop coming.

On the menu will be enchiladas, tamales, Spanish rice, tacos with beans, tostados, hot sauce and peppers and a desert with coffee or tea.

"There will be no advance ticket sales," Barraza emphasizes, "but everyone is welcome to come to the dinner and aid in building a clinic in Bovina."

Other improvements scheduled during forthcoming weeks include a benefit basketball game and a variety show featuring local and out-of-town talent, according to Mrs. Bob Estes, a member of the Bovina Woman's Study Club committee which is backing the community improvement project.

The basketball game will be sponsored by Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, announces Jack McCracken, manager-secretary. It will pit a Bovina team against a group from KCLV Radio in Clovis.

Scheduled to be a highlight of the variety show is "The Slum Town Sym-Funny," a highly popular entertaining group from Lamesa, Mrs. Estes says.

This program is being planned for March. The benefit basketball game will probably be scheduled for the third week in February. (Continued on Page 2)



Parmer Friends Honor Sheriff Chas. Lovelace

Parmer County friends of Sheriff Chas. Lovelace -- some 500 of them -- honored the big, veteran law enforcement official with an Appreciation Night Thursday in Bovina Schools auditorium. Included in the total attendance were lawmen and officials from neighboring counties.

The sheriff's friends presented him with an engraved watch, a plaque and \$2,000-worth of savings bonds.

"As long as men like Charlie Lovelace are kept in office, you can expect good law enforcement and fair trials," said Former District Judge E. A. Bills, the guest speaker.

Judge Bills, who worked with Sheriff Lovelace in law enforcement for 13 years, pointed out that there has been a nationwide increase in juvenile delinquency. "In Parmer County, I think you'll find that juvenile delinquency is less than in any other county around us and Charlie Lovelace is one of the reasons for this," Judge Bills said.

"You won't find any better law enforcement officers in Texas or anywhere else than in the counties in this immediate area and Charlie Lovelace is one of the best of those," the speaker commented.

Bedford Caldwell of Bovina was master of ceremonies for the appreciation night. He recognized out-of-county guests.

Judge Bills was introduced by Sam Aldridge, Farwell attorney. Presentations were made to

Lovelace by W. L. "Preach" Edelman of Friona. Mrs. Lovelace was presented with a bouquet of red roses by Otis Huggins of Farwell.

A reception honoring the sheriff and his family was at the school cafeteria following the program.

In his acceptance speech, Sheriff Lovelace expressed appreciation to those who arranged the program and to those who were present. He introduced his deputies, Tom Atkins of Farwell, Henry Minter of Bovina, Garland Freeman of Friona, and Raymond Treider, Jr. of Lazbuddie.

Engraved on the watch were the words, "1966 - Chas. Lovelace - presented by Parmer County Friends. Wording on the plaque read, "To Charlie Lovelace - presented in grateful appreciation for faithful and dedicated service as sheriff

Leading roles were played by Mary Dane and Scotty Rundell, both seniors.





Weed Meeting Slated at Hub

Tomorrow (Thursday) at 2 p.m. in the Hub Community Center, there will be a county-wide meeting on weed control for field crops.

This is the second of a series of meetings this winter sponsored by the Parmer County Program Committee, the Chambers of Commerce of Friona, Bovina and Farwell and the county agent. These meetings are to help area farmers and businessmen keep up-to-date on the latest agricultural developments and recommended practices.

The program features three outstanding speakers in their field of work. Dr. Allen Weise, agronomist at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station, Bushland, will discuss weed control and recommended herbicides for cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, wheat, Johnson grass and bindweed. Weise, a well-known authority in this area on herbicides, will cover the advantages, disadvantages, hazards and residues of various chemicals.

Paul Scott, research agronomist with Holly Sugar Corporation, Hereford, will cover the area of weed control and herbicides on sugar beets.

James Murphrey, area farm management specialist with the extension service, will discuss economics of various weed control practices and economic loss from various levels of weed infestations.

Winter weather, extremely cold but not severe, continued its grip on the area for the second consecutive week.


Snow which fell almost two weeks ago was still visible as late as Tuesday of this week.

Poll Tax Sales Up

Poll tax receipts issued in Farmer County this year are expected to be up over the total of last year.

Gas Meeting Set At Hub

Continuing efforts to obtain more economical natural gas for irrigation purposes, Par-

A report on the progress and problems of the association during 1965 will be made by Bruce Parr, association president, and Attorney John D. Aiken of Hereford, who is legal representative for the group.

One officer and three directors will be elected at the Thursday meeting. Those whose terms expire are Gilbert Kaltwasser of Farwell, vice president; and directors M. H. Carson of Bovina, Ellis Tatum of Friona and Freeman Davis of Lazbuddie.

"There are 80 wells in Parmer County which are being supplied with gas now for 28.3 cents per million cubic feet,"

Schlenker says. "The regular rate from Pioneer Natural Gas Co. is 42 cents per MCF. The 80 wells are at Black where a co-op of gas users was formed a year ago. They are supplied with gas from Trans-Western Gas Co. We wonder if other irrigation farmers aren't interested in this lower rate and plan to discuss ways to obtain it at the meeting this week."

The session will be at Hub Community Center and will begin at 7:30 p.m.

All irrigation farmers in the county are urged to attend the meeting, announces Carl Schlenker of Rhea, secretary of the organization.

Dues are \$2 per irrigation well and are now due, Schlenker points out.

"We have about 1300 irrigation wells represented in the association. This averages 2.8 wells per member," the secretary says.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Have you had your soil tested this year? We suggest you consider this management practice of having some soil tests made and fertilizing according to the recommendations.

The field or farm should be divided according to soil type, as well as past and future cropping practices. Take enough time to collect a good sample

and fill the information sheet as completely as possible. Pint boxes, mailing cartons, history sheets and instructions are available at the County Agent's office.

WEED CONTROL MEETING
On Thursday, February 3, at 2:00 p.m. in the Hub Community Center, there will be a meeting on Weed Control for Field Crops.

The program features Dr. Allen Wiese, Mr. James Murphy and Mr. Paul Scott. These men will cover herbicide recommendations for cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, wheat, sugar beets, Johnsongrass and bindweed. Also the economics of weed control practices will be discussed.

LIVESTOCK
We have a beef cattle meeting set for February 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the First State Bank of Bovina community room. Dixon Hubbard, Area Livestock Specialist, will lead the discussion that night on new developments in beef cattle.

CATTLE CONDITION
High condition, or over fatness, can cause temporary or permanent sterility in both cows and bulls. This occurs frequently in purebred heifers fitted for shows.

Excess condition can also affect the longevity of the cow. In addition to reproduction problems, overfeeding can also result in the wastage of large amounts of feed not needed by the animal to meet growth requirements. Stockmen must know the nutritional requirements of his animals and feed them accordingly.

On the other hand, some cattlemen may neglect their animals by failing to recognize the existence of ration deficiencies. As a result, animals may not receive sufficient amounts of calcium, phosphorus, salt, vitamin A, protein supplement and energy.

The County Agent invites stockmen to visit his office for copies of publications dealing with livestock nutrition and other subjects relating to beef production.

4-H HORSE MEETING
A County-wide 4-H Club horse meeting will be held Saturday at 2:00 p.m. in the Bovina School auditorium. The main program will be two horse films. A discussion of a lesson from the 4-H Horse member book will also be held. All youth and adults interested in horses are invited to attend.



22-20, at the halfway mark.


Going into this week's play, the Mustangs' district mark was


