Better Plan Than to Construct Mos Expensive Highway and Let It Deteriprate.




Improving an Old Roadway.

the United States, if not the best has consistently followed this practice The originally improved roads in Maryland were comparatively inexpengive, costing only what the tarrayers were willing to put for. The first few years the average cost was less that \$10,000 a talle. In some cases the work eptailed considerable grading and drainage, but in others it amounted simply to resurfacing the old turapikes, which had already been graded and drained.

Generally the roads built at that time were macadam, 12 feet wide and 6 lockes thick. Soon the width was increased to 14 feet. Later many were widened still farther, some very successfully, by adding concrete shoulders on each side of the existing macadam. This method of improving roads makes it possible for traffic to continue unimpeded on the road while the work is going on.

### State and Country Highways Built and Kept Up Will Connect Every Farm With Market.

For each dollar your state puts up for good roads, under certain conditions, Uncle Sam gives it another dollar. Such government aid for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, aggregates many millions. State and country highways, also local roads. built and kept up by state and local authority, will connect every farm Poisoned Well Starts Rumors of

Federal licenses for motor vehicles used in interstate traffic, based on weight, load capacity (which must not be exceeded), power and speed. will furnish revenue to maintain the national highways. Let a suitable part thereof accrue to the states, in addition to the state registry fee, and be used to keep up roads that receive the hardest wear.

The system must be worked out so as to build up the rural districts, not result in more favors to cities. Here is an important duty for our national agricultural organizations. Above all, no graft, no favoritism, no politics in it. Develop waterways and hydroelectricity along with good roads.

### Removal of Snow.

Highway engineers in Illinois, Indiana, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania have made definite plans which will result in the main trunk lines being kept open from snow all winter.

### Unfit for Traffic.

Railroad, motive power and rolling stock were developed before the roadbed. Is it any wonder then that at the high tide of automobile and motortruck traffic, we find the greater portion of the 2,500,-000 miles of roads in this country unfit for the traffic imposed upon them?


### Rumor That Ex-President Wilson Would Make His Home There Awakened World's Interest.

Newspaper reports to the effect that ex-President Wilson had bought the island of Monte Cristo in the Tuscan archipelago, as the home for his retirement, caused the Rome Epoca to publish an interesting account of this romantic island, six miles square, which the elder Dumas assigned as a title to the hero of his famous novel, "The Count of Monte Cristo," Ex-President Wilson, says the Rome correspondent of the London Morning Post in summarizing the Epoca story, even had he so wished, could not have purchased the island, which is the property of the Italian state, and has been for many years

leased by the king of Italy. In the quiet days before the war, Victor Emmanuel III and Queen Elena used to pass some of their happlest hours at Monte Cristo, far from the cares of state and not near the Italian peninsula-for Monte Cristo is by no means easily accessible. Before the king, that well known sportsman and Alpinist, the Marchese Carlo Ginori, was tenant of the island, which he acquired in 1889, and on which he spent during his tenancy large sums. Before his time Monte Cristo became, in 1875, an agricultural colony, dependent upon the penal settlement of the neighboring island of Planosa, the exile of Agrippa Postumus, the grandson of Augustus, who, as Tacitus narrates, was there put to death on the accession of Tiberius. Earlier still, between 1860 and 1875, Monte Cristo was the abode of a strange visionary, Davide Lazzaretti, who lived in a cave and fancied that, like St. Francis of Assisi, he had received the stigmata. Shortly after the middle of the last century an Englishman named Taylor leased the island, laid out gardens and peared from its history. At that time, before the union of Italy, Monte Cristo was the property of the grand duchy of Tuscany, which, in 1850, had sent







The Swampscott (Mass.) Historical society has undertaken the happy enterprise of trying to save for posterity the John Humphrey house, which, as nearly as can be determined, has been standing in that town near the shores of Massachusetts bay for 284 years. If the date of its building can be fixed as of the year 1637some students believe it dates from 1634-then the John Humphrey house will be recognized as the oldest in New England, antedating the Fairbanks house in Dedham by one year.

The Historical society has had the title traced and a copy of an old map made from the original in the British museum. These go to show the structure it proposes to buy and preserve is the one dwelt in by Humphrey, who was assistant to Governor Winthrop. Some doubt has been expressed as to whether the building is the original house, a question having been raised as to the probability of fire having

destroyed that structure. The final test of this is to be made through the famous elm tree which, until last year, when it was blown down in a storm, stood in front of the house. The rings of the elm trunk are to be counted by the best authority available. If this should prove the tree to be at least 280 years old the Historical society will feel it has proved its case, for the elm stood so close to the Humphrey house it could not have escaped a fire destroying that struc-

When it is saved this house will be the third of such interesting structures preserved by historical societies and their friends within recent months. The others are the Harrison Gray Otis house standing at the corner of Lynde and Cambridge streets in Boston, which has been practically restored by the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities,

### SOME GOOD MAIN DISHES.

A good homely dish which is sufficiently satisfying for the hard-working head of a family is:

Dumplings and Steak, -Cook the steak first on one side, then on the other in a smoking hot, lightly greased frying pan. Season well and cover with boiling water. Drop on dumplings made by using one cup-

ful of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-third of a cupful of sweet milk, one-third of a teaspoonful of salt and one tablespoonful of fat. Drop by spoonfuls on the steak and cover tightly and steam for twenty minutes.

Tuna Fish Loaf .- Take a pound can of tuna fish, two whole eggs or whites of four, one-half cupful of water, onefourth teaspoonful of celery salt, one cupful of stale bread crumbs, one teaspoonful of baking powder, one teaspoonful of salt, the juice of half a

lemon and a speck of cayenne. Mix well, season to taste. Pack in a bread tin and brown. Turn out on a serving platter and pour parsley sauce over the loaf.

Parsley Sauce .- Wash and cover with boiling water one bunch of parsley to which a pinch of salt and soda has been added. Cook ten minutes, strain and add to a cupful of thick white sauce and stir in one tablespoonful of fresh minced parsley. Garnish with sprigs of fresh parsley. Mock Lobster Chowder .- Take one

cupful of flaked and soaked codfish, six medium-sized potatoes, three onions, two cupfuls of stewed tomato, one tablespoonful of salt, one-eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-half dozen milk crackers, two cupfuls of milk, one-half teaspoonful of soda. Put freshened codfish, sliced potatoes and onions into a kettle, cover with boiling water and cook until soft. Add the tomato, seasoning, heat well, add the soda to the milk and add the crackers. Bring to the boiling point

and serve. Ox-Tail Stew .- Cut one and one-half pounds of ox-tail into small pieces, cover with water, add salt and cook two hours. Then add two cupfuls of minced carrots, one cupful of minced onions, more seasoning, if needed, and cook one more hour. The last half hour before serving add one pint of strained tomato. If it seems too thin match you for first chance at him."- "Oh, no, he's not rich enough."



Thread Records.

A Swiss inventor has devised a gramophone which plays thread records instead of the modern hard rubber ones. In his machine a thousand yards of thread, enough to fill a small spool, may be played, giving more music than the largest hard rubber record made today.

The thread is ordinary thread treated with a coat of a specially prepared composition that is very sensitive to sound when it becomes hard. It is not affected by temperature, nor does it require any special care. Thus it is both inexpensive and durable.

### DISHES FROM JAMAICA.

Many of the wonderful fruits of the tropics which have no keeping qualities can never be tasted

unless one is privileged to visit the zone, as the flavor is lost or entirely spoiled by the ocean travel. Some of the dishes common in that clime are possible to produce and are well worth trying.

Coconut Pudding .- Grate one coconut and beat eight eggs, reserving three whites for a meringue. Beat in coconut, put into a buttered baking dish and bake until nearly done, then cover with the meringue prepared

from the three whites and three tablespoonfuls of powderd sugar, spread over the pudding and brown. Serve at once. This amount will serve eight.


Coconut and Tapioca Pudding .-Take one-half cupful of tapioca, one pint of milk, two eggs, one-quarter of a pound of granulated sugar (one-half cupful), one teaspoonful of butter, three heaping tablespoonfuls of grated coconut. Mix the tapioca and coconut, add the milk, beat the yolks of two eggs with the sugar and mix with the rest; stir in the butter and bake in a well-buttered baking dish set in a dish of water. When nearly done beat the two whites with two

tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar; spread over the top of the pudding and bake a light brown. Serve hot or cold


Coconut Biscuits .-- Grate one coconut fine. Beat the whites of two eggs until stiff; mix in gradually one cupful of granulated sugar and by degrees the grated coconut, beating all the while. With the hands lightly floured, roll this mixture into little balls the size of a walnut and bake them on a greased baking sheet. Bake at first in a moderate oven then increase the heat to brown and harden at the bottom or they will crumble

when handled. Fried Noodles.-Cook noodles in

boiling water for fifteen minutes. Drain, pour on cold water and cook in a little list fat in a frying pan until well seasoned.


