The several hundred members of the association have for 12 years been scale in the western hemisphere, and European societies whose aims are identical with those of the American workers have been operating since These bodies of investigators pursue their experiments by the use an inscription or return address and a serial number. The bands are usually made of aluminum and are manufactured in about a dozen different sizes to fit the legs of all birds, from the smallest warbler to the clumsy pelican and the mighty eagle.

Fifty-eight thousand of these bands have so far been made for the American Bird Banding association, and approximately 20,000 have been placed by members on the legs of native wild birds. Each ring is stamped with the words, "Notify Am. Museum, N. Y.," and following this, or on reverse side of the band, is a serial number. At the time the band is placed on the bird the bander records on a standard file card all information relating to the operation. These data include mber of the band, the name of the Ard, its age (whether nestling, fledgling or adult), locality, date, name of bander and remarks. The bird, having been thoroughly "catalogued," is sent on its way.

It was at the state hospital for the insane in Dunning. Surrounded by the "stuporous," or depressed types of insane patients, Mr. Boguslawski sat at a piano running through the emotional gamut of music. A small audi-

Can insanity be cured through music? After two years of research, Mr. Boguslawski claimed remarkable results from music on such cases. He has been performing experiments at the Dunning institution, it is said, for the last month. He has been holding weekly "musical clinics."

Psychiatrists and health department officials, as well as Chicago physicians, are watching the experiments at Dunning. At each "music therapeutics" test, as Mr. Boguslawski has named his psychiatric process, Dr. D. collected data for presentation to the American medical profession for dis-

"These experiments are the first of their kind ever conducted in the United States," said Dr. Rotman, "They are highly interesting. There is a universal potency to music; it appeals to the subtler elements of the mind. Patients long considered dull are aroused by this music to the expression of emotional display. The effect on that Italian woman, for instance, was overwhelming. Now we have found a response, she may be

One of the cases studied was Mary K., an Armenian refugee. She was made insane by war horrors. She saw her mother, father and brother slain before her eyes. The Chopin funeral march today brought her to her knees in mumbled prayer. Tragic memories apparently were revived. She fell on the floor, sobbing.

"Nostalgia," explained Boguslawski. "An intelligent approach. A relief through the caress of sympathetic music for pent-up desires, suppressions, imagined fears. Music is the scalpel which help open the wound. After that it's a case for physicians not musicians."

DEMAND FOR SAFE ROADWAYS

Some Kind of Protection Should Be Provided to Keep Cars From Skidding Off Dirt Roads.

What value do we place on a human ife? To judge by some of the roads over the country it is not much. Lives are lost many times where a few dollars or a little extra time would make a road safe enough so that taking a ride along them on a rainy day in an auto would not be such a hair-raising experience as is often the case now, ays a writer in Successful Farmer.

Recently a friend of mine was driving along a road within a half mile of a small town and ran into a ditch six feet deep, upsetting his car and smashing things up generally, though he escaped unhurt, and had no one with him. Many complaints had been made about that road, but nothing was done by anyone. On either side the ditch came within less than two feet of the roadway, and there was not even a ridge or anything to ward the wheels

off and keep them from sliding over. When hundreds of automobiles are owned in every part of the country and it is impossible to always keep off roads when they are slippery, it is not morally right and should not be legally right to leave them in a condition that would make an accident under ordinary conditions possible. During the last two years I have been riding around considerably and we have been in places where it was very dangerous driving, and often came upon such places with no chance at all to avoid them. In one case we crossed a bridge after a light shower, and on the far side found that it had caved away to within six inches of the road, though that was solid. For a rod the ditch was not two feet from the road, with nothing to check a slide into it. A very steep hill began just beyond the bridge. Our car could not make the hill, and we stalled, and had to back some. The least bit of skidding would have been certain to have car-

ried us over the bank and for several minutes it looked like we were to go down six or eight feet into a creek. It is not always that such places are on unimportant roads. In fact the first place mentioned was on a main traveled road between county seats, and automobiles used it on long distance travel. In the main it was a fine road well kept, but there were two or three places that were really danger-

ous, though this was the worst of all. Wherever there is a place at the side of a dirt road that has much travel, that is deep enough to upset a car that went down into it, some kind of protection should be made to keep cars from skidding off. We are not considering the quick dash to one side from careless driving or going too fast in mud, but the unavoidable skid that is bound to occur now and then. Our roads should be safe in muddy weather as far as we can make them for often at such times we have to use them with our cars.

UNITED STATES' GOOD ROADS

Work Is in Progress in Every Section to Give Country Superior Highway System.

The time is rapidly passing when the bad roads of America can be pointed out as a reproach. In every section of the country work is in progress to give the United States a system of reads which will compare favorably with those of other countries. Roads are being built at 2,985 different points. Fully 30,000 miles of road have been approved by the secretary of agriculture. It is estimated that this construction will cost the country near-\$400,000,000. 

INCREASE LAMB PRODUCTION

Sheep Can Successfully Be Raised Without Danger of Stomach

Worms or Other Parasites. (Prepared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.)

Specialized sheep farming, in which forage crops were used for the summer pasture, and a study of the relation of nutrition of ewes at breeding time to the percentage of lambs produced were included in the experimental work conducted last year by the United States Department of Agriculture at the government farms at Beltsville, Md., and Middlebury, Vt.

Data were obtained relative to the comparative relish with which sheep ate different forage crops and the gains made while pasturing upon them. It was demonstrated that with the frequent rotation necessary in



pasturing forage crops, sheep could be successfully raised without danger of infestation by stomach worms or other internal parasites. Experiments in the last four years to test the effect and she's had a heart-to-heart ta of feed at breeding time upon the size of the lamb crop have shown an increase of 18.8 per cent of lambs produced by increased nutrition of ewes during mating season for both Belts ville and Middlebury. This is an increase of 25.9 per cent in the Beltsville flock and 8.55 per cent in the Middlebury flock.

NEW BREEDS OF LIVE STOCK

Columbia Sheep Are Particularly Adapted to Range Conditions-New Type of Horse.

The United States Department of Agriculture is developing types of live stock believed to be more useful than some now represented by present breeds.

Range sheep breeding conducted in Clark county, Idaho, is resulting in a type which has become so fixed as to warrant its classification as a breed. These sheep, known as Columbia sheep, are particularly adapted to range conditions and are believed to be profitable both for mutton and wool production.

A new type of American utility horse is rapidly being established, in co-operation with the state, at Buffalo, Wyoming. Among the characteristics of the type-possibly entitled to the term 'breed'-are activity, strength, endurance, and reasonable speed. The horses are believed to meet a demand for general farm and ranch work, delivery purposes, and for certain classes of military serv-

Poultry breeding at the bureau farm, Beltsville, Md., shows progress in the establishment of a new breed of fowl. Certain characteristics, such as white plumage and yellow legs and skin, are now well fixed, but there is still considerable variation in the type and in color of eggs. The birds developed this year show improvement over those of a year ago.


JOINT OWNERSHIP OF SIRES

GOOD THINGS FOR FAMILY.

A dainty salad is always a welcome dish. The following will be found good and uncom-



mon: Pineapple and Cheese .- Arrange slices of pineapple on white leaves of lettuce. Fill the hole in the center of the

pineapple with cream cheese that has beer, softened to a paste with a little thick cream. Place a dash of paprika on the cheese and pile lightly on each ring pieces of apple, banana and grapefruit. Garnish with cherries and erve with French dressing.

Buttered Cream Onions .- Cook two bunches of young green onions, stems and all, in boiling salted water until tender, then drain. Lay the onions on buttered toast, pour over each a tablespoonful of melted butter and serve very hot. A thick rich cream sauce may be used if preferred.

Chocolate Cream Pie.-Line a deep pieplate with plain paste, wet the edge and put on a half-inch rim. Prick with a fork and bake in a hot oven. Prepare a filling by mixing five tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with one-half cupful of sugar and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt. Dilute with onefourth of a cupful of cold milk, add two cupfuls of scalded milk and cook over hot water for half an hour, stirring while thickening. Melt two squares of chocolate, add four tablespoonfuls of hot water, stir until smooth and add to the mixture. Remove from the stove and fold in the whites of two eggs, beaten stiff, Flavor with one teaspoonful of vanilla. While still hot pour the filling into the pie, fust as the crust comes from the oven. Serve cold, covered with one cupful of whipped cream unsweetened.

Baked Stuffed Heart .- Wash a beef heart, remove veins and arteries, Stuff with bread stuffing. Lard with salt pork, sprinkle with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Place in a double boiler and cook in a moderate oven three hours.

Noisette Bread.-Soften one cake shortening, two tablespoonfuls of molasses, one cupful of filbert meats, whole, and one-half cupful of whole wheat flour. Add white flour as needed for dough. Knead thoroughly, return to the bowl, cover closely and stand in a warm place free from draft until it has doubled in bulk. Shape into a loaf, place in pan, set aside to rise and bake in a moderate oven.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

Now that the young tender dandelion greens are here, let as try them



with the following dress-Dutch Dressing .- Wash and drain one pint of fresh tender greens, cut in two-inch pieces. Cut two ounces of bacon into small cubes and fry until crisp and brown. Beat

one egg until light, add two tablespoonfuls of sugar, onefourth teaspoonful of salt, one-third of a cupful of water, one-fourth cupful of vinegar. Pour this mixture into the frying pan with the bacon and mix well, stirring constantly until thickened. It should be about the consistency of cream. Pour boiling

hot over the dandelion greens. Pepper Pot.-Take a knuckle of veal, one and one-half pounds of honeycomb tripe. Cook the veal with a tablespoonful of salt, two large onions sliced, six allspice, ten peppercorns, two bay leaves, one tablespoonful of marjoram, one tablespoonful each of sweet basil and thyme, one hot red pepper, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of pepper, all in a bag, the red pepper cut in small pieces. Simmer for two hours, or until the veal is tender. Remove the veal from the stock. Cut the cleaned tripe, which has been washed in salt water and lastly in soda water, in julienne strips. Simmer in the stock for one hour. Add two large potatoes cut in dice and add egg balls the size of marbles, made by beating an egg and adding flour to make a dough stiff enough to roll in the hands. Cook for half an hour longer, then thicken with two tablespoonfuls of sweet fat and three of flour. Cook until well blended and serve hot. The veal may be chopped, or part of it, and added to the dish. This will serve ten persons.

Steamed Strawberry Shortcake .-Sift together two cupfuls and a half of flour; one-half cupful of sugar, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt; cut in one-fourth of a cupful of butter. Beat one egg, add one cupiul of milk and mix all together. Turn into a buttered hold and steam three hours. Serve hot with whipped cream and straw-




