OIL MAN BUYS 6,000 ACRES HUTCHINSON COUNTY LAND

Development work on the new purchase of 6,000 acres of land in Hutchinson county will be started at once, according Charles C. Patton. Mr. Patton, who is an operator of California and Kansas, bought the 6,000 acres of land frm J. A. Whittenburg of Plemons. The land lies from five to ten miles from the Gulf No. 2 well, west of Pampa. Oil lease activity of the Gulf since the Patton-Whittenburg deal was made.

Rumors are afloat that the Humble well, three miles southwest of Gulf No. 2, has found excellent indications below the gas sand. The well has been fenced for several days. Material is expectted to be on the

"There are very few Americans in Russia now. The government does not take kindly to visitors, and traveling has been made very difficult. They do not like to have travelers come through from Siberia, and no one is allowed to enter from the southern countries of Asia. Another newspaper man and myself were the only two Americans coming through from Siberia, and when we arrived in Moscow the authorities did not seem to like it, but finally they sent us through to Finland, and in this way we came out of the country.

"In Siberia Americans are very popular, as America has done a great deal for Siberia in sending clothing and other aid to the peorle, and also because the United States government did not recognize Kolchak. But the Russian people in the more western areas are very bitter toward us, as they feel that we offer greater resistance than any other country, and they say that we are the last stronghold of capitalism. Their ideas are that communism is bound to prevail all over the world, and that they will

Issue Ration Cards.

"Rations are served to every one in Russia, but there is really great order there. A traveler gets one pound of black bread a day and one-half pound of sausage and some salt, sugar and tea, but the residents only get one pound of black bread and no sausage. They give you ration cards for which you can draw from the government stores, but only one meal a day. You must buy the rest from whatever sources you may be able to find. There are government restaurants and there are also some public markets in Moscow, but the government means to eventually control all food products and dispense with the public markets; they would do that now, but they find it difficult to prevent those that are

"There is no gasoline to run the trucks and automobiles, but they use as a substitute a spirit made from potatoes. This is also drunk quite generally as a stimulant. It is poorly made alcohol and not so good as the vodka that they used to have in former times, but it is consumed in great quantities. Prohibition prevails, though, all over Russia and it seems to be a good thing.



AMERICANISM BILLS GET O. K.

its disabled and for its whole member- Three Measures Written by the Amer ican Legion Become Laws in Oklahoma, June 25.

> Three Americanism bills written by the American Legion and introduced in the Oklahoma state legislature at the request of that organization, have been passed by the state lawmaking body, signed by Governor Robertson and will become laws on June 25.

House bill No. 383 provides that the American flag shall be displayed at all times in every school room in the state-public, private and denominational-and that pupils shall be taught proper respect and reverence for it by the state school superintendent. A penalty is provided for viola-

American history and civil government are made compulsory subjects for study in all schools of the state under house bill No. 384.

HORSEPOWER ON GOOD ROADS

Figures Show How Hard Surfacing of Highways Facilitates Transportation to Market.

The value of hard surfaced roads in getting products to market or in taking goods from the cities to the farms is shown by these facts, according to the Oklahoman:

Suppose a load weighing 6,270 pounds must be taken to market. On four different types of roads, the following number of horses, it is estimated, would be required to pull the load, using the same wagon in each Baby,

On a loose sand or mud road, ten

On a dirt road, five horses, On a gravel road, two horses.

On a good macadam road, one horse. To illustrate again: Suppose a farmer uses one horse to pull his products to market. On the various roads, with the same wagon, the horse can pull the following:

About 800 pounds on a muddy dirt road.

From 1,200 to 1,500 pounds on a smooth dry dirt road. About 3,000 pounds on a good gravel

From 5,000 to 6,300 pounds on a good macadam road.





FEED FOR WINTERING STEERS

Methods Used and Results Obtained by Department of Agriculture at Lewisburg, W. Va.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.)

Experiments to determine the most desirable rations and methods for wintering steers were continued last year at Lewisburg, W. Va., by the United States Department of Agriculture, cooperating with the state agricultural experiment station. Sixty two-yearold steers, averaging 927 pounds in weight, were divided into six lots of ten each and wintered for a period of 128 days, beginning December 23, 1919. The greatest gain-93 pounds-was made by the lot fed on a daily ration of 25 pounds of silage, 5.4 pounds of straw, and one pound of cottonseed meal. Other rations and gains were: Silage (40 pounds), gain, 79 pounds

silage (30 pounds) and cottonseed meal (one and a half pounds), gain, 67 pounds; silage (25 pounds) and mixed hay (eight pounds), gain, 63 pounds; mixed hay (20 pounds) and ear corn (two pounds), gain, 25 pounds; silage (30 pounds), gain 22 pounds.

The steers used in the wintering experiments at Lewisburg were grazed on pasture to determine the effect which the different rations fed and methods of wintering had on subsequent pasture gains.

PUREBRED FEMALES FAVORED

In Opinion of Specialists Number of Purebreds of Both Sexes Is Rapidly Increasing.

According to figures announced by the United States Department of Agriculture, live stock owners in the United States show a tendency toward purebred female animals as well as toward purebred sires. In fact, the use of well-bred sires appears to increase the use of good females. During the period October 1, 1919, to March 31, 1920, the quality of female fast set.' stock kept in herds and flocks headed of it." purebred, and 2.5 per cent scrub. The remaining number were grades of crossbreds. Later figures covering the period October 1, 1919, to December 31, 1920, show that the number of purebred females kept under corresponding conditions had increased to 55.9 per cent and scrubs had fallen

These figures are based on a knowl. edge of the breeding of nearly 400,000 head of animals and poultry. In the opinion of department live stock specialists, the more general use of purebreds of both sexes on farms in the United States is increasing. In about a year, it appears, the increase in the use of purebred females by purebredsire users has been at least 7 per cent.

DEVELOP HORSES AND COLTS

Protein Feeds Tend to Produce Muscle -Concentrates Are Necessary for Work Animals.

For young horses and colts muscle development is very important. Protein feeds tend to produce this. So do leguminous hays, such as alfalfa, clover, cowpeas, soy beans and peanuts. The following concentrates are Adv. valuable: Wheat bran, cottonseed meal, rice, bran and shorts. From one to two pounds of cottonseed meal a day with the grain have been found to be very economical and highly desirable for horses doing heavy work.

SELLS HIS POOR PUREBREDS

Undersized and Poorly Conformed Animals Sold for Beef by Nebraska Live Stock Man.






