Dress Contest Saturday, July 11



Barnett Wins Local Golf Tournament

S. J. Barnett defeated George Meredith 6 and 5 to cop the cham-pionship of the Eastland Golf and Country club in the 11th annual Fourth of July tournament. These two youthful prodigies have been setting the pace for Eastland golf-ers and taking high places in the invitation tournaments all over West Texas since their early teens. Barnett was the 1929 cham-pion and Meredith the 1930 cham-pion so it is little wonder that a pion so it is little wonder that a large crowd disregarded the blazing sun to follow them in their superb battle for this year's title

superb battle for this year's title. The whole week up until Sat-urday the 4th had been spent in qualifying rounds to enter the big event. Elimination matches were started bright and early on the morning of the Fourth with 64 en-trants. Brilliant play featured in nearly all the matches with every man fighting a grim battle to place.

place. Barnett won his way to the fin-als in a close semi-final contest with James Smith of Ranger win-ning one up on the 18th. At the beginning of the match, Smith won the second hole to be one up, but Barnett quickly got it back and during most of the rest of the match he managed to lead Smith by a hole or so. Smith got his perfect second shot on the green and al-though he missed his putt for an eagle, got a birdie four which was sufficient to beat Barnett's par. There are Indians living on the margins of Lake Marakaibou on houses built over the shallow wa-ter. These live by fishing. Other Indians live a miserable existance around the outskirts of the city. Their women sometimes work as servants — almost slaves. Believe it or not, among this group there is one rather old blond woman. She probably was stolen as a baby from some German settler's fam-ily as she has all German features. I had been in the country about six or seven months when I began
