Short Course Big Success

The twenty second annual Farmers Short Course will go down in history as the most successful one that has been conducted. The attendance was slightly under that of last year but the program was of the highest order and the entertainment was all that could be desired. Thirty two people from Eastland county attended all or a part of the session.

Fading of Profits

"When the color of a soil begins to change from dark to light the farmer should look out. A change in the other direction—from light to dark—usually indicates improvement, more organic matter. But a fading soil in most cases means fading crop returns."

"Erosion, speeded up by cultivation has profoundly altered soil conditions in the Texas black lands, the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils of the United States Department of Agriculture has found. This land in a virgin condition produced from 1-2 to 1 bale of cotton per acre without manure or fertilizer of any kind."

"Department soil specialists warn that unless vastly more is done in the future to protect the erosive slopes of Texas than has been done in the past the rolling areas of this great cotton-producing belt are doomed to destruction. This warning is just as pertinent to Eastland county land owners as it is to the blacklanders of Central Texas."

Gas Commission (Continued from page 1) grounds of this city, and lay below the surface, through and on bridges, viaducts of said city, gas mains, pipe and equipment, and all necessary and proper attachments, connections, fixtures and appurtenances for the purpose of manufacturing, supplying, distributing, transmitting and selling manufactured or natural gas to, in, through, or from the said City of Eastland, with the rights at all times during the life of this franchise, to dig, and excavate, for the purpose of constructing, laying, repairing, relaying, replacing and for removing said gas mains, pipes, equipment, or any portion thereof, and for the same purpose to make any connection thereof for the said City and gas consumers, with such pipe lines and

to charge any gas used a minimum of \$1.25 per month, and shall have the right to charge a connection or tapping fee of \$3.00 when connections to the mains are made. Each consumer shall pay for the gas furnished to him on or before the tenth (10th) day of the month following that during which the gas is used; and in the event the consumer shall fail to pay for the gas so used during any month on or before the tenth day of the month following that during which the gas is used, then the grantee, his successors and assigns are given the right to discontinue or cut off the gas supply from such delinquent. Section 3. That the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns are hereby privileged and granted the further right of furnishing and distributing industrial gas, natural or manufactured, to users thereof, in said city, at such rates and under such conditions as may be agreed upon. Section 4. That the meters used under this franchise shall be of standard type and shall be conditioned and maintained by the grantee, his successors and assigns, so as to run not less than 2 percent slow or fast, and shall be installed and maintained by the grantee for each gas user; and that customers or gas users may be required to deposit a minimum of ten dollars (\$10.00), meter deposit to guarantee payment of monthly bills or to pay such other sum as a deposit as may reasonably be estimated as amount of a customer's monthly bills. Section 5. That the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, have the right to adopt all such rules and regulations as may be necessary and proper to operate their gas distributing and manufacturing system; to protect themselves from loss or damage by imposition or fraud, and to prevent the wastes of gas; and to make all reasonable rules and regulations governing the method of making connections and testing meters in compliance with any and all laws of the State of Texas. Section 6. That it shall be the right of the City of Eastland, acting by and through its manager, board of commissioners, agents and servants, duly authorized, to inspect the pipe, connections, equipment, and meters at any time; to inspect the books of the grantees at any time, and the grantees are bound to make reports at least once a year, or oftener if necessary, to the board of city commissioners when requested for such report is called for; and the said City is hereby authorizing by its agents and servants, to test any and all meters and equipment used for supplying gas to the inhabitants of the City. Section 7. That the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, shall furnish gas at the line of the street next to the consumer, all service pipe and fixtures to be furnished by the consumer or at his expense. The cut off shall be furnished and maintained by the grantee at the curb line of the street. Each consumer shall keep the pipe lines on his premises free from any and all leaks and waste, and in event any consumer shall fail to do so within twenty-four hours after having been given notice, the grantee may cut off the supply of gas until such leaks and escapage have been repaired; and in any instance where the gas has been cut off for non-payment of bills or to prevent waste and leakage, the grantee has the right to make a charge of \$1.00 per turning on again the gas supply to such consumer. Section 8. That in event of any change in the grade of any street or any public place in said City, by the governing body thereof, then the grantee herein may be required to remove, relay or replace and relocate his pipes, mains and equipment that may be affected, so as to conform to the street grade after such changes or grades have been made, and the expense of such removal, replacing and relaying shall be borne by the grantee. Section 9. That the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, in constructing, laying and maintaining the gas lines for such gas distributing system, shall install in the system a reasonable number of regulators over such system as will maintain in the gas mains a pressure of about eight ounces above an atmospheric pressure of fourteen and four tenths (14.4 lbs.) pounds, so as to give a pressure of at least four ounces at the customer's meter. Section 10. That the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, shall lay a sufficient number of mains and lines within the limits of said city, and such mains and lines shall be sufficient in size to supply the amount of gas required by the citizenship of the city, such mains and lines are to be extended and made accessible to any consumers, provided, however, that existing conditions are justifiable and the permanent financial returns are shown to be possible for the amount interested in same. Section 11. That the failure, at any time, on the part of the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, subject to all the provisions herein, to comply with all the provisions of this franchise ordinance, or the failure to keep the contemplated gas plant and distributing system in operation, shall work a forfeiture of this franchise and all the rights, powers, and privileges granted herein, provided that at least 90 days written notice shall be given the grantee, or his successor, or assigns that any such forfeiture shall be claimed; and provided further, that the closing of such plant and distributing system for necessary repairs or on account of strikes, fires, or other unavoidable causes or causes shall not work a forfeiture, and provided also that the grantee herein, his successors and assigns shall at all times exercise due diligence in making such repairs. Section 12. That the said City of Eastland agrees to protect the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns in all legal ways in and to the rights, powers and privileges granted in this franchise. Section 13. That it is ordered to carry out and perform all the obligations of this franchise and to make the said City of Eastland, Texas, safe in awarding this franchise to the said John W. Moore, his successors and assigns, the said John W. Moore, for himself, his successors and assigns, agrees to execute his bond to the City of Eastland in the penal sum of \$25,000.00, either in some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, as surety, or with private sureties satisfactory to the board of city commissioners, conditional for the full and faithful performance of each and all obligations contained in and imposed by the terms of this franchise; that the said John W. Moore agrees and binds himself to begin, within 30 days after the acceptance of his bond, the work of constructing said gas distributing system, and to prosecute the same with due diligence from day to day and to complete the construction thereof within 90 working days after the com-

ment of the first construction work, reasonable time to be taken if necessary to secure material, pipe, and other supplies. Section 14. That this ordinance shall be in effect and force from and after its passage and adoption, provided the said John W. Moore shall accept the same on his part within 15 days after its passage, and shall within such time execute the bond provided for in section 13 of this ordinance.

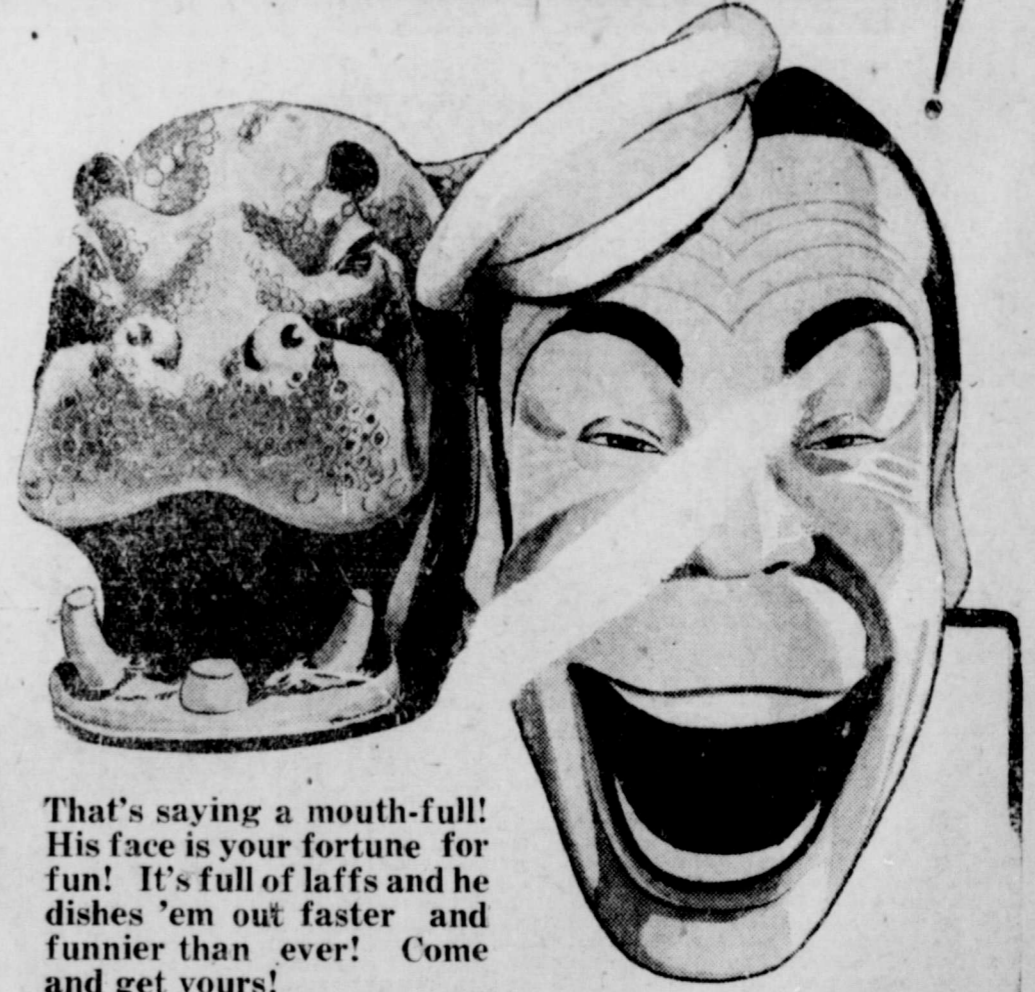
