It's time again for another big Bull Town Days celebration.

From here, it appears that everything is in readiness for the annual celebration. Last minute details are still to be taken care of, of course, but they will be as said minutes arrive.

The celebration has taken, and will take, a lot of planning and work by a lot of people.

We hope that a large crowd will be on hand to enjoy all the festivities and feel sure that it will be.

Planning for a celebration such as Bull Town Days doesn't start just the week before, as most people realize. As a matter of fact, the planning lasts a full year. Plans for next year will start being made as quickly as this year's celebration gets underway.

This is especially true when all the work is being done on a volunteer basis as it is during Bull Town Days. The pay comes in the form of much criticism and little praise, all too often.

Nonetheless, Bull Town Days has proven to be a highly popular Parmer County celebration during the past couple of years. This year it promises to be bigger and better.

Get ready to join in the fun!

Being general chairman of the celebration is no small chore. Jack McCracken, who served in that capacity during '64 and '65, and C. E. Trimble, who is in charge this year, will readily agree to that.

C. E. says he knew when he took the job that there would be a lot of work. What he hadn't counted on was the number of phone calls that would be a part of the duties.

He admits that there have been periods of time during the past month when he hasn't been able to return all the phone calls which have been made to him.

This has caused some exasperation on the part of his wife, Esther, who dutifully answers the phone and promises callers that she will have C. E. call them back when he comes in. The exasperation part comes in when C. E. hasn't had time to return the calls because of the press of other matters.

Esther has threatened to run a public notice in The Blade, we understand, stating that she "will no longer be responsible for C. E. returning phone calls."

We can understand how there just wouldn't be enough time in the days . . . and nights . . . for a Bull Town Days general chairman to do all the things he feels need doing.

There are as many stories about sore arms as there are washed up baseball and softball players. We weren't going to add our story to the already-long list until we had a conversation with Jim Russell, the Wheat Growers man, recently.

## Crowd Of Thousands Expected To Attend

Bovina's red carpet, longer and wider than ever before, is rolled out to everyone for the annual Bull Town Days celebration this weekend.

Leaders of the event expect more than 6000 people to be present for the festivities, which will be highlighted by a free barbecue meal downtown Friday evening. Serving will begin at 5 p.m.

The celebration gets underway tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon and continued Friday and Saturday.

This is the third consecutive year for the celebration. The crowd in 1964 was estimated at 4000 and 6000 were on hand a year ago.

Nine head of fat cattle have been killed to furnish meat for the feed. Locally-grown cantaloupe, pinto beans and onions will also be on the menu.

Other events scheduled for Friday, which is the "biggest" of the three-day celebration, include heading and heeling team roping. It will be at the roping arena west of town and will begin at 1 p.m. Admission charges will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children.

The downtown parade will be unreeled Friday morning at 10. The parade is expected to have as many as 200 horses in addition to floats, machinery displays and other exhibits.

A chuckwagon breakfast is slated for Friday morning at Bovina Gin Co. Serving will begin at 8 and continue until 9:30.

Also to begin at 10 at the Masonic Lodge Hall is a reunion of oldtimers, Bovina Woman's Study Club will be in charge of this part of the celebration. The Study Club will also have a basket lunch for oldtimers at noon Friday; this will also be at the Lodge Hall.

An old fiddlers contest will be staged Friday afternoon and night. The fiddling competition will be on Bovina's Main Street. Eliminations begin at 2 p.m. with the finals scheduled to start at 6 p.m.

Friday's schedule will be concluded with a square dance downtown beginning at 8 and a teenage dance at the fire station which will start at the same time.

Saturday's schedule will feature the sixth annual Quarter Horse Show of Bovina Roping Club. Judging will get underway at 10 a.m. It will be at the Roping Arena west of town.

Saturday night, a professional wrestling card will be staged at Bovina High School football field. Wrestlers from Amarillo will do battle beginning at 8:30.

A banquet for ex-students of Bovina Schools is slated for 7 p.m. It will be in the school cafeteria.

The first event on the celebration agenda is junior horsemanship activities. This will begin at 1 p.m. Thursday and will be at the roping arena.

The annual cow calling contest is slated for 6 p.m. Beard growers will compete in their specialty at 6:30.

The Bull Town Days Queen Contest starts at 7 p.m. It, too, will be at the arena.

Following the queens' contest, the action shifts to the school auditorium for a variety show which will feature a "womanless wedding," the first in Bovina in recent years.

"Everyone in the area is cordially invited to take part in all the Bull Town Days events," welcomes C. E. Trimble, general chairman of the 1966 celebration.

Trimble is assisted by Rouel Barron, president of Bovina Roping Club and Leon Grissom, president of Bovina Chamber of Commerce. The chamber and the roping club are co-sponsors of the celebration.

Details about the various events appears in individual stories in this issue of The Blade.

## Expect More Than 6000 For Barbecue

Barbecue will be prepared for more than 6000 people for the free Bull Town Days feed

which is set for Friday at 5 p.m. in downtown Bovina. Nine beef were purchased to

feed the expected crowd. Eight were bought from Edwin Lide and one from Pete Davies.

In addition to the barbecue, the menu will consist of pinto beans, onions and Bovina cantaloupe.

Mutt Graham is in charge of cooking the meat and Robert Hopingardner will be chief assistant. The meat will be bar-

## Tag Team Match Wrestling Feature

Two preliminary bouts and a tag team main event match are on the Bull Town Days professional wrestling card.

The wrestling show is scheduled for Saturday night at 8:30. It will be at the football field with a portable ring set up to handle the action.

The tag team match, which will be the best two of three falls with a one hour time limit, will pit Terry Funk and Gory Guerrero against The Bull Towner and Jose Moto.

In the opening event, which will be one fall or 15 minute time limits, The Bull Towners will fight Terry Funk and Jose Moto will go against Gory Guerrero.

A crowd of near 1000 is expected to be on hand for the matches.

These will be the first professional wrestling matches ever held in Bovina and possibly in Parmer County.

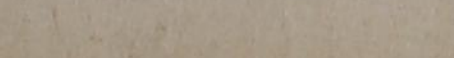
Admission charges will be \$2 for ringside, \$1.50 for general admission and 50 cents for children.

Tickets are on sale in advance from members of the board of directors of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and the Bovina Roping Club.

## Team Roping Sports Highlight

One of the main sports features of Bovina's Bull Town Days celebration will be team roping, heading and heeling. This event will be at the rop-

ing arena west of town. It will begin at 1 p.m. Friday.

"We expect 30 to 40 teams of ropers," says Bill Lookingbill, chairman of this portion of the festivities and a member of Bovina Roping Club.

Admission charges will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children with pre-schoolage children admitted free. Bleachers have been set up at the

arena to provide more comfort for spectators.

The ropers work in teams of two. One roper ropes a steer's head and the other his hind legs. After both team members have made their loops secure, they face their horses toward each other signaling their performance is complete.

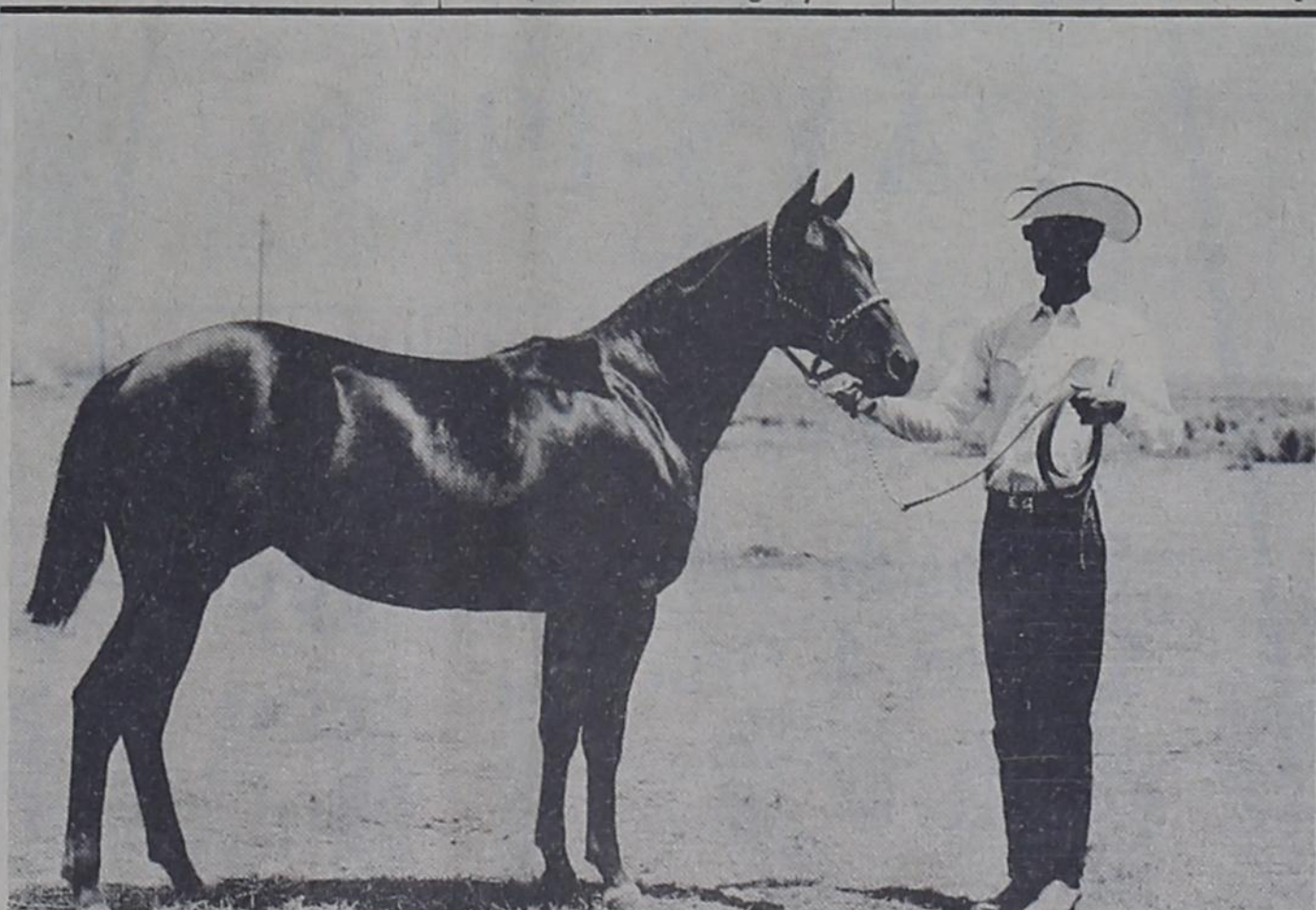
Each team will rope four steers with the time figured on all four. The winning team in the average will be figured and prize money will be paid to winners of each of the four rounds. Entry fee is \$30 per team. Of this total, \$20 goes into the jackpot to be paid back to the ropers. \$8 goes for use of the steers and \$2 is office expense.

On the committee to assist Lookingbill with the steer roping are Jon Lin Riddle, Rouel Barron, and Owen Patton.

The steers, 40 head, will be leased from Farwell Roping Club. They weigh approximately 450 pounds each.

Mrs. Robert Read will be bookkeeper for the event. Rouel Barron and Bud Crump will serve as timekeepers. Gate keepers at the entrances to the arena will be Houston Bartlett,

## Sign Teachers, Raise Lunches

Two teachers were added to the faculty of Bovina Schools last week, reducing the number of vacancies to two. Signed to teach a first grade section was Mrs. Pearl Hickman of Clovis. She formerly taught in the Clovis Schools system and has a masters degree. Mrs. Hazel Ford, teacher of a sixth grade section last year who had earlier resigned, was rehired to her former post.

Teachers are still needed for high school science and a fourth grade section, according to Otis Spears, superintendent.

At a Monday night meeting of the school board, prices of lunch tickets for the forthcoming school year were increased to 35 cents for grade school students and 40 cents for high schoolers and teachers. The prices were raised from 30 and 35 cents.

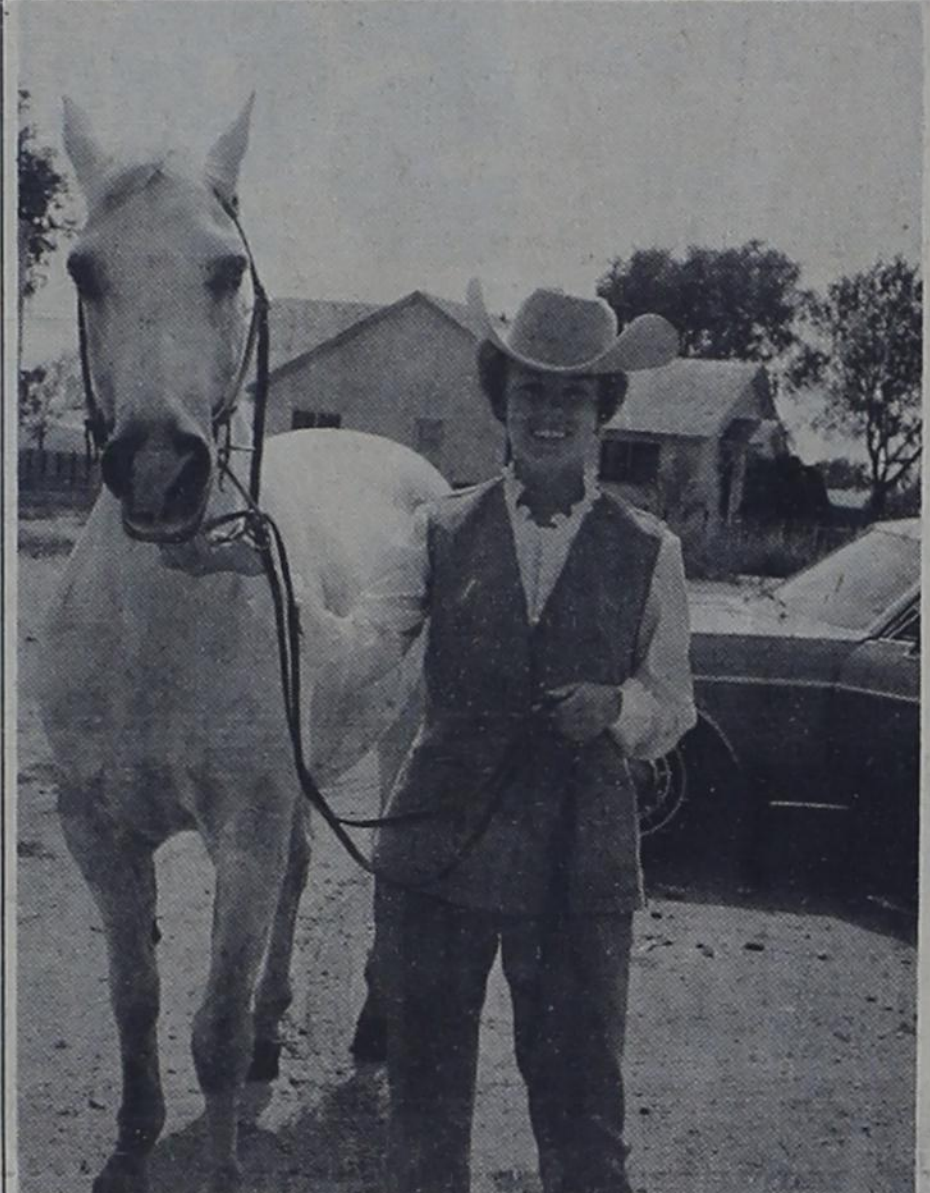

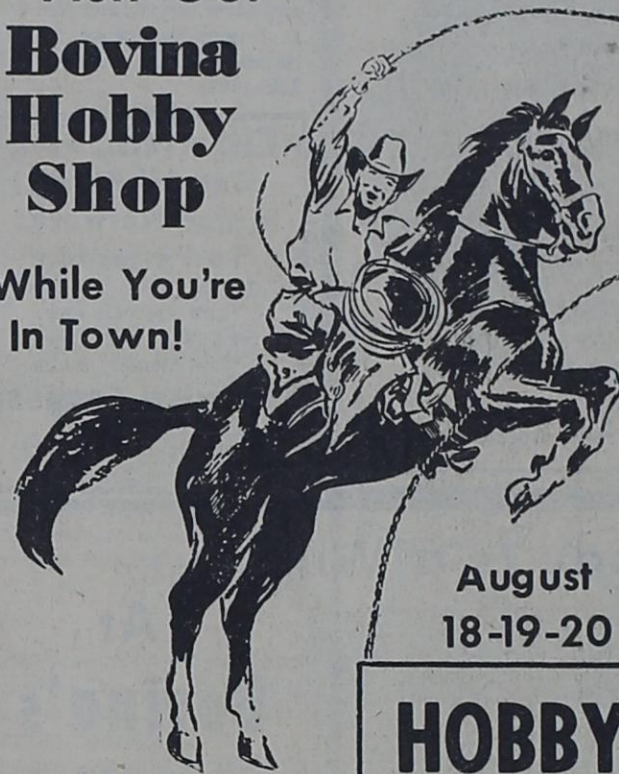

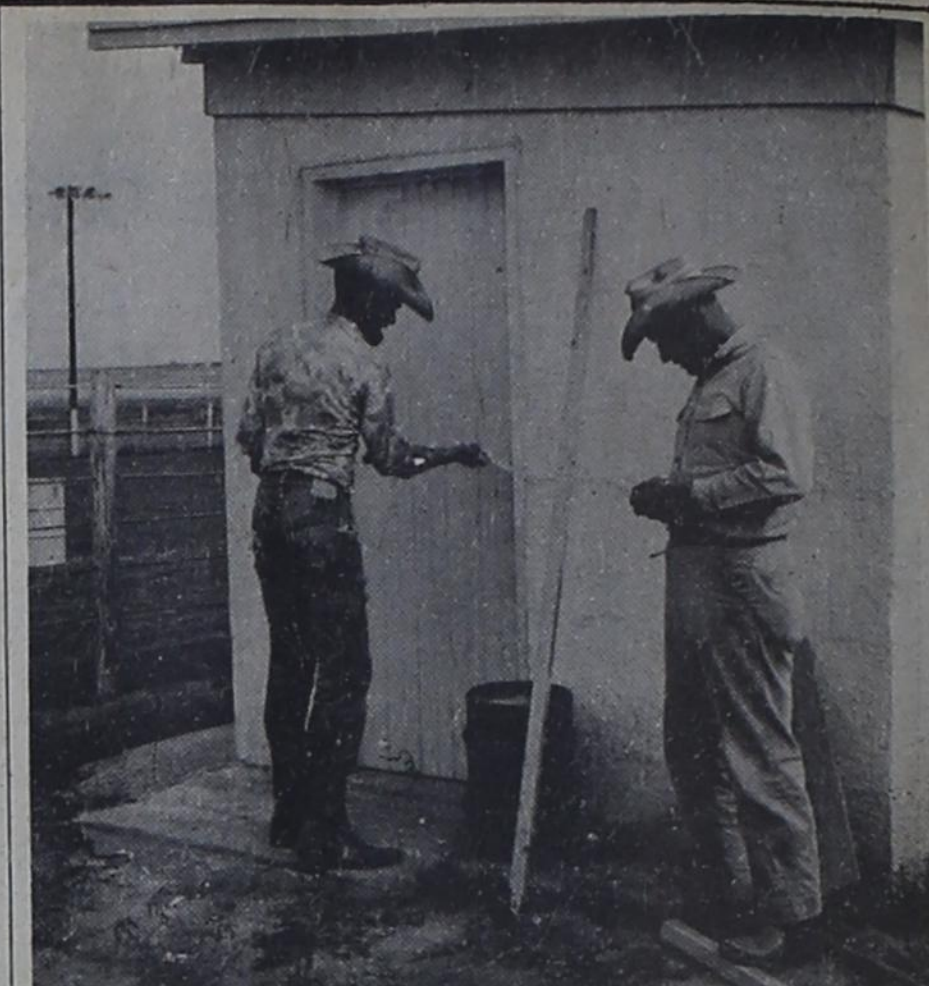

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24** proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:  
"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election."  
(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election."  
(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13** proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:  
"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor."

The wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor."  
provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term "qualified elector" as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The text of this Section, as so amended, is shown below, with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new language underscored:  
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. The wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;  
(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and  
(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13** proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:  
"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor."  
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provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term "qualified elector" as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature."

The text of this Section, as so amended, is shown below, with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new language underscored:  
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. The wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor."  
provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term "qualified elector" as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."  
"AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

Sec. 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

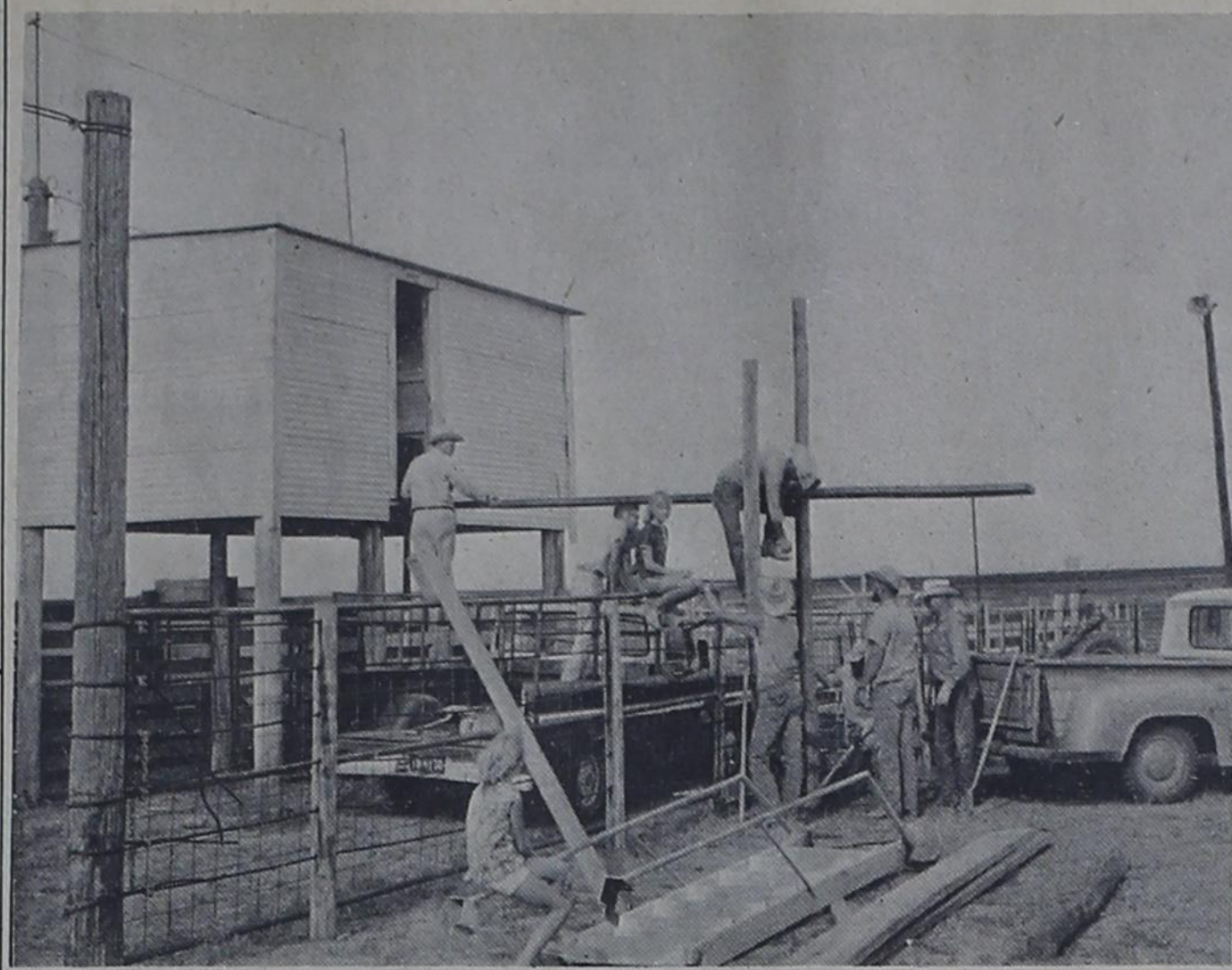

# Blade Sawdust

With all the old timers in town and the fact that Bull Town Days signifies a reunion of old times and people we decided to do a column on some of the old things we remember about Bovina from the late 40's and 50's.

Do you remember the old post office when it was a real small house on Main Street and Mrs. Margaret Caldwell worked there?

One could always walk on down the street and encounter a free ice cream cone or some money. The City Cafe which is now the Spudnut Shop had an old tree stump in front of it and a man called Dad Brichford sat there most of the time. This kindly gentleman was a "grandfather" to all the kids in town. He was good for a nickel any day of the week and on some days a quarter.

During these days bubble gum was rather scarce due to the war and one felt like a millionaire with a week old chew of gum. The first bubble gum we remember having after the war was obtained at the old Consumer building. It was pink and would last a whole week on the bed post if ones mother didn't find it.

One could journey into the Drug Store buy a Coke from John Kimbrow. His, "What do you want," didn't scare us much more then than it would now.

Entertainment on Saturday night was going to town to watch the people. The kids spent most of the evening begging for another nickel and playing hide and seek. There were some great hiding spots since most of the buildings had space between them at that time. Cars also had running boards and one could rest on these without having to get inside the car.

Some of the things we remember about school at this time was

the fact that Mrs. Roscoe Trossle taught first grade and that school meals were served from a buffet line in the hall and eaten in the room. If our memory serves correctly, Lula White was one of the cooks.

This, too, was the era of six man football and Bobby Kelly was the star.

About this same time Bovina had a skating rink in the school gym. This was before gymnasiums became sacred. More families attended skating on Friday nights than a free barbecue.

W. O. Cherry was superintendent of schools and R. E. Everett was high school principal. The entire school system was housed in one two-story building. That shows how much our schools have grown.

Churches were frame buildings and the air conditioner was a cardboard fan with advertisements printed on it.

A few years passed and we had eleven man football and a basketball team that put Bovina on the map. That year we went to state. Those on that team included Darrell Read, Larry Ezell, Bobby Calaway, Erith Hawkins, Don Owens and many others. The caravan that left for Austin that fateful morning was led by none other than Billie Sudderth.

About this same time the school building burned and classes were being held in various buildings over town. Churches were used as well as some old buildings that the school bought. These were days of wind and sand, mud, snow, muck and mire but classes were continued and school spirit was strong.

One no longer had to read the news from a column in the State Line Tribune as Bovina had its first newspaper, The Bovina Blade.

The plug for a lighted baseball field was just beginning and has since been accomplished.

Bovina was becoming metropolitan as one didn't have to go to Hammonds Service Station for a Coke and a Mana Ruth anymore. Bovina Dairy Freeze was a full fledged drive in with Cokes, ice cream and the works.

These are just a few of the things we recall about Bull Town. They were good ole days but it is better to look ahead and try to determine the future than to dwell in the past.

## Proposed Amendments On November Ballot

Parmer County voters will join others in Texas in marking a king-sized ballot in the general election in November. The main reason for the increased size of the ballot will be 16 proposed state constitutional amendments.

The 16 amendments have been submitted by the state legislature for the voters to decide on.

State law requires that the text of the amendments be published in order for voters to have ample opportunity to be informed.

Three of the amendments are being published in The Bovina Blade while the others appear in other Parmer County newspapers.

Following are brief descriptions of the proposed amendments:

Amendment No. 1 -- Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for

agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

Amendment No. 2 -- Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

Amendment No. 3 -- Would withdraw Arlington State College from participating in the Permanent University Fund.

Amendment No. 4 -- Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

Amendment No. 5 -- Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others.

Amendment No. 6 -- Provides for payment of assistance to

survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full-paid firemen.

Amendment No. 7 -- Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

Amendment No. 8 -- Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

Amendment No. 9 -- Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Crimi-

nal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

Amendment No. 10 -- Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election.

Amendment No. 11 -- Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

Amendment No. 12 -- Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

Amendment No. 13 -- Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within

a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental con-

tracts between political subdivisions of the county.

Amendment No. 14 -- Would

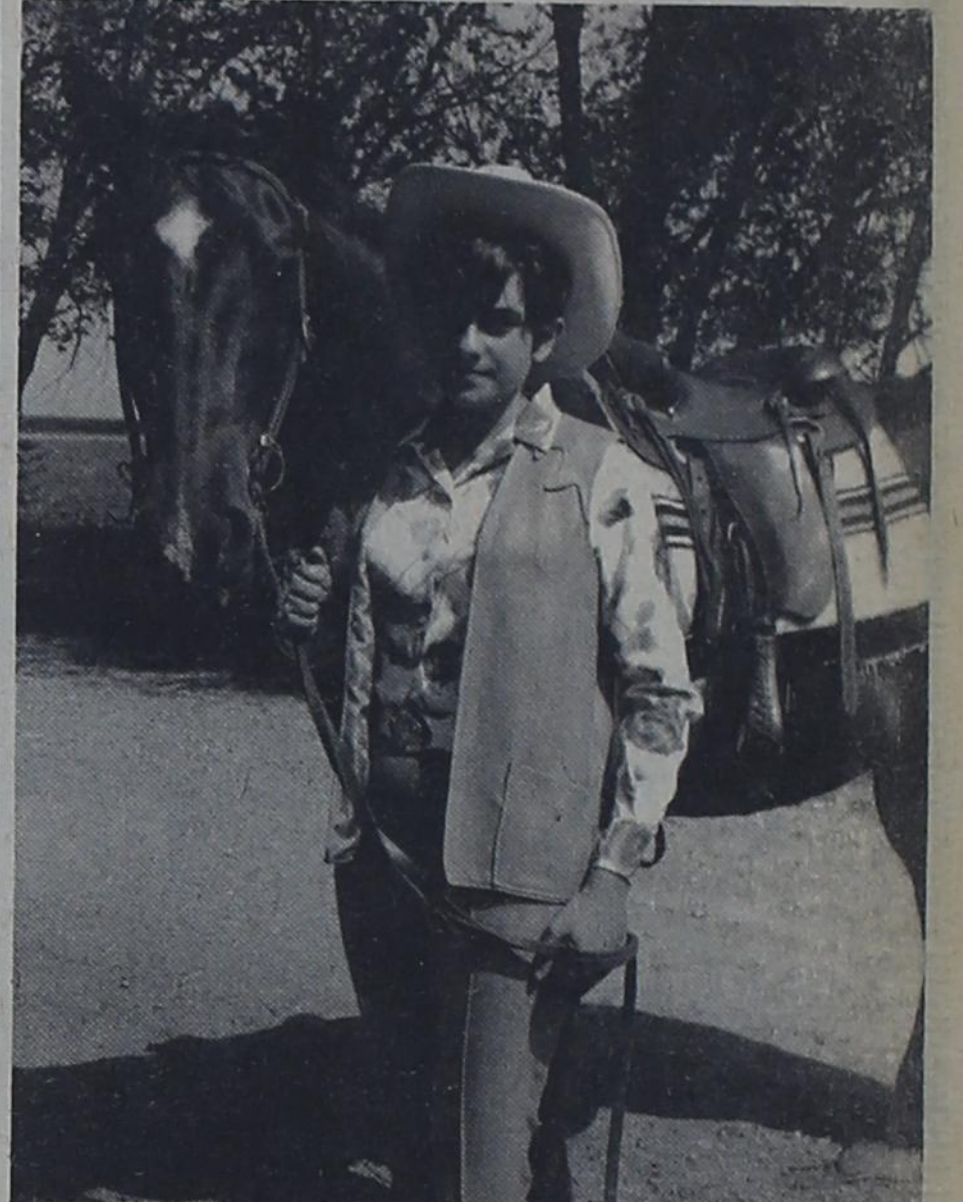
allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence re-

quirement applicable to Texans in general.

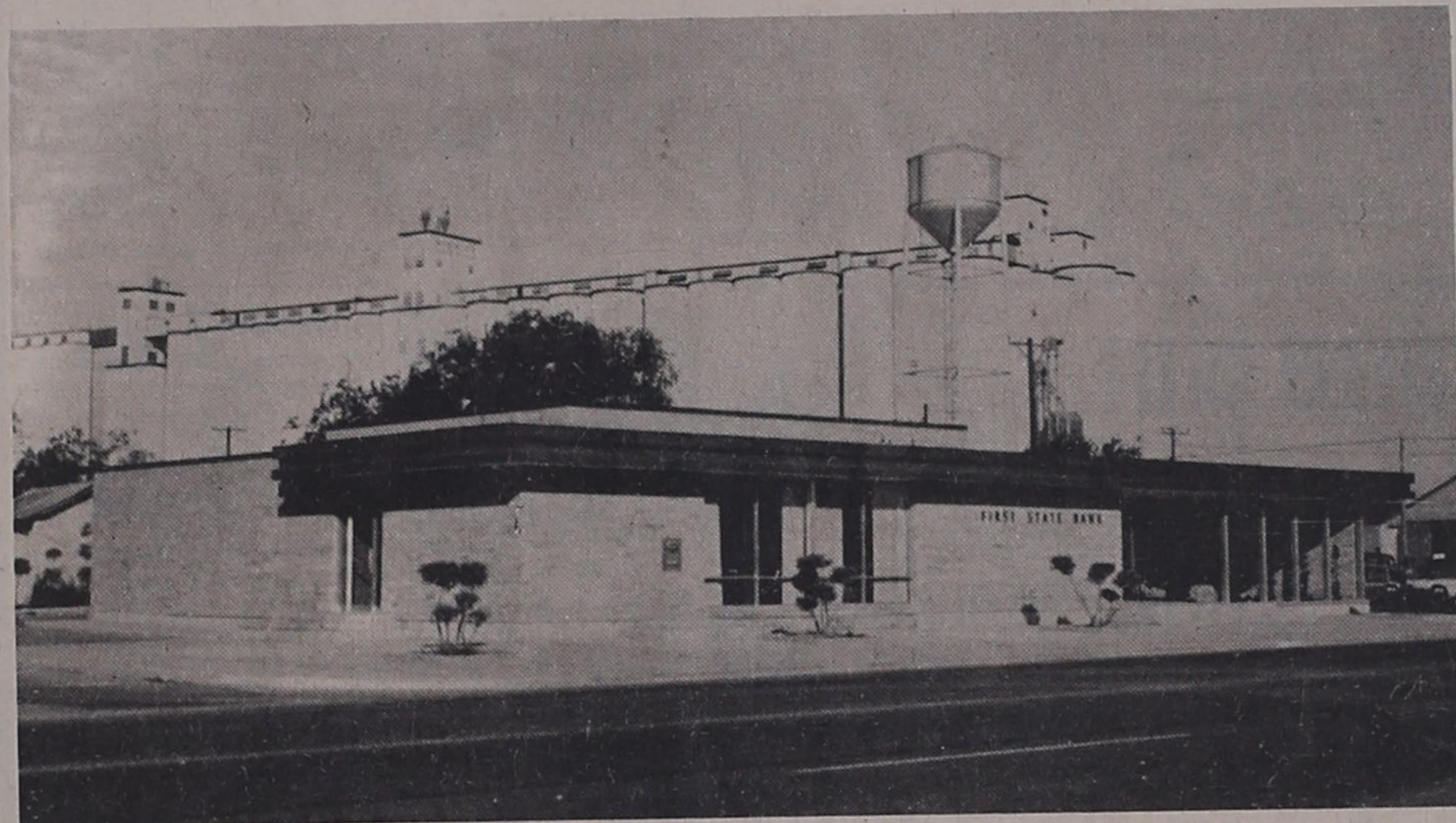

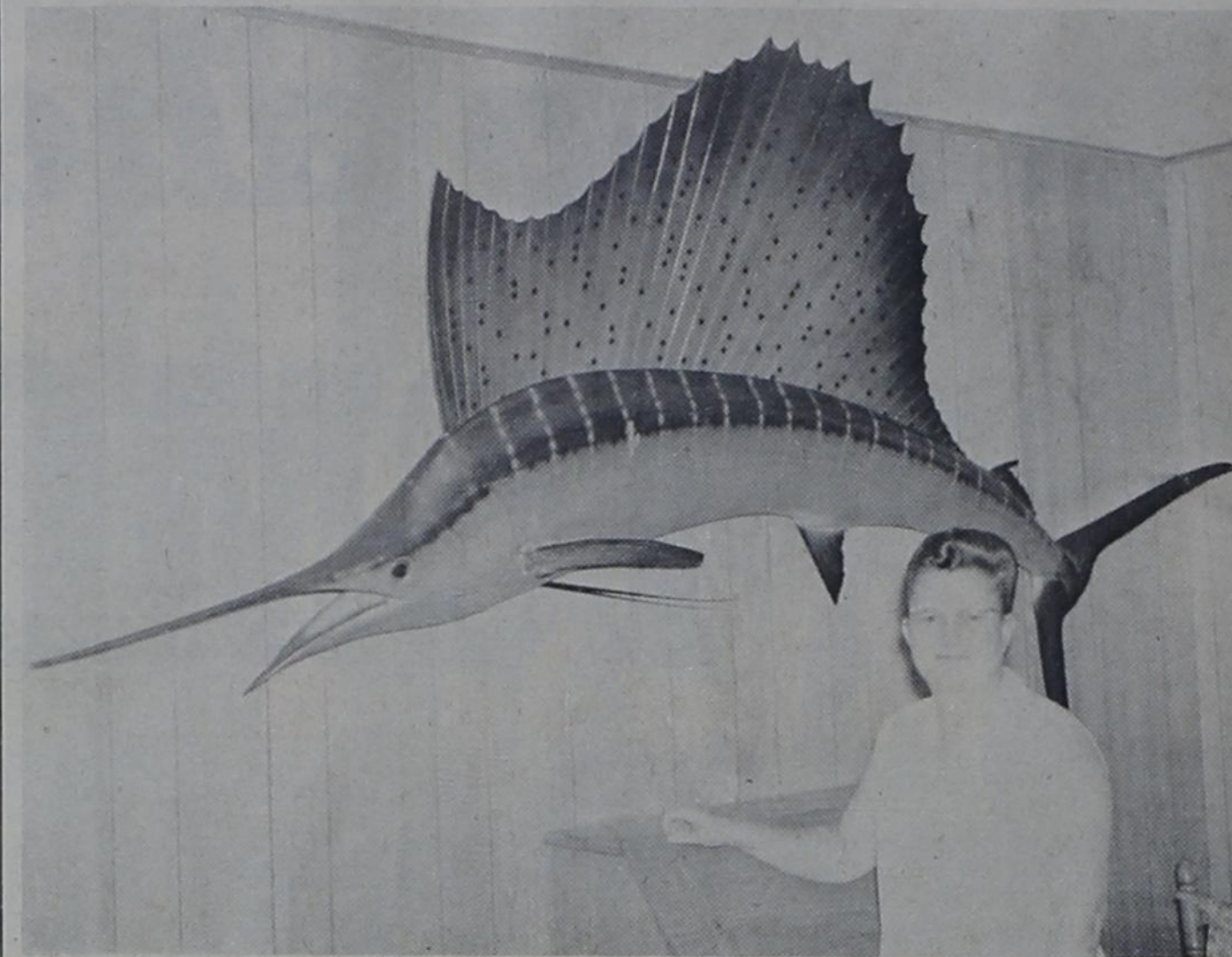

# BTD Queen Contest Fun For Candidates

Bull Town Days lends an air of excitement for the young ladies in the community because of the annual queen contest. However, being a queen candidate isn't always easy. The girls must be ready to fulfill the obligations bestowed upon a queen. The queen is required to be at the beck and call of the community during the year following her coronation. Getting ready for this contest is somewhat different from an ordinary beauty contest. Candidates must have at least some knowledge of horses and horsemanship. This isn't always easy as many of them can ride fair but when it comes to controlling a horse and putting their best feet forward the difficulty ensues.

Most of the candidates can handle themselves well on a horse but then there are still the few who can "hang on to a horse." Riding a horse for some of these girls is every day occurrence but for others it is a once a year event. Many of the girls can ride proficiently. Judy Sisk one of the candidates rides quite often. She is sponsored by the Bovina Jaycees. Another of the candidates, Pamela Grisom says she rode quite a lot when she lived on the farm but since moving to town her rides have been somewhat scattered. Nancy Mitchell is one who makes riding more of a yearly event. At any rate these girls are to be admired for their

courage to tackle the situation. According to last years candidates the girls are required to make some sort of routine with their horse in the arena. However there are not set rules about their routine. One of the aspects of riding and looking nice at the same time is the hat. When trying to ride a horse, smile and keep your hat exactly in

place one gets somewhat nervous say former queen candidates. Another aspect of being a queen candidate is that one must always look nice and try to make a favorable impression. Modern hairdos and Western hats sometimes don't go "hand in hand" or "hair in hat". Candidates spend hours the night before getting their hair done on giant rollers so that

it will be just right, then have to put on a Western hat the next morning. All the hard work may go for nothing. Another thing is the clothing. ## Sourdough Recipe

Editor's Note. The following was submitted by Mrs. Bob Estes. It is a recipe belonging to her late father-in-law, Percy Estes of Dimmitt. He wrote the recipe in 1941. Upon request of a member of the B. & P.W. Club of Plainview for a recipe, to make the legendary Sour Dough Bread I hereby submit the following:

First; get you a two gallon stone crock or earthen vessel. Have a lid sawed out of a white pine board with a slope or bevel to the under side so that lid will merely set and not become set or tight in swelling. Explanations for cover being fashioned in this manner will appear later.

Secondly; in this two gallon measure put one and one half pints of flour, using any grade you happen to have on hand. You may sift the flour if you prefer but it is entirely unnecessary.

Thirdly; Add three table-spoonful sugar and one tea-spoonful salt. Fourth and lastly for your ingredients, stir in lukewarm water and make the dough stiff and heavy enough that it will barely pour out of vessel when tilted.

The stirring should be done with a short handle wooden spoon and must be left in the jar at all times for after setting the mixture you should visit it at intervals and repeat the stirring process in

order to step up the business. The above being your full and entire set-up you have only to await the time with patience for results which will be obtained in fifteen or twenty hours. Do not get the idea that sour dough should be used as sour milk.

On the contrary about ninety percent of your bread is already in your jar and you only have to pour out an amount required for that meal into your bread tray, using the usual amount of salt, one half the amount of shortening and one fourth or less of soda as you would use if using sour milk. Work the flour thoroughly into the dough and make a lot

heavier than milk made bread. Your biscuits should be immediately placed in the oven for baking when made out.

Should company unexpected come in, causing you to take out too much of your mixture you have only to scrape your bread board back into your jar adding scraps from your biscuit cuttings also putting in the usual amount of flour and lukewarm water, stirring in as you did in the beginning but leaving out the sugar.

Always try to maintain an amount of mixture in your jar 50 percent in excess of what would be required for a meal, or in other words, if possible use only about two thirds of your mixture.

CAUTION; TO AMATEURS; Sour dough in early days was commonly carried in a chuck box which was fastened in the rear end of a wagon and the jolting process tended to agitate the stuff, causing it to kick out of the container and it might be dangerous to attempt to confine it when it goes on a rampage as all good sour dough will do when it gets actually ripe, also back in the olden times we had not the advantages of the pressure gauges but knowing that there was great pressure at times, hence the loose fitting lid. Now as to the lid I have described, when eruption takes

Compiled From Diary --

## Esteses Tell Of Trip South Of The Border

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Estes and Mr. and Mrs. Dale Shamblin of Fort Worth returned recently from a tour of the interior of Mexico.

The following is an account of their trip compiled from a diary written by Mrs. Estes. "Fort Worth was the starting point of our journey, we traveled from there to McAllen where we went across the border. Several hours were spent getting through customs and receiving permits.

"We spent the first night in Linares at a comfortable motel. The town is old and the people are friendly and polite.

"We left Linares early the next morning. Enroute we saw many quaint villages. One of these villages was in the midst of market day. We look at their wares and their homes. Their homes are mud and grass huts. They have no furniture and cook over an open fire in the hut. At another village, we were able to see how they grow or-

chids. The orchids are gotten from the river and put in trees with moss as their base, therefore they look like the orchids are growing in trees.

"Tamazunchale was our destination that night. We stayed at the San Antonio Hotel. Across the street was a missions school. The children sang songs to us. The landscape of this town is like the tropics. Flowers bloom in abundance but there is no farm land. Farming patches must be cleared off the mountains for mere food consumption. They plant a seed on the side of a mountain and put rocks around it to keep it from blowing away.

"Leaving Tamazunchale the next morning, we toured several more small villages. The natives offered us coffee and in return we gave them canned foods.

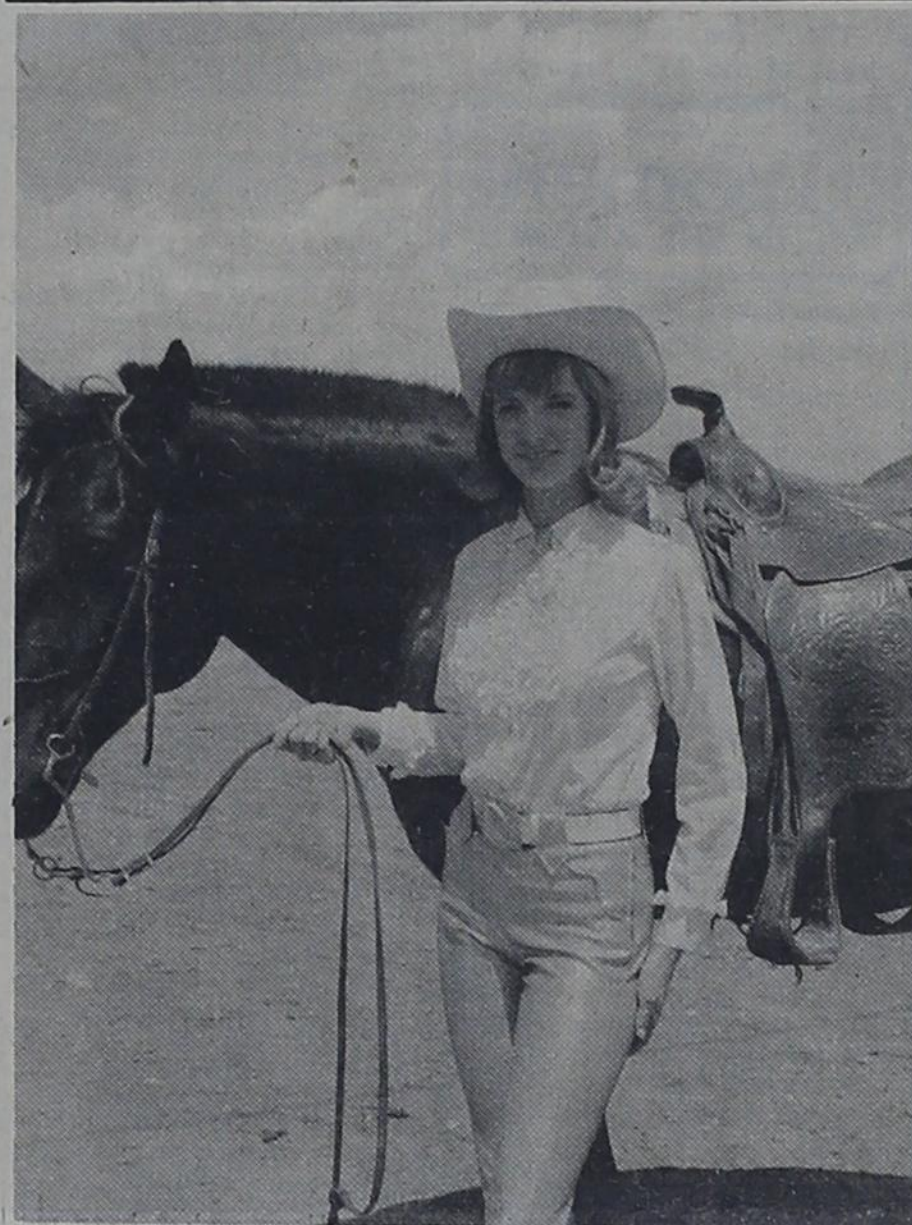
"Mexico City was our next stop. This is truly a beautiful city with many fine old buildings. The streets were built in

the 16th century. The city square was the scene of many political speeches and parades. However, no seats were built in this square. One of the larger cathedrals was built in 1525. Its splendor lies in the gold plated altars and a painted dome which was finished in the 18th century. The Palace of Fine Arts is also a beautiful building. The National Palace depicts the history of Mexico on a wall above a stairway.

"That evening, we toured more of the town. Musicians were all along the streets playing music for the tourists. Their parks and gardens are enhanced by fountains which have beautiful colored lights. The flowers in these gardens were large. Dahlias of a gold color were eight or nine inches in diameter.

"After leaving Mexico City, we traveled again to some of the smaller villages. We shopped at San Juan and stopped for the night at San Luis Portosi.

# Water Most Valuable Asset

By Robert Zetsche

For as long as man has re-counted time and history, water has been the most valuable asset or property. Texas is today engaged in one of the most bitter struggles for water the state has ever known. Agriculture is the basis for the total economy of Texas and the nation; and water is the basis of agriculture. Agricultural economy demands that the underground water re-

sources receive conservation. Irrigation water found under the Plains of Texas is limited and non-renewable. This does not mean that the area will ever run out of water; that is, if the people start taking care of the supply now.

Fortunately, many farmers realize the hard facts and have observed the declining water table. Most of these farmers have installed a conservation

irrigation system and have achieved irrigation water management. Other farmers realize this waste, but feel the cost is prohibitive, or their landlords live elsewhere and do not realize the need. Perhaps a little figuring on how much the land would be worth without water would help. Soil erosion generally goes hand in hand with a poor irrigation system, also. Some farmers have put in lake

pumps to recover wasted tailwater. This can be an ideal situation whereby wasted water is used and lake land can be reclaimed. This water is "free" only if it comes from your neighbor's farm. If the tailwater is from your own farm, don't fool yourself about it being free. You pumped it out of the ground, down the row and to the lake, and now you are concerned and want it back. The concern really should be "Why was the water in the lake to start with?" With a good irrigation system, tailwater is at a very minimum or non-existent.

A good irrigation system is where the quantity of water used for each irrigation is determined by the moisture holding capacity of the soil and the need of the crop; where the water is applied at a rate and in such a manner that the crops can use it efficiently and significant erosion does not occur. The purpose of water management is to accomplish efficient beneficial use of irrigation water according to the moisture needs of the crop to achieve optimum production while minimizing losses of water, soil, and plant nutrients.

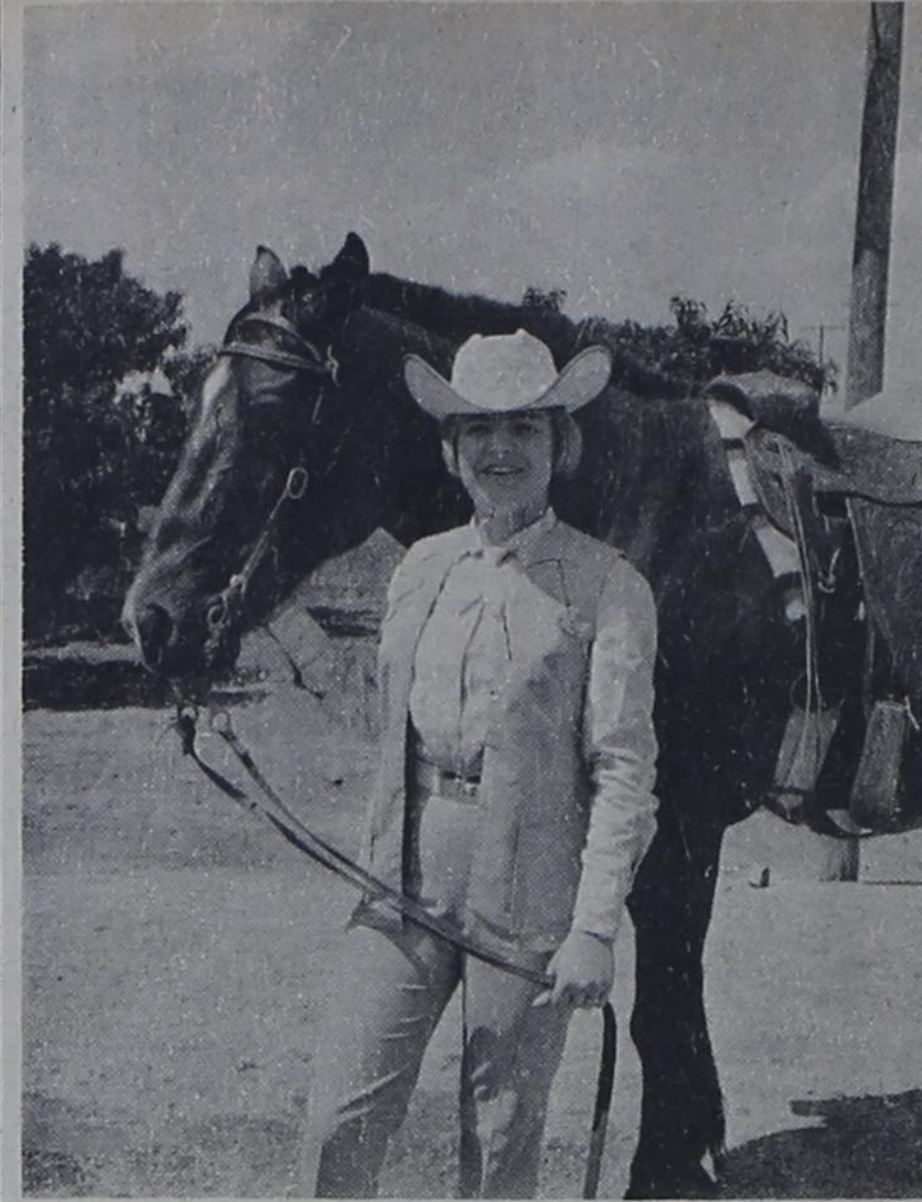

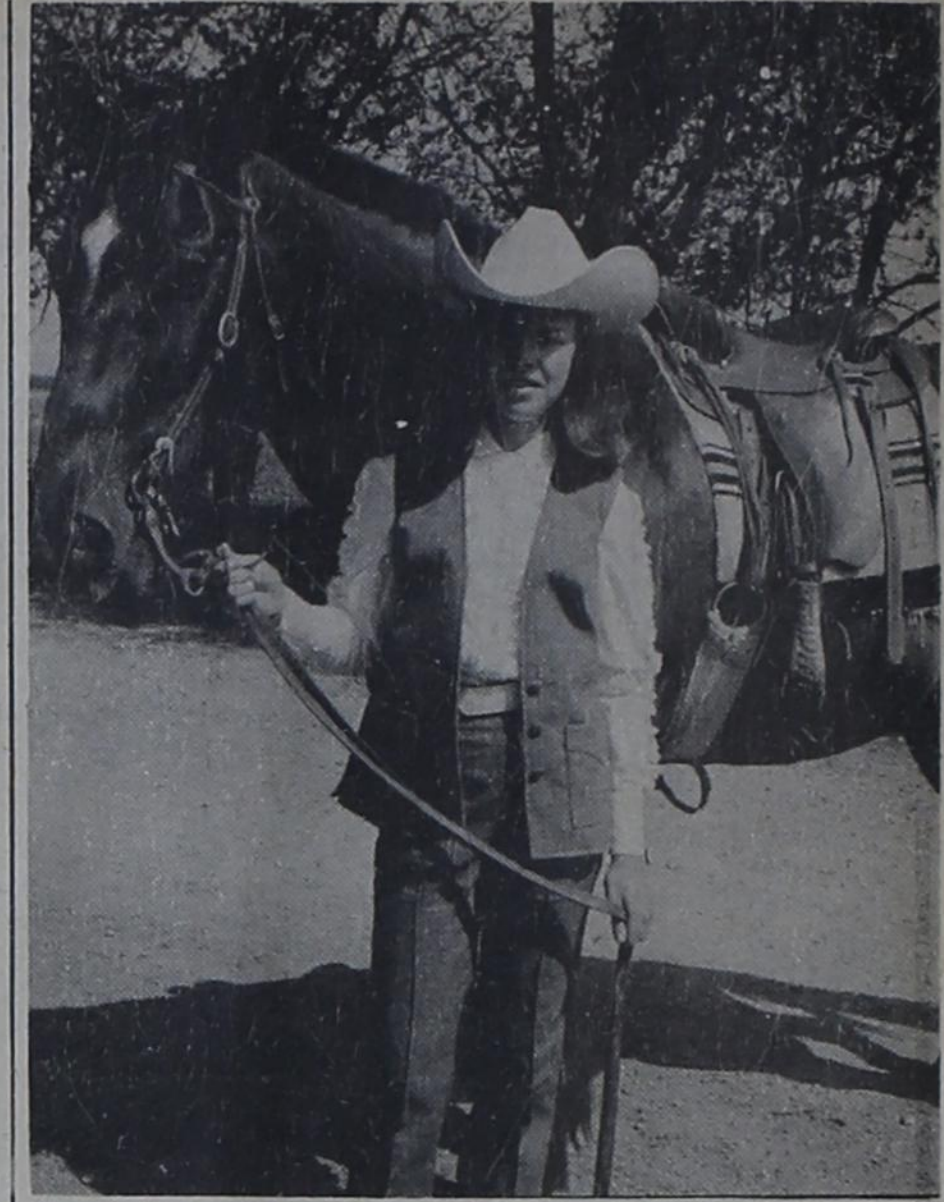

# Research Foundation Field Day September 8

Halfway -- Tours of the Research Farm at the headquarters of the High Plains Research Foundation have been increasing in popularity with each Annual Field Day. The Tenth Annual Field Day to be celebrated at the farm at Halfway on Thursday, September 8, 1966, promises to be no exception. Firms throughout the area donate the use of large trucks for the use of visitors each year. Seats are placed on the trucks so a comfortable ride over the 312 acre-research farm is arranged.

The tour for the afternoon will be dispatched by Ollie Linder, Hale County Agent; Lee Dent, Executive Vice-President of the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce, and Merwyn Igo, Member of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation. Guides will accompany each seated truck for the tour. They will supply information on research in progress seen en route. Guides will be professional agricultural leaders from throughout the area and will include County Agents, Soil Conservation personnel and

representatives from the Farm Home Administration service. James Valliant, Water Engineer and Chairman of the Coordinating Committee at the Foundation, announced that the Committee had arranged for four major stops on the field tour with members of the Foundation Staff speaking at each stop. A fifth stop of a walk-through pause for those desiring has been arranged close to the end of the tour so that the visitors can make a short walk through the grain sorghum and cotton variety tests. This walk

through program has been added at the request of farmers who desire to view these varieties at close range. The first major stop on the farm tour will be at the High Plains Foundation Farming System demonstration plots. Loyd Langford, Associate Agronomist, will show the value of the system of interplanting of cotton with other crops, and also give the results of farm centered research on this system with 17 farmers throughout the High and South Plains in 1965. The so-called "United Nations

Garden" planted from the Foundation's world-wide seed bank can be seen by visitors just as they leave stop number one. The recharge well, and bench levelling with seven years successful results, along with contour plowing values will be explained at stop number two. Use of certain grasses in playalakes will also be outlined. James Valliant, Water Engineer, will be the speaker at this stop. Stop number three on the farm tour will show the results of weed control with a combination program of chemicals and flame

cultivation. Use of flame investigateable production will also be explained by Dean Howard, Assistant Agronomist. Sugar beet production research can also be viewed at this stop. Soybean varieties, future releases, production principles and state wide farm centered research on soybean varieties and experimental strains will be shown and explained at stop number four by L. T. Cooper, Assistant Agronomist. The trucks will pause near the end of the farm riding tour for those who desire to take a

short walk-through tour to have a closer view of the grain sorghum and cotton variety comparison plots. Sixty-six hybrids and varieties of grain sorghum and thirty-two varieties of cotton are planted in these areas. The riding tour will proceed and unload at the farm equipment exhibit around the Halfway Community Building. Dr. Earl H. Collister, Executive Vice-President of the High Plains Research Foundation, says, "The Foundation appreciates the assistance the professional agricultural leaders have

given the Foundation by their participation as guides at every field day since the Foundation was started in 1957." He also expresses his thanks to the firms that furnish the trucks for the farm tours each year. Texas Tech holds memberships in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and in the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities. Nature controls erosion largely by supplying a vegetative covering over the ground.

"The drivers of a vehicle upon a highway outside the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding 10 miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."
