Bovina's red carpet, longer and wider than ever before, is rolled out to everyone for the annual Bull Town Days celebration this weekend.

Leaders of the event expect more than 6000 people to be present for the festivities, which be highlighted by a free barbecue meal downtown Friday evening. Serving will begin at 5

The celebration gets underway tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon and continued Friday and Satur-This is the third consecutive year for the celebration. The crowd in 1964 was estimated at

4000 and 6000 were on hand a year ago. Nine head of fat cattle have been killed to furnish meat for the feed, Locally-grown cantaloupe,

pinto beans and onions will also be on the menu. Other events scheduled for Friday, which is the "biggest" of the three-day celebration, include heading and heeling team roping. It will be at the roping arena west of town and will begin at 1

p.m. Admission charges will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children. The downtown parade will be unreeled Friday morning at 10. The parade is expected to have as many as 200 horses in addition to floats, machinery displays and other exhibits. A chuckwagon breakfast is slated for Friday morning at Bovina Gin Co. Serving will begin at

8 and continue until 9:30. Also to begin at 10 at the Masonic Lodge Hall is a reunion of oldtimers. Bovina Woman's Study Club will be in charge of this part of the celebration. The Study Club will also have a basket

lunch for oldtimers at noon Friday; this will also be at the Lodge Hall. An old fiddlers contest will be staged Friday afternoon and night. The fiddling competition will be on Bovina's Main Street. Eliminations begin at 2 p.m. with the finals scheduled to start at

Friday's schedule will be concluded with a square dance downtown beginning at 8 and a teenage dance at the fire station which will start at the same time.

Saturday's schedule will feature the sixth annual Quarter Horse Show of Bovina Roping Club. Judg ag will get underway at 10 a i. It will be at the Roping Arena west of town.

Saturday night, a professional wrestling card will be staged at Bovina High football field. Wrest-

lers from Amarillo will do battle beginning at 8:30. A banquet for ex-students of Bovina Schools is slated for 7 p.m. It will be in the school cafeteria.

The first event on the celebration agenda is junior horsemanship activities. This will begin at 1 p.m. Thursday and will be at the roping arena. The annual cow calling contest is slated for 6 p.m. Beard growers will compete in their specialty

The Bull Town Days Queen Contest starts at 7 p.m. It, too, will be at the arena.

Following the queens' contest, the action shifts to the school auditorium for a variety show which will feature a "womanless wedding," the first in Bovina in recent years.

"Everyone in the area is cordially invited to take part in all the Bull Town Days events," welcomes C. E. Trimble, general chairman of the 1966 celebration.

Trimble is assisted by Rouel Barron, president of Bovina Roping Club and Leon Grissom, president of Bovina Chamber of Commerce. The chamber and the roping club are co-sponsors of the celebration. Details about the various events appears in individual stories in this issue of The Blade.



With all the old timers in town and the fact that Bull Town Days signifies a reunion of old times and people we decided to do a column on some of the old things we remember about Bovina from the late 40's and 50's.

Do you remember the old post office when it was a real small house on Main Street and Mrs. Margaret Caldwell worked there? One could always walk on down the street and encounter a free ice cream cone or some money. The City Cafe which is now the Spudnut Shop had an old tree stump in front of it and a man called Dad Brichford sat there most of the time. This kindly gentleman was a "grandfather" to all the kids in town. He was good for a nickel any day of the week and on some days a quarter.

During these days bubble gum was rather scarce due to the war and one felt like a millionaire with a week old chew of gum. The first bubble gum we remember having after the war was obtained at the old Consumer building, It was pink and would last a whole week on the bed post if ones mother didn't find it. One could journey into the Drug Store buy a Coke from John

Kimbrow, His, "What do you want," didn't scare us much more then than it would now. Entertainment on Saturday night was going to town to watch

the people. The kids spent most of the evening begging for another nickel and playing hide and seek. There were some great hiding spots since most of the buildings had space between them at that time. Cars also had running boards and one could rest on these without having to get inside the car.

About this same time Bovina had a skating rink in the school gym. This was before gymnasiums became sacred. More families attended skating on Friday nights than a free barbecue.

W. O. Cherry was superintendent of schools and R. E. Everett was high school principal. The entire school system was housed in one two-story building. That shows how much our schools have grown.

Churches were frame buildings and the air conditioner was a cardboard fan with advertisements printed on it.

A few years passed and we had eleven man football and a basketball team that put Bovina on the map. That year we went to state. Those on that team included Darrell Read, Larry Ezell, Bobby Calaway, Erith Hawkins, Don Owens and many others. The caravan that left for Austin that fateful morning was led by none other than Billie Sudderth.

About this same time the school building burned and classes were being held in various buildings over town. Churches were used as well as some old buildings that the school bought. These were days of wind and sand, mud, snow, muck and mire but classes were continued and school spirit was strong.

One no longer had to read the news from a column in the State Line Tribune as Bovina had its first newspaper, The Bo-

The plug for a lighted baseball field was just beginning and has since been accomplished.

Bovina was becoming metropolitian as one didn't have to go to Hammonds Service Station for a Coke and a Mana Ruth anymore. Bovina Dairy Freeze was a full fledged drive in with Cokes, ice cream and the works.

These are just a few of the things we recall about Bull Town. They were good ole days but it is better to look ahead and try to determine the future than to dwell in the past.

First; get you a two gallon stone crock or earthen vessel. Have a lid sawed out of a white pine board with a slope or bevel to the under side so that lid will merely set and not become set or tight in swelling. Explanations for cover being fashioned in this manner will appear later.

Secondly; in this two gallon measure put one and one half pints of flour, using any grade you happen to have on hand. You may sift the flour if you prefer but it is entirely unnecessary.

Thirdly; Add three tablespoonful sugar and one teaspoonful salt.

Fourth and lastly for your ingredients, stir in lukewarm water and make the dough stiff and heavy enough that it will barely pour out of vessel when tilted.

Perhaps a little figuring on how much the land would be worth without water would help. Soil erosion generally goes hand in hand with a poor irrigation system, also. Some farmers have put in lake

irrigation system and have ach- | pumps to recover wasted tailwater. This can be an ideal situation whereby wasted water is used and lake land can be reclaimed. This water is "free" only if it comes from your neighbor's farm, If the tailwater is from your own farm, don't fool yourself about it being free. You pumped it out of the ground, down the row and to the lake, and now you are concerned and want it back. The concern really should be "Why was the water in the lake to start with?" With a good irrigation system, tailwater is at a very minimum or non-existent.

> A good irrigation system is where the quantity of water used for each irrigation is determined by the moisture holding capacity of the soil and the need of the crop; where the water is applied at a rate and in such a manner that the crops can use it efficiently and significent erosion does not occur. The purpose of water management is to accomplish efficient beneficial use of irrigation water according to the moisture needs of the crop to achieve optimum production while minimizing losses of water, soil, and plant nutrients.
