WEED CONTROL

For a moment today, I want to talk to you about that last point-weed control.

All of you have seen one or more of the estimates of hundreds of millions of dollars' loss to the farmers caused annually by weeds. "In a sense," say the authors of the new version of familiar old Farmer's Bulletin 660-"farming might be called a warfare against veeds."

These men, W. M. Talbot, weed control investigator, and Dr. F. V. Coville, chief botanist of the Bureau of Plant Industry, see no easy way to win the war. They lay down three fight the battle out along these lines a hog for publicity-he should have if it takes all of seevral summers. The first principle is-prevent weeds to put too many things in his show from maturing seed on the farm.. Now I know a lot of you are wondering what Mr. Talbot and Dr. Coville have to say about the method of chemical warfare on weeds which has been so much discussed in the past three years.

Well, they say this: (I'm quoting) "Weed-killing chemicals, because of their cost and other objections, should be regarded as substituted for tillage, pasturing, and cropping methods of keeping down top growth of perennial weeds. A limited use of suitable chemicals is practicable, however, for the destruction of small, scattered patches of very troublesome weeds. Chlorates, oils, common salt, and soluble arsenicals are examples of fairly effective chemical weed killers."

If you wish to employ chemical weed killers against small, stubborn paches of perennial weeds on your place, you'll find the precautions to observe duly noted in Farmers' Bulletin 660 You'll also find the directions for the old, hard, but tried and true methods of killing weeds. You'll find also a table of the common weeds of each section giving details that will enable you to recognize them. Ask for Farmers' Bulletin 660-F, "Weeds and Their



EDITORIAL

Mayor McCullough was seen and stated that "much disappointment is felt because of the fact that John W. Moore, to whom a gas franchise was granted recently by the City Commission, has not returned to Eastland, and has not expressed himself properly in regard to his ability to put in the gas system and his ability to furnish a sufficient gas supply. The Commission is not expected to go further with his propostion until Mr. Moore makes satisfaction on these two points. He was expected back in Eastland early last week, but no further information has been heard of him.

There has been some other gestures, however, concerning the gas matter. An influential banker has been in Eastland making inquiry touching opportunities for a new gas distributing company in this section. We are still looking for a new gas supply, one that will cost our people in the neighborhood of 35c per thousand. If Oklahoma can get gas for 45c per thousand, and if 42 West Texas cities can get 15% reduction in gas rates, then, located as we are, we think gas at 35c is a reasonable

The Mayor is working hard to bring to the citizens of Eastland relief from the high gas bills of the last few winters. Every gas user should remember that winter is not a great distance away and we have no reason to expect anything different from the high gas bill we have had to pay in the past. Remember, too, that the City Commission has the power to fix gas rates, so if the plan for a new distributing company fails we can set the rates through our City Commission.

This is not a new idea. It has been before our Commission. It failed to pass, however, but the gas users and the voters still have the power in their hands to lower the present rates and if they will follow closely the ferent proposals that come before the Commission they are sure to find a satisfactory solution of our gas troubles-then get behind that proposal and put it over. One or two Commissioners cannot do the job alone.

So far three proposals have been before the Commission. First, Mayor McCullough introduced a resolution to give the present gas company notice and then have a judicial determination of a reasonable gas rate. That means the City would go to the District Court and ask that court to fix a reasonable rate. in case the gas company refused to agree to a lower rate. This propostioin was voted down by a majority of 3 to 2 of the Commission

Second, Mayor McCullough offered an ordinance to fix the gas rate at 35c per thousand feet. Three of the Commissioners objected to that ordinance and same was not passed.

Third, the franchise was granted to John W. Moore, and now it remains to be seen what will be done with this proposition. The franchise as proposed was amended several times, and three of the Commissioners voted for its passage and one voted against it and one was absent.

You are the one who will profit or suffer by such changes Don't stand by and allow a change to be made if it is not for the good of the masses, and, on the other hand if it is for the good of all, it is your duty to help make the changes.

Will you support the Commissioners whom you elected or will you desert them now that summer is here and your gas bill low.

Let's finish the job.


