Voters to Cast Ballots Saturday

Eastland County's more than 6,000 voters will go to the polls tomorrow (Saturday) and register their choice of candidates for the numerous precinct, county, district and state offices.

Elsewhere in this paper is a fac simile of the official ballot. Voters may use this form to acquaint themselves with the names on it but under no circumstance will anyone be allowed to take this or any other printed or written ballot with them to the polls.

Don't mutilate your ballot. With your pencil draw a line through the name of every candidate except the ones you want to vote for, leaving those unmarked. Don't put a check mark beside the name of the candidate you are supporting.

You have the privilege of voting for three candidates for congressman-at-large, one from each of the three places on the ballot.

Every person who was 60 years of age before January 1, 1931—not 1932—and every person becoming of age, 21, since January 1, 1931, is entitled to vote without payment of poll tax.
