Mrs. Ferguson Is Party's Nominee

DALLAS, Aug. 31.—Nomination of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson as democratic candidate for governor was apparently virtually assured today as the Texas Election Bureau revised its tabulation of the run-off election.

The 11 a. m. report gave her a majority of 2,042 votes with a total vote of 475,756 as compared to 473,714 for Governor Sterling. The bureau announced that revision of Eastland county records had reduced Governor Sterling's total by 190 votes.

Re-checking also reduced the total cast in the election, the bureau said. The 11 a. m. total of 949,470 votes is 121 less than that reported at 6 p. m. yesterday.

Scurry and San Jacinto counties were reported complete today, leaving only six counties out of the 254 incomplete.

Child, 10, Has An Arm Amputated

Ten year old Beulah Harbin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Harbin who reside about six miles north of Eastland in the Morton Valley community, is recovering from an operation surgeons performed in amputating one of her arms.

Many Turkeys Are Killed By Snakes

J. F. Johnson who runs a farm near Moss Curve, about half way between Eastland and Ranger, was a visitor in Ranger today.

Mr. Johnson has 183 turkeys this year, but has lost 58—all dying of rattlesnake bites. In telling of his experience with the rattlesnakes, Mr. Johnson said that he has killed many of them, but that he had not killed as many snakes as he had lost turkeys.

"Whenever a rattlesnake gets into a bunch of turkeys I can hear them for several hundred yards," he said. "The turkeys bunch up around the snake and usually two or three are bitten before I can kill the snake. The turkeys invariably die from the snake bite."

Mr. Johnson has been farming on the same place for 20 years. Last year he raised 103 turkeys. He herds the turkeys while his boys do the farming.

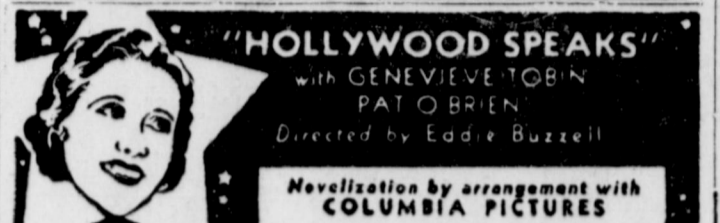

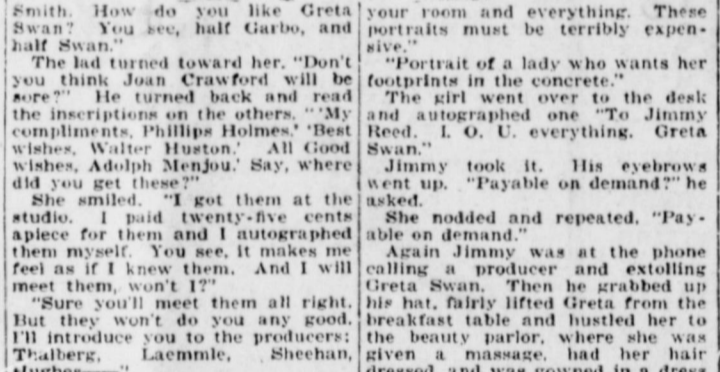
