County Budget On File With The County Clerk

The Forty-Second Legislature
enacted what is known as the "Uniform Budget System for State and
Local Governments."
Section 10 of this Act provides

that
"The County Judge shall serve
as budget officer for the Commissioners' Court in each county, and
during the month of July of each
year he, assisted by the County
Auditor or by the County Clerk,
shall prepare a budget to cover all
prepased expenditures of the counshall prepare a budget to cover all proposed expenditures of the county government for the succeeding year. Such budget shall be carefully itemized so as to make as clear a comparison as practicable between expenditures included in the proposed budget and actual expenditures for the same or similar purposes for the preceding year. The Act also provides that the County Judge shall file a copy of the proposed budget with the clerk of the County Court, and that it shall be available for the inspection of any taxpayer. A copy has

shall be available for the inspection of any taxpayer. A copy has been filed as required, and taxpayers desiring to inspect it should not hesitate to call for it at the County Clerk's office for that purpose. This budget is tentative and may be changed by the Comand may be changed by the Commissioners' Court after the public hearing which the law provides shall take place on some date to be named by the Commissioners' Court subsequent to August 15th, and prior to levying the county taxes. The County Judge will advertise the date of the hearing in the newspapers or by posting notices so that all taxpayers may be informed of the date and attend the hearing if they so desire.

As the expenditures for any collections for the budget year. the expenditures for any project should not exceed the budget estishould not exceed the budget estimate, except in cases of emergency, much care in the preparation of the final budget is necessary so that no governmental function may be crippled because of an inadequate appropriation; and the Commissioners' Court I am sure will appreciate any assistance the taxpayer may render.

As county expenditures will probably be discussed in some detail at this public hearing, it occurs to me that it offers the taxpayers, who supply the money to operate the County government, a fine opportunity to learn more about the various purposes for which their tax money is expended

about the various purposes for which their tax money is expended and to express their opinions as to whether certain projects carried in the budget should be continued or discontinued. It should also be a means of bringing the tax accept means of bringing the taxpayers and the county government into closer relationship. Many items of county expenses are mandatory by law and cannot be changed or elimlaw and cannot be changed or eliminated except by legislative enactment. This matter will likely receive attention at the hearing, and, at the proper time, the attention or our representatives should be called to such statutes as justice demands should be amended or represented.




