Court Re-Instates Cisco Loboos In Oil Belt League

The Cisco Loboos will be a contender in the 1932 race for the high school football championship of Texas according to a ruling given Monday by Hon. George L. Davenport, judge of the 91st district court.

Cisco was suspended from the league by the state committee after a series of hearings in connection with the playing of Fred Hightower, passer and ball carrier formerly of Corsicana. The committee satisfied itself that Hightower was not in school in Cisco for a period of 80 days prior to the game Cisco played with Breckenridge on Oct. 23, 1931, in which Cisco was victorious and used the challenged player.

The district committee composed of representatives of schools in the Oil Belt district met on the evening of Nov. 19 and the evidence presented before that indicated that Hightower was eligible and the results of the game were left in status quo.

Later, more evidence came to light and on Dec. 4 the committee met and heard and examined the new evidence and ruled that Hightower was ineligible and reversed its former decision, awarding the game to Breckenridge.

The district committee held another meeting on Feb. 27, 1932, at which time a resolution was passed which recommended to the state committee that Cisco be suspended from the league for a period of one year. The state committee, after a private investigation conducted by Roy Henderson, secretary of the interscholastic league, during which Henderson made visits to Cisco and to Tyler and satisfied himself as to the true facts concerning certain conflicting statements made by the officials of the Cisco and Tyler schools, voted to suspend Cisco according to the recommendations of the district committee.

The Cisco independent school district then filed suit in the 91st district court asking for \$10,000 damages and requesting the court to issue a mandatory injunction to force the district committee to include the Cisco team in its playing schedule for the 1932 season.

The suit came to trial on Sept. 5 and has been before the court until yesterday. A jury heard the evidence and the arguments of the attorneys and 13 special issues were given the jury for decision. The jury was able to agree on only five of these special issues and was discharged last Tuesday. The court took the case under advisement and agreed to hear the arguments of opposing attorneys on last Saturday. The day was consumed by the opposing arguments,

each citing references and reasons why the case should be decided in their favor.

Monday afternoon, Judge Davenport rendered judgment in the case, reinstating Cisco and charging the costs of the suit against the defendants, L. E. Dudley et al., meaning the other members of the district committee and members of the state committee.

In his formal ruling on the case, Judge Davenport gave a brief resume of the evidence presented by both parties and concluded with this statement:

Judge Davenport Gives Opinion.

"I am of the opinion from all the evidence before me that the action of the district board on Feb. 27, 1932, wherein they recommended to the state board the suspension of Cisco was without legal effect, and that the board was acting without jurisdiction of the subject matter; and that by reason of the district committee had no authority or jurisdiction to make such recommendation to the state board; and that since the state board had no jurisdiction in the absence of such recommendation by the district board, in turn the state board acquired no jurisdiction over the matter in controversy, and that at the several hearings before the state board, the state board was acting without jurisdiction or authority; and hence the order of that board was of no legal force or effect.

"It has been contended that Cisco, having participated in the hearings before the state board, would of itself be sufficient to give the state board jurisdiction. I am unable to concur in this contention. In his resume of evidence above (in his resume of evidence, the rules are recited), I am convinced that a recommendation from the district board, acting without authority, was the only act that could give the state board jurisdiction.

"Many of the issues discussed before the court, in my opinion, and not necessary for the determination of this suit, and will not be given further consideration. There are charges of unfair dealing among the various members of the district board which, in my opinion, are not sustained by the evidence, and at this time I desire to make the statement that in my judgment and opinion, every member of the district board throughout the entire transaction has acted in perfect good faith, with the interest of the district at heart, and that at no time was there any effort on the part of any member of the board to deal unfairly with the Cisco school.

"The decision I have reached is based upon the irregularities of the board in dealing with this matter, and not upon the theory that any was sought or taken against the Cisco school. It is not surprising that such errors as have been pointed out were made by the district board, as the board is made up of school superintendents over the district, who are busy with

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

MOSES HONORED IN DEATH

Text: Deut. 32:45-52; 34:5-8. The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Sept. 25.

By WM. E. GILROY, D. D. Editor of The Congregationalist. The circumstances of the death of Moses were as remarkable as his life. His birth, the preservation of his life, his upbringing at the court of Pharaoh, his discovery of his interest with his oppressed people, and his forsaking of the court to become the leader of the op-

pressed in their effort toward freedom, are all dramatic incidents in the life of a great man. Deeper in the drama was the character of the man himself—the shrinking and unselfish spirit that held him back from seeking any glory or honor for himself, the lack of confidence in his own powers that made him hesitant about accepting responsibility, but the splendid courage that led him forth with no less a spirit of daring and determination once he was convinced that the task of leadership was his and that there was no one else who could perform it better.

No man was more conscious than Moses of his own shortcomings and his own weakness. It may be that through his own humility that side of his character is stressed in Scripture more than was really just or necessary. At any rate, the representation is that though he led his people to the borders of the Promised Land and was privileged to see the land of their future home, he was denied the privilege of entering because on one occasion at least he had committed the sin of losing his faith and of railing in his disappointment against the people whom he had been called to lead.

The punishment seems out of proportion to the temporary lapse of a courageous and generous leader. However, that is not for our determining. We have the record as it reads, and instead of dwelling upon the errors or shortcomings of Moses it is well that the lesson should be made an occasion for the just appreciation of his life.

If we were to dwell upon the punishment that came to Moses in the frustrating circumstances of death, it might be to stress the inexorable standards of God's demands.
