The purpose of the school is that of training leaders to direct community singing and community games and other recreational entertainment. Three class periods will be held each day, one in the morning, another in the afternoon,



Errors of Turkey Growers Explained

Many farmers could get more money for their turkeys if they would improve the quality of the birds and adopt better dreising and packing methods, concludes Thomas W. Heitz, marketing specialist of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, on the basis of investigations in poultry packing plants and terminal markets.

Mr. Heitz has found that many producers expend much labor and money in an effort to raise turkeys of fine quality, and then through improper selection, finishing, and preparation of the birds for market, fail to get much of the profit they would otherwise re-




