Eastland County Rural School Aid Survey Completed County Superintendent B. E. McGlamery reports that State Supervisor John T. Conn has completed the inspection of the schools of Eastland county that are entitled to aid under the provisions of the state aid law and aid has been granted to schools as follows:

Table listing school districts and their respective aid amounts, such as District 1 - Yellow Mound \$234.00, District 2 - Flatwoods \$846.00, etc.

Of this amount \$12,661 is for aid in paying teachers' salaries; \$2,676 is aid in providing transportation and \$165 in industrial aid granted for the maintenance of departments of home economics and agriculture.

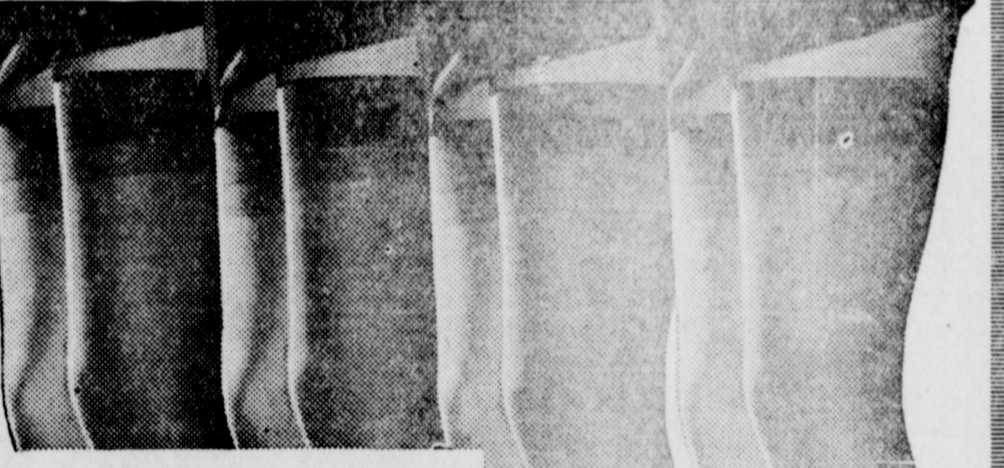
