County Taxpayers To Save \$700,000 At Smoker Here By Refunding Act

AUSTIN, March 2 —Eastland county taxpayers will save more than \$700,000 on their outstanding road bonds through the refunding act of the legislature last

figures, just compiled.
Gasoline tax revenues are providing the money for this saving, beginning this year. The law sets aside one cent of the four-cent tax or more than \$7,000,000 gas tax, or more than \$7,000,000 a year. Each month's portion of this income is to be divided in the proper ratio and paid against the maturities of each county for that

The ratio is to be set by new Board of County and District Road Indebtedness. Gibb Gilchrist, its chairman, said that while pay-ments already have been begun the amounts thus far are too scattered to bear any real significance
