

Community Event Highly Successful

Another successful Bull Town Days celebration was folded back into the pages of history Saturday night. The popular community celebration was held here Thursday, Friday and Saturday. This was the sixth consecutive year for the event

Approximately 3000 people were in town Friday evening for the free barbeque which is "open to the world." The meal featured barbequed beef, pinto beans and Bovina-grown cantaloupe. Serving began at 6 p.m. and continued for a couple of hours or so. The free barbeque is considered one of the highlights of the celebration.

Miss Loy Beth Christian, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendol Christian, was crowned Bull Town Days Queen 1969 at intermission of Thursday night's variety show in Bovina Schools auditorium. Miss Christian is a junior in Bovina High and was sponsored in the contest by Bovina First runner-up in the queens contest was Karen Bell,

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Durward Bell. Her sponsor was Wilson's Super Market, Second runner-up honors went to Holly Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Brooks Davis. Miss Davis was sponsored by The Bovina Blade.

A total of 10 queen contestants took part in the contest, which consisted of performances on horseback at the roping arena and interviews with the judge, Mrs. Wilma Fulgham, an accomplished horsewoman of Clovis.

The celebration was kicked off Thursday at 1 p.m. with calf roping events at the arena, featuring a pair of matched ropings and a jackpot roping which had a total of 17 entries. Roping results are listed in a spearate story in this issue of The Blade.

Winners in the women's division of the cow calling contest were Mabel Ellison, first; Alta Hutto, second; and Joe Looney, third.

Redge Priest was the first place winner in the men's cow calling. Second went to C. E. Trimble and third was Pat Quintana.

Eugene Jackson of Happy won first in the beard growing competition. Second was Larry Scott of Bovina and third place went to Carl Bryan of Happy.

Plaques were presented to the beard growers and cow callers during the variety show intermission.

The variety show played before a packed house in the schools auditorium. All seats were filled, folding chairs lined the aisles and people stood outside the auditorium for a chance to get a glimpse of the production which had an Old West theme and featured talented performers from throughout the area.

Director of the show was Mrs. Celia Barraza.

Friday's events were kicked off with a chuckwagon breakfast at Bovina Gin Co.'s yard. A total of 217 people were present for the breakfast. Serving started at 7 a.m. Some 225 people attended the basket lunch for oldtimers and visitors which was sponsored by Bovina Woman's Study-Club and was held at the Masonic Lodge Hall Friday at noon. Registration for the old timers and other visitors was

conducted from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Friday. During those same hours, horsemanship activities were conducted at the arena. Youngsters competed in various events including barrel racing, flag racing, pole bending,

At 4 p.m. Friday, one of the "best ever" BTD parades was unrolled through the streets of Bovina.

First place in the float contest division went to the Comite Mexicano for its float concerning Pipila at the Alondiga de Granditas, which concerns a legend in regard to Mexico winning its independence from Spain, Second place float winner was Bobbie's of Farwell. Third place went to Bovina Woman's Study Club.

In the riding club division of the parade, Farwell was judged first, Bovina was second and Morton third.

Following the free barbeque, which saw downtown Bovina filled with people for hours, awards presentations were made to the float and riding club winners and to the people who had travelled the fartherest distance to attend the celebration. This plaque went to Bill and Edith Young of Hawaii. Square dancing on Main Street followed the awards presentation. Eddie Gunnels of Clovis was the caller.

A teenage dance was also held Friday night. It was in the American Legion Hall.


