

## WHITTLIN'

The Jay Harrises are back. They attempted for a few years to transplant themselves in Arizona, but they didn't take root. They sure are at home around here, though. They hadn't been back many days when we noticed a Harris on a Little League ballclub and then a night or two after that Fern was working in the concession stand ---- just like old times.

Like the song says, it's good to have them back where they belong. And I get the impression from the Harrises that they agree wholeheartedly.

The great state of Texas with all its cattle and forward thinking cattle people has a live-stock brand law that's about as antiquated as a water bucket and a gourd dipper on the front porch.

As a matter of fact, the state would be about as well off without a brand law. What we have now isn't worth anything from a law standpoint. And when we say not worth anything, we mean nothing!

All branding in Texas is good for is to help honest neighbors get along with each other.

If cattle get mixed together and they're branded, honest neighbors can decide which are whose. Aside from that, cattle in Texas might as well not have a brand.

Texas had sufficient agricultural leaders to get the screw-worm fly eliminated for all practical purposes and we don't understand why the same people can't implement a brand law which would do some good and offer some protection.

Being so close to the state line of New Mexico, which has an adequate brand law, makes people around here more aware of Texas' pitiful situation.

Under the present Texas set-up, brands are registered on a county basis only. And even that hardly offers enough advantages to pay for the \$2 it costs to register a brand. As far as we know, the only thing you get for your two buck investment is the assurance that nobody in this county can register the same brand in the same place. But that wouldn't keep somebody from registering "your" brand in a neighboring county if they wanted to.

New Mexico brand inspectors are helpless and powerless for all practical purposes in regard to Texas brands. You can take cattle to auction sales in New Mexico with brands all over them and tell the auction people, "Texas cattle," and no more attention is given to the brands. Honest people can do that and cattle rustlers can, too, we'd guess.

There's nothing to keep them from it. We don't know all the things that would be required to make a good brand law, but we do know that other states have them and people who are in a position to do something about initiating a new law could study what other states are using and adopt the best parts for Texas' use.

A new brand law, state-wide, would be a big job. But Texas is a big state and its people who would be affected should be more than equal to the task.

Brand laws make for inconvenience. This is necessary for them to have advantages. Brand inspectors have to look over cattle before they're moved, for instance. And brand inspectors are human. This makes for problems, like waiting for an inspector before you can transport cattle. But the advantages will far outweigh the disadvantages, we're a thinking.

It looks from here as if Texas should start the wheels turning toward updating its present system. Such action is way past due.

John C. White, the state commissioner of agriculture, is doing a good job of promoting the fact that "Texas beef is tender." With some work and planning he could go a step further and bring about a law which would imply that the cattle this tender beef comes from have honest, meaningful brands on them, too.

The fish business in Parmer County isn't as good as it could be.

Back in the Spring, we reported here that our west-of-town farmer/friend, Willis Hester, was going in the commercial fish growing business. Last week, Willis, sadder but wiser, reported that his project didn't work and has been abandoned.

We were sorry to hear that it didn't work for more reasons than one. In the first place, we didn't want our friend to have an unsuccessful undertaking, which isn't like him, incidentally, and in the second (Continued on Page 2)

# Wheat Harvest Set For 'Go' Signal

## 'Dutch' Dean Cuts 1st Load

The first load of 1970 wheat was delivered to the elevator 10 days before the first load of 1969 and was termed "real good grain."

A truck load from the farm of Elmo (Dutch) Dean was delivered to Sherley Grain here Wednesday afternoon, June 10. Last year's first load came in June 19.

The wheat was a surprise in more ways than one. It was tested grade No. 1 with 13.40 moisture. The Wichita variety produced 60 and one-half bushels to the acre (first load) from a 120-acre field 10 miles north of Bovina in the Rhea Community.

The dryland wheat was cut by the Schlenker custom combining crew and delivered at 6 p.m. by Jim Schlenker.

Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain said the elevator received a sample earlier in the day from the E. O. Johnston farm, but it "was pretty wet."

The last two weeks of June are expected to be the heavy harvest period, elevator operators say.

## Expects Rush Within Days

Wheat harvest is on the verge of getting underway "full steam."

If weather permits, irrigated wheat should be ready to cut by the latter part of this week, elevator operators think. They are expecting harvest to be running "wide open" by the end of this week.

Most of the dryland wheat has already been cut in this area and has been producing well for a dry year. Most dry wheat has produced from 10 to 25 bushels per acre and is of extra good quality, elevator men say.

Some irrigated wheat might be shriveled this year because of high winds, but harvest, as a whole, is expected to be about "average."

When harvest gets into full swing, it will not take long for it to be completed, if it goes

according to schedule and has no weather interruptions.

Harvest of the 1970 wheat crop should be completed by the end of the month, making the entire operation cover about two weeks.

# New Memorial Park Serves Parmer Area

Parmer County Memorial Park has begun selling property at its location between Bovina and Friona on U. S. Highway 60.

The new perpetual care cemetery was organized under the laws of the State of Texas and is operating under jurisdiction of State Department of Banking, a spokesman said. Located on 15 acres of land, about half of that has been developed.

Directors of the park are J. C. Claborn, Richard Collard, Steve Messenger, A. M. Wilson, John Renner, Ranza Boggs, E. M. Jack, all of Parmer County. Stockholders include the directors and other Parmer County citizens, Bertam Jack, J. E. Knight, D. L. Carmichael, Hoyt Smith, C. R. Elliott, Bill Carthel, Elvie Jennings, John R. Cook, Charles Kirk, Hugh Moseley, Marion Fite, B. W. Sisson, Delton LeWellen, C. W. Fleming and Edward Isaac.

A trust fund has been established for permanent care of

the cemetery with a portion of each lot sold going into the trust fund. The principal of the fund will never be used. The interest will provide full-time year-around care, according to the policy of the park.

The park is planted with hybrid blue grass and has an underground sprinkler system. Drives through the park are 20-foot wide, all weather roads.

Memorials in the park will be flush with the grass, according to the spokesman.

Landscaping, such as trees and shrubbery, has been started. In addition flower gardens will be planted, with religious features planned for each garden.

Purpose of the new Memorial Park is to serve Parmer County and surrounding area.

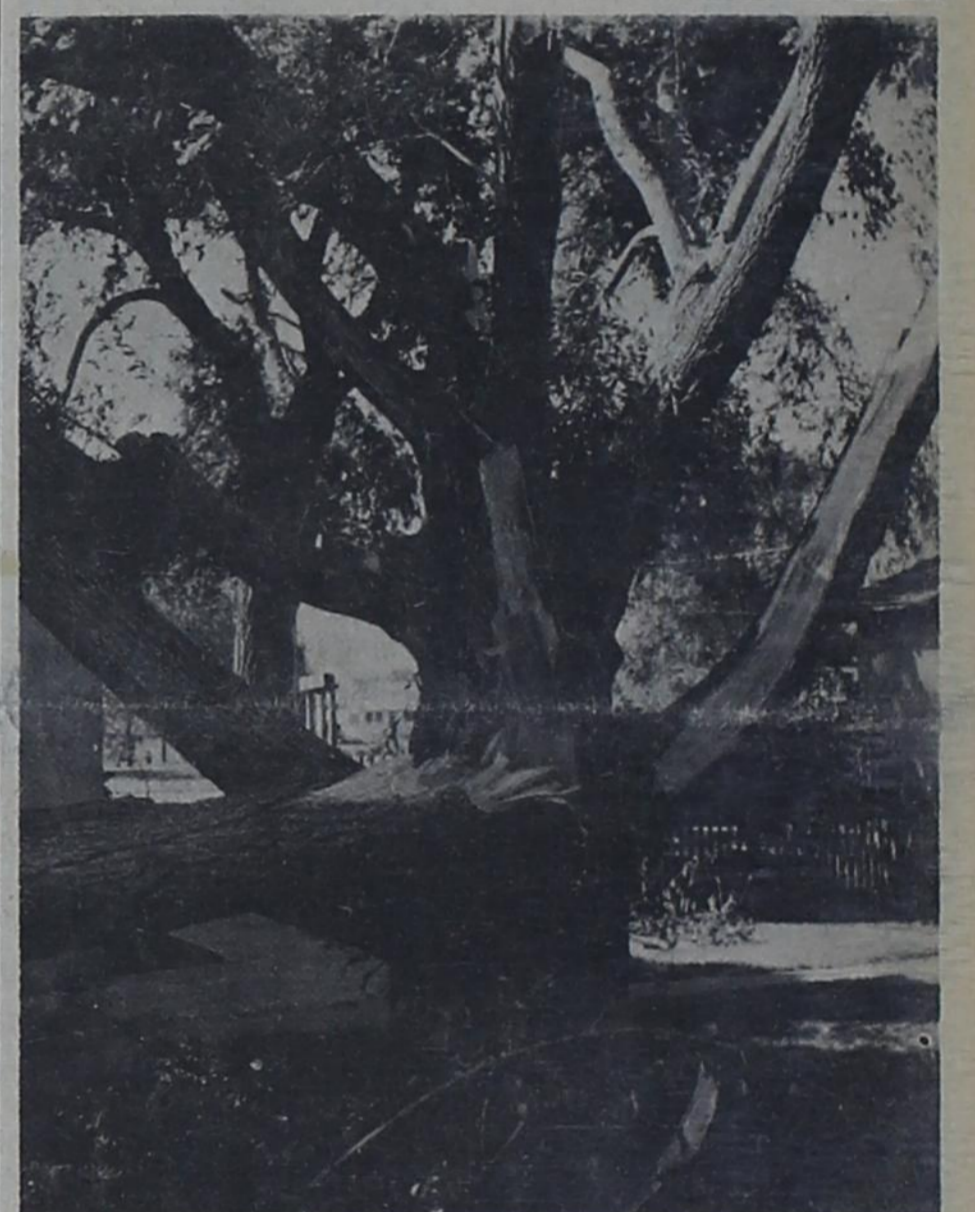

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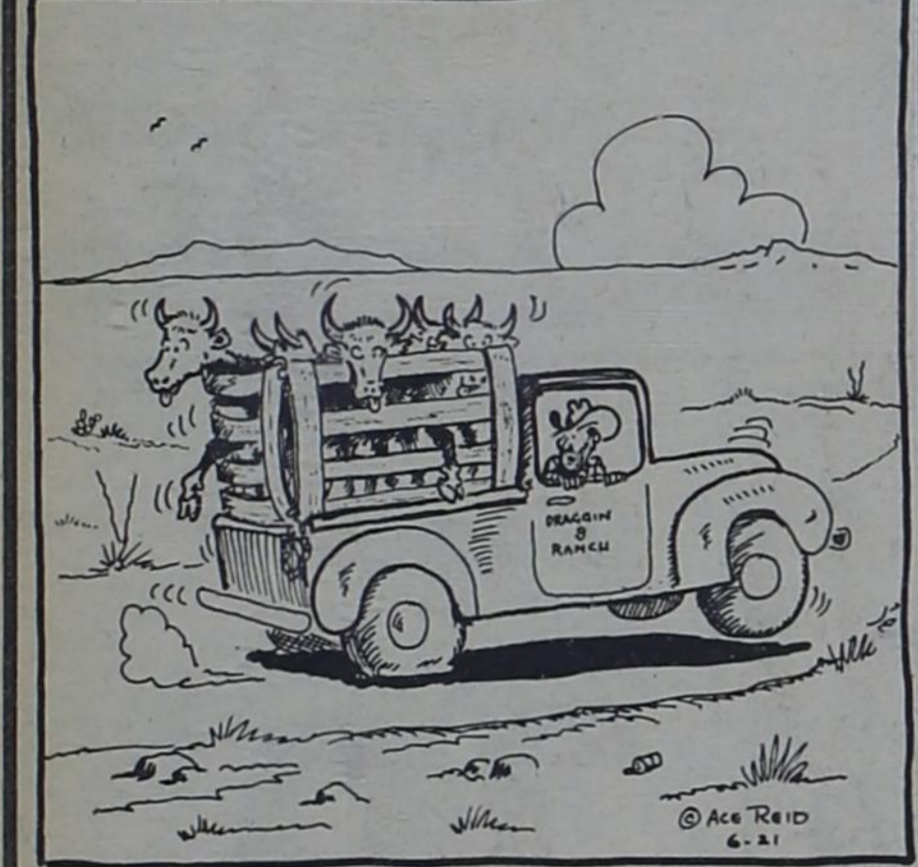

**On The Farm

Horn flies are beginning to increase rapidly on cattle on the Texas High Plains as warmer weather continues to be the order of the day.

"These pests live on animals continuously and feed as much as 20 times a day," explains Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A moderately heavy infestation of 5,000 flies can extract one-half pint of blood or about one percent of the blood value of a 1,000-pound animal."

In addition to the blood loss, the flies constantly irritate animals thereby causing a loss of energy. Digestive upsets are common and feed utilization and consumption decreases.

"Some authorities say that uncontrolled infestations of horn flies can cause a loss of one-half pound of flesh or one quart of milk per day," points out Clymer.

To combat horn flies during periods of peak populations, insecticides may have to be applied on a two-to-four week basis, he adds. In addition to spraying, other methods that are effective are dusting, dipping, self-treatment dust bags, back rubbers and mineral treated salt blocks.

Numerous insecticides are available for controlling horn flies. Information on these can be obtained from the "Texas Guide for Control of External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" available at the local county extension office.

By said ordinances, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Bovina, Texas, has ordered said streets, within the limits indicated, to be improved by excavating, grading and paving the same, by the installation of drainage facilities and by constructing curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, together with other drains incidental and appurtenances thereto, said paving to consist of a crushed caliche base and double asphalt surface, with the thickness and width as fully provided for in the plans and specifications thereof, prepared by the City Engineer of the City of Bovina and heretofore approved and adopted by the City Planning Board, all of said improvements to be done and constructed in the manner and of the materials as provided in said plans and specifications and contracts covering the construction of said improvements, all of which are hereby expressly referred to for a full and complete description of said improvements and all of which are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Bovina, Texas, incorporated herein by reference.

That the City Board of Aldermen has caused the City Engineer to prepare and file the hereinafter set out estimates of the cost of such improvements and has heretofore, by duly enacted ordinances, determined the necessity of levying assessments for a portion of the cost of the construction of said improvements against the properties abutting upon said streets, within the limits above defined, and the real and true owners thereof and did adopt and determine the hereinafter set out proposed apportionment of the cost of said improvements between said City and the said abutting property and the real and true owners thereof, and that the portion of said cost proposed to be assessed against the said abutting property and the real and true owners thereof will be in accordance with THE FRONT FOOT RULE OR PLAN and did further adopt the following proposed rates and estimates of said costs in reference to and for said streets within the limits above defined and indicated in the following schedule by the unit number of said streets, to-wit:

A hearing will be given and held by and before the Board of Aldermen of the City of Bovina, Texas, on the 2nd day of July, A.D. 1970, at 8:00 o'clock P.M., in the City Hall of the City of Bovina, Texas, to the real and true owners, whether named or correctly named herein or not, of all property abutting upon said streets within the limits above defined and to all persons owning or claiming any such abutting property or interest therein and to all others owning, claiming or interested in said abutting property or any of the proceedings, contracts or matters and things herein mentioned or incident to said improvements or contract herein described.

At said time and place all such persons, firms, corporations and estates and their attorneys and agents shall have the right to appear and be heard and offer testimony as to the said assessments and to the amount thereof proposed to be assessed against said abutting property and the real and true owners thereof, the lien and charge of personal liability to secure payment of said assessments, the special benefits to accrue to each such abutting property and the owner or owners thereof by virtue of said improvements, if any, or concerning any error, invalidity, irregularity or deficiency in any proceeding or contract in reference to said improvements and said proposed assessments and concerning any other matter or thing as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of said assessments, proceedings and improvements and on which they are entitled to hearing under the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas and the proceedings of the said Board of Aldermen of the City of Bovina, Texas.

Following such hearing, assessments will be levied against each and every parcel of property abutting upon said streets within the limits above defined and the real and true owners thereof for that portion of the cost of said improvements determined by said Board of Aldermen to be payable by such abutting properties and the real and true owners thereof and said assessments shall be and constitute a first and prior lien upon said abutting property from the date said improvements were ordered by said Board of Aldermen and shall be a personal liability and charge against the real and true owners thereof as of said date, whether said property be described or correctly described, or such real and true owners be named or correctly named in such proceedings or not, and no error or mistake or discrepancy in the names of such owner or owners or in describing said property in this Notice or in any of such proceedings with reference to said improvements shall invalidate any assessment or certificate issued in evidence thereof, but nevertheless, each parcel of property abutting upon said streets and the real and true owner or owners thereof shall be charged with and be liable for said assessment, which shall be valid, whether or not such owner or owners be named or correctly named or such property be described or correctly described, all as fully provided for under the Acts of the 40th Legislature of the State of Texas, First Called Session, Chapter 106, known and shown as Article 1105-b, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and as adopted by the said City of Bovina, Texas, under which said improvements, proceedings and assessments are being constructed, performed and levied.

## Sisk Home From Trip, Legion's 'Boys State'

An enthused Royce Sisk returned from Boys State in Austin Saturday with hopes of attending next year as a junior counselor, and wishing all boys in Bovina could have the same experience.

He was sent to Boys State by the Bovina American Legion Post and was among 765 there from over Texas "Learning by Doing" the process of government on all levels.

Meloney Marshall left here early this week to attend Girls State, also sponsored by the American Legion.

Royce is a member of the Federalist party at the week-long meeting. The other was the Nationalist party. Following several days of campaigning, state officials, district, county and city officials were elected and appointed. All boys were a part of some form of government.

Serving on the city council of "Moore" city, Royce said they held council sessions, adopted city ordinances, hired city officials, etc., as a council actually functions. The Senate and House of Representatives actually used the capitol building for a session where bills were drafted.

After sessions were held in the mornings when strict parliamentary procedure was observed, recreation was planned in the afternoon with each "city" having its own teams for various sports.

Boys State has its own constitution, set up like the United States constitution. They had their own bank, hospital, post office, etc.

Each afternoon at 5 p.m., all gathered for the flag lowering. The Boys State band played the "Star Spangled Banner." The boys all wore T-shirts with the Boys State emblem on the front.

State dignitaries spoke to the group on several occasions, including Governor Preston Smith.

While in Austin, the Young Socialist Party and other protest groups attempted to sway Boys State participants to join their ranks. Royce said on one occasion, the response from the visitors was a spontaneous singing of the Boys State song. He reported the demonstrators made little head-way with the Boy Staters.

He brought home a poster, a newspaper and a propaganda sheet handed out by the protestors.

Royce is anxious to return next year. He hopes to be appointed a junior counselor, but will not be notified until next Spring.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Sisk.

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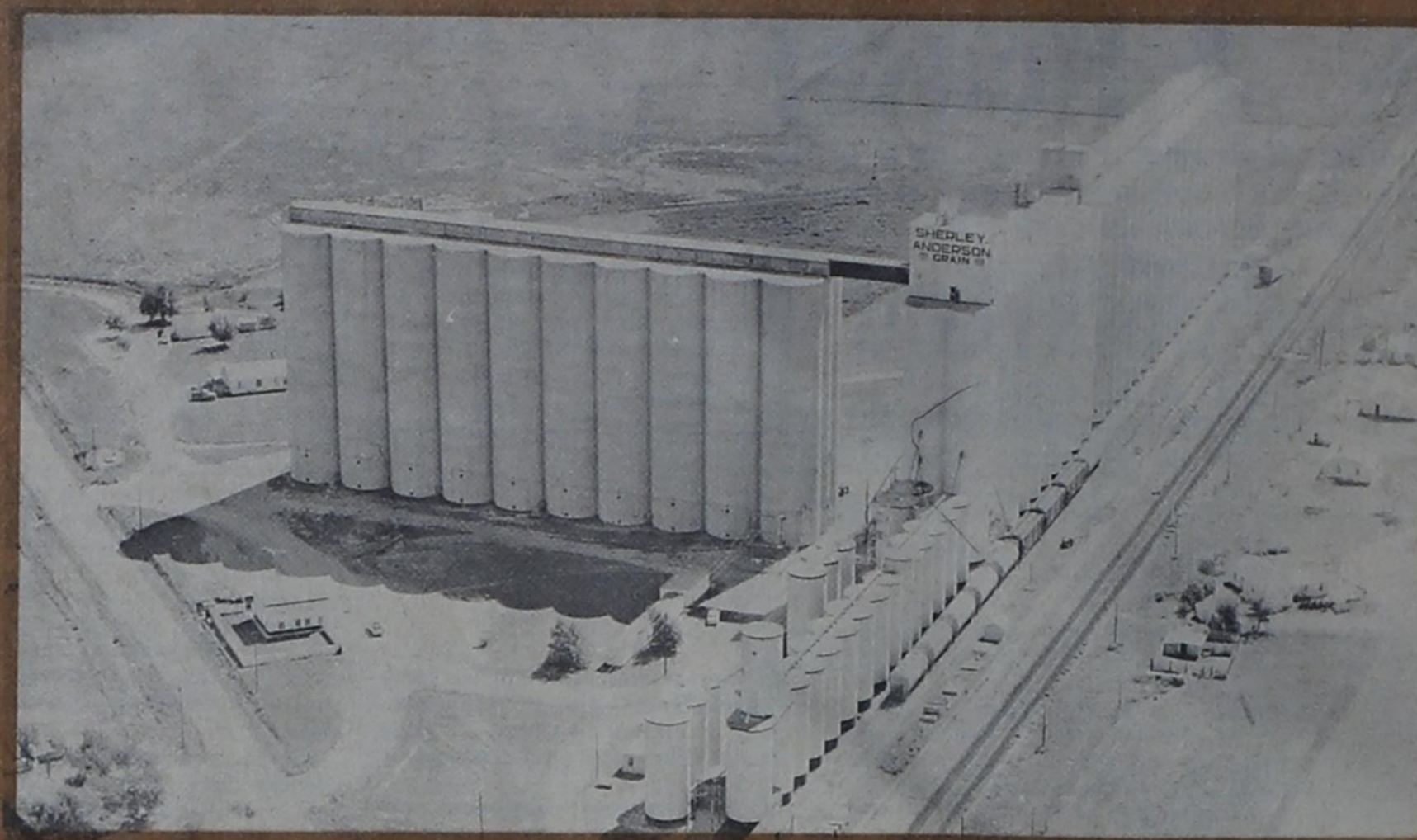
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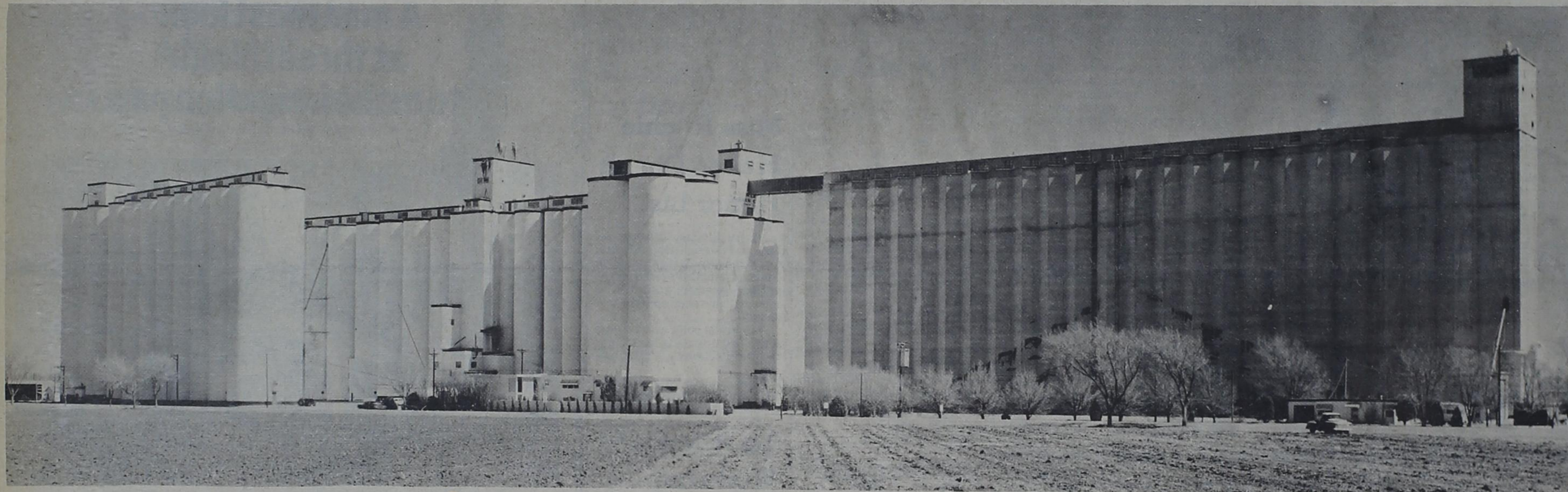
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
