First Win Over Steers In 16 Years



Bovina Breaks Jinx With 23-13 Victory

Farwell's football domination of Bovina has ended. The Bovina Mustangs, not spectacularly but with steady determination, plowed under the Farwell Steers here Friday night, 23-13.

The win was the first football victory for a Bovina team since 1954 and the teams have played each year during that time.

The Mustangs dominated the game's final statistics more than they did the score. However, the Steers drew first blood and it wasn't until the final quarter that the Mustangs had enough points and not enough time on the scoreboard for their fans to breathe easier and with the deep satisfaction of knowing that the win drought over Farwell was broken.

In recording the win, which will be remembered as one of the greatest in Bovina High athletic history, the Mustangs racked up three touchdowns, an extra point and two safeties.

No doubt the Mustangs have won games which were more important, like district championships, for instance, but this win will be remembered because it broke the 16-year jinx the county seat team has enjoyed over the Mustangs.

Both teams went into the game with unimpressive records. The Steers had a win over Happy and a tie with Hart on their District 3-A slate while the Mustangs were 0-2 in 3-A play with losses to Happy and Springlake-Earth.

The win string for Farwell began back when both schools were in the same Class B district. They continued non-district play after the Steers were promoted to Class A and went back into the same district when Bovina reached the Class A enrollment level.

The Steers scored the first time they had the ball, after receiving the opening kickoff, and it appeared early in the tilt that it was the same old song, 17th verse.

It just wasn't to be that way, though, as the Mustangs thrilled their cheering and hopeful fans by coming back to tie the count in the second period and salt the game away in the final two stanzas.

Bovina's first TD came on a six-yard pass from Quarterback Billy Shelby to Tight End Bobby McMeans, Kim Rundell's extra point kick was true to knot the count.

The scoring drive began late in the first period when a Farwell fumble was recovered by the Mustangs' Alfonso Delgado at the Bovina 38 yard line. It took 17 plays for the Mustangs to go the 62 yards for the tying tally and at that they suffered a five-yard penalty and a called-back touchdown.

A steady ground attack was used to eat up the real estate in the initial scoring effort with Larry Wiseman, Jeff McCormick and Eddi Pesch alternating at tailback and doing the bulk of the ballcarrying. Wiseman went across the goal line from the one, but a five yard penalty nullified the effort and moved the ball back to the six. Then, facing fourth down, Shelby pegged the strike to McMeans for the six-pointer.

Just before the half, the Mustangs missed a golden scoring opportunity as they lost a fumble at the Farwell one yard line. The Steers had time for only two plays before the halftime buzzer sounded. That drive by the Mustangs originated on their own 29 and again featured a steady ground attack plus a 39-yard pass and run play from Shelby to McMeans which carried from the Bovina 46 to the Farwell 15.

As the teams took the half-time break, still nothing had been proven as the score was knotted at 7-7 and it appeared to be anybody's game in the final 24 minutes.

We join in extending our congratulations to the Mustangs and their coaches for breaking the ice in the Farwell games.

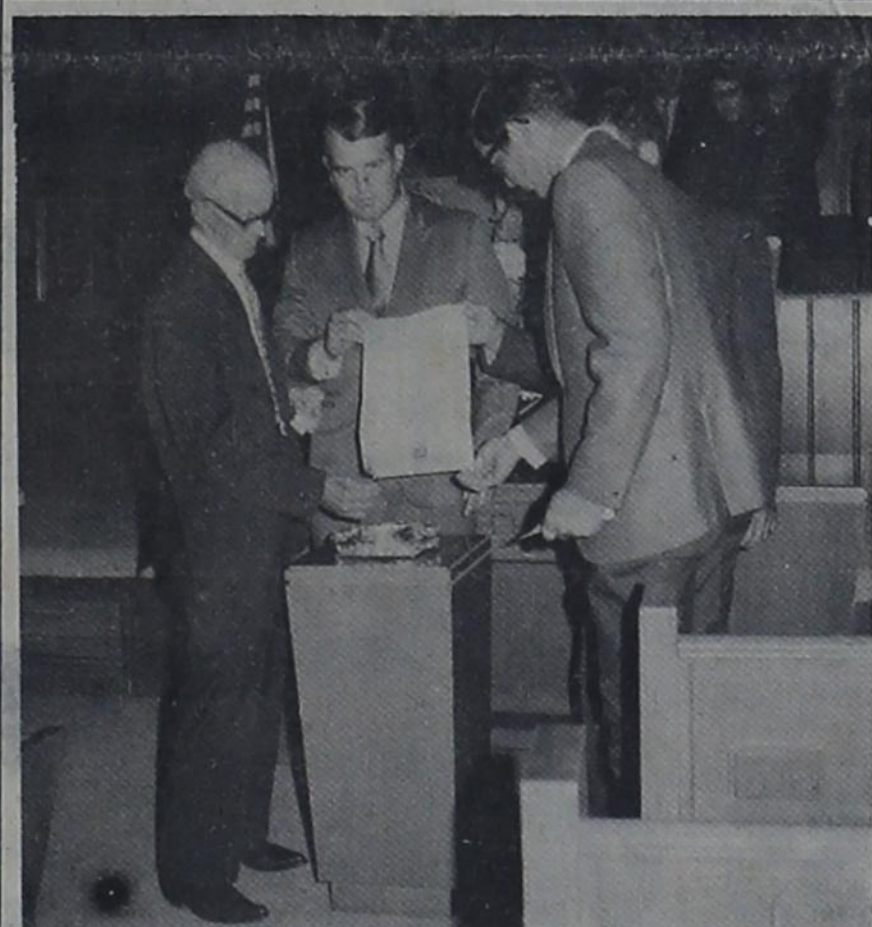
Only natural it is, we'll guess, when you consider it's been 16 years since a Bovina football win over Farwell, to wonder who played, etc. way back there in 1954 when the Mustangs last won . . . until Friday night.

We talked with Darrel Read, who was a member of that '54 team. He says winning over Farwell then, while a good deal, wasn't as important as it is now because there was no long win streak involved by either team.

The 1954 Mustangs took their win over Farwell, added some to it and came out with the district (Class B) championship. The winning streak by Farwell was started the next season, 1955, as the Steers came out on the long end of a 6-0 count. Read admits he was a member of that team, too. And while that loss was disappointing as those kind of games are supposed to be, nobody realized it was the beginning of something that wouldn't be ended until the determined team of 1971 came out with a 23-13 margin.

Most of those years in between, Farwell was favored to win the game, we're guessing. The Steers had some Class A district championship ballclubs there in the late '50's and early '60's while the Mustangs were still in Class B competition and the Bovina boys were just outclassed on some occasions. However, the rivalry continued to exist, at least as far as Bovina was concerned. When the Mustangs did have as much as an equal chance, it

Schools' ADA Has Increase

Average daily attendance at Bovina Schools is up slightly this year over last, according to a report heard at the Monday night meeting of the board of trustees.

ADA through the first six weeks this year was 649.91 as compared with 647.31 during the same period a year ago.

The board confirmed the employment of Mrs. Judy Page to work in the school cafeteria.

Supt. L. F. Jacobs reported on a Monday meeting of schools which will be in District 3-A next year. New district football schedule was approved. The district members remain the same except for Happy which was changed to a Class B district.

Jacobs reports that total 1971 school district taxes which have been collected through Monday are \$22,068.84. The taxes became due and payable the first of the month. Total on the tax

roll is \$271,761.90. Deadline for payment without penalty is January 31.

Feedlot Installs Equipment For Steam Flaking

Bovina Feeders, Inc. has announced the installation of new and additional mill facilities for the steam flaking process of feed grains for cattle feeding rations.

The feedlot, which has a capacity of 22,000 head, has been using high moisture grain, milo and corn, as the basic ingredient of its rations.

The new steam-flaking process insures area-cattle feeders of scientific and efficient methods of feed manufacturing, according to Lee Hicks, general manager of the corporation.

Another Delay --

Rainfall Halts Milo Harvest

Rainfall Sunday night and Tuesday morning brought a halt to grain sorghum harvesting which was just beginning to get underway.

The Sunday night shower totaled as much as half an inch in some sections. Moisture came again in the form of drizzle Tuesday morning.

The rainfall delayed still more an already-late harvest of the county's most important crop, milo. August and September rains, which boosted the yield potential of the crop, also delayed the maturity date and only a small percentage of the milo was ready for harvesting before the most recent showers began.

There was no crop damage in this area Sunday night due to the weather. Some sections of the Plains had crops destroyed by tornado-like winds and hail, according to reports.

Yields of the milo which has been harvested up to now have been outstanding, according to reports. Harvest will, no doubt, move into full swing, when the weather dries.

Mager Takes First In Weekly Contest

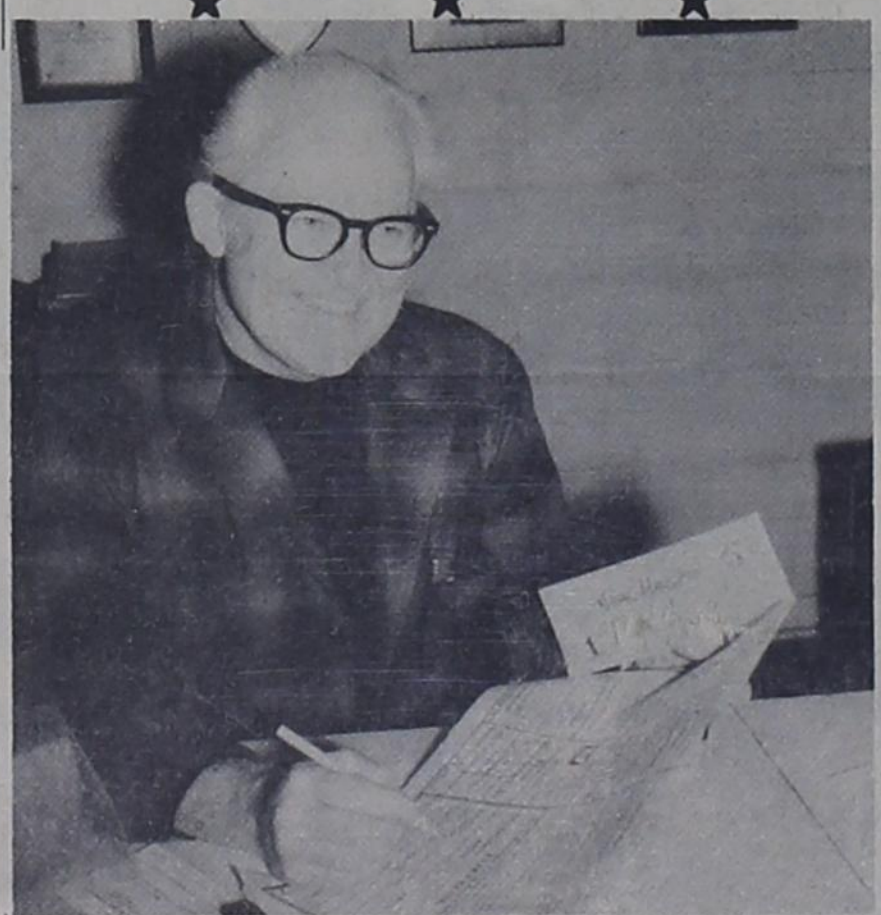
A total of 198 contestants entered the sixth week of the contest.

Report Shows --

Bank Deposits Continue Rise

Deposits in First State Bank of Bovina as of Sept. 30 totaled \$3,475,275.18, an increase of approximately \$632,580.18 over the same period a year ago.

Total deposits as of Sept. 30, 1970, were \$2,842,695.00. The Sept. 30 deposits show a slight increase over the June 30 figure, which was \$3,340,977.45.

Loans at the end of last month totaled \$2,489,769.51, up \$178,665.52 from the '70 mark of \$1,711,103.99. Two years ago, in October 1969, the loan total was \$1,730,678.84.

McCallum's Father Dies

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in Childress Church of Christ for C. Fairl "Paducah" McCallum, 70, father of Dean McCallum of Bovina.

Mr. McCallum died Saturday morning at his home after apparently suffering a heart attack.

Minister of the church, Auther Judd, officiated at the services. Burial was in Childress Cemetery.

A native of Tennessee, Mr. McCallum came to Childress in 1921. After working as a barber for about 20 years, he operated a malt shop and later managed an Army surplus store. For the past four months, he had been employed as a salesman at an automobile company.

He married Ruth Hullum on Sept. 22, 1922, in Childress. He was a past president of the Childress Volunteer Fire Department.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Dean of Bovina; his mother, Mrs. Katie Smith of Hamlin; and three grandchildren.

He had been a visitor in Bovina many times.

seemed that Lady Luck was never looking their way and still another chapter in the book of Farwell wins would be added.

All along, we've felt like Bovina would some day win the Farwell game, but, frankly, we were beginning to wonder when. Continuous disappointment made true optimism hard to come by.

Bovina football fans and former players admitted "those blue suits" from Farwell were worth two touchdowns when they met on the gridiron. Such may still be the case, but the spell is broken, and we are, like we said, glad.

One of our favorite south of town farmers says he may come out a little short financially since he had his milo money all spent based on a \$2.10 cwt. price.

But he says he figures the situation is only temporary because one of his agricultural advisers has told him that he'll make two bales of cotton per acre. . . if it doesn't freeze until March.

He might make it, too. It's just a little over four months until March and we haven't had a freeze yet. He's getting closer with each day that passes.

Seems from here this has been an unusual year from a grain sorghum harvesting standpoint in that the crop is not maturing as rapidly as normal. The freeze which hasn't come yet has something to do with that, of course, but that's not the whole story. The August and September rains must have caused the plants to continue growing and producing instead of maturing. Last year's early freeze made the crop earlier than normal and it may be that we have a tendency to compare the harvest dates of last year with this year instead of with what's more normal.

Incidentally, Weatherman Willie Williams tells us the average freeze date hereabouts is October 28.

That's later than we'd have guessed. We'll admit, though, that the average freeze date isn't worth much to a fellow who's trying to make cotton THIS year.

Kress Kangaroos Next Opponent For Mustangs

With morale never higher following the long-awaited victory over the Farwell Steers last Friday night, the Mustangs take on the pre-season District 3-A favorites, the Kress Kangaroos, here Friday night.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. for the district tilt.

"The Kangaroos are really fast," says Head Coach Gib Hough, "and we are going to have to contain them and keep them inside -- because if they get outside they're going to score."

Bill Jennings, in his second year at the reins at Kress, coached his team to a 7-4 season record last year and the District 3-A title.

The Kangaroos have the majority of last year's starters returning this year, led by all-state candidate Roy Jackson, 175-pound halfback, who won two-way all-district honors last year; Weaver McClure, 155-pound defensive back, who made the All-South Plains team; and Terry Stark, 155-pound all-district center.

With eight returning starters on defense, the Kangaroos major strength appears to lie in their experience in the line, quarterback position, all around team speed and defensive secondary.

In the past four meetings of the Mustangs and Kangaroos, Kress has come out on the top end of the score three of the four times -- in 1967 by the score of 15-7, in '69 when the score was 33-6, and last year

Kress battled back in the second half to defeat the Mustangs, 36-21. The Mustang victory came in 1968 when Bovina capitalized on Kress miscues to take a slim victory, 14-12.

"Our kids did a fine job -- they didn't just beat Farwell, they played a fine football game," commented Hough on the victory Friday night. "We finally put something together offensively," he continued.

"They all did such a fine job -- we had tremendous team effort on both offense and defense," said Hough, who stated that he didn't want to single out any one particular standouts in the game.

Team morale is expected to be high for the Kress tilt and the team is in good physical

In District 3-A action last week, Vega pulled into sole possession of the lead for the district title by beating previously undefeated Springlake-Earth, 10-0. Vega now has a 3-0 record in district play and Springlake-Earth stands at 2-1. Kress, the pre-season favorite, defeated Happy, 27-14, to maintain a tie for second place in standings with a 2-1 record. Happy and Bovina now have dis-

The Mustangs quickly broke the deadlock after the halftime rest period, however, with the six-pointer coming on a one-yard plunge by Pesch. Bovina received the second half kickoff, McMeans returned it from the 15 to the 26, but a half-the-distance penalty moved the ball back to the 13 and the Maroons had to start from there for the scoring drive.

On the first play, Shelby slipped through for five to the 18. On the next play, the sophomore quarterback threw long downfield. The ball was deflected by a Farwell defender and then settled into the arms of Ronnie Steele, who carried it down to the Farwell 27 before being tackled. The pass and run play earned the Mustangs 55 yards. Shelby was then dropped for a three-yard loss back to the 30 and a fumbled pitchout got only one of those back. On third down, Shelby threw to Fullback Shannon Davis for an 11-yard gain to the 18. McCormick, aided by the consistent blocking of the Mustang line, got two and the first down at the 16. Wiseman picked up four, Shelby was stopped for no gain, Wiseman then got 11 more and a first down on the Farwell one. Pesch sailed through the line and into the endzone from that point for the counter. The Mustangs went for the dual extra points after the TD, but Wiseman was stopped as he attempted to carry through the center of the line.

The Mustang defense, a strong point of the team all season, didn't need an inspirational boost, but the six-point lead didn't hurt anything and they carried the fight to the Steers more than ever afterwards.

With just over two minutes remaining in the third quarter, McMeans, the Mustang punter, got off a high and long spiral from his own 46 which was fielded at the Farwell five by Larry Erwin who returned only one yard to the six. The punt was good for 54 yards and put the visitors into a hole from which they couldn't recover. Three plays later, Mustang Guard Hugh Rogers tackled Farwell Quarterback Brett Hargrove behind the goal line for a two-point safety, boosting the score to 15-7.

The Steers rallied quickly, however, as they grabbed a Bovina fumble four plays later at their own 47. With 0:31 remaining in the third period, Hargrove threw long to Kevin Haradge for a 53-yard touchdown play. Farwell elected to go for two extra points in an attempt to tie the score but Wiseman, from his defensive end position, dropped Hargrove as he was back to pass.

That sent the game into the final quarter with the Mustangs owning an encouraging, but unsafe, 15-13 lead.

That was too close to suit the fired-up Mustangs and they set out to do something about it. McMeans returned the following kickoff 30 yards to the middle stripe and the Mustang offense was in business. Pesch made two on the final play of the third quarter, then Fullback Davis took over the pigskin moving duties. Carrying three consecutive times, he made six, 17 and four yards. Pesch then made one, but a five yard march-off against the Mustangs slowed the drive down. Shelby

then passed again to McMeans for a nine-yard gain and Davis carried for three more for a first down at the 17. McCormick got five and Davis two to put the ball at the 10. Then, Shelby, on a keeper play, scored from there with solid blocks from the right side of the line and good second effort. That boosted the score to 21-13 and it stayed that as Rundell's extra point kick was wide to the left.

That score gave the win-hungry Mustangs an eight-point edge with about that many minutes remaining to be played. The Mustang defense continued to put the pressure on Farwell and a high snap from center on an attempted punt by Hargrove allowed him to be tackled on his own 20 yard line. Making the defensive play were Tommy Bonds and Wiseman. That gave the Mustangs the ball and another TD opportunity. They moved the ball to the one in eight plays but lost possession on downs. The Steers then had the ball but less than three minutes to do something with it. On their third play from that point, McMeans tackled the ballcarrier behind the goal for the Mustangs' second safety. That boosted the score to the final 23-13 count with only 2:08 remaining to be played.

Still another opportunity to add insurance points was missed by the Mustangs following the safety. Farwell kicked from it's own 20 after the two-point play. Shelby gathered in the ball on the Bovina 40 and raced down the east sideline to paydirt. He was ruled out of bounds at the five. Davis got four of those and on the next play, a Mustang fumble went across the goal line and was recovered by Farwell in the end zone, giving the Steers possession at their 20.

The Steers launched a desperation passing attack from the 20 with 1:19 to be played, but it went for naught. The Mustangs had their highest yardage total of the season in the game -- 383. Farwell had 210 total yards. The Mustangs led in the first down department, 18-9.

Happy To Class B --

7 Teams In 3-A For Next 2 Years

District 3-A will have seven teams during the next two school years instead of the present eight.

Happy is being transferred to a Class B district.

This change was announced at a district meeting of school officials Monday.

Approved at the session was the district football schedule for 1972.

Also, according to interscholastic league rulings, there will be 11 weeks for schools to schedule 10 football games. This will allow for an open date for football teams. Bovina has had no open date in recent years.

In Bovina's case, the open date will be October 6, the week before the Mustangs begin district play.

Then, the games will be played on consecutive Friday nights in this order: Vega, Sudan, Farwell, Kress, Springlake-Earth and Hart.

With six district games, 3-A

The Bovina aerial game also enjoyed its best game of the season as Shelby hit on six of nine for 129 yards. He was four for four until he missed on the fifth try in the third period.

McMeans caught three of the six passes for 54 yards, Davis caught two for a total of 20 yards and Steele gathered in the one 55-yarder.

teams will be allowed to schedule four non-district tilts. These have not yet been arranged.

Superintendent L. F. Jacobs, who represented Bovina at the Monday meeting, said it was his understanding that Happy and Lazbuddle, both long-time opponents of the Mustangs, will be in the same eight-team Class B district. This will mean they will have fewer non-district games and may not be

able to continue to schedule Bovina. However, the non-district schedule has not been worked out and it remains to be seen who the outside opponents will be.

The district alignment will remain intact at least for the next two school years, '72-'73 and '73-'74.

Starting date for football season next year will be Sept. 7 or 8 and the ending date is Nov. 17.
