HOUSTON .- Revision of high chool curriculum to prepare children for a world in which leisure will be a major consideration is the task before educators, according to Dr. Edison Ellsworth Obernoltzer, new president of the deartment of superintendendence of National Education association. Dr. Oberholtzer, superintendent f Houston schools for the past 10 looks upon his election to he highest office of N. E. A. with reat concern.

Pioneering has past, he and it will be the duty of high chools to prepare children for vise use of the leisure time that vill become such an important art in living.

Public school training may be ngthened. Oberholtzer ventured. meet the new economic situaion. Thus educated men and womwould enter the field of cometitive business much later and in it a shorter time, taking sevral years from social readjustnent to leisure time.

"It will be more and more our igh responsibility to help prepare the future men and women for his new world of labor and leiure, with the latter taking more more time," Dr. Oberholtzer aid. "We need culture more than

He believes children should be ined to think more in terms of. helpful work for the common soial good and less in terms of maerial success.

Necessary as this change is, he uid, those who make the new chool program are "betwixt the devil and the deep blue sea." On the one hand is the need for the ew curriculum to adjust children to the new world of greater leisure, and on the other hand is an economic pressure demanding curtailment of the vey activities introduced to meet the social demand.

Dr. Oberholtzer has two courses for high school students here. One s for those who plan to continue their education at institutions of higher learning.
