BUSINESS HAS SHOWN STEADY

WASHINGTON, July 9. — American business, aided by bil-lions of dollars from federal and to have pulled itself more than a third of the way out of the depres-sion which began five years ago this month.

More than two years have pass-ed since the absolute bottom of the depression was reached in July, 1932. Today both official and private business figures showed an irregular upward course since that time, interrupted temporarily 15 months ago by the banking shut-

Figures compiled by the federal reserve board showed today that industrial activity in the United States, after reaching its peak of 125 per cent of the 1923-25 average, in June, 1929, declined stead-ily to 58 per cent in July, 1932. The index rose thereafter and fell to a second bottom of 59 per cent in March, 1933.

After another setback following last July, activity began to rise slowly early this year to the cur-rent 85 per cent level.





To the Citizens of Eastland!

The Eastland Fuel Corporation is a company organized by Mr. A. S. Hickok, who is president of the Hickok Oil Corporation, of Toledo, Ohio, operating a large and successful oil and gasoline marketing business throughout Ohio, Michigan, Eastern Indiana, and Western New York. This company is capable of carrying out its business ventures and undertakings. The Hickok Oil Corporation is the parent company of the Consolidated Gasoline Company, the Hickok Producing & Development Company, and the Breckenridge Gasoline Company. The two first named companies have operated in Eastland for the past twelve years. During this period of time these companies have had an average pay roll well in excess of \$5,000.00 per month, which has been and is now being spent in Eastland. In addition, these companies have paid producers and land owners royalties of over \$1,000,000.00. If these concerns are to stay in business, they must find a market for their residue gas.

We have worked out a plan which we believe will aid in creating a market for such residue gas and will ultimately result in the City of Eastland owning its own gas system. It is a well known fact to us as well as to the people of Eastland, that a great many cities find it impractical to vote bonds in order to construct their own utility gas system, as many cities have desired to do. We have, therefore, agreed and do hereby propose to construct a gas distribution system at our own expense and, after the net revenue of this gas system shall have repaid the cost of installing the same, plus 6 per cent interest per annum, then the Eastland Fuel Corporation will give the system to the City of Eastland to be operated as its own. This offer is conditioned, however, upon the City and the citizens giving us their wholehearted support and upon our being protected from annihilation by the adoption of a minimum rate ordinance below which it shall be unlawful to sell gas within the City of Eastland. We have been notified that the prices will be cut for the purpose of running us out, should we go into the gas distribution business.

The important parts of the plan proposed are as follows:

- (1) To build a new gas distribution plant.
- (2) This gas distribution system, to be constructed of new material, will cost about \$80,000.00, of which approximately one-half or \$40,000.00, will be paid for labor to Eastland people.
 - (3) To supply this system with gas from wells in this territory so far as practical.
- (4) After the net revenue of this gas system shall have repaid the cost of installing the system, plus 6 per cent interest per annum, then to give the system to the City of Eastland, after which the city can determine its own rates. We guarantee to apply at least 12½c (approximately 20%) from each 1,000 cubic feet of domestic and commercial gas sold toward the repayment of the investment.
- (5) We propose to charge the following rates for gas for the various classes of service and our franchise and rate ordinance, if granted, will limit the rates to an extent that no higher rate than these may be charged:



This has been most unfair to me as the statement below will show that I had nothing whatsoever to do with the making of the scale of wages, neither was I ever asked my opinion on the wage scale as now exists.

Friends of my opponents are using this against me in their campaign to get votes—and in order that the people may know, and believing that the people will be fair and impartial in their decision, am publishing the following letter. Will appreciate anyone interested in taking the time to check on these statements made by these parties and also to check my record from any angle that they may see fit.

Following is the letter:

EASTLAND COUNTY RELIEF ADMINISTRATION General Office at Eastland, Texas July 2nd, 1934.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

In order to clarify some misunderstanding regarding the appointees of the Eastland County Wage Scale committee, this is to advise that Mr. G. W. Leaverton of Ranger, Texas, a member of the Carpenters' Union, was appointed to represent organized labor, Mr. Pete Coole of the Cisco Lumber & Supply Company, was appointed to represent construction labor and Mr. M. B. Kowalski, county project superintendent, of the Eastland County Relief Board, was appointed to represent the Eastland County Relief organization.

The above appointees were selections made by the county relief committee with the exception of Mr. M. B. Kowalski, who was appointed a member of the wage scale committee on orders from our Austin headquarters. The above applies to the work division of the FERA inaugurated after CWA activities ceased on March 29th, 1934.

The wage scale applied to all CWA activities over the entire county was a scale set up to apply to this entire county by our Austin Headquarters and applied to the entire CWA program until it stopped operations March 29th, 1934.

It has been brought to my attention misunderstandings have arisen regarding the selections made for the work division of FERA Wage Scale committee, as well as the wage scale set for the old CWA program and the above is self-explanatory.
