## Two Armed Bandits Secure Guns at Strawn

### BLANTON GREETED BY LARGE AUDIENCE SATURDAY NIGHT AT EASTLAND COUNTY-WIDE RALLY

(From Monday's Eastland Daily Telegram)  
Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, campaigning for re-election, addressed an audience of fully 1,000 people assembled on the north side of the Eastland county courthouse lawn Saturday night. The audience, which was made up of men and women from all walks of life and all parts of Eastland county, with some from Hamilton and Comanche counties, was the largest that had heard a political speech in Eastland since the late James E. Ferguson spoke in the city in the interest of his wife's candidacy for governor.  
J. Frank Sparks, chairman of the Eastland County Blanton-for-governor club, introduced the speaker in a short speech in which he reviewed briefly Congressman Blanton's career and his achievements in behalf of the masses.  
Expressing his appreciation for the large audience assembled before him and for the interest his friends had taken in arranging for the meeting, the speaker reviewed his political career which began when he became a candidate for judge of the old 42nd district, and then to the adjournment of the 51st session of congress.  
"I came here as a young lawyer and told you folks of Eastland county that if you would put me in your district bench I would see that your dockets were cleared and the business of your courts expedited. You gave me a splendid vote that helped to elect me district judge and I fulfilled every promise. When I offered for congress I again asked you for your

### Candidates For The Legislature Speak Saturday

Candidates for both the 106th and 107th Legislative districts, will address the voters of Eastland and the adjoining communities in Eastland Saturday night at 8:30 o'clock, it has been announced. The time of the speaking has been changed from 3:00 p. m. to the later hour.  
Reports from over the districts indicate that interest in this race is growing and that the voters are beginning to consider seriously the claims being made by the various candidates.  
In the 106th district there are seven candidates and in the 107th there are three candidates.

### 'Uncle Joe' Calder Has Oldest Gun In Eastland County

"Uncle Joe" Calder of Ranger has an ancient pistol, which he believes is the oldest revolver in the county which is still in perfect working order.  
The gun is a .45 calibre Colt, made in 1872, which was formerly owned by W. W. Calder, his father. It, together with another single action gun of the same model, but which had pearl handles, was issued to his father when he was a member of the Texas Military police, and has been in use ever since.  
The gun is still in perfect working order and shoots better today, Mr. Calder said, than many of the newer model guns and is far superior to the automatic pistol, being equally as fast, much more dependable and more rigidly built.  
When a child, Mr. Calder's father promised to give him the gun when he was old enough to shoot it, so when he was about six years old he took it out, put it across a log and pulled the trigger. The gun kicked back and hit him in the face, but he claimed it as his own and has had it in his possession ever since, except once when it was stolen from him in Ranger and later recovered.  
The gun was carried by the present owner when he was deputy sheriff and later when he was a Texas ranger and has seen much service. It has four notches filed in the barrel, indicating that four men have been killed by the weapon.  
The scabbard in which the gun is now kept was made years ago by the present owner, who is very justly proud of the old weapon. He says that he intends keeping it as long as he lives.

### Want Eastland County Put On 1st Drouth List

Alarm over conditions in Eastland county which are resulting from the prolonged dry spell has motivated action of several organizations in Eastland county who have notified relief headquarters in Washington that Eastland county should be put in the emergency relief classification.  
A telegram sent by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce reads: "Continued drouth in Eastland county make it imperative that we have immediate relief. Crops and gardens are burning up with no sign of rain. No late crops have been planted due to drouth. We feel that Eastland county should be classed immediately for emergency relief."  
The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce and the First State bank of Rising Star in similar action last week sent the following telegram to relief headquarters: "Drouth conditions in Eastland county alarmingly acute. Hundreds of cattle are being sacrificed on Fort Worth market. Thirteen head netted 59 dollars. We could cite many other similar instances. It is necessary that we be classified immediately for primary relief. Your immediate action requested."  
Besides the chambers of commerce of Eastland, Rising Star and Ranger, which have taken action, it is understood that the commissioners' court has taken similar action in addition to that of organizations in other Eastland county towns.  
J. C. Patterson, county agent, states that the situation, as far as crop conditions are concerned, is actually acute.  
Congressman Thomas L. Blanton on recent visits to Eastland county said that efforts were being made by himself to have counties in his district placed on the emergency relief list. It was only recently that Eastland county was classified for secondary relief classification.

### Service For D. N. Scurback Thurs.

Funeral services for D. N. Scurback, who died in a Confederate home in Austin Wednesday, were conducted at the Eastland cemetery Thursday afternoon with O. B. Darby, Baptist pastor, in charge.  
The body was shipped Wednesday from Austin to Eastland where a nephew, W. M. Armstrong, resides.

### Negroes Attempt To Force Party To Let Them Vote

AUSTIN, July 19.—A petition for leave to file a mandamus in state supreme court to compel authorities to permit two Jefferson county negroes to vote in the next election was filed today by Wyatt J. Baldwin, Beaumont attorney.  
His petition urged the court to take jurisdiction of the case in order to settle the question of the right of negroes to vote in democratic primaries in Texas.  
Baldwin contends the democratic party in Texas and its executive committee are organs of the government and as such have no authority to exclude negroes.

### Wheat Goes Up On Market Today

FORT WORTH, July 18.—No. 1 hard wheat advanced a cent a bushel today, closing at \$1.08 1/2 a bushel. The price was one cent above yesterday's price which in turn was an advance of one cent above Monday's quotations.

### Thomas L. Blanton Speaks at Cisco At 8:30 Tonight

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton returns to Eastland county this week and speaks today at Pioneer at 11:00 a. m.; at Nimrod at 1:30 p. m.; at Scranton at 3:30 p. m. and tonight at 8:30 at Cisco. Last week he spoke in the county at Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, Olden, Ranger and Eastland.

The meeting tonight at Cisco will be somewhat in the nature of a final Blanton rally in the county since it is doubtful if he will fill another speaking engagement in the county before the primaries.

The people of Eastland county have accorded Congressman Blanton by far the greatest reception given any candidate that has spoken in the county during the present campaign and much larger crowds have attended his meetings than any other candidate. The nearest approach to the Blanton crowds were those of Attorney General Allred, C. C. McDonald, Clint Small and Tom Connally; the latter named, with the exception of Allred, spoke only at one place in the county.

### Ranger Scouts Get Awards at Annual Billy Gibbons camp

Troop 9 of Ranger, under the direction of Scoutmaster Steele, made an enviable record while at Camp Billy Gibbons, entering all the camp activities and winning many honors, both for individual scouts and the troop as a whole.

Friday night the scoutmaster had charge of the council fire and presented a good program, while the troop won 660 points to take first honors at the camp, taking the first position from Troop 8 of Brownwood, winner for last year. Troop 8 was second with 640 points and Troop 1 of Brownwood was third with 510 points.

The Ranger troop had the largest number of boys of any troop in the camp, having 28 present out of a possible 31.

### WATCHMEN ARE OVERPOWERED; STORE ROBBED

Two armed bandits raided capturing the town night watchmen early Tuesday morning, man at the Strawn Merchandise company, and escaped from town in an automobile after taking a number of guns, two suits of clothing and three boxes of ammunition.

The two bandits, driving a new model Chevrolet sedan with wire wheels, entered the town about 1:30, captured and disarmed H. N. Sherrod, city night watchman, and discussed robbing the Strawn Merchandise company.

One of the bandits is quoted by the night watchman as saying that they would probably have to kill A. M. Marrs, night watchman for the merchandise company, but Sherrod asked them not to kill him. He offered to call Marrs from the store if the two would promise not to kill Marrs and the bandits accepted, according to reports to local police.

When Marrs was called from the building the two got the drop on him and disarmed him. They then entered the building and selected a number of guns and forced the watchmen to carry them to the waiting car. After the car was loaded they again searched the two men, taking \$3 from Marrs, which they returned, along with the guns belonging to the watchmen. The guns were unloaded before they were returned to the owners. The two men then sped away in their automobile.

A checkup this morning showed that two suits of clothing, three boxes of ammunition and several guns had been taken. The guns were listed as follows:

- One Browning model B-112 automatic shotgun, 12-gauge, 30-inch barrel, factory serial number 150-710.
- One Browning model B-116, automatic shotgun, 16-gauge, 28-inch barrel, factory serial number 81-682.
- One Remington automatic shotgun, 12-gauge, 28-inch barrel, factory serial number 345,992.
- One Marlin repeating shotgun, lever action 410 gauge, factory serial number 5574.
- One Winchester pump shotgun, 12-gauge, factory serial number 821,906.
- One Remington .22 calibre automatic rifle, 22 long rifle, serial number 808,862.

The two bandits were quoted as saying that they would have to come back through Strawn some day and kill Si Bradford, mentioning that he wore a steel vest. Bradford, who is one of the most famous peace officers in this section of the country, was little concerned over the threats to shoot him, officers here declared, but was indignant that anyone would think that he wore a steel vest.

A report of the robbery was sent to all sheriffs and police departments in this section of the state, along with a list of the guns stolen, and a sharp lookout was being maintained for the bandits. Eastland county officers were called from Strawn about 3 o'clock this morning to assist officers there in tracing down two bandits who robbed the Strawn Merchandise company of that city and kidnaped the night watchman.

Si Bradford, veteran Strawn peace officer, called the Eastland sheriff's department and advised them that the two men were traveling in a Ford coach and were thought to be headed this way. Nothing was seen of the men, however.

The Strawn night watchman was carried by the bandits several miles out the Thurber road from Strawn where he was released and his gun, which the bandits had taken from him, returned to him, Eastland officers were told.

AUSTIN, July 19.—Special appropriations for highway improvements in 19 counties were recorded on the highway commission minutes today.  
They included: Eastland county \$36,544 for grading, drainage structures on highway 187 from 2.5 miles north of Cisco to highway 67, and \$11,168 for seal coat highway 23 from 1.5 miles north of Romney to Rising Star. Bridges across Barton and Sunny creeks, estimated to cost \$20,000, were specified for highway five miles and 11 miles east of Amber in Palo Pinto county. They were added to the projects scheduled.

### Monkey Soft Ball Game to Be Played Sunday

Plans have been made for a monkey playground ball game, to be played Sunday afternoon at Grand field.  
Trained donkeys, which are being used all over this section of the state, and which were used in game at Brownwood, Tuesday night, are to be secured and used in the game, which will be staged at the Service and Elks.  
Several from Ranger went to Brownwood Tuesday night to watch the game and came back enthusiastic over the interest and that can be had at the game. The donkeys are well trained and according to members of the committee, "know more about the game than most of the players."

# Texas May Have Its Own Brain Trust Professor Believes

AUSTIN.—Will Texas have a "Brain Trust?" Dr. C. P. Patterson, professor of government at the University of Texas, thinks it will and should have one. The term is unfortunate, however, Dr. Patterson believes. He suggested "Trained

Civil Service Corps" as more appropriate. Whether "brain trust" or "T. C. S. C.," it is Dr. Patterson's opinion that "the American people must in the future become accustomed to experts in government, whether national, state or local. "It is clear to all informed people that the programs of the governments of the future must largely come through executive planning which must be based upon information furnished by the subordinates of the administrative system to be composed of college men," Dr. Patterson said.

His statement may sound strangely familiar to some of the Texas voters. Attorney General James V. Allred declared in opening his campaign for governor at Bowie that Texas has failed to progress in government for lack of planned action.

Dr. Patterson goes further: "The politician of the future must realize that he is incompetent to exercise a form of definite control, as has been his custom. He must learn to play second fiddle to the trained statesman."

In the heat of the present campaign for governor, no candidate will admit that he's willing to "play second fiddle" to any person or group of persons, except the majority of Texas voters.

The background of Texas candidates offers some proof that college class rooms have played at least a small part in political careers.

On the University of Texas roll of ex-students one finds, for example: Clinton C. Small, LL.B., 1911. Out of the university, Small became a district judge in Wellington, was elected to the Texas senate.

Edgar Ernest Witt, B.A., 1900. Witt began a career in government service as a clerk in the

state comptroller's department 25 years ago. He served in the Texas house of representatives, the Texas senate, and four years ago was elected lieutenant governor.

The university's list of ex-students also includes Walter Frank Woodul and Robert Milton Johnson, candidates for lieutenant governor, and Walter Calisto Woodward, candidate for attorney general.

C. C. McDonald, candidate for governor, "worked his way" thru the University of Texas by serving as secretary of state. A young man just out of the navy, Jimmie Allred saved his salary as a stenographer in a law office, earned his law degree in Cumberland University. Tom Hunter cleaned and pressed his schoolmate's trousers and taught school to obtain his education in law a college degree. Maury Hughes, educated in Austin College and the University of Virginia, was admitted to the bar in 1916.

Regardless of a brain trust or Dr. Patterson's T. C. S. C., it appears that Texas will have a college-bred man for its next governor.

## Contracts Let On Highway No. 89

AUSTIN, July 17.—Contracts for 20 state highway construction projects, aggregating \$1,753,584 in costs, were held by successful bidder today. Included in the projects was for Palo Pinto county, 9.5 miles grading and drainage structures from the county line southwest to the Santo-Stephenville road on Highway 89, Huddleston & Work, \$75,113; Rock creek and Buck creek bridges on Highway 89, between Parker and Palo Pinto county lines, Crouch & Nolan, of Strawn, \$32,227.

## Hijackers Take \$40 at Gun's Point

Two unmasked bandits Saturday night at 10 o'clock after ordering beer at the eating establishment of Les Taylor on Commerce street in Eastland forced the proprietor to hand over \$40 after show of guns.

## FARM NEWS

Growing chickens and turkeys, much of the needed feed and food for flocks and family, and depending on a variety of truck crops for cash is the way W. H. Nixon of the Henry Prairie community in Robertson county has weathered the gale of hard times. He tried an acre of cucumbers this year for the first time and the first picking paid all the expense of the crop except 10 cents.

A trench silo proved very profitable to H. F. Reist, Brooks county dairyman, because without it this feed would have been lost, due to the heavy rains last year. Mr. Reist has the only trench silo so far constructed in Brooks county, but a number of dairymen are so impressed by his savings that they will follow his example this summer.

Conserving moisture that is already in shrub beds is more im-

portant than watering them, says Mrs. Charles Galloway, home demonstration club member of Shady Acres, in Harris county. A loose, finely pulverized soil around the roots of the shrubs will not only hold the moisture but discourages the growth of weeds.

Successful gardening depends upon shallow cultivation after every rain, according to Mrs. Monroe Reynolds of the Hastings home demonstration club in Shackelford county. Mrs. Reynolds has raised a garden every year for 25 years and this year has 37 varieties of vegetables, five of which are new to her experience.

Farmers in Bailey county have found that alfalfa is a good crop for the shallow water district. A large increase in acreage was made in 1933 and indications are that an even larger acreage will be planted in 1934. Several farmers are preparing their retired cotton acreage for seeding to alfalfa this fall.

LAREDO.—In May, 1933, A. R. Rutherford of Laredo gave a pair of German police dogs to his friend J. C. Bluntzer of Corpus Christi, 157 miles away.

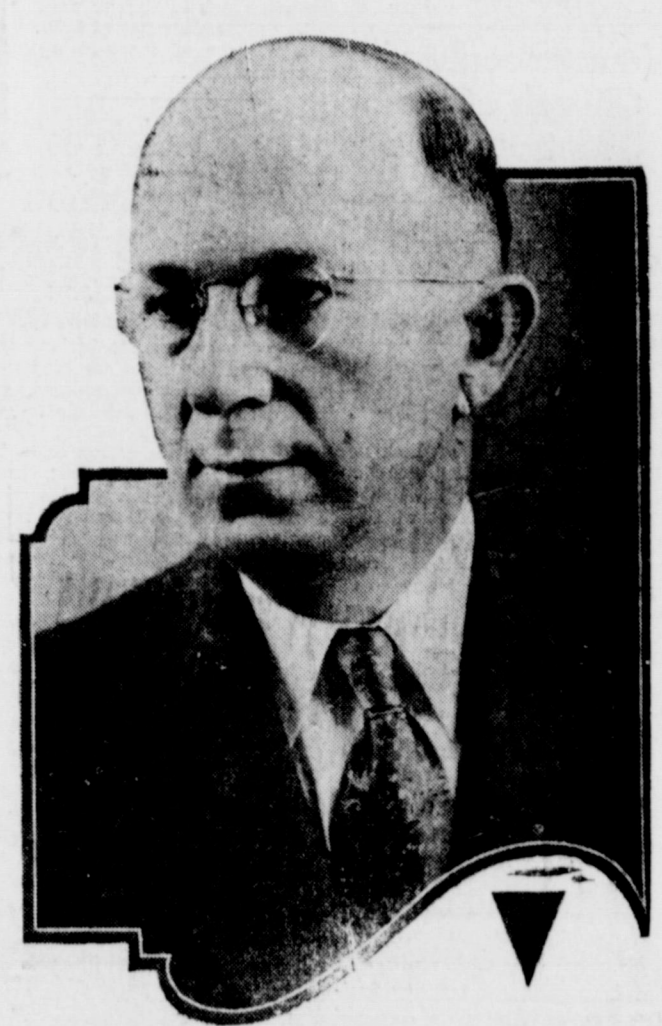

### Blanton Greeted

in luxury his every heart beat was in sympathy with the masses. He is thoroughly honest, sincere and capable, and despite his physical handicap, often works until after midnight in his office in order to carry on his work of national recovery for the benefit of the people, he said.

"While much has been accomplished in the way of recovery there is yet much to be done and the president is going to need the help of loyal friends in congress. I have been one of his leaders and have always helped him and I want you to return me to congress so I can continue to help you and support of the president's policies," Blanton said.

Blanton explained his vote to override the president's veto of the independent offices bill, which included government employees and veterans pay cuts. "The president is glad now that we passed that bill. If he had not had bad advice he would not have vetoed it," he said.

Blanton explained that by the terms of the existing law all federal employees' salaries would have automatically been restored to 100 per cent of their former amounts on last July 1, had not the present law been enacted. The passing of this law retained a cut in government employees salaries, and therefore congressmen's salaries were also cut. "It is being said that I voted to raise my own salary, when as a matter of fact just the opposite is true," Blanton said.

**For Veterans**  
"I have always been for the war veterans and have always fought for them," Blanton declared. He said he was in favor of the soldiers' bonus, which he said was misnamed, that it was not a bonus, but a debt of honor and that he was in favor of paying it. He also went into details in regards to his efforts in the behalf of all World War veterans, and told of his long fight to put off the government payrolls 4,800 retired officers who were drawing pay for life in amounts from \$125 to \$500 per month for alleged service connected disabilities, which it had been proven did not exist. He declared more than he was entitled to nor any soldier discriminated against.

"I succeeded in getting 4,800 of these fellows cut off the payrolls and they are mad at me for it. Some of them were holding jobs paying salaries as high as \$10,000 per year and in addition were drawing retired officers' pay. By some of them were United States marshals, some were mayors of big cities and some of them were district judges here in Texas," Blanton said.

The speaker declared that he had worked in the interest of a tariff on oil. He pointed out in this connection that Andrew W. Mellon, whom he declared was worth \$450,000,000, and the great Dutch Shell company, with its enormous refineries and peon labor in the Argentine and Old Mexico, were shipping oil into this country and selling it in competition to the independent oil men at prices that could not be met where living standards were such as exist in this country. "This must be stopped and I am in favor of stopping it if it takes an embargo to do it," he said.

The question of "hot oil" in East Texas was discussed by Blanton who said that he had put forth every effort to get an oil control bill through the last session of congress, but that the big oil operators chloroformed it and they were not able to pass it, but that the effort would be renewed in the next session and the measure would pass.

"I am in favor of a federal old age pension," Blanton said. "There is no sight more pitiful than an old man or old woman who has toiled their lives away and with children and grandchildren gone, are left alone in their old age, penniless and without even the meager comforts of life and so long as this nation is as rich as it is and plenty abound everywhere, I am not going to be content to have conditions like that exist. The president is in favor of an old age pension, too, and the next congress will ask that such a measure be passed, the speaker said. Blanton said an attempt was made to pass an old age pension for Washington, D. C., but he opposed it because it did not take in the whole country.

Blanton said that last spring William Randolph Hearst, the multimillionaire newspaper publisher, who owns a million-acre ranch in Old Mexico, shipped 10,000 heaves across the Rio Grande into Texas where he fattened them and shipped them to the Fort Worth market, glutting it with these cheap Mexican cattle and thereby running down prices until the farmer and stockmen of this section got virtually nothing for his livestock. This, the speaker said, he was opposed to and meant to continue his efforts against it until he got it stopped.

**Old Attack**  
Before he began his speech, friends told Blanton that an article attacking him had been published as a supplement in this week's issue of the Palo Pinto Star. This article, Blanton said, is a review of the old charge made against me years ago in congress when Frank Mondell, republican congressman from Wyoming, sought to kick him out of congress. He explained in detail the charges made and said that the matter complained of had long ago been reinstated and was now a part of the Congressional

Record and that Mondell, who had served in congress from Wyoming 26 years and up to that time was the only congressman Wyoming had ever had, was defeated for reelection the next time he came up for election after his attempt to kick him out of congress, having carried only one county in his state.

Explaining the important positions in congress Blanton pointed out that men like Garner, Rainey, Byrnes, Buchanan and others had reached the places of influence they now occupy because their districts had kept them in congress from 25 to 30 years. Seniority, Blanton said, means everything in congress and "I have, step by step, climbed up to where I now have the prestige necessary to best serve you," he declared.

Blanton told the women in his audience that they should vote for him because he was the first member of congress to start the move there for enfranchisement of women, if for no other reason.

The speaker dwelt at length on the anti-crime laws passed by the recent session of congress and declared that he was in favor of making these laws so stringent and enforcing them so completely that it would make it impossible for Dillinger and others of his ilk to exist to terrorize the people.

Blanton's speech in Eastland was the fifty-sixth he had delivered since his return from Washington at the adjournment of congress about two weeks before. He was given splendid attention throughout his address and his remarks were frequently applauded. At the conclusion of his speech a large portion of the crowd rushed forward and for almost an hour milled about the speaker's platform in an effort to speak to and shake his hand. Among these was Judge N. N. Rosenquest of Eastland, who, when a rising young attorney, served as district attorney in the old 42nd district while Blanton was judge. The two embraced each other affectionately, it being the first time they had met in some years.

Throughout his address of more than an hour Blanton at no time mentioned the name of either of his two opponents. Eastland is the home of O. F. Chastain, one of Blanton's opponents in the present campaign.

**Helps the Farmer**  
Blanton said that he had always noticed that much was done in congress presumably for the benefit of the farmers, but that little, if any, benefit ever really got to the farmers. He decided, he said, to see to it that the farm-

ers actually got some of the benefits and as a result of his efforts and those of others in sympathy with the farmer, had secured aid that went direct to the farmer himself. In this connection he mentioned cotton plow-up checks, hog and corn reduction checks, cotton option checks and wheat reduction checks. "I don't know whether you like the Bankhead bill or not; there are some things about it I don't like, but the President said if we did not pass it cotton would go to 2 cents."

He also commented on the appropriations for good roads and said that every time bills of that kind came up he helped to get portions of good road appropriations designated for lateral roads in order that the farmers might have good roads to market. "I want to see a good road to the door of every farmer, if possible, so he may be able to haul his produce to market wherever he can find one," Blanton said.

Counties in five states were included in the new certifications made by the bureau of agricultural economics and the extension service committee.

In California, Imperial county, a new county, was designated in the emergency drouth area. In Kansas, six counties were transferred from secondary to emergency rating. These are Finney, Haskell, Kearny, Logan, Meade, and Morton. Saline county, Nebraska, also was transferred to emergency status.

Three counties not previously certified were made emergency counties. They were Blanco, Crosby and Kent. Twenty-four others in Texas were changed from secondary to emergency rating. These are Bandera, Coke, Comal, Concho, Garza, Gillespie, Gonzales,

Guadalupe, Hansford, Hockley, Hutchinson, Irion, Kendall, Kerr, Llano, Lubbock, McCullough, Mason, Menard, Mitchell, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling and Tom Green.

In addition, 93 new Texas counties were added to the secondary drouth list. Among them were Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Palo Pinto and Stephens counties.

## City Commission Takes No Action On Gas Franchise

The granting of the proposed gas franchise to the Eastland Fuel Corporation, which has been discussed pro and con at the last three meetings of the Eastland city commission, was further discussed at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the commission Monday night. No action was taken on it, however.

A letter from Samuel Butler of the Arab Gasoline corporation, in which Butler stated that if the city was going to grant another gas franchise the Arab felt that it should be given consideration and allowed to submit a proposition for a franchise, was read and passed for further consideration as was the matter of the franchise for the Eastland Fuel Corporation. Mayor Kinnaird and all of the commission were present. Commissioner Sherrill stated

that he would insist on the Eastland Fuel Corporation, if a franchise was granted them, posting a bond in a sufficient amount to guarantee the faithful performance of any contracts the Eastland Fuel Corporation entered into with the city. Representatives of the Eastland Fuel Corporation looked with disfavor on this and said that it was discriminatory as the Community Natural Gas company now serving the city, was not under bond. Commissioner Sherrill's answer was that because mistakes were made in the past was no reason why they should make others now.

Mayor Kinnaird stated that the commission had employed an attorney who would look over the contracts submitted by the Eastland Fuel Corporation and possibly draw up contracts for the city which would, in effect, be a counter proposition to the one submitted by the Eastland Fuel Corporation, and that as soon as this work could be done the matter

would again be before the commission.

Representatives from both the Community Natural Gas company and the Eastland Fuel Corporation were present at the commission meeting Monday night.

The next regular meeting of the commission will be on the first Monday in August, which will be Aug. 6.
