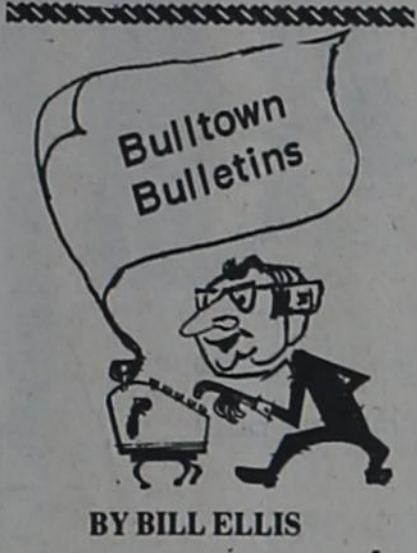

IF THE WEATHER such as we had this weekend holds out, there should be many acres planted in this area this week. We're keeping our fingers crossed that we've had the last spell of winter, but realizing full well that Easter Sunday is this coming Sunday, and we would be due the traditional "Easter Storm."

What we're hoping is that the weather got the calendar confused and sent the Easter storm two weeks early this year. This would really please several farmers in our area if this would be the case.

Although being tired of winter and the umpteen snows we've had since last October 31, farmers across the area are very thankful for the good general moisture that has been received here up to now.

Biggest majority of the farmers will be able to plant their crops without the necessity of pre-watering. This will not only be a big time and money-saving bonus to the farmers, but will also be one less time farmers will have to tap our depletable water table.

With the water level going down year by year, this is of prime consideration to residents hereabouts.

ON THE SUBJECT of water, and its depleting status, area leaders in Water, Inc. got a bad report last week from the Bureau of Reclamation study findings, which showed that the project is "economically unjustifiable."

A.L. Black of Friona, president of Water, Inc., stated that the findings were not unexpected. But Black says he feels that the standards used to evaluate the project were not adequate. Proposals for changing the standards are currently being adopted, and this could possibly have a bearing on the commission report.

Black joins other leaders in the water import project in urging that area leaders continue to band together and work on behalf of the import program. "We could just roll over and play dead-but I don't believe the people of this area will do that," he says.

State Representative Bill Clayton says he believes the legislature will be able to pass a two-year state budget without any new taxes—the first time in a number of years.

Clayton says he believes Governor Dolph Briscoe will stick to his campaign promise to "Veto any bills calling for additional taxes." Apparently, the legislature will attempt to keep from testing the governor's campaign promise.

Clayton also says that the recent supreme court decision on the school financing problem should give state leaders time to work on the financing problem, and save the state's taxpayers some money by not having to pass something hurriedly.

ARNOLD E. PAULSON, executive director of the National Organization for Raw Materials (NORM), was a speaker at our press convention last weekend in Amarillo.

Paulson quoted some startling facts that gross and net farm income has increased much slower during the past 22 years than has the national average income.

Mr. Paulson says our country could experience a famine at any time, and if it does, the

Blade Gets 3 PPA Awards

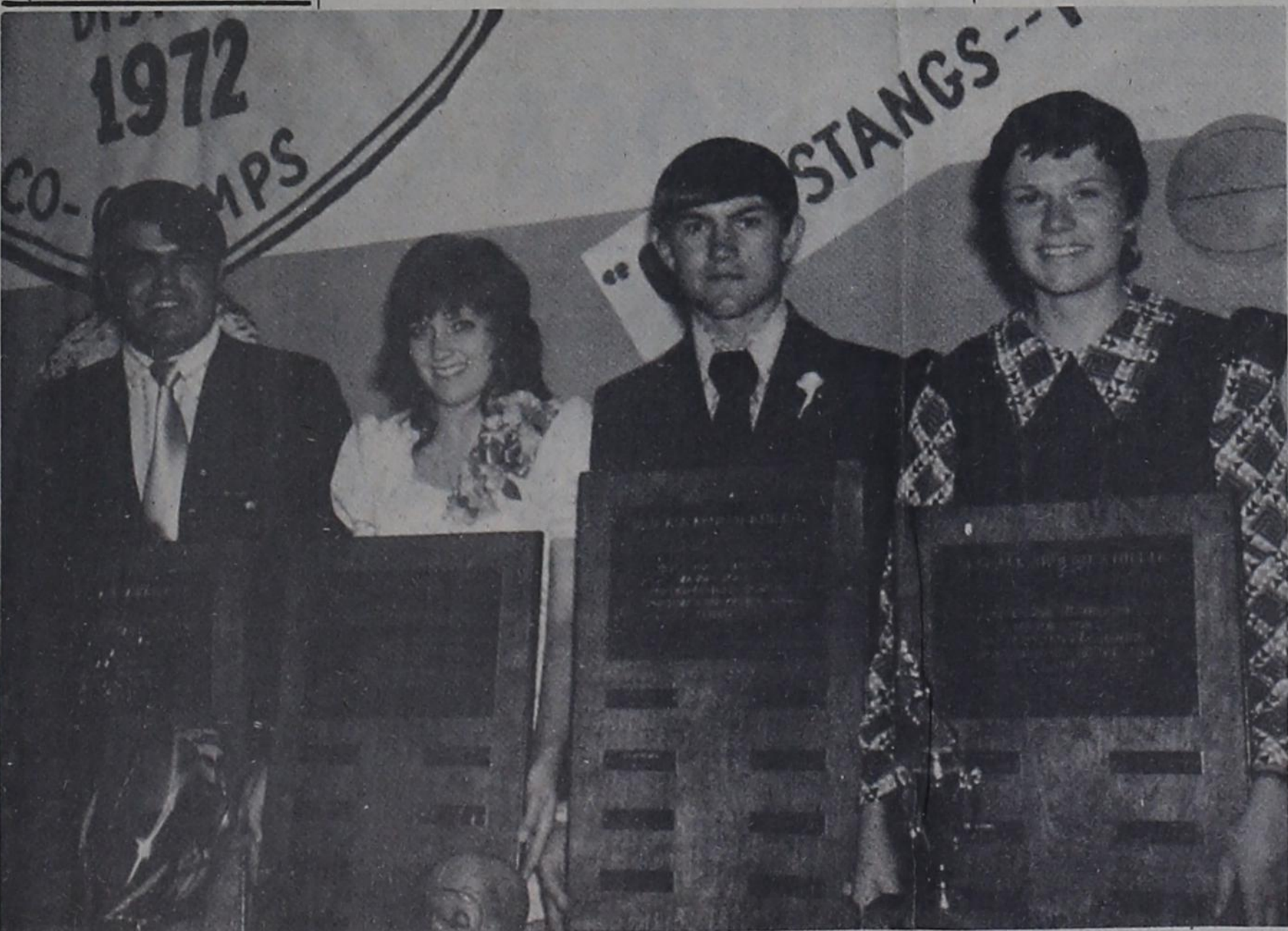
The Bovina Blade received three awards at the 64th annual Panhandle Press Association convention last weekend in Amarillo.

AT BOVINA SCHOOLS

'Bug' Meeting Set April 26

"Integrated Pest Management," a new concept in pest control will be explained to Parmer County and surrounding area farmers at a meeting at Bovina Schools.

The meeting, which all farmers in the area are urged to attend, will be at 8 p.m. Thursday, April 26, in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

Parmer County Spraying Service of Bovina is sponsoring the meeting. Refreshments will be served.

Buddy Ross and Willis Winter of Plainview, representatives of the Bio-Insect Control Co., will present a program on controls for corn borers, ear worms and spider mites in corn, greenbugs and spider mites in grain sorghum and various pests in the vegetable category.

"This meeting may well be one of the most important meetings for farmers in this area," states T.C. Wiseman, co-owner of the spraying company.

Legislation is currently pending in Congress to impose stricter controls of chemical usage in agriculture, said Wiseman.

The meeting at Bovina Schools will pose an alternate method of combating numerous pests in the agricultural industry.

Also present at the meeting will be Ovid Lawlis and Junior Lambert, co-owners of the spraying service with Wiseman.

AT RIDGEELE Pre-Registration Slated April 27

Next year's kindergarten and first grade students will be pre-registered at Ridgelea Elementary School by their parents or guardians beginning at 9 a.m. Friday, April 27, according to Wilson DiCuffa, elementary school principal.

Children who will be six years of age on or before September 1 and who will attend the first grade next year should be registered that day, DiCuffa says.

In addition, educationally handicapped children who will be five years old by September 1 and all other children who will be five years and seven months old by the same date should pre-register for kindergarten.

DiCuffa asks that parents

bring a list of immunizations the child has received, as well as their birth certificates.

Required immunizations for children entering kindergarten and first grade are smallpox; three DPT shots, one shot must have been received since the child's fourth birthday; three doses of oral polio vaccine, one dose must have been administered since the fourth birthday; measles, either the vaccine or the disease; and one dose of rubella vaccine.

DiCuffa urges all parents who have children in either of the three categories to register them. He will be at Ridgelea Elementary School until noon the day of registration for that purpose.

He says the cost of the Water Import plan should be measured in terms of this area's ability to produce enough food to feed the entire nation, if necessary.

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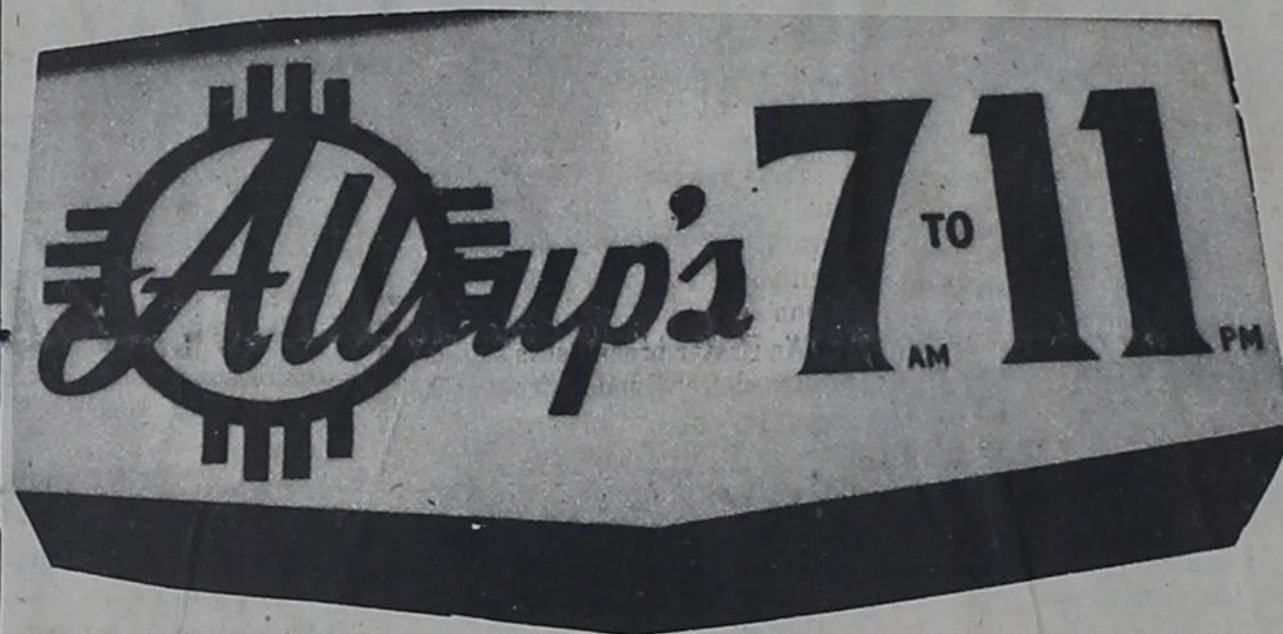

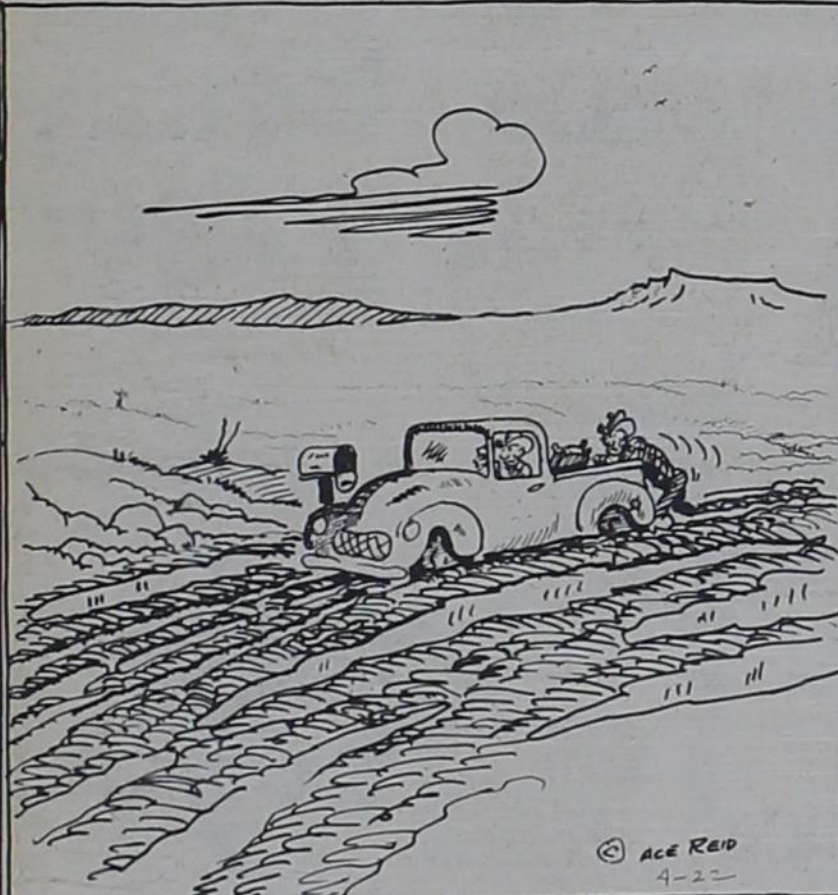

Former Students of Texas A&M in Parmer County will Muster April 21 to mark the passing of comrades and honor them.

The 7:30 p.m. meeting will be held at Clara's Spur Restaurant in Texico, New Mexico, reports Muster Chairman Mack Heald.

The Aggie Muster began April 21, 1903 and has been held annually ever since wherever A&M former students might find themselves on that day. Aggies have mustered on board ship, in foxholes on the battlefield, in the Swiss Alps, in airplanes, and on Corregidor shortly before the Japanese captured the island in World War II. More than 350 Musters will be held around the world this year, including many in Vietnam and doubtless in prison camps. For some A&M former students, this will be their last Muster.

The ceremony is the same in every location. Former students pay their respect to those who are absent. When the names of the honored dead are called from Muster rolls, a friend of the deceased answers, "Here."

The program ends with a poem—
"...Softly call the Muster
Let comrades answer—Here
Their spirits hover around us
As if to bring us cheer.
Mark them present in our hearts
We'll meet some other day.
There is no death, but life
eterna
For old friends such as they."

Deposits Increase

Total assets at the First State Bank of Bovina were up by almost a million dollars from a corresponding time a year earlier, it was revealed this week by the bank's quarterly statement for the first quarter of 1973.

Deposits likewise showed a gain, from \$4,036,437.64 in 1972 to a total of \$4,876,888.14 on the current statement. The total asset figure on the present statement amounted to \$5,387,010.75, which was a gain of \$905,156.82 over the figure of a year earlier, which was \$4,481,853.93.

The bank statement also revealed an increase in the loan category, from \$2,751,069.32 on the 1972 statement, to \$3,585,333.06 on the present statement.

Excellent prices for farm commodities, as well as the good beef market during the first quarter were credited as major reasons for the increase in deposits here.

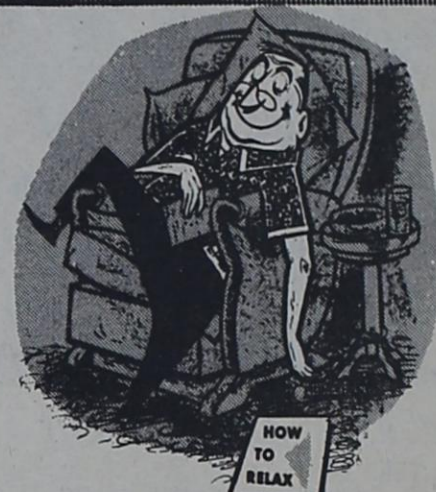
He was a native of Curry County and a Navy veteran of World War II. He was a member of the Lions Club and a deacon in the First Baptist Church at Earth.

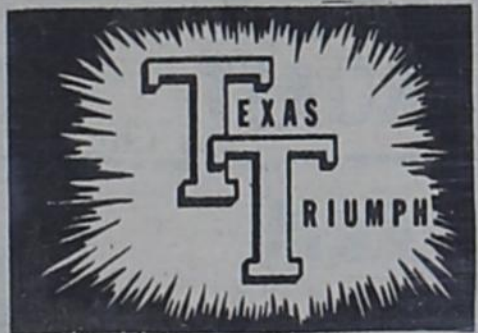

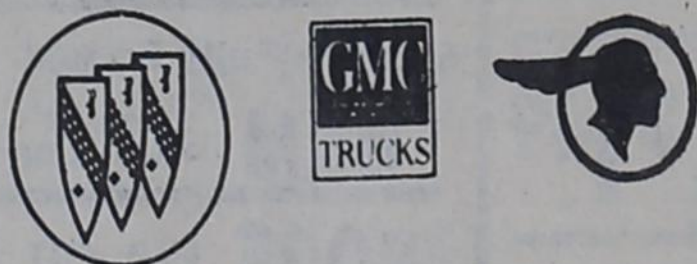

I recently read a very interesting article penned by Paul Harvey. I would like to share it with you—

However circuitous the line of questioning (in a research I made) became, it always seemed to lead back to a simple formula. "Our children are always home at mealtime." Most Chinese-Americans, no matter how wealthy or poor maintain a strict family style home. Mealtimes are ceremonious affairs which must be attended by every member of the family.

This simple home remedy explains why not one of New York's 10,000 Chinese American school aged youngsters has never been brought to court for narcotics, speeding, burglary, vandalism, stick-up, purse-snatching, or mugging. Not even for speeding.

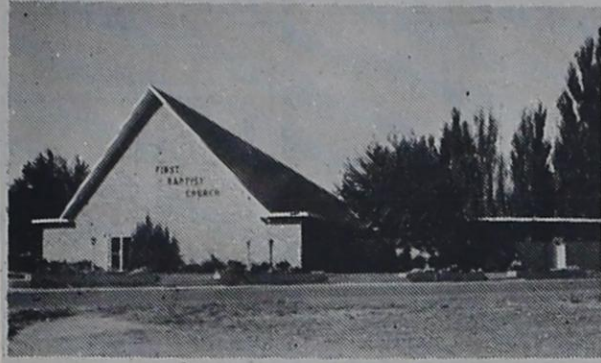

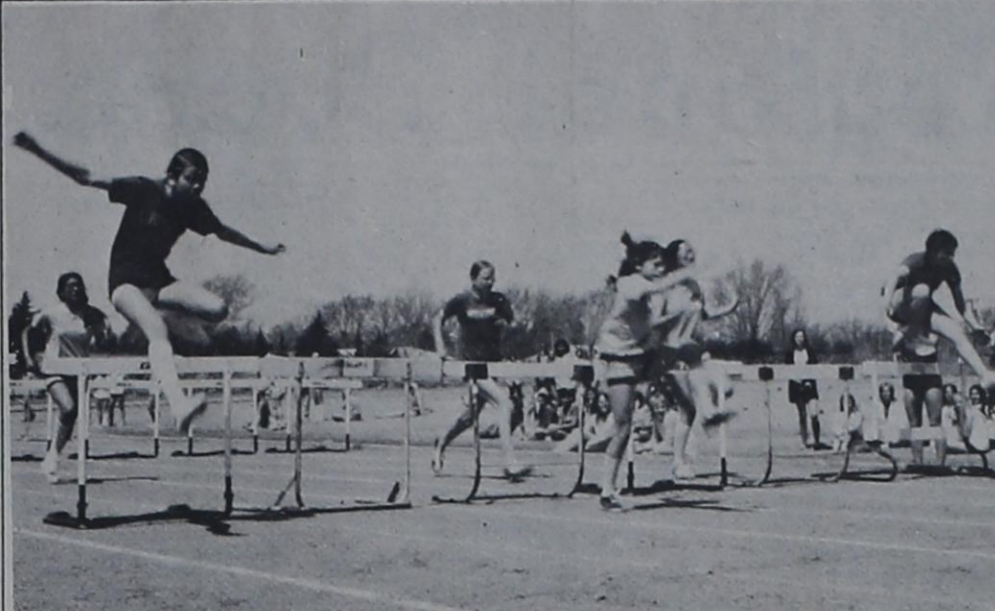
