On The Form In Parmer County

THAT NEXT STEAK you eat may be "rarer" than you think. Regardless of the way you like your steak cooked, you're getting a 'rare' commodity.

Why is steak, or all beef for that matter, so rare? It's a simple matter of time. It takes about two-and-a-half years to produce a

A cow produces only one calf in 12 months. The calf is weaned at six months of age and turned to pasture for another four to six months. Then it goes to a feedlot for six months to be fattened on a high grain ration. Finally, at about 1,000 to 1,100 pounds of weight, the animal is sold to a packer for slaughter.

Well, at least that's a thousand pounds of beef, you say? Not by a long shot. A lot of weight from the animal is lost in slaughtering and processing. A 1,000-pound animal produces only about 48 pounds of sirloin steaks.

A 1,000-pound steer that grades "choice" will produce about 600 pounds of carcass. Take away the fat, bone and waste and only about 444 pounds of edible beef remains.
