For Selling Liquor Are to Be Issued

AUSTIN, Nov. 20 .- Temporary licenses to sell liquor in wet areas will be issued immediately under regulations announced today by the liquor board.

Prospective dealers may temporary permits by placing Nov. 15, 1935, within 10 days.

Manufacturers, wholesalers, rectifiers and wineries will be requir ed to report every 10 days and pay a tax on all liquor handled. Tax payments will be deposited in stamps and licenses are ready.

Stamps will be sold to dealers of 65. in all counties, precincts, incor the sale of liquors has not been prohibited by valid local option


