

That year, 1938, will be the 75th anniversary of the great Civil War battle. To commemorate it, the governor of Pennsylvania has invited the United Confederate Veterans and the Grand Army of the Republic to hold encampments at Gettysburg at the same time. Both organizations have accepted.

For many years, well-intentioned people north and south of the Mason and Dixon line have made efforts to bring about a joint meeting of the two groups. The difficulty in bringing about such a reunion is a -reminder that that dreadful war, fought so long ago, is still a reality to the men who did the fighting.

We have prettied that war up, in our imagination, just as all people do with all wars. We have romanticized it, and made it an affair of bright uniforms and gallant young men and pretty girls in hoopskirts and honeysuckle twining up the white pillars of southern manor houses.

It is stuff for movies and romantic novels, nowadays, "and we who were born so long after the last shot was fired slip into the habit of looking back at it much as a graying college alumnus looks back at a fabled football game of long ago.

But the men who did the fighting have another viewpoint, and it doesn't hurt us to be reminded of it.

The Civil War wasn't fought just for fun. The bright uniforms got soiled and torn, the gallant young men had moments in which they were everlastingly sick of the whole thing, the pretty girls grew haggard and thin with anxiety, and a good meny of those picturesque white pilars were destroyed by fire, honeysuckle and all.

Disarmament Is Game of Entangling Fears

If you enjoy the sight of a number of distinguished and "silk-hated diplomats running earnestly around in a small circle, you must not forget to examine the current naval disarmament conference in London.

It isn't simply because this "disarmament" conference will bring more and heavier arming on the part of all concerned. It's the way it will work that will be worth watching.

Start with England. The English aim to increase their navy, for what seem to be good and sufficient reasonswar in Ethiopia, threats of trouble in the Mediterranean, shenanigans by the Japanese in China, and so on. Out of all of this, inevitably, will come a larger British fleet.

Next we come to Germany. Under the recent agree ment with Britain, the Germans will build their naval strength up to 35 per cent of the British fleet. This will mean a substantial enlargement of existing German strength.

This, in turn, draws France into it. The French will sinsist on having a stronger navy than the Germans have. and so, when the Germans start building, the French will

That means something to Mussolini. It is a cardinal point in his policy to keep Italian naval strength equal to that o fthe French; so when the French lay down new ships, the Italian are certain to do likewise.

This, if you haven't yet got dizzy, brings us back to England. One of the reasons England demands more ships today is the fact that her margin of superiority over other a naval powers in the Mediterranean-meaning Italy and France-isn't great enough. So when France and Italy build new ships, England will have to build some more to keep ahead of them.

Off on the outskirts will be Uncle Sam, determined to keep his fleet as large as the British fleet; and in the background are the Japanese, who insist that their fleet will be the equal of America's.

Follow this sort of thing long enough and you will find - yourself stepping on your own heels. It is an ascending spiral of the dizziest kind ever seen, self-starting and selfperpetuating. The secret of perpetual motion seems to have been discovered at last.


