# Annual Chamber Banquet Scheduled Thursday Night

## Rep. Bill Clayton Speaker; Rib-Eye Steaks On Menu

Bovina's 12th annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet, featuring charcoal broiled rib-eye steaks, will be held at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

Featured speaker on the program will be Bill Clayton, state representative for District 72 which includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer Counties.

Clayton was recently appointed a member of two national advisory committees -- to advise the Water Resources Council and the Environmental Protection Agency of the state's views on water development and pollution control.

Clayton is executive director of Water, Inc., an organization dedicated to full development of water resources in the state of Texas. He is a member of the West Texas Advisory Committee to the Water Development Board and first vice president of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems.

He has published several papers on water law, water development and pollution. He is the recipient of the Fort Worth Press "Outstanding Service Award in Water Conservation," received an award from the West Texas Water Institute for Meritorious Contributions to the Development and Conservation of West Texas Water Resources and the Heritage Hall Citation.

Highlighting the evening will be presentation of plaques to Bovina's "Man and Woman of the Year." Awards will be presented by the 1971 Man and Woman of the Year, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Estes. Charcoal broiled rib-eyes will be prepared on a special-made grill. Billy Smith and (Continued on Page 2)

## Church Attendance Fails To Reach Goal

Attendance at Bovina churches fell 91 short of the 1173 goal Sunday morning. A total of 1081 residents counted in the city's seven churches.

The figure also marked the lowest attendance since the promotion began in 1970. That year, 1,122 attended church and last year, 1,143 filled the pews.

The slogan, "Pack A Pew in '72," and a goal of 1172 in church Sunday had been set several weeks ago by civic leaders, school representatives and

city officials when they met to plan the third annual observance of Religious Emphasis Day here.

A concentrated effort by those working in the promotion to meet and surpass the goal last week was made with hat bands, lapel ribbons and posters being distributed around town.

Attendance at four of the seven churches was down from a year ago with United Methodist, Pentecostal Holiness and New Jerusalem Baptist showing increases.

First Baptist Church had an attendance Sunday of 310, United Methodist 238, St. Ann's Catholic, 240, Church of Christ 152, Pentecostal Holiness 84, Mission Belen Bautista 50, and New Jerusalem Baptist seven.

Figures in last year's RE Day showed First Baptist with 397, St. Ann's Catholic 254, United Methodist 201, Church of Christ 155, Pentecostal Holiness 65, Mission Belen Bautista 71, and no services were held at New Jerusalem Baptist last year.

In the initial year of the promotion, a goal of 1,000 set with 1,122 in worship services that day. First Baptist had a high attendance of 404, St. Ann's Catholic 225, United Methodist 212, Church of Christ 140, Mission Belen Bautista 75, Pentecostal Holiness 53 and New Jerusalem Baptist 13.

## RR Crossing Gates City Council Subject

Plans for erecting railroad crossing "gates" in Bovina continued at a Thursday night meeting of the city council.

Three Santa Fe officials met with the council to discuss installation of the gates with the request that the present 40 mile per hour speed limit for trains be lifted if and when the crossing barriers are installed.

The council agreed to write a letter to the state highway department requesting that gates be installed at the Third Street crossing. At an earlier meeting a request was made by the city to have gates installed at the east crossing.

The Santa Fe reps explained that the speed limit here was costly to the railroad because it's "uphill both ways from Bovina and the loss of time is a problem."

TEN YEARS AGO

March 31, 1962

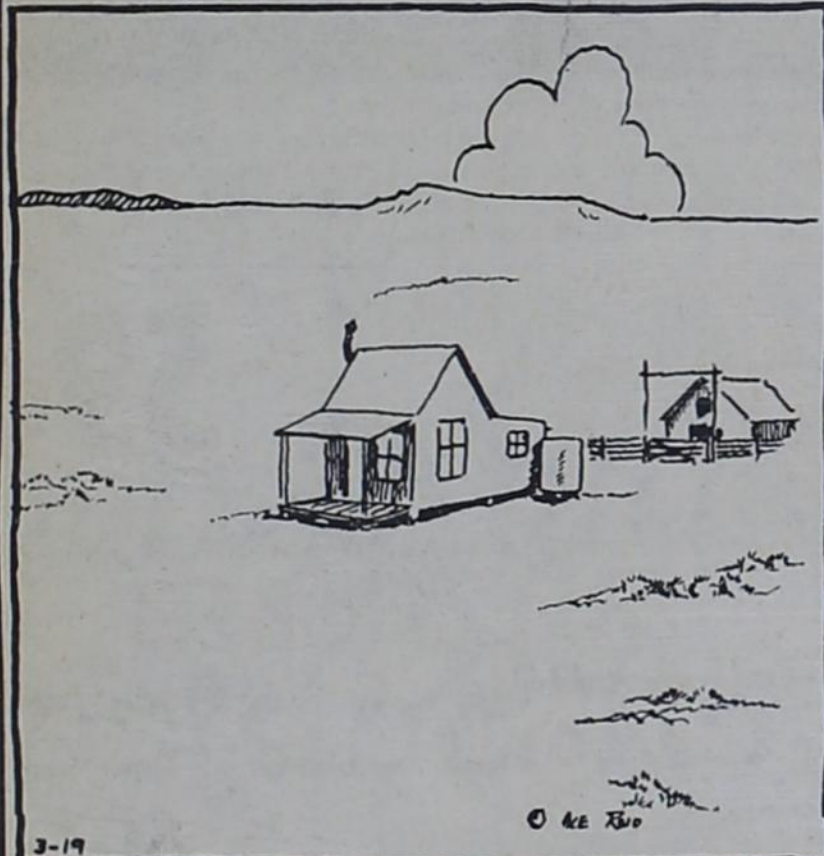

The possibilities are limited only by a lack of imagination.

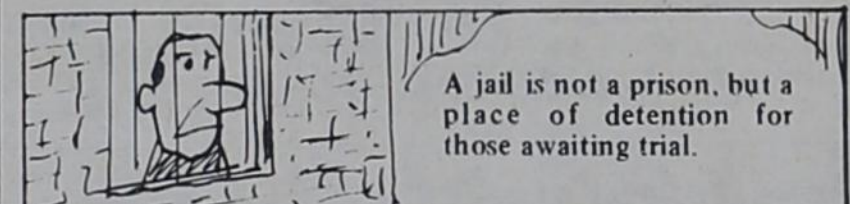
Also as a part of the program, Grady Sorley, member of Bovina School board, explained the forthcoming bond issue to those present.

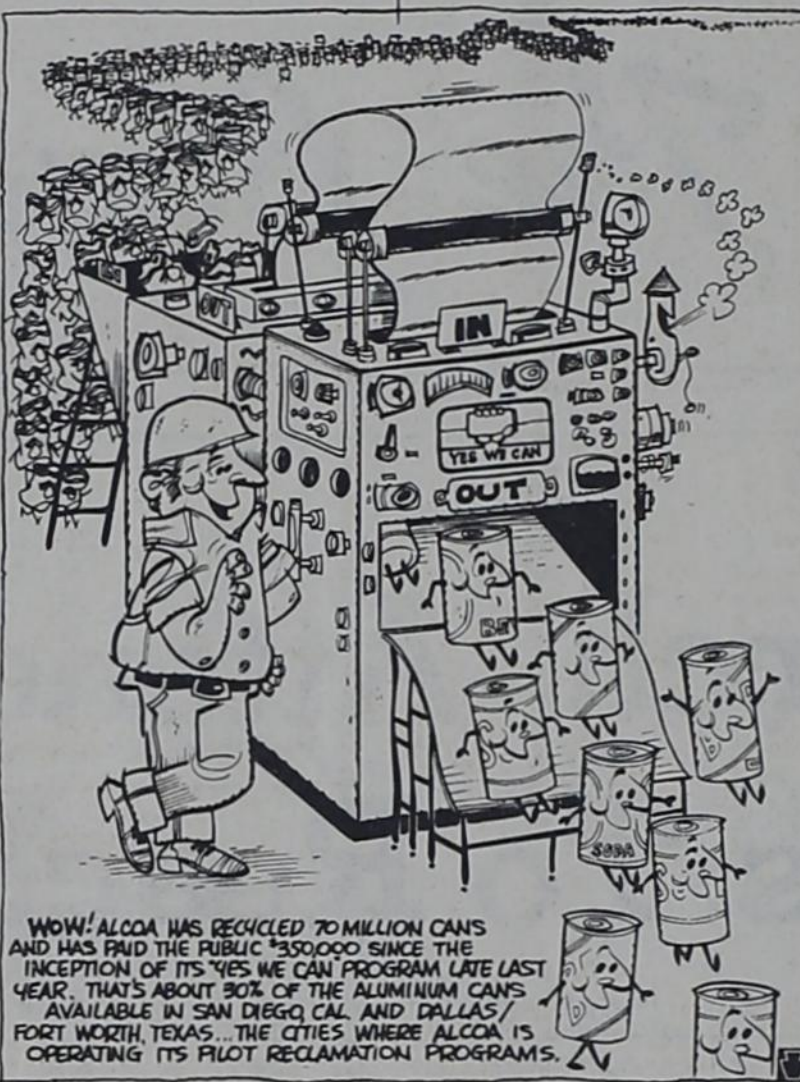
New directors and officers will be introduced at the banquet.

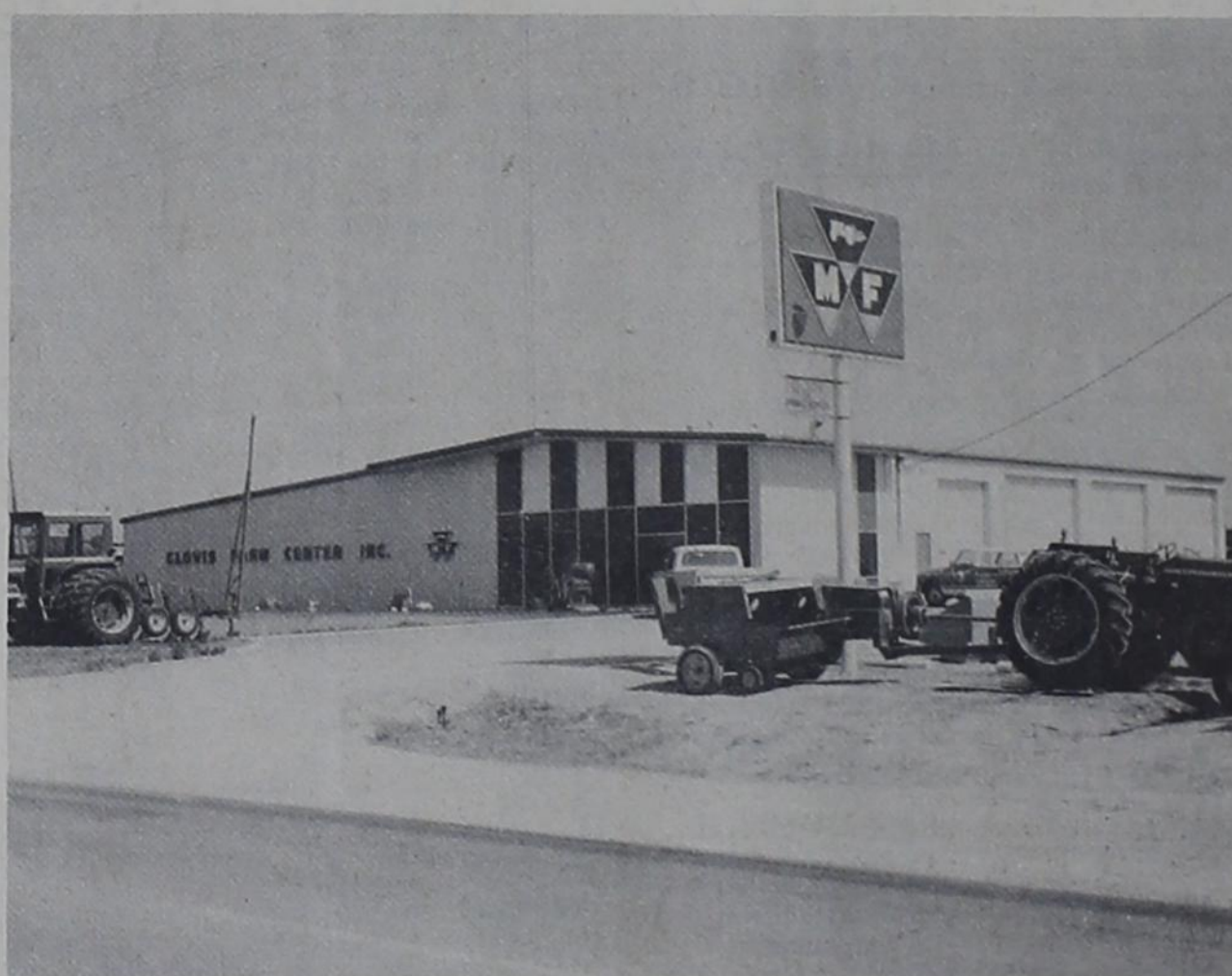

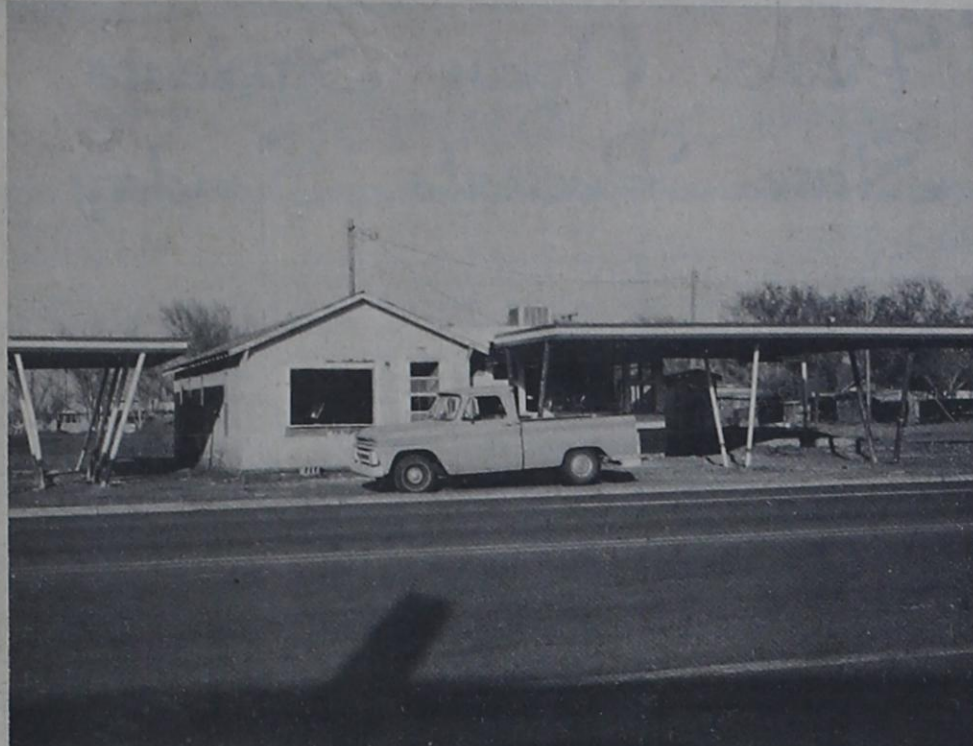

At Home In Parmer County

The Irish potato got its name from two sources.

One from the early growing of potatoes by a group of Irish immigrants in New Hampshire around 1719, and later from the tragedy of the famine in Ireland in the 1870's.

Potatoes were brought to England and Ireland from South America but the Irish were the first of the Europeans to realize the potato's economic and nutritional benefits.

In the 1600's farmers in Ireland quickly found that potatoes could yield heavy production at a modest price per acre. The potato's usefulness slowly spread throughout Europe and early Irish immigrants to the New World carried potatoes -- as security against an uncertain food supply.

Potatoes remain an Irish and American vegetable favorite. What better way to celebrate St. Patrick's Day than with a real symbol of the "luck o' the Irish" -- the potato.

IRISH STEW

- 1 lb. lean lamb, cut in cubes
- Salt, pepper, flour
- 1 onion, sliced
- 2 T. fat or oil
- Water
- 2 potatoes, diced
- 4 small carrots, diced
- 1 turnip, diced
- 1 T. chopped parsley

Sprinkle the meat with salt, pepper and flour. Brown it with the onion in the fat. Add water to cover.

Cover pan and cook slowly until meat is almost done -- about 1 1/2 hrs.

Add potatoes, carrots and turnip and cook until tender -- 20-30 minutes. Then add parsley. Makes four servings.

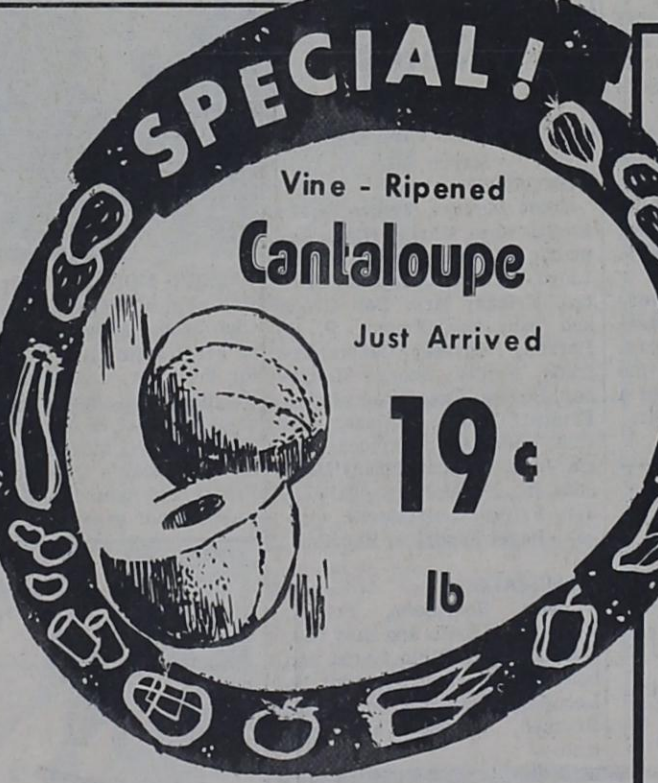

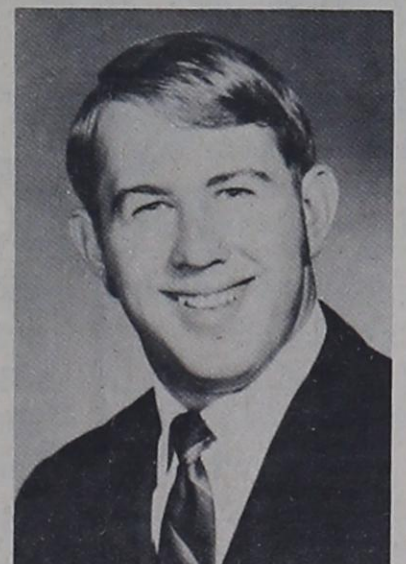

### INFLUENCE

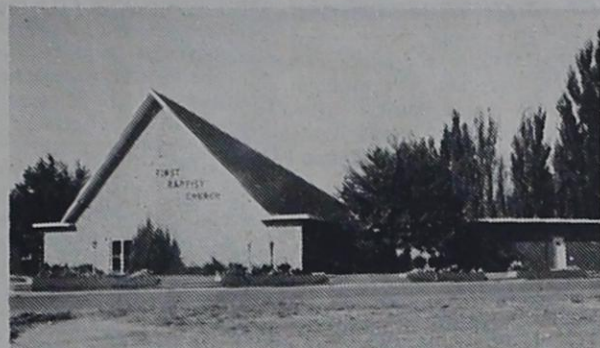
Every person has influence. We are all born with influence. Observe how a little baby changes a whole household. When a baby is born into the household it is never the same. Observe the stories surrounding the birth of Moses. His influence still lives even to this day. Observe the stories surrounding the birth of Christ, the world has never been the same. So it is with each of us. We all have influence so great that many times we fail to realize the greatness of it. It has been said by someone that the average person, who lives an average lifetime, influences ten thousand persons for good or bad.

We cannot lose our influence. We may lose our good influence, but we still have influence -- bad. Once in the Bureau of Standards in Washington, a tiny tube containing less than 2,000th of an ounce of radium was accidentally dropped on a hardwood floor and broken. Each washing yielded about \$400 worth of radium. Finally a carpenter came and scraped the floor. Three years later the shavings burned and the ashes were found to be strong in radium. The moral of this story: it is almost impossible to get rid of human influence for good or bad, whichever has been exerted.

They do not put our influence in the coffin with us - it lives on and on. In Rev. 14:13 the Lord tells us, "their works do follow them." How many people will spend eternity in heaven because I lived? How many people will enjoy eternal life because I lived? These are sobering questions but ones we need to consider. Yes, let us guard our influence.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD County Agent

A general crop meeting is going to be held at the Hub Community Center on March 23, 1972. Starting time will be 2 p.m. Several Extension specialists will give the program on water use, milo disease and major insects.

Leon New, Irrigation specialist, will give an up-to-date report on water use and irrigation methods on milo, corn and cotton. Dr. Bill Clymer, Area Entomologist, will present a program on the various damaging insects affecting the crops grown in Parmer County. This will include a report on the Banks Grass Mite that is such a threat to milo and corn. Wrapping up the program will be Dr. Bob Metzger, Area Plant Pathologist. Dr. Metzger will speak on the milo and corn diseases that were seen in this county last year.

Remember this meeting will be on March 23, at 2 p.m. in the Hub Community Center.

Food Fads

The latest addition to our ecology-consciousness is food fadism. Teenagers, especially, feel that an austere diet somehow brings them closer to nature. Suddenly they're renouncing pizza and French fries, and turning to macrobiotic foods. Yet, some of these diets can cause harm. If your teenagers start demanding brown rice three times a day, they're following a dangerous course: there is no such thing as one "perfect" food capable of providing all the vitamins and minerals necessary for health.

Nutritionists warn that certain food fads can make you ill, and stress the importance of eating a well-balanced diet. If your teenagers want to include wheat germ and honey among their staples, fine: But don't let them eliminate any of the four basic food groups.

How can you cook for a family that is suddenly rejecting everything canned and frozen as being somehow "unnatural"? Instead of serving a frozen vegetable, why not give them Chiquita brand bananas. They make a perfect side dish when gently fried or grilled. When they're hungry for a snack, and don't want cake, give them a celery stalk or a Chiquita banana to munch on. One thing about the teenagers' new view of food—they suddenly realize how important it is to stay healthy. It's up to you to take advantage of their new awareness, and feed them the nutritional foods they're suddenly asking for. Just don't let them fall into the hands of food cultists!

The greenbug, arch enemy of High Plains sorghum producers, may not be a problem in a few years because of work being done by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Lubbock.

Dr. Jerry Johnson and Dr. George Teetes experimented this past season with the comparisons of resistant and susceptible types of sorghum, with some interesting results.

The most striking characteristic of the greenbug resistant types is their tolerance, their ability to support large greenbug populations without significant death of leaf tissue.

The studies this past year indicated that greenbugs prefer to feed on the common commercial sorghums if possible. If they were forced to move to the resistant varieties, the rate of reproduction dropped sharply. The main problem with these resistant varieties is that they are inferior to the susceptible varieties from a commercial production standpoint. Naturally resistant varieties are one of the best methods of insect control, because the pest populations are reduced without the extra cost of insecticides or possible damage to the environment.

Under a grant from the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, Johnson and Teetes are transferring greenbug resistance to sorghum varieties that are suitable for commercial production. But the scientists emphasize that breeding work of this type is time-consuming. They say the resistant varieties may not be ready for general use for at least four to five more years.

Darrel Read, water superintendent for city of Bovina, attended a week long water and sewer school at Texas A&M University recently.

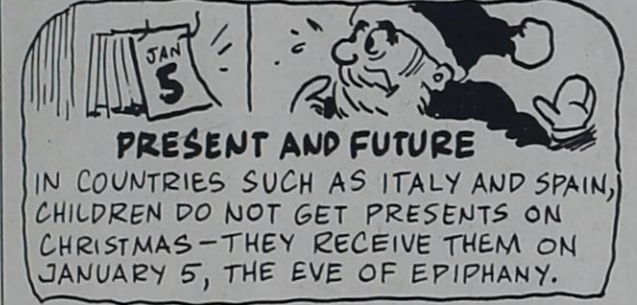

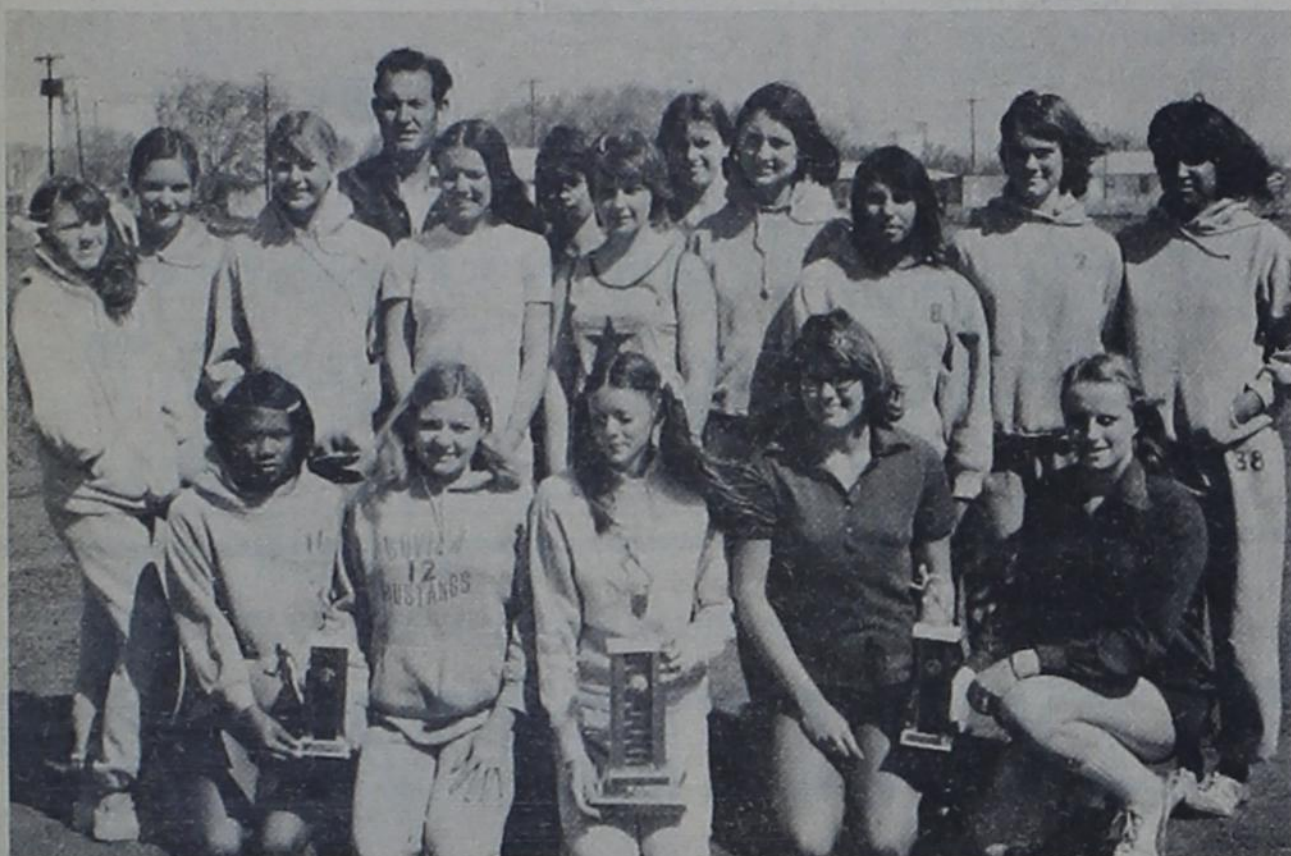
Others scoring points for the

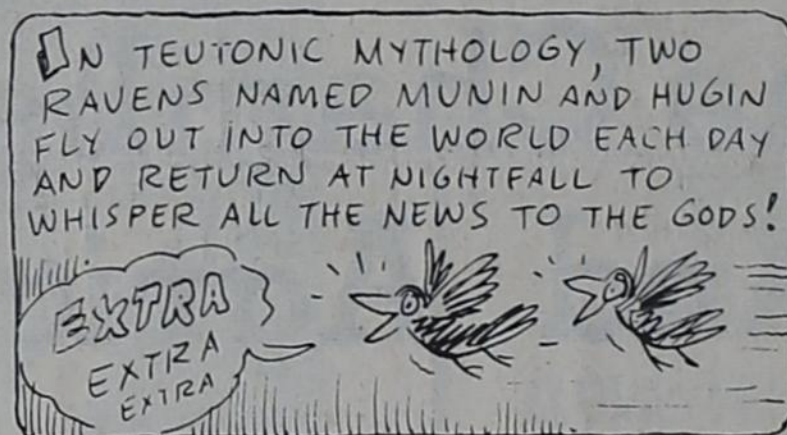
Both steers were Charolais crosses. Rogers and Carson are members of Bovina FFA.

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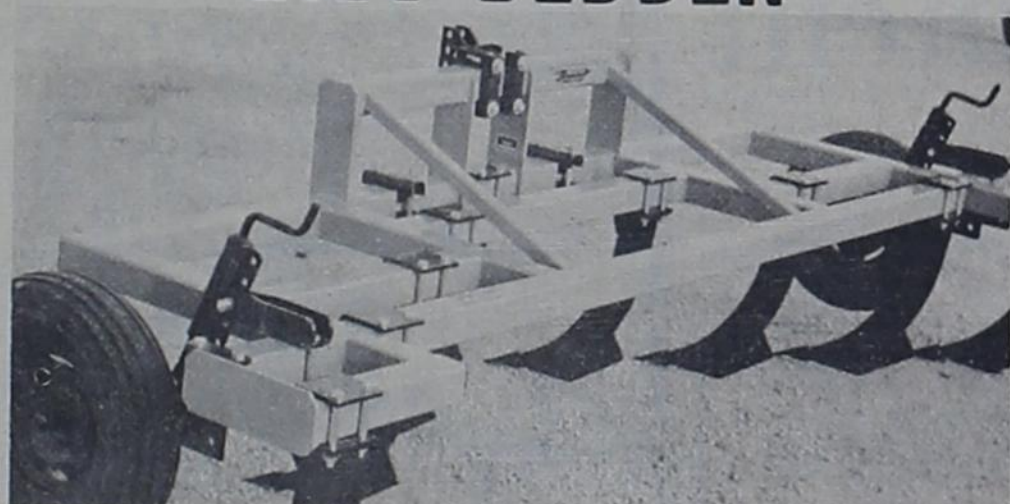
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
