WARDROBE Mrs. W. E. Peoples, wardrobe demonstrator for the Morton Valley home demonstration club will work with the cooperators in her club in studying line, color, construction and selection of garments needed to have a more harmonious and economical wardrobe. Along with these points, Mrs. Peoples will make a foundation pattern, an individually fitted pattern and make her garments using the same. No person is a perfect size and because of this the women are working on the patterns in order to be better dressed. With the foundation pattern a person can take any commercial pattern and fit it to herself and have the perfect fitting garment. BEDROOM IMPROVEMENTS "All bedrooms should adequately meet the needs of the family from the standpoint of health, comfort and beauty," Mrs. John Nix, bedroom demonstrator for the Morton Valley home demonstration club will make a complete change in the bedroom for her son. In doing this Mrs. Nix will refinish the floor, walls and furniture and make a mattress for the bed to make it comfortable. The room has a west window and this will allow the sunshine in each day, but does not furnish more light than is needed. SPACING SHELVES IN CLOTHES CLOSETS

Well planned and arranged shelves will double the storage capacity of a closet. There should be narrow shelves for somethings and wider ones for others. The spacing between the shelves is most important; space the shelves to fit the objects to be stored there. Shelves spaced 10 to 12 inches apart are convenient. This can be accomplished if the storage space is worked out before building. "Make the shelves adjustable or removable and when you want to change or store larger or smaller or more garments, add a shelf," states Mrs. Elbert Erzell, clothing demonstrator for the Reich home demonstration club.

Cutting, sub-grading, filling with chat and draining Oak, Tiffin, Austin, Apple, Hospital, Gholson, Terrell and Wilson streets in Ranger. Seventy-three men, \$16,570.45.
Completing tennis courts and repairs to grounds of Olden school. Sixteen men, \$508.50.
Beautifying, leveling school grounds, building retaining wall, moving and remodeling toilets, digging drainage ditch, install flues, paintin one room outside, at Nimrod school. Eighteen men, \$1,160.30.
The Leon river straightening project is still in hands of the engineering departments at Austin, and is not approved as yet, Administrator Driscoll announces.

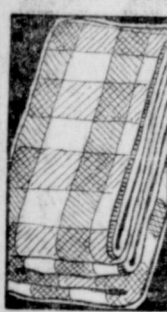

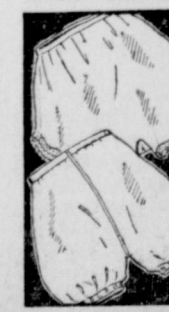

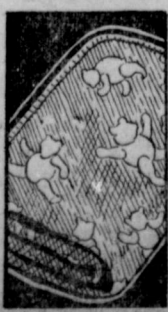
