DALLAS.—Richard Lee Dobie, native of Beeville, Texas, proudly displays the eighth gold star on the sleeve of his uniform coat as a pilot for United Airlines.

Dobie took the first air mail out of Kansas City, May 12, 1926, for the National Air Transport division of United Airlines, on the first established air mail route for Kansas City and the Southwest.

However, even before Dobie started flying for N. A. T. he had accumulated a total of more than "2,500 flying hours in the Army Air Corps and in "barn-starming."
