DALHART, Tex.-Farmers in he Texas Panhandle can do much to stop wind erosion of the top soil by allowing the wheat stubble to remain on the fields, H. H. Fin. nell, soil erosion service director,

"Stubble provides almost complete protection against this type of erosion," he said. "The greatest mistake farmers have made in this section was to permit grazing of sorghum and other stubble."

"There is no physical excuse for permitting the Panhandle soils to blown away," Finnell said. "The Leon. Miss Greenwall is a niece her back into our midst. only limitations are economic and available and how much farmers will do."

The use of a combination of several control methods is the most important requirement. Terrac-ing alone, while a great help, is not a complete solution, but should be supplemented with proper terrace outlets, permanent pastures, strip croping, sodding, other con-trol methods, the type and number being determined by the individual problem.






