In town, the total was .7 of an inch with reports of up to an inch of moisture falling west of town in the Pleasant Hill area. Lesser amounts of from one-fourth to one-half inch were recorded north and east of town.

Reported yields have ranged from "well below average" to "the best wheat ever raised." Those desperate remarks have been attributed, in most cases, to incidences of disease in some wheat fields.

Some dryland wheat growers have reported better yields than irrigated farmers, one

Mosaic virus and rust has been the cause of low irrigated yields in some cases. Elevator operators estimate

the harvest is from 60 to 75 per cent complete with operations expected to be over by the weekend. Wheat harvest, always over

here by July 4, is exceptionally late this year. The lateness has been attributed to the cold spring and wet weather earlier this year. "We've heard of some real

good dryland yields and reports of some later irrigated wheat that was averaging over 70 bushels per acre," said Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain Co. "Some farmers have said this was the best crop ever, but some also : eported diseases in

yields to fall off. Barley yields This year, with acreage and were mostly disappointing, mostly in the 80 to 90 bushel range," stated Johnson.

Larry Webb at Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc., echoed Johnson's statements, saying, "We've heard of some real high yields-up to 76 bushels for the irrigated wheat-and then some farmers have had yields as low as 15 bushels because of the mosaic virus and rust." Webb also said some dryland farmers were reporting yields in the 30 bushel range.


City Tax Board To Meet Here


