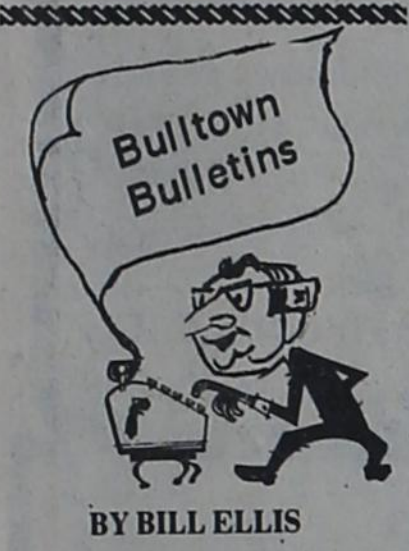

If we're scanning newspapers or magazines on the job, we have too much manpower-if we don't read other publications, we're not up on the news.

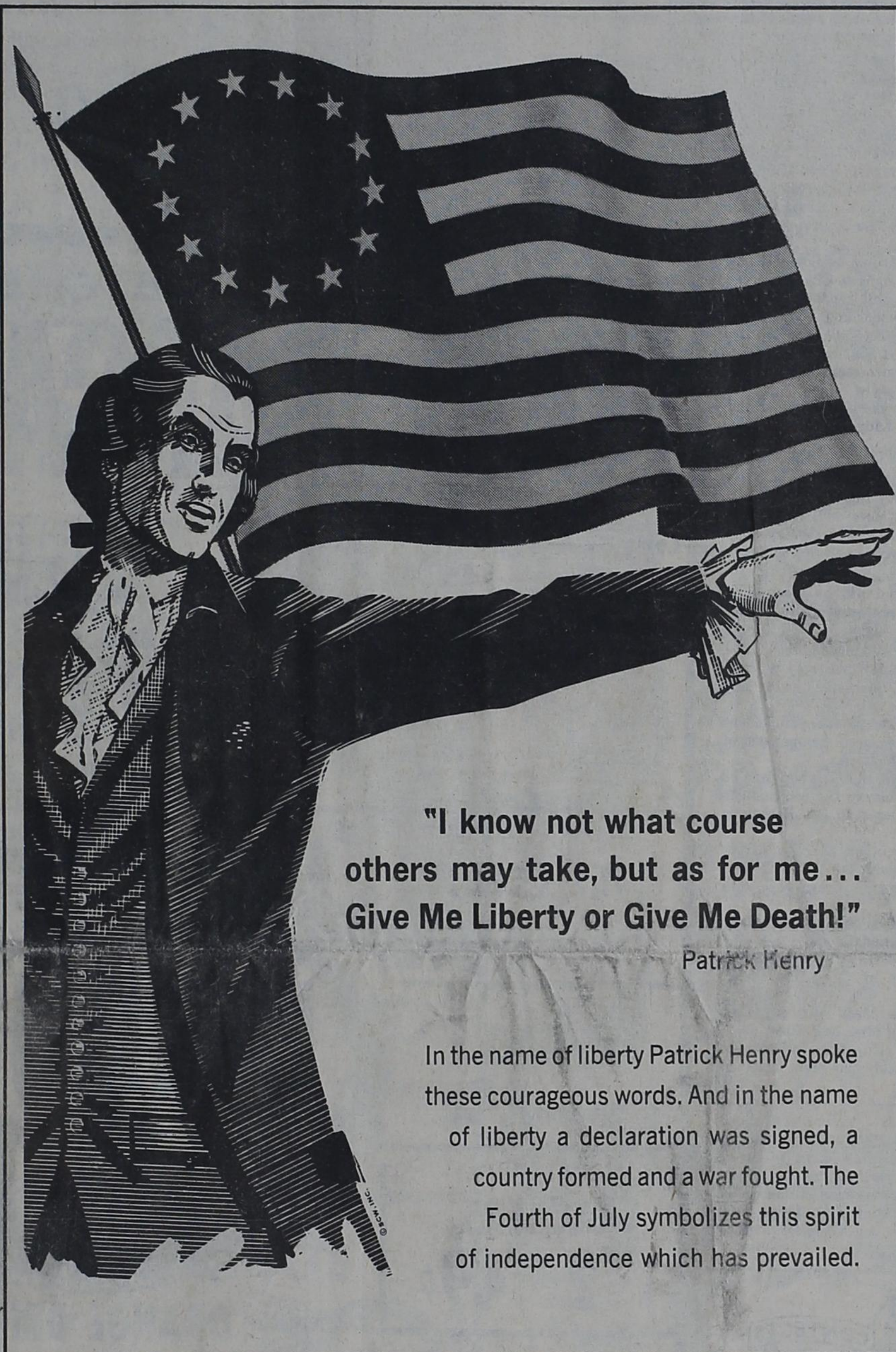
If we publish a "pinup" the women complain-if we don't tie men complain. If we print more club news, the sporting fans complain-if we print more news, the clubwomen complain.

## Clinic Meeting Slated Monday

The annual meeting of Bovina Medical Center, Inc., is scheduled for Monday at 9 p.m. The meeting will be in Community Room of First State Bank of Bovina. Residents of the community who are interested in the medical clinic here are welcome and

invited to attend, says Earl Stevenson, chairman of the board of directors.

Primary business of the meeting will be to name three new directors to the seven-member board of the clinic. The terms of Rouel Barron and B.L.

Marshall expire this year. Dolph Moten, whose term had one year to run, resigned from the board last month. A director will be elected to fill that vacancy.

Recently named as nominees for the three positions were Lewis McDaniel, Dan Koelzer, J.E. Sherrill and Rouel Barron.

Other nominations may be made from the floor during the meeting.

The three elected will serve three-year terms on the board.

The clinic here was constructed in 1968 for an approximate cost of \$45,000. Most of this amount was contributed by citizens, either outright or in the form of certificates of stock.

Indebtedness has been reduced during the past year, through additional contributions and rental income, from \$2238 to approximately \$1000.

Income came from the community's Christmas Card Project, from memorials and from the monthly rent of \$100 from Dr. P.C. Hickman.

Holdover members of the board are Stevenson, who has one year remaining on his present term, and Mrs. Leon Ware, Mrs. Leslie McCain and O.H. Jones, who have two years remaining as board members.

Plans call for the board to be re-organized following the annual meeting.

## Friday Rain Measures .7

Mid-summer rain brought smiles to the faces of area farmers Friday morning.

Showers fell during the nighttime hours measuring up to an inch in the Bovina area.

In town, the total was .7 of an inch with reports of up to an inch of moisture falling west of town in the Pleasant Hill area. Lesser amounts of from one-fourth to one-half inch were recorded north and east of town.

The showers halted some harvesting operations, but was considered highly beneficial for the young milo, cotton and corn crops.

Although 1973 has been considered a "wet" year, as far as average rainfall, the total for June was below normal.

## 'Mixed-Up' Wheat Harvest Nears End

This weekend will put the lid on the 1973 wheat and barley harvest, weather permitting, in what has been termed a "mixed-up" crop.

With the majority of the wheat still in the fields last week, temperatures of near and over the 100 degree mark threw the harvesting opera-

tions into full gear the past four or five days.

This year, with acreage and prices up over a year ago, Bovina area wheat farmers have fared well, for the most part.

Reported yields have ranged from "well below average" to "the best wheat ever raised."

Those desperate remarks have been attributed, in most cases, to incidences of disease in some wheat fields.

Some dryland wheat growers have reported better yields than irrigated farmers, one said.

Mosaic virus and rust has been the cause of low irrigated yields in some cases.

Elevator operators estimate the harvest is from 60 to 75 per cent complete with operations expected to be over by the weekend.

Wheat harvest, always over here by July 4, is exceptionally late this year. The lateness has been attributed to the cold spring and wet weather earlier this year.

"We've heard of some real good dryland yields and reports of some later irrigated wheat that was averaging over 70 bushels per acre," said Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain Co. "Some farmers have said this was the best crop ever, but some also reported diseases in

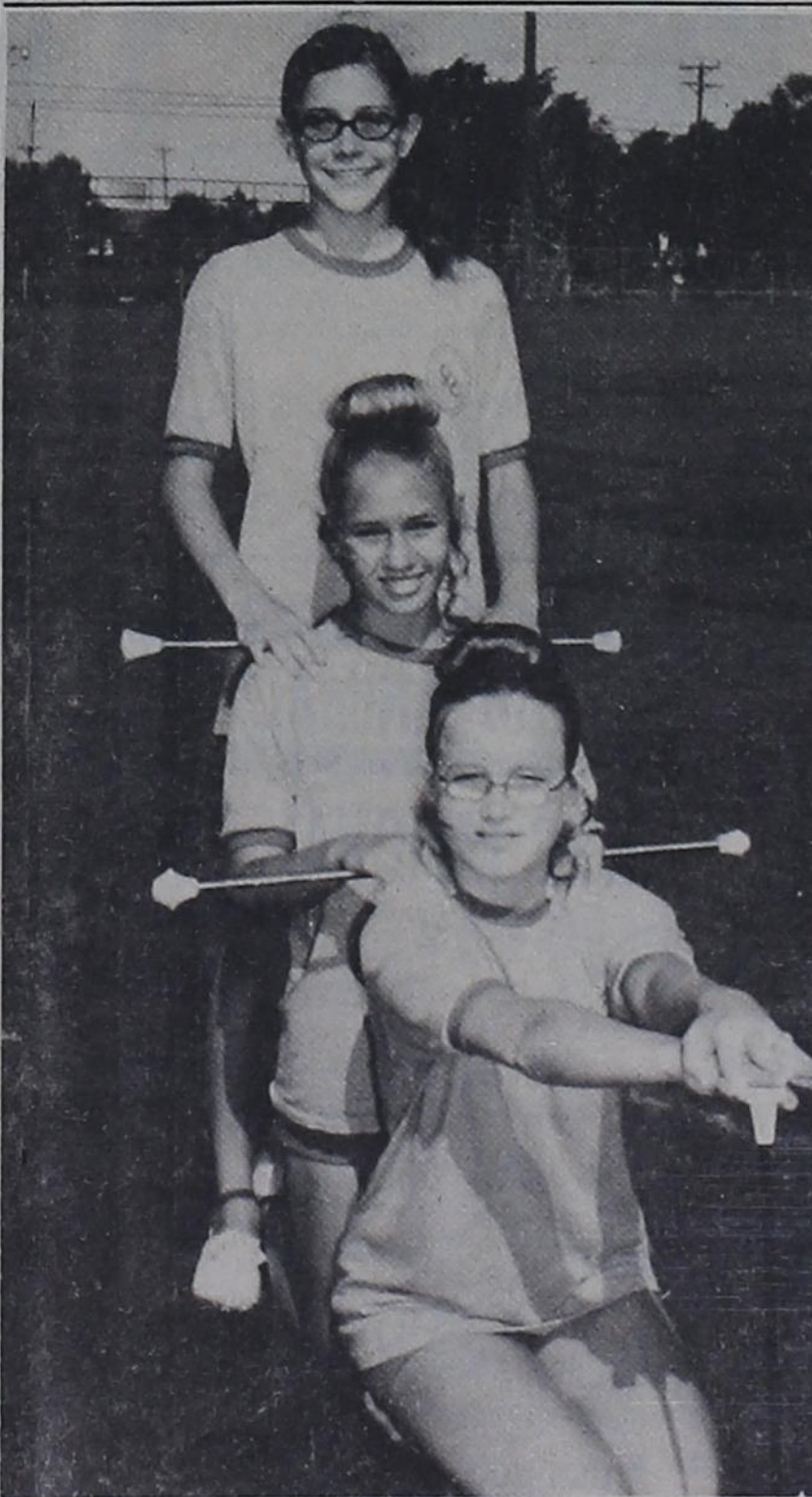
their fields which caused the yields to fall off. Barley yields were mostly disappointing, mostly in the 80 to 90 bushel range," stated Johnson.

Larry Webb at Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc., echoed Johnson's statements, saying, "We've heard of some real high yields-up to 76 bushels for the irrigated wheat-and then some farmers have had yields as low as 15 bushels because of the mosaic virus and rust." Webb also said some dryland farmers were reporting yields in the 30 bushel range.

Officiating at the rites was Rev. John Lewis. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery.

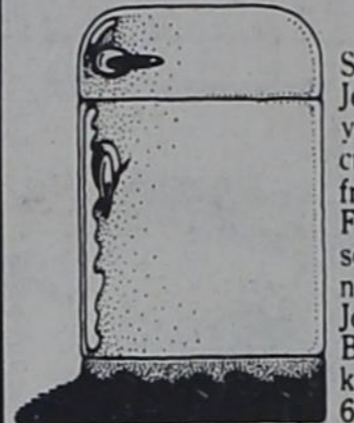
An Olton resident for the

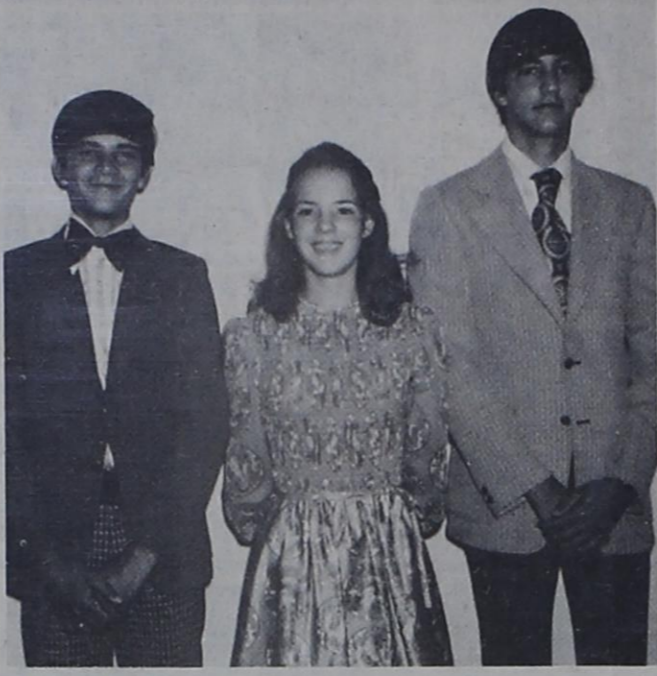
