VIEWED IN THE light of Vega's recent push toward a state football championship, the Bovina Mustangs' 27-0 loss to the Longhorns here on October 12 wasn't so bad after all.

Vega has done no wrong since they visited Bovina in October. The Longhorns rolled past all six district 3-A opponents enroute to a perfect 10-0 regular season record, and the fact that Bovina didn't score against the potent 'Horns is now very excusable.

You see, Vega has scored shutout wins over eight of their last nine opponents. Bovina's 27-0 loss was a closer score than two of the playoff games have been for Vega. The Longhorns blasted Hale Center, 35-0 in bi-district, and Rankin in the quarterfinals, 35-0.

Now, the Longhorns have battled through four playoff opponents, and find themselves in the state finals this Saturday. Everyone from the Panhandle-High Plains area will be rooting for Vega on Saturday, as they are the only area team left in the playoffs. In fact, they were the only team to survive the second round.

Coach Jimmy Duncan surprised pre-season prognosticators by winning District 3-A, after being picked for a second-place finish by many, including the "Top-O-Texas Football" magazine, who also rated the Longhorns ninth in the area, behind such teams as Lorenzo, O'Donnell, Sonora, Memphis, Clarendon, Canadian and Hale Center.

After demolishing Hale Center, 35-0 in bi-district, Vega disposed of Stinnett in the second round, 14-0.

The Longhorns had their closest call last Saturday night against Frisco, having to come from behind for a 15-7 win.

VEGA HAS everything expected of a state contender. The Longhorns are big, averaging 191 pounds on the line. This massive line has been responsible for the nine season shutouts recorded by the team enroute to their current 14-0 record.

Also, Vega has speed in its backfield, with such backs as John Fangman (165) and Tim Hubbart (165), who have broken for some long touchdown runs this season.

Although the margin may not have indicated it, Vega': 15-7 win over Frisco may have been the team's most impressive win to date.

Going into the game, Frisco was averaging 408 yards total offense and 31.2 points per game. Their quarterback had thrown for 1550 yards and 19 touchdowns.


Vega had not been hurt in the passing department prior to Friday's game, but Frisco did set up its touchdown with a 55-yard pass in the first half.

Win or lose, the Vega team has gained the admiration of this section of the state, and they'll have the backing particularly of the Bovina Mustangs and their fans as they attempt to win the first state football title since 1962 for the Panhandle area.

The indictment fails to prove that it is an offense to dispense joy, good will and happiness.

The indictment reads, in part, as follows: That Santa Claus alias Kris Kringle on or about the 24th day of December did then and there at night, by force, threats and fraud, break and enter through an unusual place of entry, to wit, the chimney, the private residence of Ebenezer Scrooge, with the intent to fraudulently take from the personal property, to wit, milk and cookies there situate on the hearth, without consent of said Ebenezer Scrooge;

And the Grand Jury aforesaid, at said term, do further present that Santa Claus, alia Kris Kringle, on or about the 24th day of December, and before the presentment of this indictment, in said county and state while then and there in or near the private residence of Ebenezer Scrooge, there situate, did then and there unlawfully and wilfully use unreasonably loud and boisterous language, to wit, "HO! HO! HO! Merry Christmas!" or words to that effect, in a manner calculated to provoke a disturbance of the inhabitants of said private residence, to wit, the minor children of said Ebenezer Scrooge.



Drivers Urged To Obey Laws

"One of the most tragic Commander that by not wastes of our natural resources may occur this Christmas and New Year Holiday period," said Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock.

Major Bell said he was not referring to the fuel shortage situation, but rather to the number of human lives that may be needlessly lost as a result of traffic accidents in Texas during the holidays. It was noted by the

December 31 Deadline For Filing Claims

December 31 is the deadline for filing medicare claims on charges for medical treatment received before October 1,

Gerald Schlaeppi, social security field representative, is reminding area Medicare beneficiaries of the deadline because Medicare payments may be forfeited if claims are not submitted on time.

The deadline does not pertain to inpatient hospital bills. It does apply to expenses covered under Part B of Medicare, primarily doctor bills.

Schlaeppi also reminds area residents that a general enrollment period for Medicare Part B will begin January 1 and continue through March 31, 1974. Anyone who could have enrolled previously for this part of Medicare, but did not, may enroll during the general enrollment period.

In addition, through membership in the pool Southwestern Public Service Company will make available any surplus capacity it might have to help other parts of the country with electric power in the case of emergency," Hodson said.

The Southwest Power Pool is an organization of approximately 32 electric utilities in Texas, New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri, and Louisiana and is one of nine power pools. covering the nation.

Transmission facilities of the SPP member companies are intertied so that electric power can be moved back and forth within the pool area and to the other 7 power pools serving the eastern one-half of the United States.
