In June, 1935, he inserted about 50 paper shell pecan buds on the sprouts which had grown out on the tree where the big limbs had been cut off Abshier reports that 90 per cent of the buds are living and that a great many of them have already put out limbs ranging from six inches to two feet in length.

By 1937 Abshier expects to be able to prune out all of the old native pecan growth, leaving the new top composed entirely of the paper shell variety.
