Temporary Licenses For Selling Liquor Are to Be Issued

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—Temporary licenses to sell liquor in wet areas will be issued immediately under regulations announced today by the liquor board. Prospective dealers may get temporary permits by placing a bond and filing inventory as of Nov. 15, 1935, within 10 days. Manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and wineries will be required to report every 10 days and pay a tax on all liquor handled. Tax payments will be deposited in a suspense account until tax stamps and licenses are ready. Stamps will be sold to dealers in all counties, precincts, incorporated cities or towns in which the sale of liquors has not been prohibited by valid local option elections.

Senator Nelson Proposes Unicameral Legislature for Texas

SENATOR NELSON PROPOSES UNICAMERAL LEGISLATURE FOR TEXAS PLAN TO RESTRICT MEMBERSHIP, MEETING IN CONTINUOUS TERM

"A two-headed snake was going to a creek to get a drink of water. To make the state government more democratic, to simplify its workings so that the will of the people can be carried out with the least possible expenditure of funds Senator Nelson believes that Texas should replace the present Legislature with a unicameral body.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE NEEDED TO OBTAIN A PENSION UNDER NEW TEXAS LAW

Explanation of the old age pension law and direction on how to secure an old date birth or death certificate was given Tuesday by Mrs. John Matthews, registrar for the Texas Bureau of Vital Statistics at Eastland. Mrs. Matthews' explanation: In order to secure the old age pension, the petitioner must meet the following requirements: A. Must have attained the age of 65. B. Must be a citizen of the United States. C. Must reside in Texas five years during the last nine. D. Must not be an inmate of, nor receive aid from any home or other institution except for medical care. E. Must not have transferred property to other persons in order to secure pension. F. Must not have an income over \$360, or if married not over \$720 per year. G. Must not own property with a taxable value over \$5,000 or if married, \$7,500. H. Does not own marketable securities of more than \$500, or if married \$1,000.

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Monument To Founder of Eastland Urged By Historical Group Head

Erection of a monument to the memory of C. U. Connelley, legislator and sometimes called the "Father of Eastland," will be urged by Judge R. C. Crane of Sweetwater, president of the West Texas Historical Association, to the Texas Centennial Commission. County Judge Clyde Garrett has written Judge Crane suggesting that if the monument is approved, it be placed on the courthouse lawn in Eastland in the town he founded and lived for 55 years. Connelley was widely known in Texas. He was the author of the separate coach law, which provides for separating whites from negroes in transportation vehicles. Connelley was a regent of C. I. A. at Denton, now Texas State College for Women. In 1911 Connelley was appointed by Gov. O. B. Colquitt as a member of the State Board for the purpose of locating and establishing a state tuberculosis colony.

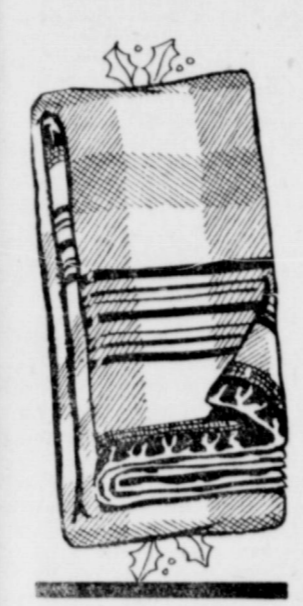

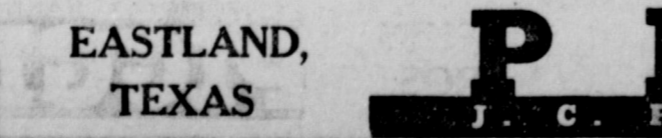

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

AFTER his first proud debut the noble Thanksgiving bird still has several leading roles left to play before he makes his positively final appearance in soup.

To keep your turkey good to the last silver, you must take care that it doesn't dry out. Cover snugly with heavy waxed paper to exclude every bit of air and store on next to the bottom shelf of the refrigerator. Thus the meat will remain moist and flavorful as long as there's any left.

If you're planning to have guests for Sunday night supper right after Thanksgiving, and it's a splendid time to entertain, make up an attractive cold platter of alternating dark and white slices before anybody has a chance to get to the cupboard on Thanksgiving evening.

Turkey a la King

For the meals between, use up the small pieces and slivers of meat in rechauffees and salads. For turkey au gratin, make a medium white sauce, add chopped fowl and turn into a buttered baking dish. Cover with coarse crumbs and bake in a hot oven until crumbs are brown.

Turkey a la King can be made at the table in a chafing dish or made in the kitchen and kept hot over hot water.

There are various turkey salads, jellied or hot as suits your needs and tastes. A combination of peas, celery and diced turkey is a good substantial luncheon salad.

Shredded Chinese cabbage and green peppers with turkey is a piquant mixture. Cubed cooked chestnuts, celery and turkey; diced turkey, sliced celery and sliced stuffed olives; celery, turkey and English walnut meats or

peas; turkey, crisp bacon and sliced tomatoes; a salad made of skinned and seeded Tokay grapes, turkey, celery and sliced Brazil nuts; these are a few of the ways to use up the honored bird.

Sandwiches, plain and toasted, especially three-deckers of broiled Canadian bacon, lettuce, tomatoes and mayonnaise are perfect for a late evening supper and men particularly like them.

Use the left-over gravy in hot sandwiches, making a hearty version of an open sandwich of the hot biscuit type. And finally—

Turkey Soup

Turkey bones, 1 onion, celery tops, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1 cup cooked rice, salt and pepper, 1 teaspoon birdseye onion.

When the turkey bones are quite free from meat, break the carcass in pieces. Cover with cold water and slowly bring to the boiling point. Simmer fifteen minutes and add onion cut in slices, celery tops and tomatoes. Stir over a low fire for one hour. Strain. Add rice, reheat and serve with a few birdseye onions in each bowl.

Lion Hunting Good In Texas, Famous Hunter Declares

DALLAS.—Bruce Duncan has come down out of the mountains near Abilene, and started counter club, drug store and poolhall sportsmen with the news that they won't have to go all the way to Africa to hunt lions.

"Many people," Duncan explained, "have the impression that a mountain lion is the same as the African lion with a bushy mane and a tassel on the end of his tail, but in reality a mountain lion resembles a plain ordinary yellow house cat, with of course the exception that they are larger, in fact, a great deal larger."

Duncan has been hunting panthers, his name for the mountain lion, for over two years and has brought down 22 of them. The largest he ever killed weighed 203 pounds. Duncan says that with the exception of a 212-pounder killed a number of years ago by Teddy Roosevelt while on a hunting trip in Arizona, his is probably the largest ever shot in the United States.

"I had a hard time with that one," Duncan said, "he had killed 700 sheep, 150 horses and had done an estimated damage of \$75,000. The state had put a price on his hide of \$200, and the trouble was well worth it. I cracked him with dogs for over 20 miles, and after I finally caught up with him, it took me five hours to make the kill. I made the kill about 7,000 feet above sea level. Finally got him down with a Wild West style."

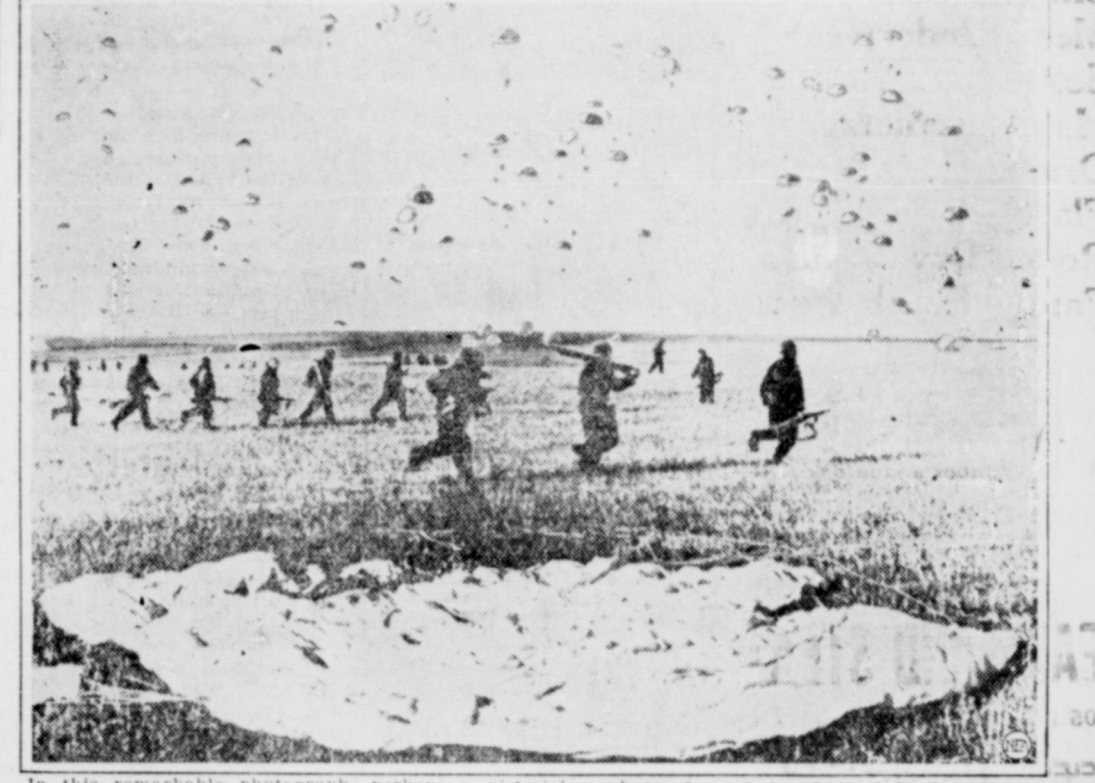

ON TEXAS FARMS

It is possible to make comfortable, light weight cover for the home from home grown wool, if the wool is scoured perfectly and carefully carded, says Mrs. J. D. Robertson, member of the Hagerman Home Demonstration club of Grayson county.
This lady recommends that the wool be spread on paper in the sun to dry, and where the air can circulate around it fully. The wool loses about one-half its weight in washing. A three pound bat is about the average for comforts.

The first terraces in Gillespie county were constructed in 1916. Since that time terraces have been built on farms in every community, but not more than half of the farm land that needs terracing has been terraced.

Heavy rains this year have convinced many farmers that they must terrace if they are to continue growing crops. At a recent meeting, they decided that they would build their terraces themselves with such equipment as they had, and would also use available county equipment.

Under the auspices of the Refugio County Farm Demonstration Council, 35 farmers and ranchers interested in pasture improvement work and breeding better cattle recently made a tour of several ranches in Kingsville.

The group made a tour of the Rhodes grass pastures and feed lots on the Hobse and Hollimann ranch, the Worth Wright ranch and the famous King ranch. There are 17,000 acres of Rhodes grass on the King ranch and more is being planted. It is said to compare in food value with timothy grass.

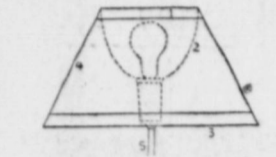
SAN ANGELO.—"Beets are thriving in my winter lettuce bed and are protected from insects there," Mrs. B. R. Buchanan, pantry demonstrator of the Water Valley Home Demonstration Club in Tom Green county, told Miss Doyra Crowder, home demonstration agent.

After planting two rows of beets in her fall garden, Mrs. Buchanan broadcast the rest of her seed in the winter greens bed which is six feet long and four and one-half feet wide. She then covered the bed with canvas which was removed occasionally to admit more sunlight.

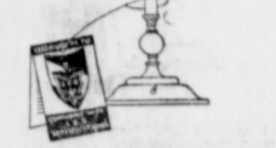

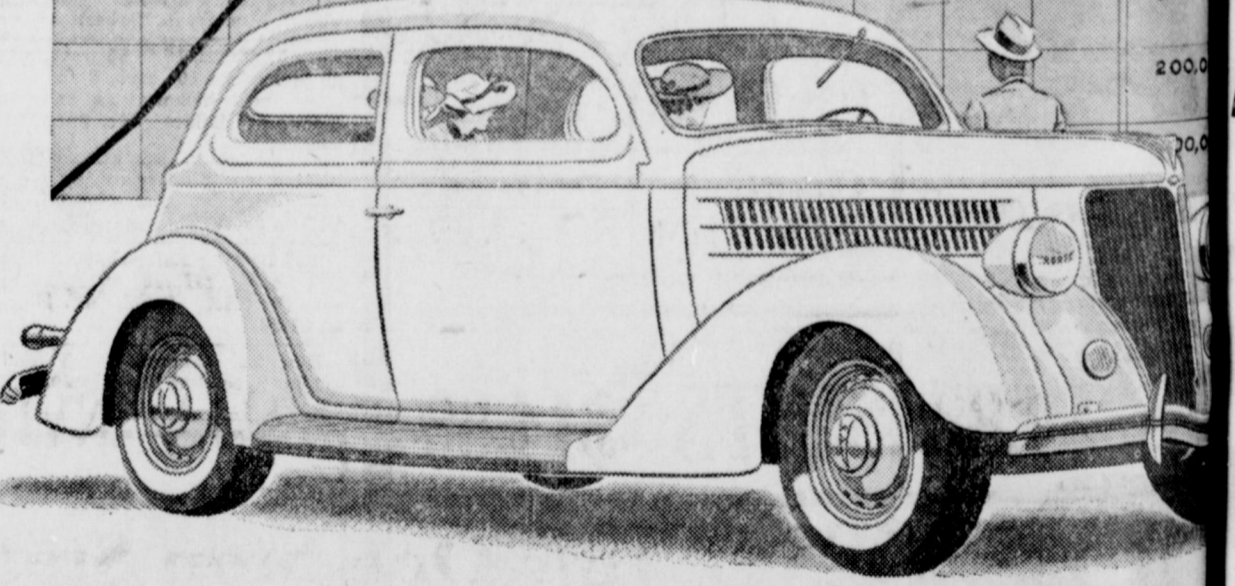
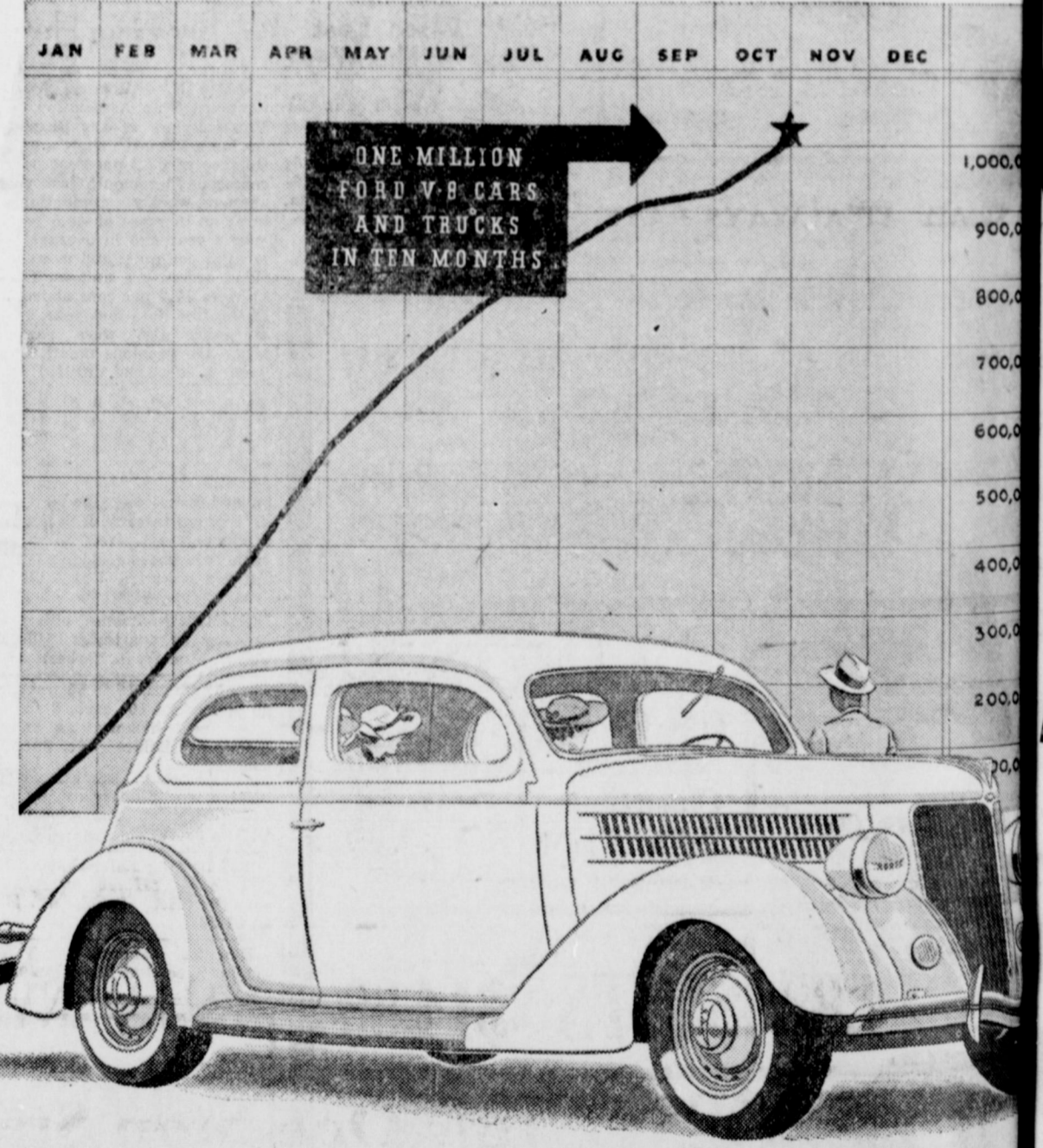
EX-MINISTER GOES ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

HOUSTON, Nov. 18.—The death penalty will be asked for Rev. Edgar Eskridge of Orange, Baptist minister, charged with murdering his friend, Police Chief Ed J. O'Reilly. Questions to prospective jurors indicated this as his trial opened here today.
More than a dozen veniremen were excused, many of them because they objected to infliction of the death penalty. Others were challenged by defense attorneys after being questioned regarding a plea of insanity in murder cases.
The defendant smoked cigars, taking no interest in the proceedings. He did not see his wife or sister, Mrs. C. M. Chambers of Port Arthur, and neither spoke to him.
Eskridge was charged with shooting O'Reilly on May 29, the day after the officer met him on the street and took his weapon. Eskridge claimed the incident was a plot against his life.

ITALIANS ARE BITTER ABOUT THE SANCTIONS

Italy showed bitter resentment against most of the nations of the world today as League sanctions went into effect.

Demonstrations by 2,000,000 young Italians around embassies and legations showed the temper of the people, convinced by Mussolini that Italy is being given a raw deal.

Mussolini is determined not only to push his campaign in Africa to success in spite of combined opposition of 52 nations, linked in the greatest mass effort in history to stop a nation from making war, but to fight back economically.

To that end Italy will refuse to buy the products of nations which apply sanctions and even to pay her debts abroad, which are large.

The Italians, backing the dictator wholeheartedly, are prepared to make heavy sacrifices and word from Rome is Italy probably can go a year before the real pinch of the trade and financial penalties is felt.

By that time, judging by the steady success of the preliminary campaign in Ethiopia, the country can be subjugated.

The real danger lies in the possibility Britain, backed by the League of Nations, will not be content to let Mussolini have his way. If they do the League structure collapses and the nations will be in the position of having let one man defy them and get away with it.

If the League should vote for military penalties against Italy it is safe to assume Britain will carry out her reiterated pledge to back the League to the limit within the provisions of the covenant.

Probation of Adult Prisoners In Texas Watched By Many

HOUSTON. — Prison authorities of 15 states which do not have adult probation laws will watch closely the type to be adopted by Texas under a recently adopted constitutional amendment, according to District Judge Langston G. King.

The jurist was one of the leaders at the annual congress of prison officials at Atlanta, Ga., during the last week of October.

"I discussed the matter with members of the National Probation Association," Judge King said. "They offered to help Texas work out one of the most modern and efficient systems in the nation."

"Adult probation proposals probably will not be submitted to the State legislature until the next regular session," Judge King said. "Gov. James V. Allred has promised to submit the topic to the law-making body as soon as possible."

"Fulton county, Georgia," Judge King said, "has that state's model system."

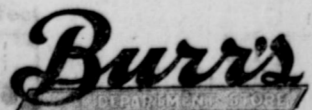

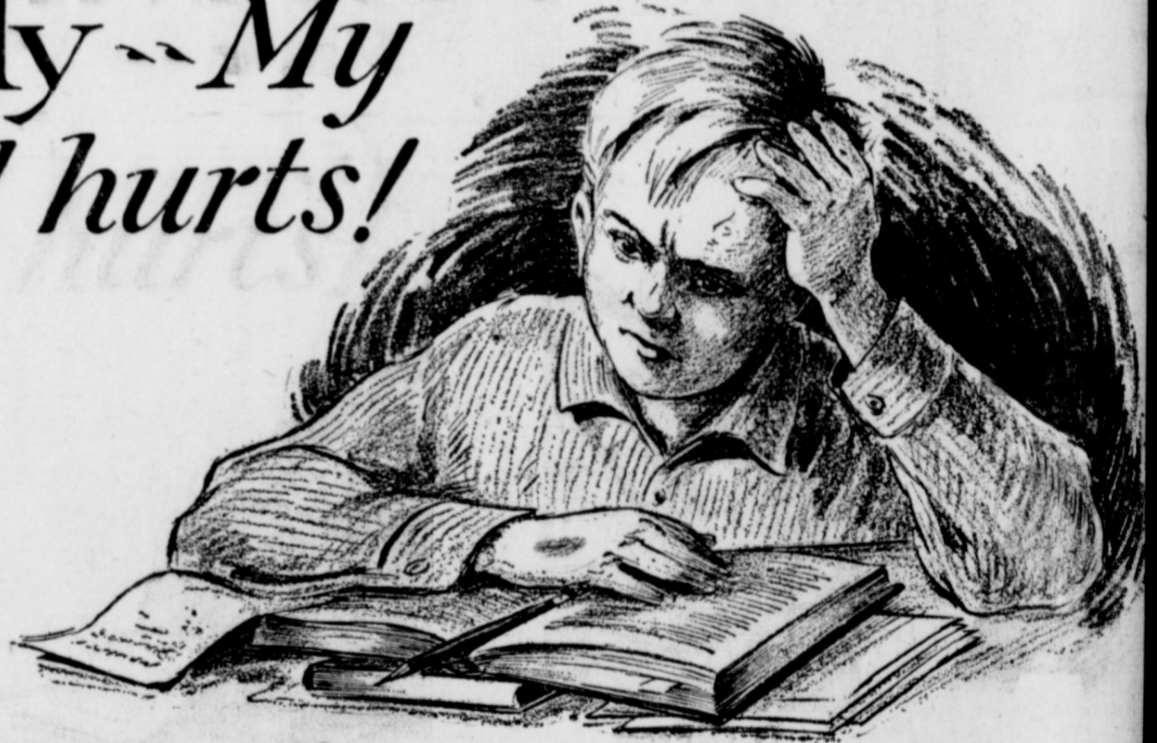
