Nice Modern Warships Too Costly To Fight

If the gentlemen who are inhaling the London fogs at for their respective countries, they might try to find some way of making warships less expensive.

A modern warship is just about the most costly contraption, pound for pound, that man has ever invented. Indeed, it is so very costly that admirals don't dare to risk it by doing any actual fighting with it.

For illustrations look at the record in the World War. When this war began, Great Britain and ded to it, so fleet ever built. As the war went on she added to it, so Economist Tells When this war began, Great Britain had the mightiest erful than at the beginning.

Yet from first to last the guiding thought of her naval strategists seemed to be that these marvellous ships were so extremely costly, and took so long to build, that they must not under any circumstances be risked in actual combat if it could be avoided.

The first example of this timorousness came at the Dardanelles The British admiral Sir Roger Keyes is authority panacea by Dr. Graham Laing, for the statement that the straits could have been forced by the British fleet if the British admiralty had not been afraid of losses.

Britain Is Warned Of Birth Slump

By United Press

LONDON. - A prophesy has been made by experts that Britain's population may fall to onetenth of its present size in the next hundred years.

This is foreshadowed in a report just issued by the Royal Economic society. The inquiry which the report is based has been conducted by Dr. Enid Charles, of the Department of Social Biology in the University of London.

The present low birth rate will begin to cause social dislocation long before ashundred years has past, says, Dr. Charles, if no new social agencies intervene to raise it. Britain will become largely a nation of old-age pensioners. Schools will be empty, and the number of men and women of marriageable age wil fall dras-

Soon after Lake Littlejohn, department of commerce investigator, arrived from Little Rock, a former inquest was held on the scene and it was decided the crash

was "purely accidential."
All 17 bodies, some unrecognizable, were taken to Memphis.

Investigators rounded up natives in the dismal swamp country near the Mississippi river hoping to learn something that would lead to a partial explanation of the dis-

Investigations began to fix responsibility. The American Air Lines twin-motored Douglass crashed last night in a swamp three miles northeast of this farm-ing hamlet carrying all aboard— 14 passengers and a crew of three, to a frightful death.
