**Ear Amplifier Ends Deaf Spots To Aid Hearing**

LOS ANGELES.—Success in giving 95 per cent perfect hearing to half-deaf persons was announced today by researchers seeking a scientifically ideal ear amplifier.  
 Delighted smiles of persons hearing the high notes of an opera for the first time in their lives are rewarding the researchers. Prof. Vern O. Knudsen, and two graduate students, Norman Watson and Ludwig Sepmyer, who have spent a year and a half on the project at the University of California at Los Angeles.  
 They seek to place mechanical hearing aids on the same prescription basis as eye-glasses, promising great relief to the hard-of-hearing, who are estimated at 3,000,000 in the United States alone.  
 Discovering that most of such afflicted persons hear some notes perfectly, but are deaf to others, Dr. Knudsen built an amplifier that will pick out a certain range of tone and amplify that alone.  
 Partly-deaf persons, most of them professors and students on the campus, are given sound tests running up and down the scale. Usually they hear perfectly the middle range, but are deaf to high pitched tones.  
 The amplifier is adjusted to bolster only their "deaf spots" and record are played through it. Listening through earphones, persons rated 50 per cent deaf have been enabled to hear almost perfectly.

"The experience has been a very pleasant one for them," said Knudsen.  
 The amplifier used by the experimenters is especially constructed, embodying newest discoveries in radio and sound motion picture amplification. It weighs 100 pounds, but Knudsen is confident that light portable amplifiers nearly as efficient may be developed.

**Homemaking Rally To Be Held April 23**

Plans for the Homemaking Education Rally for 1936 have just been released. San Angelo will be the hostess city and the meeting will be held April 23-25. Approximately 800 homemaking students from the 618 vocational high schools in Texas will be in attendance.  
 New features of the program are: Plans for a Future Homemakers Organization of Texas to be submitted by home economics clubs and formulated out of local interests and needs; a centennial motif for original one-act plays centered around progress in homemaking art in Texas. (The plays may be written by anyone in the community but must meet the approval of the local homemaking group); original songs expressive of Texas culture in home life. Since hobbies or avocational interests, now popularly called boondoggling, are considered of great importance in the development of the individual, each school may for the first time select and exhibit 3 exhibits of hobbies of homemaking students. Another new feature is the selection of household accessories such as lamps, vases, curtains, scarfs, and the like. An assemblage of accessories will be provided and a problematical situation set up. The students will select from the things available those which they consider the best choices in the situation. A first aid entry has also been included. Entrants will be subjected to an emergency situation in which they must administer first aid treatment.  
 Boys who are taking homemaking courses in public schools will participate in the entries. This is the second year boys have been privileged to enter the rally. An increasing number of high schools in Texas and other states are offering courses in homemaking for boys.

Did you surrender to the menacing spectre of, used by the desperately rallying forces of Pride and Manhood, break the hypnotic influence of dread and free yourself from the accursed stigma of a coward?

In either case you can understand and sympathize with the young hero of "Branded a Coward," who became a hero despite his mental obsession of horror, and consequent physical quailing. There was good excuse for Johnny Hume to show the white feather at intervals. At the age of ten, while crossing the desert in an emigrant wagon, he saw his parents and brother die in a shower of bullets from the guns of outlaws who knew no mercy, escaping with his own life, but with the tragedy indelibly etched on his mind. In later years he proved a magnificent shot at targets, a bold rider and splendid athlete. But—he was gun-

shy in moments of peril! His towns men saw him cower and hide when bandit bullets were flying.

Before his eyes flitted a panic-stricken picture—the desert battle of his boyhood, the agonizing screams, the dull thud of leaded slugs entering crimson-flecked flesh. That was the cruel vision that haunted Johnny Hume, and drove him into exile. Yet Fate intervened to make him a hero in the view of the community that didn't know his history. Fate forced him in a moment of anxious anger to forget his fears temporarily and exchange bullet for bullet with a pack of human wolves that attacked a stage coach. Scattering death and wounds like an avenging God of War, he drove them off. One of the passengers was a lovely girl, whose gratitude toward her preserver grew into love.

And the future? Appointed marshal of the town of Lawless against his will, hailed as a hero, and proving his worth against an outlaw band whose members learned to dread as much as they hated him. Yet always, even in the moments of triumph, he wondered if the damning vision of Fear would grasp and hold him powerless. But knowing fear, he still fought against the chill phantom, and conquered! Which is the bravest, the man who takes lethal risks carelessly, because he is of the phlegmatic, unimpressionable type or he, who, handicapped by quivering nerves, moves resolutely into hand-grips with grim death? You can make your own choice! But whatever that choice may be, you cannot fail to react enthusiastically to the splendid thrills, the ro-

## Grocer Norris is Planning Appeal For His Freedom

LINCOLN, Neb.—Attorneys for George W. (Grocer) Norris, of Alva, Okla., central figure in the investigation conducted by a senatorial committee in Nebraska in 1930, are resolved to carry the case to the U. S. supreme court, if necessary.

Norris in 1930 attempted to file for the U. S. Republican senatorial nomination against Sen. George W. Norris, of McCook. The 36-year-old grocer recently was convicted of falsifying before the committee and was sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$100 in federal court.

While his counsel is perfecting an appeal to the U. S. circuit court of appeals in St. Louis, Norris is free on a \$1,500 bond and continues his work as a grocery store manager at Alva where he moved from Broken Bow, Neb., shortly after he announced his candidacy.

Norris contended he was the "innocent victim of a political trick" hatched by a group bent on smashing the political power of Senator Norris.

The dapper young grocer admitted at the trial that he was given \$50 to file for the nomination and an additional \$500 for "campaign expenses." This testimony was in conflict with his statements before Senator Gerald P. Nye's senate committee in 1930 that he neither received nor was promised any funds to run against Senator Norris.

Grocer Norris said he knew that influential Nebraska Republicans furnished the funds paid to him through an intermediary.

Evidence presented in court revealed the money was contributed largely by William Stebbins, of Gothenburg, state treasurer at the time, and also a candidate for the Republican senatorial nomination.

The grocer's name never appeared on the ballot. The Nebraska supreme court held that his filing papers arrived at the state capitol a day late.

Victor Seymour, Lincoln attorney who was manager of the Republican national committee's western campaign office at Denver, recently completed a six months' sentence for perjury committed before the same committee.

The grocer will base his appeal upon the ground that it was a senate resolution and not a statute that created the Nye committee and hence there was no perjury under a federate statute. An additional defense will be that he corrected his testimony at a second appearance before the committee.

### No Action Taken On Farmers' Demand

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—Dr. H. Y. Benedict, University of Texas president, declined to comment today on action taken by Central Texas farmers at San Marcos requesting the removal of Dr. A. B. Cox, head of the school bureau of business research for allegedly criticizing President Roosevelt and his policies.

"We can but let the matter rest on its merits. All I know of this is what I read in the papers," Benedict said. Dr. Cox could not be reached for a statement.

## W. S. Adamson to Be a Candidate For County Judge

Judge W. S. Adamson, prominent Ranger attorney, has announced his candidacy for the position of county judge of Eastland county, subject to the action of the Democratic primary of July 25.

Judge Adamson is well qualified, both by training and experience, to hold the position he is seeking. For the past 29 years he has been actively engaged as an attorney and for four years he was county judge of Scurry county.

For the past three years Judge Adamson has been a city commissioner of the City of Ranger, and during his regime many constructive measures have been brought forward and enacted, saving the taxpayers of the city many thousands of dollars, and at the same time putting the city in the best financial condition it has enjoyed since the boom days.

In announcing his candidacy Judge Adamson stated that he was in favor of a conservative and economical administration of the county's affairs and was in favor of a reduction in taxes.

He will wage an active campaign later, at which time he hopes to contact every voter in the county. He has not, as yet, arranged his speaking itinerary, but will arrange it so that it will carry him to every portion of the county.

### Tung Oil Trees Are New Texas Crop

WOODVILLE, Tex.—The culture of tung oil trees in Southeast Texas has given a great impetus within the past several months when more than 32,000 seedlings have been distributed to farmers. Tyler county farmers have pledged support to the program of tung oil production and five units of seedlings will be distributed in the section. Experts have announced the soil and climate are ideal for the growth of the new product.

### Drive Opens to Move Frigate Constitution

WASHINGTON.—Lieut. Col. George E. Hays, commander in chief of the Military Order of the World War has urged chapters of the organization to support a move to bring the frigate U.S.S. Constitution to Baltimore.

Each chapter has been asked to consider a resolution to their congressman and to the naval affairs committee of both houses of congress to support the movement.

## FREEDOM OF PRESS UPHELD BY HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—In a sweeping opinion that went to the roots of the American constitutional guarantee of freedom of the press, the supreme court invalidated the Louisiana newspaper gross receipts tax.

The court ruling in the case was unanimous. While submitting its verdict in the newspaper tax law, passed at the request of the late Senator Huey Long, the court failed once again to render its decision on the constitutionality of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

However two important rulings on the validity of the sections of the New York milk control law were presented. The court opinion in the Louisiana newspaper case, struck hard at any effort by government to

shackle the long-guaranteed liberty of the press.

Read by Justice George Sutherland, it traced the history of the tax and challenged the Louisiana statute, "not an ordinary form of tax, but one single in kind, with a long history of hostile misuse against the freedom of the press." The court made clear that it was not intended to exempt newspapers from any ordinary form of taxation, but only to protect their recognized freedom from attacks, cloaked in the guise of taxation.

The court concluded: "The predominant purpose of the grant of immunity here invoked, was to preserve untrammelled press as a vital source of public information. Newspapers, magazines and other journals of the country, it is safe to say, have shed and continue to shed more light on the public and business affairs of the nation than any other instrumentality of publicity and since it formed public opinion, is the most potent of all restraints against misgovernment. The suppression of the publicity afforded by a free press cannot be regarded otherwise than with grave concern."

## American Bobsled Team Runs Fifth

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 11.—America's bobsledders, defending the title they won in 1932 at Lake Placid, N. Y., were dropped to fifth place in the four man event today, when teams representing Switzerland and Great Britain completed brilliant runs.

The American cause was not hopeless, however, for only a mere 3.65 seconds separated the American sled from the No. 1 Swiss sled which captured the lead with a dash of 1 minute and 18 seconds today.

### Forests of Alaska Cover Large Areas

JUNEAU, Alaska.—Forest areas of Alaska are estimated at 70,000,000 acres by federal foresters.

Two national forests, the Tongass in Southeast Alaska and the Chugach, near Seward, include about 25,000 board feet per acre. Merchantable trees range from two to four feet in diameter, from 90 to 140 feet in height.

Principal species are western hemlock, 74 per cent; Sitka spruce, 9 per cent; western red cedar, 3 per cent; smaller quantities of white spruce, cottonwood, mountain hemlock, white birch, balsam, black spruce, poplar aspen and tamarack.

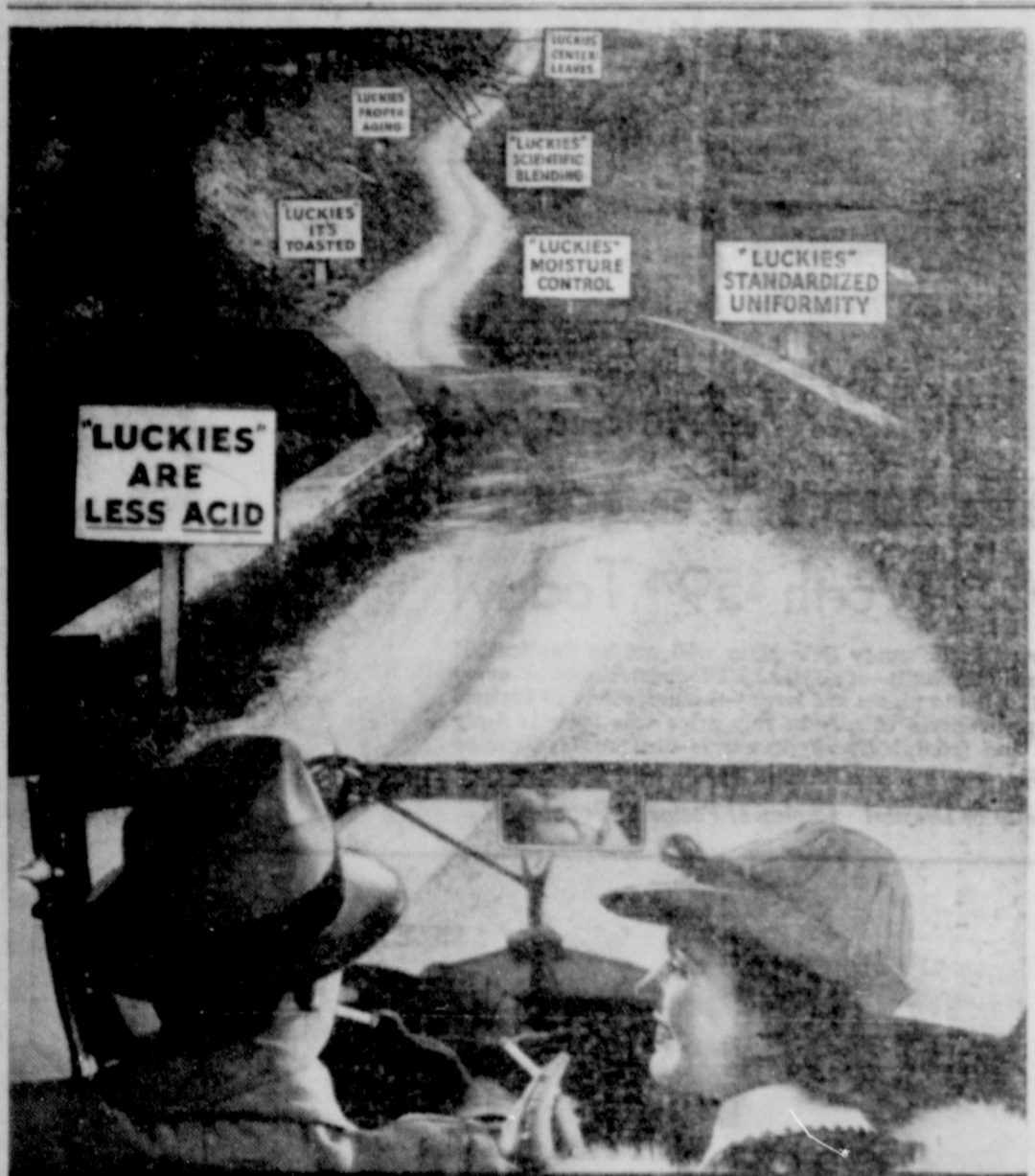

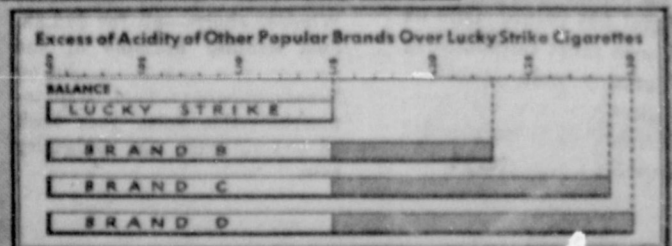
