

It may seem all right to run out on your debts if you are neevr going to need any more favors from your creditor. The reason for this surprising change is not a pricking of Britain's commercial conscience, but a bad case of fright.

The European situation is full of terrors. Britain recently found, to her humiliation, that the lesser breeds without the law just aren't afraid of her any more. A desperate flurry of rearmament is taking place as a result.

J. L. Garvin, editor of the London Observer, and England's most respected and influential publicist, announced the other day that England's only hope is to haul the American debt out of the bag and settle it. His argument is worth looking at.

He begins by pointing out that England must rearm swiftly and extensively. Her very existence depends on it. Army, navy, and air force need vast expansion and they need it at once. England, however, is short of skilled labor in some trades, and even shorter of certain specialized kinds of machinery. The necessary rebuilding cannot be done at home within the time available.

So says Mr. Garvin-settle the debt, and do it at once, so that America's vast manufacturing resources can be tapped. During the wra, American munitions were indispensable to British success; they are no less indispensable today. Get the debt paid, and they would becomee avail-

England made one miscalculation about that debt. She assumed that the world was going to remain at peace and that John Bull would need no more help from Uncle Sam -in which case, of course, gypping Uncle Sam would be just a pleasant little game

It hasn't worked out that way. So we may yet see that debt settled-Mr. Garvin has an uncanny way of forecasting British policy-and find ourselves, too, once more tied by strong commercial ties to the fortunes of the British empire.

#### Land Aplenty Assures Us Against Collapse

Drouth and dust storm and erosion may continue to smite western farm lands, but the American has one unbeatable ace in the hole that will keep the game from licking him. No matter what is happening to his land, he has such a tremendous lot of it that he can stand the gaff.

It is this fact that keeps the recent report of the National Resources Committee from being a thing of unmitigated gloom.

The National Resources Committee, which has just completed for President Roosevelt an extensive survey of our soil and its ills, begins its report by calmly predicting that American civilization will collapse completely unless men come to the rescue of the soil they have misused.

"The fact is," says the report, "most of the territory occupied by the United States is not naturally suited for a permanent civilization. It is like the land of the Mayas of Yucatan or the land of Babylon-a rich country where civilization can flash into a blaze of glory and then collapse ina few generations into ruin."

"Our soil," the report continues, "is not enriched by tre usual methods of cultivation, but impoverished . the usual methods of cultivation, but impoverished. By the normal processes of our farming, our mining, and our lumbering, we create a desert . . . Any nation whose land naturally tends to turn into desert must either take measures to preserve the land or it will surely die."

That sounds very bad, but there is worse to come. The report points out that other nations with farming land which had thatt desert-creating tendency, have been able t ostay in business only by regimenting their people and undertaking colossally expensive public works programs. The empires of ancient Peru and Egypt, which imposed an ant-like discipline on the masses as the price of survival, are cases in point.

By this time, a man who takes government reports seriously might well be ready to sell out and move to Zamboanga, or some equally remote spot. But it is just here, with the sky darkened on all sides, that the Resources Committeelets in a strong gleam of sunlight.

After all, it points out, the United States is a big country-unbelievably big. If it has millions of acres of soil that should not be farmed as we now farm it, it has other millions of acres which, with a little care, can be farmed until doomsday.
