

## BODY RECEIVED WOMAN'S FATE LATE TUESDAY

Dissenting jurors in the trial of Mrs. Della Henry, charged in connection with the death of her former husband, H. L. McBees, were dismissed at 11:35 a. m. Thursday by Eighty-eighth District Court Judge B. W. Patterson.

The case was received by the jurors at 10:50 Tuesday night. Foreman W. L. McCorkle of Nitrod reported to Judge Patterson of the jury's inability to reach an agreement. It was understood the jurors stood 9 to 3.

Mrs. Henry was charged in connection with the death of her former husband, who disappeared from his Rising Star home May 1, 1933. About three months later, she married Raymond Henry. In December, 1934, the body of McBees was found suspended from a tree near Rising Star.

The appeal of Henry from a 50-year sentence in a companion case, assessed April 5 by a jury in 88th district court, will be submitted to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, Wednesday, Dec. 23.

## BULLDOG AND LOBO TIE PUTS END TO LONG LOSING STREAK FOR BOTH CONTESTING TEAMS

The Ranger Bulldogs and the Cisco Lobos, living up to the tradition of friendly rivalry and closely contested games, battled to a 6 to 6 tie at Cisco Armistice Day before a small crowd. By playing a tie the teams each won a moral victory, as it put an end to a long losing streak for each. And, although the game meant little in the Oil Belt standings, as it leaves both in last place in the district, the game was a hotly contested as though the district championship had been at stake.

The Lobos, who appeared to outweigh the Bulldogs more than their weights indicated, pulled two bad plays and got one bad break that kept them from a possible win. An off-side penalty on the kick for point after touchdown was the break, a pass deep in their own territory while leading 6 to 0 was the first bad play and the blocked punt behind the goal line that resulted in Ranger's touchdown was the other. Had the quarterback elected to take a safety Cisco might have won by a score of 6 to 2.

That the game was closely contested is indicated by the fact that the score was tied, Cisco made nine first downs to eight for Ranger and the ball was near midfield a good part of the afternoon.

Cisco's first score came on the ninth play after the second quarter opened and marked the end of a 45-yard march to pay dirt, with Rainbolt carrying over for the score on an end run after good ball carrying by Steyer and Donohue had placed the ball in scoring position. On the kick for extra point Cisco was offside and drew a penalty and the second attempt was blocked.

In the final quarter, with but a few minutes to play, Cisco attempted a pass from deep in their own territory, which was intercepted by Cox, but Cisco stopped the Ranger advance, temporarily, when a pass was intercepted on the Cisco two-yard line. Cisco attempted to punt from deep in the end zone, but it was blocked and recovered by Dudley for a touchdown and Adkin's try for the extra point failed.

Dudley played a whale of a game at guard throughout the afternoon, going down under all Ranger punts and taking the safety man in his tracks, so that no return was made on any Ranger kick. Stevens was outstanding on the defense, too, as were Cox and Adkin, and Stevens did a good part of the passing, the most effective pass combination being from Stevens to Adkin though the order was reversed on one or two occasions.

Outstanding offensively for Cisco were Steyer and Rainbolt, who gained early in the game on a lateral and end run, which backfired after the first few attempts and lost ground. Jones, at end, was instrumental in breaking up a majority of Ranger's plays off right tackle when, time after time, blockers failed to keep him out of the play.

Cisco was rated as being the best passing team of the two, but her passing attack failed to click. The Lobos attempted 12 passes, seven of which were incomplete, three intercepted and two completed, one for no gain and the other for 18 yards and a first down. Ranger attempted 15 passes, seven were incomplete, two were intercepted and six were completed for a total of 66 yards.

On running plays the Lobos outgained the Bulldogs, gaining a total of 144 yards to 67 gained by the Bulldogs, while Ranger was thrown for a total loss of 18 yards and Cisco lost a total of 23 yards. Penalties were about even with Cisco being penalized 40 yards and Ranger 35, but most of Ranger's penalties came in bunches, the Bulldogs being penalized 15 yards on two occasions.

The game was by far the best played by either team this season, though Ranger was without the services of McKelvain, Hinman and Lingle, who showed up well in the early part of the season, were used but a few minutes during the latter part of the game.

## Ranger Boy Makes Best Club Report In 4-H Contest

Howard Hinman of Ranger has been awarded a gold medal of honor for making the best report of any 4-H club member in the county in a National 4-H Rural Electrification Contest conducted by extension agents.

The winner who was designated by County Agent Eno V. Cook is automatically entered in the state contest, in which the prize is a \$50.00 merchandise certificate. Eight all-expense educational trips to the 15th National 4-H Club Congress, to be held in Chicago November 27-December 5, will be awarded to that number of highest scoring state champions.

The three highest scoring of the eight will be awarded cash college scholarships of \$400, \$300 and \$200 which are provided with all other prizes in the contest by Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company.

Contestants were required to submit a diagram showing the location of their farm with relation to the nearest "high line," and another plan showing how to wire their home and out buildings if not now wired. They were also required among other things to indicate what appliances they could use to advantage, and what they could add where they now have electricity.

## ARTILLERY IS PUT TO USE IN MADRID AREA

A heavy artillery barrage rocked Madrid today as government and nationalist batteries resumed a fierce cannonade.

With rain preventing operation of airplanes, the leftist artillery began shelling the insurgent positions on almost the entire front and the nationalists quickly responded.

Loyalist militia trapped 1,000 picked rebel storm troops in the western part of the city and expected to annihilate them.

Foreign legionnaires and the rebel soldiers tried a dash into the city last night.

A strengthened militia line was surprised to find the enemy approaching. Militiamen began a quiet enveloping movement and opening fire stopped the nationalists.

There was a growing opinion that the nationalists had lost one opportunity to take Madrid. On Sunday night the loyalist forces were demoralized and close to panic. Two days ago foreign military experts were convinced the city was doomed.

Now thousands of fresh troops have arrived, men with fighting experience. They came from Catalonia and from abroad.

The complete shift in the situation is believed to mean that the first threat to Madrid has failed.

HENDAYE, Nov. 12.—Spanish nationalists have been ordered to make no further attempts to take Madrid until their present positions have been consolidated. Gen. Gonzalo Liano said today in a radio broadcast.

VIENNA, Nov. 12.—The three-power conference of Italy, Austria and Hungary, issued a statement today recognizing Hungary's right to equality of armaments. The announcement was interpreted as meaning Hungary joins Germany, Austria and Turkey in repudiating the peace treaty.

## Constable And Justice of Peace Shot in Battle

CENTER, Nov. 12.—Constable Ed. Chapman, 60, was near death in a hospital today as the result of a gun battle in which two other men were shot to death during a dance at the Stockman high school last night.

Justice of the Peace, Allie Gillespie, 50, and Alpus Lillie, 25, were killed. Chapman was wounded five times.

Gillespie and Chapman went to the high school to question Lillie about a disturbance earlier in the evening. Chapman began searching Lillie and the latter drew a gun and began firing.

## School Children To Have Special Day at Centennial

A 22-coach passenger train, starting from Cisco Friday morning at 6 o'clock, leaving Eastland at 6:20 and Ranger at 6:40 will carry between 1,500 and 1,800 Eastland County school children to the Centennial at Dallas.

The train will proceed directly to the Centennial grounds, where it will remain all day, leaving that night for the return trip.

Arrangements were made today with J. E. Bass, with the Dallas division of the Department of Education, to have some spot at the Centennial designated as the meeting place for the school children, so that if any become separated from the rest of the group they can return there before train time.

School teachers from the schools in the county will accompany the children on the trip as guardians.

It was announced today that the Cisco delegation would be put in the front portion of the train, the Eastland children in the middle section and Ranger children in the back portion of the train. Each town's section will remain locked until the train arrives in that town in order that their seats will not be taken.

All schools in the county will be closed all day Friday in order that the children may attend the Centennial on Eastland county day.

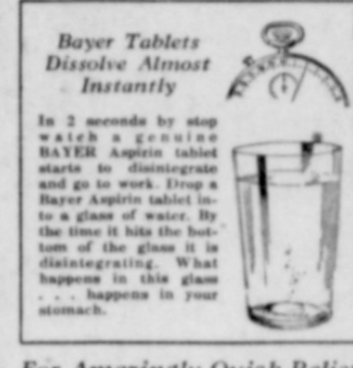

The local postoffice will with 45,000 others of the nation, distribute forms Nov. 16 to employers for registration of workers for old age pension accounts under the Social Security Act, it was announced Saturday.

After the employer blanks are returned the postoffice will begin the distribution of blanks to employees.

The employer forms will be known as the "employer's application for identification number."

Each employer will be asked how many are in his employ and the employes in turn will begin receiving blanks labeled "application for social security account number."

Each employe will receive a card, with warning printed thereon to preserve it because "it shows the account number used in keeping records of your social security benefit rights under federal and state laws."

In the accounts the persons eligible for pensions will commence

next Jan. 1 the storing up of pensions which go to them at the age of 65, in amounts depending on what their wages have been.

The pensions are to be financed by taxes on the payrolls of the employes, which will start at 1 per cent in January and rise gradually to 3 per cent. Among those not eligible under the plan are farm labor, servants and Government workers.

The employe's form, it is understood, asks only questions as to name and address of the applicant and his employer, date and place of birth and parents' names.

Surplus Big Game Offered For Sale

To avoid overgrazing of ranges on big-game preserves administered by the Biological Survey, U. S. Department of Agriculture, surplus animals in the herds each year are offered for sale.

This season, says the Survey, the following big-game animals are available for disposal: at the National Bison Range, Moineau, Mont., 100 buffalo; at Niobrara Game Preserve, Valentine, Neb., 25 buffalo and 12 elk; at Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge, Cache, Okla., 50 buffalo and 30 elk; and at Sullys Hill Game Preserve, Ft. Totten, N. Dak., 3 buffalo and 15 elk. Big-game animals on these

preserves run wild on the ranges and are maintained as nearly as possible under natural conditions.

In selling the surplus animals the Survey will give preference to applicants who wish to purchase the animals alive for propagation or exhibition. Animals not sold can later be obtained by State, county, city or municipal zoos, parks, or game preserves, or private institutions desiring such animals for propagation or exhibition, at cost of capture, crating, and transportation.

Additional information regarding the animals available for disposal may be obtained from the Biological Survey, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

### Miami Building At 10-Year High

MIAMI, Fla.—The Miami area is enjoying the biggest wave of building since 1925 in preparation for an anticipated influx of 2,500,000 visitors. Addition of approximately 6,000 housing units to accommodate tourists is revealed in a survey by J. B. Sullivan, Florida hotel commissioner.

More than 100 new apartment houses and 33 new hotels are included in the building permits issued since last April in Dade county, embracing the City of Miami and several surrounding communities, according to Sullivan. His survey shows the new apartment houses account for approximately 3,000 rooms, while the construction of residential and de luxe hotels adds an additional 2,500 units.

"The fanfare accompanying the 1933-35 Florida boom is absent from this constructive increase in building," Sullivan said. "Nevertheless, the records of the Miami building department show that the wave of residential building construction in the district since the first of the year exceeds in volume that of the first eight months of 1935.

"A total of \$5,644,878 was spent on residential construction in Miami during the first three-quarters of the year in Miami Beach, linked to Miami by two causeways across Biscayne Bay, building expenditures in the same period amounted to \$3,329,317."

Completion of a schedule of major sports events and special entertainment features in the Miami area are believed to assure the longest winter season here to date.

## Canning Plant for Valley Is Largest Operated In Texas

McALLEN, Tex.—What is believed to be the largest vegetable and fruit canning plant in Texas, the \$100,000 plant being completed by the Riona Products Company of McAllen, was expected to start operations early in November, according to announcement of Lee Akin, president of the concern.

Exterior work on the concrete brick and steel structure in complete and machinery for processing the first vegetables to go through the plant is being installed.

Four separate canning processes will be used in handling the various products, Akin stated. Vegetables, fruit juices, citrus juice concentrate and citrus by-products will be the four general classes into which the plant's products will be divided, and special machinery had been installed to handle each type.

Three of the newest type bean "snipers," machines which cut beans into the proper size for canning, have been installed at a cost of several thousand dollars. Beans will probably be the first of a large group of winter vegetables to be processed at the plant, and other vegetables will be handled as the various harvest seasons arrive. Peas, spinach, kumquat and tomatoes will probably follow.

Eight large cooking retorts have been installed in the basement, while machinery is located both in the basement, open to the third floor, and on the second floor. All vegetables are cooked in the pressure retorts after canning. Each

step in processing fruits and vegetables progresses from the basement and first floor toward the warehouse and loading spaces in the west wing to facilitate production and handling, Akin explained.

One of the most unique machines in the new plant is the orange juice concentrator. Akin explained that the vacuum process is used in concentrating the juice at a temperature of about 110 degrees. One gallon of concentrate is equal to five gallons of ordinary juice. The concentrator will manufacture about 2,500 gallons of concentrate daily from 80 tons of fruit.

Even the citrus peel, used in small amounts in making candied citrus peel, will be utilized by the new plant, Akin said. The peel will be ground up and sold to feed mills for use in making feed for livestock. Molasses, oats and other edibles are added to the ground peel and make an excellent feed, Akin stated. They can also be used for fertilizer, it was explained.

## Automotive Taxes Are Higher Than Levies On Property

NEW YORK—Special additional taxes paid by the American motorist to federal and state governments in 1935 averaged 21.8 per cent on his automotive investment as compared with an average real estate and general property tax of 3.1 per cent the country over.

The average value of the 26,221,052 motor vehicles operating on the highways in 1935 is estimated at \$212. The average tax bill was \$42.26, or about one-fifth of the value of the car. This tax cost was nearly seven times heavier than the general levies on property, according to a study made by the American Petroleum Industries Committee.

Variation in the tax levies on automobiles is seen from state to state, the highest rate being found

in Florida, where the \$75.13 annual tax bill represents 35.4 per cent of the average automobile's value. Other states having automotive levies higher than the national average are: Alabama, 32.4; Arkansas, 29.4; Louisiana, 27.7; Mississippi, 29.0; North Carolina, 31.4; Tennessee, 29.8; Vermont, 29.8; and Virginia, 28.0.

High gasoline taxes account for almost two-thirds of the tax bill on automobiles. Federal taxes on gasoline averaged \$10.42 per motor vehicle last year, adding 34.4 per cent to the tax burden already imposed upon the motorist by the states. The federal gasoline tax in 1935 accounted for 63 per cent of all automotive taxes paid into the federal treasury.

Motorists in those states where the tax rate is 30 per cent or more pay out in taxes in about three years an amount equivalent to the value of their cars. In Florida, tax payments in two years and ten months equal the average car value. For the country as a whole the period is four years and seven months. General property taxes equal the assessed valuation in about 32 years.

Schoolma'am of Old Worth Tribute, Too

An inquiring reporter who restlessly prowls the streets in quest of news checks in with the pleasing report that the schoolma'am of today is a great deal prettier and snappier than she was in the days when dad went to school.

What set the reporter off on this observation was the fact that he had just returned from a state teachers' convention. There he had mingled with a crowd of stylish and attractive young women who looked more like moving picture extras than school ma'ams, and the fact went at once to his head.

The contrast is probably unfair. Yesterday's schoolma'am lives on in the memory of the restless lads who sat at her feet a generation ago, and it was always an article of faith with them that the schoolma'am could not be anything but a battleax.

They conceived of an eternal antagonism between teacher and pupil, and to have admitted that teacher was a charming young woman would have been to lose half the battle right at the start.

So the memory of today's grown men probably does yesterday's schoolma'am less than justice. But whatever they think of her appearance, most men in looking back will undoubtedly admit that the lady had a pretty tough and thankless job and handled it remarkably well, all things considered.

Any schoolma'am stars her job with two strikes on her. She has a roomful of restless youngsters who would rather be anywhere on earth than in a school room.

She has to keep their attention, arouse their interest, make them behave quell that red Indian spirit that periodically takes possession of healthy youth—and, those things done, give them an education, prepare them for citizenship and instruct them in manners and hygiene.

It's a job big enough to make a strong man quail. But the slip of a girl who hires out as a schoolma'am tackles it without turning a hair—at disgracefully low wages, often enough—and gets away with it.

Looking back, who can't remember a host of things he owes to the overworked misses of his grammar school and high school days?

This one, by some chance phrase or other, snapped him out of a tendency toward selfpity.

That one took a few extra pains and showed him that the mysteries of mathematics were not necessarily insoluble, after all.

Another revealed to him the beauties of English poetry. A fourth somehow showed him that these can be a deep satisfaction in taking on a difficult job and doing it well.

And for reward—what do we give them? We picture them to ourselves as frumps and old maids. We look at today's crop of schoolma'ams and wonder why our own weren't as good-looking and stylish.

We may actually have the crust to feel a little bit sorry for ourselves for having grown up in the era of unattractive schoolma'ams.

And today's youngsters will probably feel exactly the same, 30 years from now.

Professor's Red Tie Is As Famous As His Teaching Is

AUSTIN, Tex.—The brilliant red bow tie of Dr. Henry Winston Harper, dean of the graduate school of the University of Texas, which has become one of the campus traditions in the last 42 years, is being lowered to three-quarter staff.

Dr. Harper has served on the University faculty in many capacities. Beginning as an adjunct professor of chemistry in 1894, he advanced to the position of dean of the graduate school in 1913. He will become dean of emeritus of the graduate school this fall and a professor of chemistry three fourths of the time.

Wearing of the red tie is said to have resulted from a vow taken many years ago. The red material is a special, imported cloth. The ties are hand made.

In 1935, O. O. McIntyre wrote in his newspaper that "Dr. H. W. Harper of the University of Texas in Austin is a red tie fancier." McIntyre immediately was sent one of the special Harper ties.

Dr. Harper's work in chemistry has been recognized widely and his reports have been published in many outstanding scientific journals. Much of his experimental work has dealt with cosmetics. At one time he revised completely the formulas of a nationally known New York cosmetics manufacturer.

Other discoveries of Dr. Harper have included utilization of the barium in mineral barite and the lowering of distillation temperature and reduction of the pressure required in the distillation of bituminous coal. He has succeeded in making the candleless plant a substitute for canaba wax in the manufacture of floor polish.

Dr. Harper has been honored by many schools and scientific societies, both in America and Europe, and he is listed among 175 outstanding chemists in Cattell's American Men of Science.

He will be replaced by Dr. Albert Perley Brogan. Dr. Brogan has been a member of the faculty at the University since 1914.

MILK TO MAKE MORE WOOL—FERRARA, Italy.—A new factory for the manufacture of artificial wool fromilk has been erected here. The factory, the second of its kind, is expected to absorb 22,000 gallons of milk a day.

### Miami Building At 10-Year High

MIAMI, Fla.—The Miami area is enjoying the biggest wave of building since 1925 in preparation for an anticipated influx of 2,500,000 visitors. Addition of approximately 6,000 housing units to accommodate tourists is revealed in a survey by J. B. Sullivan, Florida hotel commissioner.

More than 100 new apartment houses and 33 new hotels are included in the building permits issued since last April in Dade county, embracing the City of Miami and several surrounding communities, according to Sullivan. His survey shows the new apartment houses account for approximately 3,000 rooms, while the construction of residential and de luxe hotels adds an additional 2,500 units.

"The fanfare accompanying the 1923-26 Florida boom is absent from this constructive increase in building," Sullivan said. "Nevertheless, the records of the Miami building department show that the wave of residential building construction in the district since the first of the year exceeds in volume that of the first eight months of 1925."

"A total of \$5,644,878 was spent on residential construction in Miami during the first three-quarters of the year in Miami Beach, linked to Miami by two causeways across Biscayne Bay, building expenditures in the same period amounted to \$3,397,317."

Completion of a schedule of major sports events and special entertainment features in the Miami area are believed to assure the longest winter season here to date.

### Farmer Opinion On Land Use Will Be Sought at Once

COLLEGE STATION, Tex.—A state-wide campaign to determine farmer opinion on land use will be launched immediately by a committee headed by George E. Adams, assistant state agent of the Texas Extension Service. Efforts will be made to secure land use estimates from every county in the state within the next two months.

Under state committee plans, county agricultural and home demonstration councils will be asked to appoint joint committees to have charge of the work and to schedule community meetings. Farmers will be given farm plan sheets upon which to figure present usage of land on their own farms and estimate changes necessary if their land use were planned to prevent erosion and to keep up and improve soil fertility. The state committee will combine county estimates and forward a state total to the department of agriculture at Washington, D. C., for the use in connection with federal agricultural programs.

Other members of the state committee include Miss Mildred Horton, extension vice-director and state home demonstration agent; W. E. Morgan, extension specialist in agricultural planning, committee secretary; Mira Lola Blair, extension staff member; and S. A. McMillan, extension economist in farm management.

### \$6,000,000 Spent by WPA In District Of Nine Counties

FORT WORTH — Nearly \$6,000,000 in improvements have been made through the Works Progress Administration in the nine-county Fort Worth district during the past 18 months, director George L. Dickey announced. Since the WPA program was inaugurated in August, 1935, WPA has spent \$4,605,040, Dickey said. Of the federal share, \$148,129 was spent by the National Youth Administration.

Counties in the Fort Worth WPA district are Tarrant, Palo Pinto, Denton, Wise, Parker, Montague, Clay, Cooke and Jack.

### Esperanto Urged as More Than a Hobby

The 30-year-old language is used in tourist guides and railroad bulletins in many foreign countries, Bahm said. He pointed out the facility in communication of ideas in the international language, stating many Americans carry on correspondence with foreigners in the proposed international language.

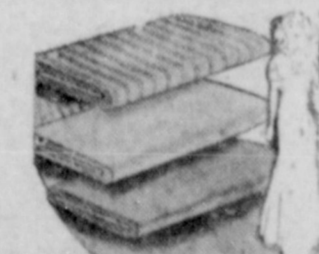

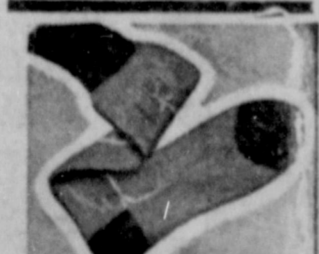

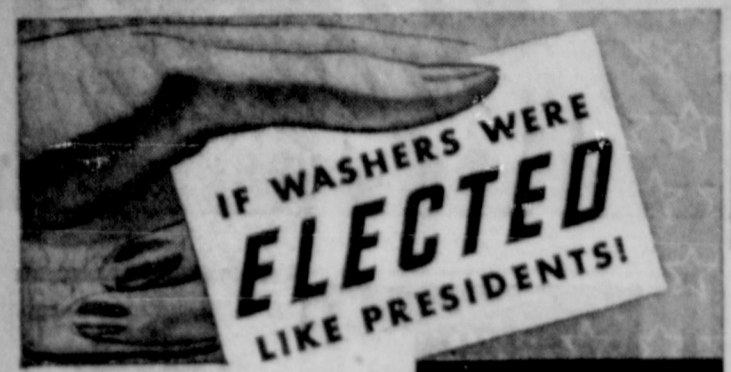
