Japan Watching Patriotic Unit

TOKYO.—Eyes of politicians today are on Col. Kingoro Hashimoto, retired, who has just formed a new political party of young

men filled with patriotic ardor. "Watch us," Hashimoto said in his first newspaper interview after the organization.

Not only the politicians but the public as well is heeding the request. Some have characterized Hashimoto as radical, others as Fascist. Hashimoto declares he is neither.

The new political figure has been Japan's military attaché in Turkey and the Soviet Union and has commanded one of the Empire's crack heavy artillery units in Manchukuo.

Nov he has retired from the army and launched a movement designed to "disseminate the imperial achievement and to build a new moral atmosphere," according to those who have studied his plans.

The public is not yet certain as to the political results that Hashimoto seeks. He is not opposed to parliamentary politics. He does not say whether his youthful party will seek seats in the Diet at the next general election.

His own statement as to party aims: "I am no mere retired soldier. I am not going to do my work as an ex-soldier. I retired from the service because I had work to do which required that I start afresh. It would be a great mistake if my work is to be considered as a side job of an army ex-serviceman. Look at the colors of the Great Japan Youth Party! White sun on red background. This symbolizes blood patriotism under a white hot sun, unbounded loyalty to the Emperor. Just watch us. Hashimoto is not one to sit still and just talk."

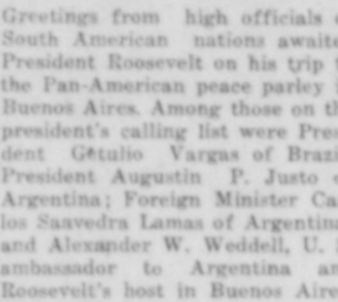

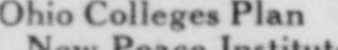

Regulations On Citrus Fruit Are Made by the AAA

McALLEN, Texas.—Regulations covering purchases of Lower Rio Grande Valley citrus fruit by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration have been announced as preparations were completed to start the purchases.

F. B. Holland of Mission is the chairman of the Valley committee. The AAA will purchase grapefruit from growers and shippers and then turn it over to the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation which will distribute it through state and federal relief organizations to needy persons.

The committee has recommended to the Administration as the most desirable fruit grading U. S. No. 3. Growers will be paid 54 cents per standard 1 3/5-bushel sack loaded in cars, of which 25 cents is allowed per sack for handling expenses. Growers, therefore, will net 29 cents per sack, or an average of \$7.50 per ton on the tree.

One important result of such purchases of the U. S. No. 3 grade fruit, it was pointed out, will be removal of large quantities of what is ordinarily known as "cull fruit" from fresh-fruit markets and possible shipment for cheap resale in such markets. The price set will also have the effect of establishing a minimum price of \$7.50 per ton for fruit going to juice and other by-products plants.

Members of the committee pointed out that Florida growers are receiving the same net price, \$7.50 per ton, for their fruit. It is expected that about \$200,000 worth of Valley fruit, or about 26,000 tons, will be purchased during the season.

Cowboy of Old West Sheds Tear Over Headstones On "Boot Hill," Recalls Famous Texas Gunmen

TASCOSA, Tex.—John Lang came back to old Tascosa, for a last look at a time faded page of the Old West's history, then he departed for his home in Haines, Ore., to spend his last days.

Tears streamed down his face as he walked among the dusty headstones on "Boot Hill" that mark the graves of his friends, killed the night of March 21, 1886, in a feud between cattle trail drivers. That fight is remembered as one of the bloodiest in range history of the Texas plains.

Lang, then a cowboy, in subsequent years joined the Alaskan gold rush, served in the army in the Philippines during the Spanish-American War, and later, was a member of the Oregon legislature.

He came back to Texas to visit the Texas Centennial Exposition, and was drawn by a vivid remembrance of his stirring youth to visit old Tascosa, now deserted save by Mrs. Mickey McCormick, whose husband lies buried in Casa Romero Cemetery nearby.

Lang told of leaving a cattle camp at Jerry Springs, that March afternoon in 1886, with three companions, to ride to Tascosa for a "spree." Frank Valley drew his six-shooter, killed a rabbit and cut off the left hind foot to keep for a luck charm.

They visited Jim East's Equity bar, Ed King, Lon Woodruff, Charley Emory and Lang emerged from the saloon and started across a street to Jess Jenkins' saloon.

A volley out in the darkness. King fell dead. Successive blasts felled Woodruff and Emory. A rifle shot ripped Lang's coat sleeve. Lang said he dodged into East's saloon and begged the bartender, Concho, to lend him a loaded revolver. Concho refused.

Frank Valley and Fred Chilton, over their drinks, were singing "Little Laughing Nell of Narragansett Bay." They stopped when they heard Lang, and dashed into the street with him.

Woodruff and Emory were gone. Only King's body lay in the street. Lang took King's pistol. Valley found the unknown assailants ambushed in an adobe building near Jenkins' saloon. He opened fire on the house. Unexpectedly someone behind a wood pile began shooting at Lang. Valley fell, seven shots in his body. The rabbit's foot charm had failed.

Lang said Fred Sheets came to the door of his restaurant and began shooting at him. Fred Chilton, who had taken his stand near Lang, returned Sheets' fire. Sheets dropped, mortally wounded.

War On Opium In China Compared to Pre-Repeal in U.S.

By United Press
NEW ORLEANS.—China's war against opium smuggling is much the same as the fight the United States waged against illicit liquor under the 18th Amendment, according to H. F. Worley, of the United States customs service, who attended the National Customs Service Association convention here.

Worley is director of the school of instruction of the customs service in Washington. In addition to teaching the 8,000-odd men and women in this nation's service, he has won world-wide recognition as an authority on customs problems. He said he has taught men from the Republic of China for the past 12 years, sent here to learn the ways of the United States. Worley may go to China soon as an instructor in the Chinese Customs academy, he revealed. He has received several proposals from the Orient for this purpose, he said.

"During prohibition," Worley said, "we used to take the students from China along with us on rum-running chases and otherwise show them the actual operation of our service. Several students come here each year and they return to instruct others."

"The opium war in China is big problem. It is tackling the problem bravely and deserves general commendation for it. This fight is somewhat similar to the United States' battle to enforce the prohibition law."

Worley has been head of the U. S. Customs Service for 38 years. When the school of instruction was organized in 1935, he became head of it. He has aided in organizing customs service in Liberia, Cuba, Santo Domingo and Haiti.

Thyroid Tested As Mental Key

CHICAGO—The thyroid gland, long associated with control of goiter, appears headed for a new responsibility—the increase of intelligence in children.

Experiments undertaken by Ralph Hinton, psychology research assistant at Northwestern University, have investigated possibilities of advancing intelligence in children above the "norm" through administration of thyroxin, secretion of the thyroid gland.

Hinton's work is an outgrowth of an earlier experimentation series in which he established a relation between intelligence of children and their rate of growth—"metabolic rate."

In computing mental development, Hinton has used scores made on standard intelligence tests by groups of children chosen at random. Groups were tested, their scores recorded, and administration of thyroxin begun. After the period of treatment they were given another standard examination. Results showed considerable improvement in every case.

Penney Officials Declare Dividend Of Extra Amount

At a meeting of the board of directors of the J. C. Penney company held Nov. 24, a dividend of \$1 per share on the common stock was declared for the quarter ending December 31.

At the same time an extra dividend of \$3.75 per share was declared. Both are payable Dec. 15, to stockholders of record at the close of business Dec. 4.

The board of directors also approved the payment of a special Christmas bonus for associates of the company. This bonus will equal two weeks pay for employees in the stores, offices and warehouses of the company who have been regularly employed for over one year, and a proportionate amount for those employed for shorter periods.

Mr. E. C. Sams, president of this company, stated that this is not a payment on any permanent plan, but is additional remuneration for loyalty and service that have played a part in making this the greatest year in the history of the Penney company. The number of employees affected will be somewhat in excess of 25,000.

On Friday, Nov. 20, at a special meeting of the stockholders of the J. C. Penney company, the stockholders approved the company's proposal to issue and to sell to qualified associates of the company, at the discretion of the board of directors, 150,000 shares of common stock of which not more than one half will be offered in any one year.

Man's Ability to Stand Thirst Tested

MINNEAPOLIS—Experiments at the University of Michigan medical school have shown that a man can do without water until he has lost 6 per cent of his body weight.

According to Dr. Frederick A. Collier, an average adult, weighing 170 pounds, would lose 10.5 pounds of water in 6 per cent of his body weight.

Political Appointments Again Make Capitol Buzz With Speculation

AUSTIN—Governor James V. Allred will not make a fight against re-appointment of Dr. J. W. Brown as state health officer, Capitol Dome has learned from a reliable source.

Brown's appointment dates back to the administration of Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. The legislature in 1932 changed the state health law by adding three members to the State Board of Health. These were appointed by Governor Ferguson. The board re-elected Dr. J. A. Anderson, appointed by Governor Dan Moody, to serve until Jan. 1, 1935, and then made Brown health officer. The board re-elected Brown in December before Allred took office in January.

The appointment at that time prevented Allred-appointed members of the Board of Health from having a voice in the selection of the health officer. Allred then was opposed to Brown.

The State Board of Health will make its appointment again this December. A recommendation for Dr. Brown's re-appointment has been made by the executive council of the state medical association.

Prominent physicians who are close friends of Governor Allred and his political supporters have urged Dr. Brown's retention. In Allred's first administration they had little success in combating his opposition. The governor vetoed a large item of the Health Department appropriation that would have been under Dr. Brown's supervision. As a result there has been much speculation as to whether Governor Allred's new appointments on the State Board of Health would be used in opposition to Dr. Brown. The Governor, however, will not seek to remove him, it was learned.

Reports of changes in state departments for the new year have kept the capital agog recently. One of the reports is that the State Railroad Commission may vary from its usual custom of rotating the chairmanship and may re-elect Chairman Ernest O. Thompson for another two years. Confirmation was lacking from commission members. The commission elects its chairman in December to take office in January.

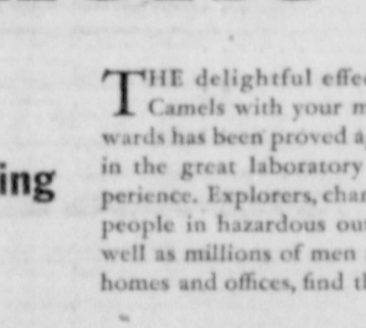

Radio Played Big Part In Centennial Central Exposition

Radio played a unique role in the Texas Centennial Central Exposition which closed at midnight Sunday, November 29. The exposition was officially opened June 6 with an international round-the-world broadcast over a network of 103 stations. This program, produced by the Centennial radio staff, was relayed through the facilities of the Gulf radio studios and the Gulf Centennial network on the exposition grounds. The exposition officially closed Sunday midnight with a broadcast of the actual clicking of the turnstiles when the last visitor went through the gates and a round robin pick-up from several points on the grounds. The significance of the \$200,000 Gulf radio and public address facilities as a means of advertising Dallas, the Centennial, and the State of Texas is shown by figures released by Robert C. Colson, who was in charge of production at the Centennial studios. After the exposition opened on June 6, 2,513 live talent programs originated on the exposition grounds and were made available through the facilities provided by the Gulf Oil to local, sectional and national networks.

AUSTIN — Poultry shipments from Texas to interstate points were almost negligible during October, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported. Only three cars of Texas chickens and two cars of turkeys were forwarded from the

state. Yet even this amount was greater than the two cars shipped out during October last year. Egg shipments to out-of-state points totaled eighteen, against 28 during October last year.

Receipts of eggs from other states totaled 29 during October. Of these, seven cars came from Kansas, twelve from Missouri, two from Oklahoma, six from Nebraska and two from California.

A Truly Great Woman Has Passed Away

What you do may be fine, important, spectacular. But what you are, in the long run, has a way of speaking more loudly. Your character has the last word, every time.

That is why so many people in this country felt a real, personal sorrow at the news that Ernestine Schumann-Heink was dead.

She had been a great singer—but we have had many great singers, whose passing did not make us feel that the world had lost a precious personality. Above and beyond her vocal talent, Madame Schumann-Heink was a great woman. She would have been a great woman without her ability to sing.

For here was a woman who had traveled the wide range of human experience to the full, knowing all that it could bring to her of sorrow and of triumph, and who had somehow managed to preserve that fundamental innocence, that eager lightness of heart, that is ageless and timeless—that quality which, according to our Gospels, is of the essence of the Kingdom of Heaven.

As a young woman, struggling to rise in that toughest of competition, the grand opera stage, she took all the bumps any aspiring musician can take.

She knew poverty, dire discouragement, caustic rebuffs. She was even turned down for a role, once, on the ground that she was not pretty enough—and grand opera's standards of feminine charm, Heaven knows, are exceedingly elastic.

All this she took without becoming embittered or cynical. She won success, at last, became world-famous, acquired riches—a good part of which she promptly spent on friends and relatives, for she had, as they say, a heart as big as all outdoors. And success was no more able to poil her than was bad fortune.

And then came the war. She had a son in the kaiser's army; he was killed in action. She had another son in the American army, fighting the kaisers army; he, too, was killed in action. The agony of grief, doubt, and divided loyalty that this must have caused her was never visible.

She toured the American training camps, sang for the soldiers over and over again with that rich, golden contralto of hers, and became a shining example of the selfless patriotism of which an American of foreign birth can be capable.

Now there is a good deal more in all this than the story of a person of genius bringing that genius to flower. It is the story of a human being licking fate to a frazzle; of a person who met all of life's varied experiences and emerged unspoil, unstained, triumphant in the only way that human triumph has meaning.

We can forget Schumann-Heink the singer. Schumann-Heink the person will be an inspiration as long as we live.

Education of the State's Motorists Is New Safety Plan

AUSTIN, Tex.—Inauguration of an extensive drive to educate present and future motorists in the state have been announced by the State Department of Public Safety.

In connection with this drive the department said that during the past two months uniformed members of the patrol have spoken before more than 75,000 persons, including school students and civic club members in every section of the state.

Appearance of uniformed patrolmen, the safety department said, has a more lasting effect on the students than that of a civilian. Students are encouraged to ask questions directly concerning the subject of safety and enforcement problems. School rooms are chosen for many of the lectures, the program directors reported, because they are contacting the future drivers of the state and nation.

In connection with the lectures safety literature is left with the instructors for further classroom consideration. Additional data is furnished from time to time for this type of study.

Another phase which has gained wide popularity, the department said, is the formation of schoolboy patrols and safety councils.

The program simply seeks to insure that all new drivers have at least a fundamental knowledge of traffic relating to personal safety, the department said.

TEXAS 4-H'ER WINS \$200 SCHOLARSHIP

MEET the champion 4-H livestock boy of the southern states, J. D. Jordan, 15, of Mason, Texas. Each year since his 1918 he fed and showed baby beavers. His prizes on the 49 head he raised total \$1,116.84, and his sales return \$4,250.13. For this record and his work as assistant leader and other activities he was awarded second national honors by club leaders in the seventh Thomas E. Wilson annual contest, and prizes including a \$200 cash college scholarship presented at the 15th National Club Congress in Chicago. The boy had won state honors in 1934 but was too young to qualify for higher awards. This year's state award fell to Carl Martin, 15, Menard County, who fed 31 baby beavers in five years, winning \$224.77 in prizes and returning proceeds of \$1,167.22.



Duck Trot Line Enrages Warden

FORT WORTH — For several years a city ordinance has prohibited local hunters from shooting ducks at Lake Worth, near Fort Worth.

This fall, one duck-killer circumvented that law by catching ducks on a trot line. A regulation 450-foot trot line was set in a shallow part of the lake, its hooks baited with grains of corn. The ducks swallowed the corn and the hook and drowned within a few minutes.

The cruelty of the plan so enraged Lake Officer Walter Hale that he watched the line for 48 hours, but nobody ever came to inspect the trap. Only one duck was caught in that time. The trap then was removed and destroyed.

Hale searched the statutes and found there was no law against catching ducks—merely against shooting them. He did find that federal and state regulations prohibited trapping of ducks with cruel tactics.

Autograph Needed To Get a Pension Science Hailed As An Atheism Cure

AUSTIN—The Texas Old Age Assistance Commission is starting an autograph collection which will eventually contain more than 88,000 signatures, Acting Director Orville S. Carpenter said today.

Washington officials told Carpenter that the federal government wanted the Texas commission to have a signature card upon each assistance recipient. The purpose of the collection is to provide federal auditors a method of checking endorsements written on the back of the pension warrants when cashed, and to assist them in verifying the eligibility of each person. However, the cards will be kept in file by the Texas commission.

It was estimated by the statistical division of the commission that this new requirement would necessitate approximately 300,000 extra hours of labor by investigators in addition to the work being done re-investigating recipients and investigating new applications.

People now upon the assistance rolls will be brought cards to sign during the next sixty days, Carpenter stated. He stressed the fact that even present recipients eligible under the "necessitous circumstances" requirement of the new law would be asked to sign cards.

SOUTH BEND—Deeper scientific knowledge is the world's best defense against atheism, according to Dr. Arthur E. Haas, former professor of physics at the University of Vienna, Austria, now a member of the University of Notre Dame faculty.

The rapid strides of science during the last 25 years, he said, has dispelled the 19th Century attitude of many scientists who scoffed at the idea of God, the creator.

"Now most real scientists realize that there are many inexplicable phenomena—so far as science is concerned—that belong to the realm of spiritual things and that can be attributed to God alone," he said.

"Few real scientists in the world today are conceited enough to feel that they can explain the existence of the universe without admitting the existence of the deity."

Two winners of many honors in the agricultural department of the tenth County Fair at Eastland, Sept. 16-19, took places Tuesday in the International Grain Show at Chicago.

A kaffir entry of Albert Schoor of Cisco took sixth place and Wayne Thurman, also of Cisco, places eighth.

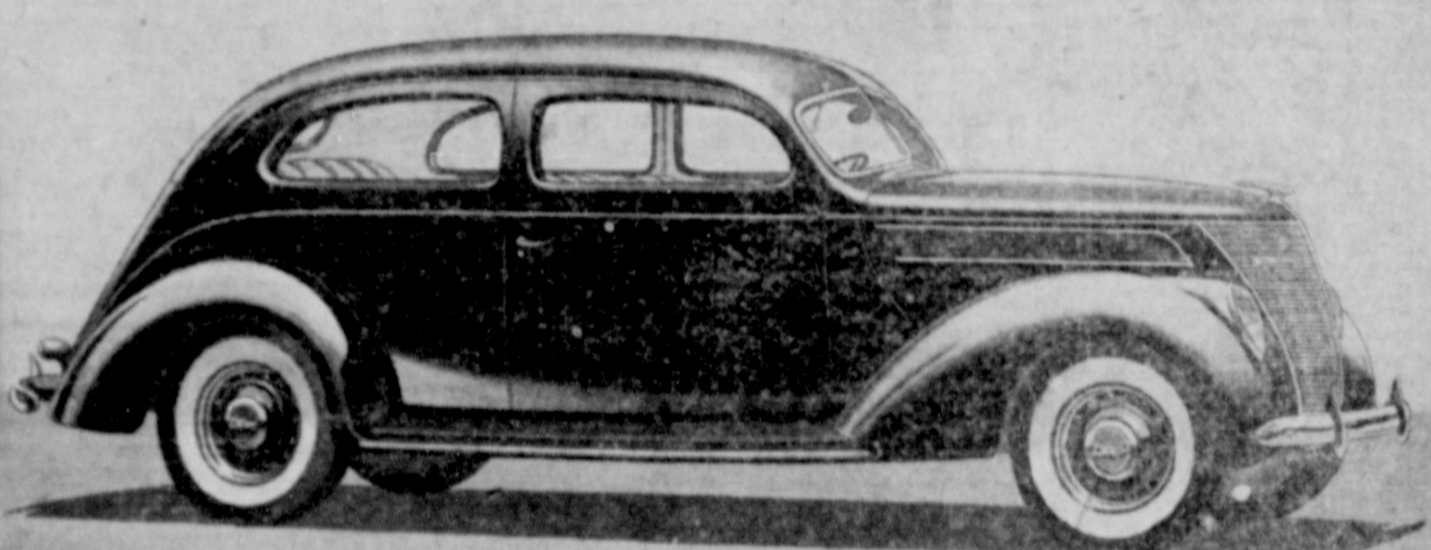

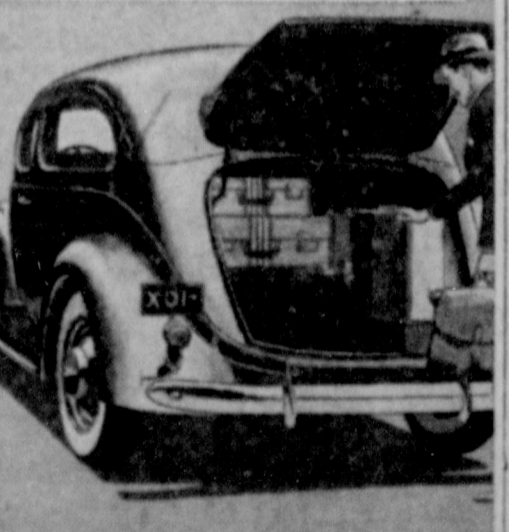

Japan Watching Patriotic Unit

TOKYO.—Eyes of politicians today are on Col. Kingoro Hashimoto, retired, who has just formed a new political party of young men filled with patriotic ardor.

"Watch us," Hashimoto said in his first newspaper interview after the organization.

Not only the politicians but the public as well is heeding the request.

Some have characterized Hashimoto as radical, others as Fascist. Hashimoto declares he is neither.

The new political figure has been Japan's military attache in Turkey and the Soviet Union and has commanded one of the Empire's crack heavy artillery units in Manchukuo.

Now he has retired from the army and launched a movement designed to "disseminate the imperial achievement and to build a new moral atmosphere," according to those who have studied his plans.

The public is not yet certain as to the political results that Hashimoto seeks. He is not opposed to parliamentary politics. He does not say whether his youthful party will seek seats in the Diet at the next general election.

His own statement as to party aims:

"I am no mere retired soldier. I am not going to do my work as an ex-soldier. I retired from the service because I had work to do which required that I start afresh. It would be a great mistake if my work is to be considered as a side-job of an army ex-serviceman. Look at the colors of the Great Japan Youth Party!—White sun on red background. This symbolizes blooded patriotism under a white hot sun, unbounded loyalty to the Emperor. Just watch us. Hashimoto is not one to sit still and just talk."

Neither the names nor the number of founding members have been announced to date.

U. S. Delegates To Peace Meeting Widely Chosen

WASHINGTON — The delegation sent by the United States to the Inter-American Conference for Maintenance of Peace is regarded here as concrete evidence of an attempt on the part of the Roosevelt administration to interest all groups in this country in the cause of peace.

The membership of the delegation has been drawn from quarters representing not alone official Washington but also from those associated with Catholic, and Jewish organizations, labor, and women's groups.

Strictly speaking the official representation is lodged in Secretary of State Cordell Hull, Assistant Secretary of State Sumner Welles and Alexander Weddell, U. S. Ambassador to Argentina.

Weddell has represented the Roosevelt administration as Ambassador to Argentina since Mr. Roosevelt took office. He is a political appointee from Virginia. He is considered here to have served this country in Buenos Aires with tact and distinction.

Adolf Berle, Jr., was one of the original "brain trusters" who carried the Roosevelt banner in the early days of the New Deal. Of late he has been Chamberlain of New York City in the "cabinet" of Mayor La Guardia. He is an authority on corporation law. His appointment on the delegation is regarded here as a reward for services to the New Deal.

Michael Francis Doyle, prominent Irish-American lawyer of Philadelphia was originally selected as representative of Catholic groups. Doyle defended Sir Roger Casement in the famous Irish treason trial. He was a close friend of Eamon de Valera, and later helped to write the constitution of the Irish Free State. He is regarded as an authority on international law.

Prof. Charles G. Fenwick of Bryn Mawr College has long been associated with Catholic enterprises. He is regarded as an authority on neutrality legislation and in the past has shown a marked partisan attitude in favor of the League of Nations. High church officials have high regard for his personality and ability.

Alexander F. Whitney, the seventh member of the delegation, comes from the ranks of labor. He is president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and has long supported peace movements. He is an advocate of government control of the manufacture of munitions, and conscription of wealth in wartime.

Mrs. Burton Musser of Salt Lake City was supported for a place on the delegation by peace groups among women's organizations. She is a member of the Utah Senate and has been prominent in social service work in Salt Lake City, especially with the foreign population resident there. She is credited with having been largely instrumental in obtaining passage of the constitutional amendment prohibiting child labor by the Utah Legislature after that body had first defeated the measure. She is an accomplished linguist, speaking French, Spanish, German and Italian and reading Portuguese easily.

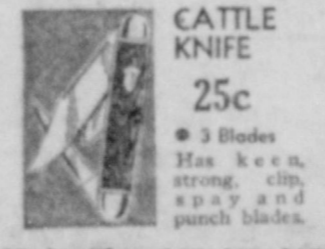
