Offices Designated To Give Data On Social Security

SAN ANTONIO—Persons in and near the cities of Dallas, Austin, and San Antonio, Texas; New Orleans, Louisiana, and Albuquerque, New Mexico, were requested today to direct questions about the Social Security Act to field offices of the Social Security Board located in those cities.

Oscar M. Powell, regional director for the States of Louisiana, New Mexico and Texas, said utilization of these field offices by the people of their respective territories will result in faster service on requests for information.

"These offices," Powell said, "are equipped to provide general information concerning the Social Security Act; however, tax titles of the act are administered by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, and all requests for interpretations of tax provisions of the act should be directed in the case of old age benefits taxes to the Miscellaneous Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., and in the case of unemployment compensation taxes to the Income Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C."

"All inquiries about state unemployment compensation laws, including tax questions, should be directed from Texas firms and individuals to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, Austin, Texas; and from Louisiana firms or individuals to the State Commissioner of Labor, at Baton Rouge, Louisiana. New Mexico does not have an unemployment compensation law."

For those desiring to make personal calls, the newly established field offices of the board are located in Texas at 1530 Alton Building, Dallas; Old Federal Building, Austin; 1901 Smith-Young Tower Building, San Antonio; in Louisiana at 720 Hibernia Bank Building, New Orleans, and in New Mexico at Federal Building, Albuquerque.

while some \$14,000,000 was spent on projects unrelated to roads. Declaring it is inevitable that the motorist should begin to wonder whether he hasn't been paying too much for gasoline taxes, the Oklahoma Congressman expresses the opinion that the motorist will get what he wants if he keeps informed about road matters and insists that his state adopt and execute a rational highway plan, for he has the whole highway-transportation industry behind him.

Pointing to the fact that a number of states have taken legal measures to protect highway funds by prohibiting diversion, and that a referendum bill in Maine prohibiting diversion was passed by an overwhelming majority at the last election, he says: "Motorists elsewhere are bound to win out eventually because their cause is right in fact and by official sanction. Diversion of highway funds—always unfair, always illegal—is being outlawed state by state."

Old Age Assistance Office Is Opened at The Courthouse

Texas Old Age Assistance Commission will open a sub-office for Eastland County on Friday, Dec. 18th on the second floor of Court House. This office will be open every Friday thereafter except Christmas and New Year's day.

An investigator will be in the office each Friday and persons desiring to make application for Old Age Assistance should come to sub-office at Eastland and have investigator fill out their applications. By order from State office all applications must be filled out by an investigator.

In making applications, if applicant owns any real estate, they should know Abstract Number Survey, Lot and Block number and number of acres owned. Cost of same, present value and indebtedness, if any, and State and County rendition for taxes.

If they have sold any property in the last three years they must be able to give legal description of same from whom purchased, to whom sold and amount received or same.

They should also bring an itemized statement of all 1935-36 income, whether it be cash or other-

wise. On Friday applicants can get information concerning their applications, and it will not be necessary for them to call at homes of investigators for this information unless absolutely necessary as he will be busy with investigations on other days.

All information and records that are in the hands of investigators at present will be kept in the sub-office, and not at homes of investigators.

In the near future, a record of all Eastland county cases will be kept in the files of the sub-office at Eastland.

Too Warm House Is Winter Hazard

AUSTIN—It is an illogical fact that many people complain about the heat of Texas summers and yet sit indoors during the winter months in a temperature about as high as that about which they complained in the summer season, in the view of Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

"If the average person would realize the definite hazard in developing and maintaining an indoor temperature above 70 degrees, or at most 72 degrees, when the outside thermometer registers around freezing," he said, "there would be fewer colds, less bronchial conditions, and less pneumonia than there is today.

"Fresh air is one of the body's basic needs and no amount of luxury or artificial pleasure can be substituted for it. It may be a comfortable feeling to be warm, especially with the consciousness of the tough weather outdoors, but it is quite another matter to achieve this comfort at the probable cost of health.

"Winters in the Temperate Zone are sufficiently trying upon the human system with their sudden and sharp temperature changes, without adding to the burden by making a hothouse of one's home. Of course, colds and other respiratory affections can be acquired in many different ways, but one of the easiest methods of becoming victims of such hazards is the overheated house.

"To become overheated and perspire, though the latter condition may not be perceived, and in this softened state to brave the cold winter blasts, is to take a thoroughly unwarranted chance with your health.

"The wise householder therefore will check up on his artificial heat problem. He will resolve to keep his thermometer within safe limits."

Teachers of State Approve NYA Plan

AUSTIN.—The Texas State Teachers Association at its annual convention in Fort Worth commended the National Youth Administration for its good work and praised Lyndon B. Johnson, the state director, for his efficiency and cooperation with school and college executives and teachers.

In cooperation with school officials, the NYA has enabled 16,503 students to continue in school. The NYA has supplied funds through its Educational Aid Division, headed by J. C. Kollam, assistant state director, for part-time employment of 10,221 students in 2,119 Texas elementary and high schools at wages not exceeding \$6 a month and for part-time employment of 6,282 students in 87 colleges and universities at wages averaging \$15 a month. These students work on socially desirable projects under direction of local school officials.

Marvin Hall Has Risen Politically In the Past Year

AUSTIN — Though comparatively unknown a year ago, the name of Marvin Hall was familiar to many of Texans who read that he had been promoted to the office of State Tax Commissioner by Governor Allred.

He forged to the front last summer as the manager of the Governor's landslide campaign for re-nomination. Much of the credit for the Governor's sweeping first primary victory went to the 37-year-old attorney.

Hall was far from being unversed in the strategy of ballot wooing when he reached the stature of a state figure in the Allred campaign. His school was the Rio Grande Valley, where it is learned the hard way.

Mild-mannered and quiet-spoken, the new Tax Commissioner has successively been farm boy, college student, teacher, lawyer, county official and so to the state office which he now holds.

Within the past year Hall has also distinguished himself as an administrator of rare ability. He managed the set-up and was personnel director of the State Tax Survey, financed by WPA and reputedly the largest "white collar" project of its kind in the U.S.A. This survey was administered under the Tax Board.

Bloodhounds Are Worse Than Guns Fugitive Claims

FORT WORTH — G-men can have their machine-guns, but one suspect prefers that a yelping pack of bloodhounds at his heels.

Haunted by the memory of bloodhounds used by secret service agents in searching the Brazos river bottoms near Cleburne, Thomas Moore surrendered to a federal counterfeiting charge two days after the chase had begun. Bloodhounds led officers in a successful hunt for one brother, Leonard, but Thomas Moore swam the river and escaped.

"I had two days along the river," said Thomas Moore when arraigned before the federal commissioner in Fort Worth. "But even when I was asleep, I seemed to hear those dogs yelling. I'd rather run from a machine-gun any time than to have those hounds after me. They stay with you."

The two brothers were charged with manufacturing spurious coins at their farm home near Cleburne.

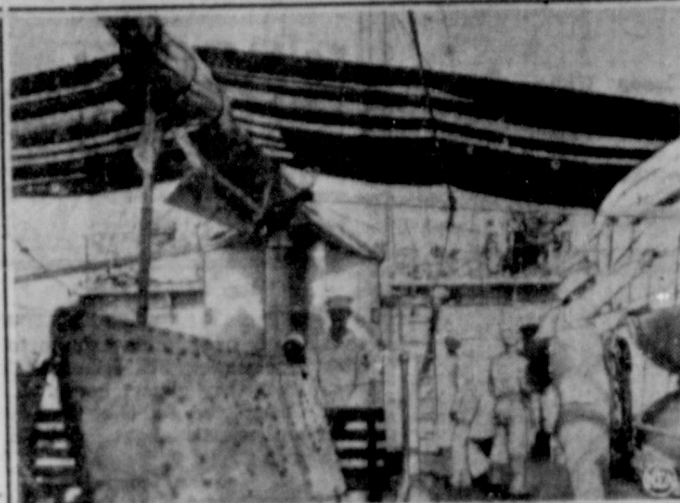
Motor Patrolman Teaches Safety to Children In School

AUSTIN.—Motor Patrol Sergeant G. E. Schauer looks unlike an orator but he talks to a larger and more critical audience than any other Texan. Anyone who has answered the questions of one child will agree that Schauer must know his stuff in talking to more than a million school children in the state about traffic.

Schauer uses nothing to attract the children's attention, other than his appearance in the regulation motor patrolman's uniform. He talks to them directly about what causes accidents.
