



Christmas Seal Purchases Should Not Be Finished

AUSTIN - "The purchase of Christmas Seals should never be allowed to become 'Unfinished business,' 'said H. A. Wroe treasurer of the Texas Tuberculosis Association in a statement made yesterday urging a prompt response to the seal sale now in progress. "The work of the national, state and local tuberculosis association is necessary for our protection from this disease and must be called on. There can be only one question for each person to ask before answering this appeal, that is, 'Can I afford to buy my seals?' Very few can say 'No" to

Mr. Wroe continued: "Prevention of tuberculosis is cheaper than cure. The people of Texas know that the work of the tuberplosis associations not only protects them indivdiually but also greatly lowers the death rate and greatly decreases the cost from this disease which they pay for through taxes. They know that the money they pay for Christmas Seals is repaid them many times over through actual savings made in the successful battle against tuberculosis.

"The number of people still dy-ing every day in Texas from tuber-culosis would be three times as great if the death rate of thirty years ago had continued. Money spent for Christmas Seals has helped greatly to reduce the death rate. If we continue our program of prevention, greater reductions can be made.'





There has been a good deal of talk about the "collapse of civilization" which another war would bring. That collapse would not come through the physical destruction of towns, factories, and transportation systems, or through the mere total of violent deaths. I would come through this resort to barbarism, of which the assault on Madrid is so glaring a nexample.

For a world which fights like this is not civilized. It is on a level with the ancient world in which Assyrian armies put the inhabitants to the sword after capturing a city. The only difference would be that the modern world put them to the sword before capturing the city, not afterward.

And beyond all that-how insane this rebel proceduce is, anyway! The rebels hope to govern Spain, someday. Madrid is Spain's greatest city. How can they hope to get anything remotely resembling loyalty, or even tolerance, from a city they have repeatedly bombed? Human premories are not so short as all that.

The war in Spain may end in rebel victory, and it may not. That, at the moment, is not the point.

The point is that a savagery has been loosed which, if not disavowed and discarded by the conscience of mankind, means the beginning of the end of European civiliza-






