THE HISTORY OF Parmer County is currently being compiled by the Parmer County Historical Association, which is preparing to publish such a history, and make the book available to all who are interested in preserving the history of Parmer County.

Now comes Nelson Lewis, who has been doing special research on behalf of the County Historical Association, making a plea for more information about the Bovina area in particular.

Lewis says he has a fair amount of material on Friona and Farwell, but that he has very little yet about Bovina and Oklahoma Lane. He is anxious for every community in the county to have its fair representation in the county history book, and he invites any local history buffs to contact him.

The county historian would particularly like to gain information on Bovina's big fire of 1921, which destroyed most of the town. Also, he is anxious to get information about the early schools and churches.

Lewis is also desperate for any old photographs that might be loaned for use in the county history book. "We're having trouble coming up with any old pictures at all," Lewis said this week, hoping that some oldtimers might come to his rescue in this regard.

If you would like for your family's history as far as Parmer County is concerned, to be included in the book, you should contact Lewis.

WE READ in Sunday's Lubbock paper that this area is now in the midst of its longest dry spell since 1911. This won't come as much of a surprise to those of you who have been attempting to get your land ready for planting.

Since August, Lubbock has recorded only 2.08 inches of moisture—a six month period. Normally, you could expect around eight inches of moisture for that same six-month period.

The article went on to say that since April of 1973, only one month (July) produced at least a normal amount of rainfall.

In Lubbock, for the months of November, December and February (as of February 24), only a trace of moisture had been received for those months. It has been very little different on the local scene.

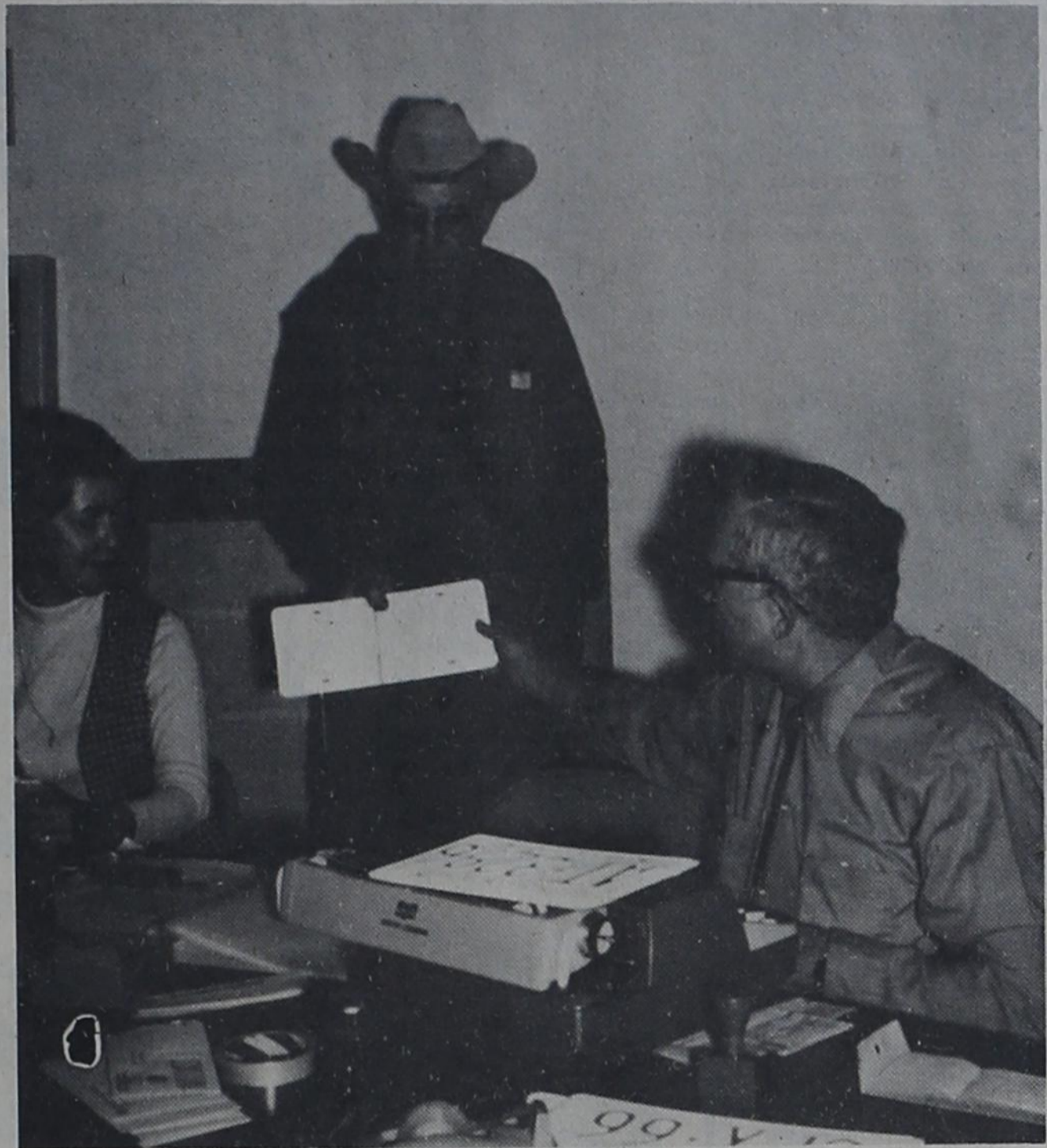
ANOTHER ARTICLE along this same line, put out by an area Soil Conservation official, hinted that the High Plains of Texas could be heading for another "Dust Bowl Era."

J.C. Brown of Hereford says that the conditions for such an era are present. He points out that past records show the southern Plains of the United States having a major drought about once every 20 years since the area was settled by farmers in the 1880s.

Records also show and many remember the "Dirty 30s," when a severe drought lasted from 1931 through 1938. Normal rainfall conditions returned generally from 1940 through 1949 and most forgot about the "Dirty 30s" and thought they would never return.

But in the early 1950s, severe drought conditions again hit this area and lasted until 1957 when rains came to break the drought. However, our SCS expert reminds that rains did not come before severe erosion occurred from Colorado and Nebraska deep into Texas and New Mexico.

"If records mean anything, the area is due for another prolonged drought. Certainly

School Week Slated Here

Bovina Schools will join other schools across the state in observing Texas Public Schools Week March 4-8 with an invitation to school district patrons to visit the school and to have lunch in the school cafeteria Wednesday.

A change from previous years has been made for the 1974 event, however, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs. No open house will be held during the week because of the flu epidemic, which has caused a higher percentage of absentee in the Bovina Schools, and because of the energy crisis, Jacobs said.

Jacobs said that parents, especially, are invited to come to the school anytime during next week to visit with teachers and ask any questions they might have concerning public education.

Visitors' special day to have lunch in the cafeteria will be Wednesday. Cost will be 60 cents per person. The cafeteria staff is planning for a larger than usual group of visitors to be on hand that day.

School Board Race Draws 5 Candidates

Five candidates have been petitioned on the ballot for three positions on the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District.

Submitted by petition Tuesday were the names of Leon Ware, Jon Lin Riddle, Gaylon

Rhodes, Leon Schilling and James Clayton.

Ware and Riddle will be candidates for re-election. Ware is completing a three-year term on the board this year. Riddle was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the

resignation of Lawrence Jamerson in August of '73. His term also expires this year. Rhodes, Schilling and Clayton are newcomers to school politics.

Ware, Riddle, Schilling and Clayton are farmers. Rhodes is manager of Agri-Sprayers, Inc.

A community farm sale, sponsored by the Bovina Jaycees, has been scheduled for Saturday, March 30, according to an announcement from Ken Horn, president of the organization.

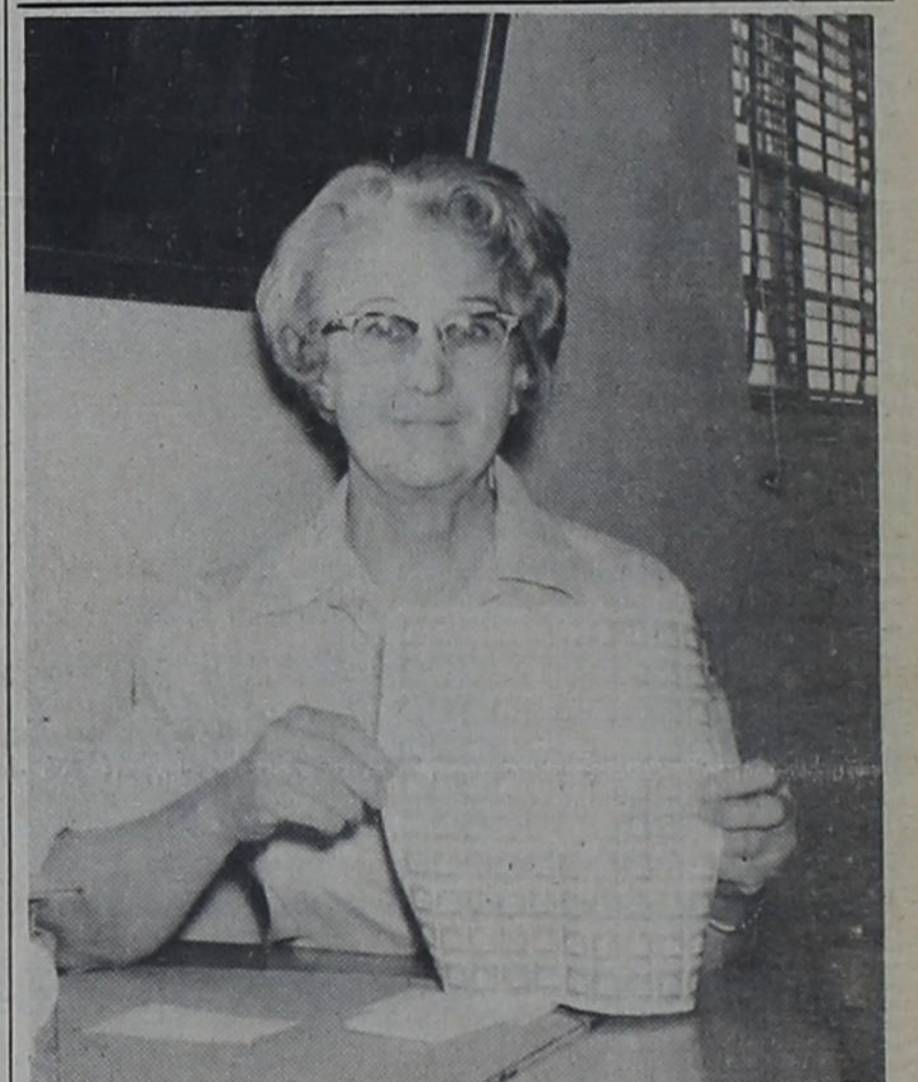
The sale will be held at the Bovina Gin yard.

Postage Rate Increase Due

Come Saturday morning, it will cost more to mail a letter than ever before.

Postage on a first class letter will increase from the present eight cents to 10 cents, Flossie Rhinehart, assistant postmaster, announces.

Charge for an air mail letter will increase from 11 to 13 cents.

A post card, which could be mailed for a penny years ago, will now cost eight cents, up

two pennies from the present six cent rate.

In addition to the rate increase for first class mail, charges for some second, third and fourth class mail will be raised.

Ten cent stamps are expected to replace the eight-center as the most popular for postal patrons to purchase beginning Saturday morning.

The last postage increase was in May, 1971.

GATES READY

Trains To Up Speeds Friday

Santa Fe Railway has completed installation of new crossing gates at the Third Street Crossing in Bovina, and plans to resume "normal" speed of its trains through the city, according to an announcement this week from Santa Fe's Amarillo office.

In an agreement with the City of Bovina and Mayor Johnnie Horn, the railroad had for the past several months, been reducing the speed of trains through Bovina to around 40 miles per hour, until such time as the new gates were installed.

Beginning at 12:01 Friday morning, train speed through town will be the train's "normal" speed—which is up to 70 miles per hour.

The gates have been fully tested, and should provide an adequate warning to automotive traffic which crosses the railroad.

"Hopefully, the gates will provide an adequate reminder that train traffic is approaching," stated Herman Hill, public relations official for Santa Fe.

Without the gates, people who cross the track every day

Small Crowd Hears Speakers On Poison

Only a handful of Parmer County residents were present at a Poison Control meeting Monday night at the Bovina Methodist Church, but those attending heard a number of facts and figures about poison that were surprising and shocking to say the least.

The most startling fact presented by Mrs. Emily Earthman, R.N., and Mrs. Dorothy Robertson, R.N., was the fact that "plain old" aspirin heads the list of toxic substances and is responsible for over 500 deaths each year in the United States with the number of incidences increasing yearly, particularly in the infant age group.

Mrs. Earthman teaches pediatric nursing at Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing in Amarillo. Mrs. Robertson is the head nurse in the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center at Northwest Hospital and works with the Poison Control Center at the hospital.

Through slide presentations, examples and case histories, Mrs. Earthman told those attending that 90 per cent of all poison cases involve children. Broken down, the figures show that 77.4 per cent involve children under five, 10 per cent involve adults and 2.6 per cent involve youngsters five through teenagers.

"Aspirin heads the list of all toxic substances with drugs of all kinds responsible for over 50 per cent of poisoning cases," Mrs. Earthman stated.

Other dangerous products she listed included camphor, chlorine bleach, disinfectants, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene, lighter fluids, acids, insecticides, iodine, lye products, oil of wintergreen, paint, pine oil, rubbing alcohol, turpentine and washing soda.

Mrs. Earthman pointed out that 41 per cent of the accidents occur in the kitchen, 21 per cent in the bathroom, 12 per cent in the bedroom and 26 per cent in other areas of the home.

Mrs. Earthman stated that although discipline was the most important factor in teaching young children to avoid dangerous products, other precautionary measures should be taken including purchasing special locks that children cannot open.

The highest instances of poisonings occur, she said, in the two to three year old group, the second highest in the one to two year old group and the third highest from three to four years old. The lowest occurred in infants under one, however, incidences are "increasing today as a result of therapeutic overdose of drugs, primarily aspirin," she stated.

"Infants up to the age of one are most likely to swallow substances which they find at floor or low levels and are more frequent victims of poisoning by pesticides, solvents, bleaches and a variety of cleaning and polishing agents," she commented. Mrs. Earthman noted that such products are most commonly stored beneath the kitchen sink and in lower cabinet areas.

Pointing out the dangers of aspirin, Mrs. Earthman said, "Aspirin accumulates in the system and if the child does not drink enough liquids, the accumulation will cause kidney failure, which may result in death." She said many doctors advise never giving aspirin to children and said that other less dangerous and more effective products are on the market today.

In follow-up comments, Mrs. Robertson said that prevention is the main emphasis at the Poison Control Center. She emphasized that the center gives information on the treatment of poison cases and may be contacted at any time for information on the subject.

"Parents may call the center for advice if they believe their child may have swallowed a poisonous substance and doctors may call for specific information on how to treat some poison cases they may not be familiar with," she said. For any type information, she told the audience, the center may be contacted by phoning 376-4431 in Amarillo. The center may be reached anytime during the day or night.

Mrs. Robertson reported that the Amarillo hospital had treated 380 poison cases in 1972 with one fatality recorded, a teenage girl who had taken an overdose of drugs. She said that most of those cases were in Amarillo proper and their statistics did not include patients treated at other Amarillo hospitals or at a physician's office. She noted, also, that the statistics did not include a follow-up on patients transferred from the Northwest emergency room to other hospitals in the city or area.

Pointing out that the majority of adult poison cases were intentional, she noted that some are accidental for a varied number of reasons. Mrs. Robertson said that there are approximately 250,000 products on the market which may be toxic in one form or another.

Concluding her remarks, she stated that "The sooner treatment begins, the better chances are for recovery," noting that over 90 per cent of the poison cases treated do recover.

HARVEY FLOYD ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY AS STATE REPRESENTATIVE

Primary among our problems is inflation, which affects us all. There is an existing need in Texas for additional revenue to meet the demands of inflated prices. I believe our proposal can sufficiently increase state revenue and at the same time avoid a state income tax and increased state property taxes on property, etc.

Crude oil produced in the United States is priced at approximately \$4.50 a barrel. Texas taxes crude oil on a basis of about \$3.71 per barrel. State tax on oil is 4.6 per cent at the well plus a 3-16c per barrel pipeline tax giving a total of under 20c per barrel state revenue from oil.

Texas collected approximately \$210 million from this source in the fiscal year ended August 31. Revision of the state's taxation program of crude oil would greatly increase this revenue source.

An even more urgent need is revision of the state program taxing natural gas. Texas collected \$125 million in taxes in the latest fiscal year on \$1.8 billion paid for natural gas produced in Texas. Much of this gas goes to other states where it serves as cheap fuel.

Natural gas in Texas is taxed at 7.4 per cent of its wellhead value. Many contracts were made, and are still in force, which sell gas at price ceilings imposed by the Federal Power Commission with a base tax on Texas-produced gas at 16c per thousand cubic feet. Current market value is 75c per thousand or more. A consumer buying gas at 16c per thousand pays state tax of 1.2c while the buyer of 75c gas pays 5.6c tax.

This present percentage system of taxation is unfair to the buyer paying high prices and favors those who pay the least for gas at the well. With action from the state and cooperation from the Federal Power Commission in changing from a percentage tax to a flat-rate of taxing natural gas, the taxing system would be equalized and would create an untapped source of state revenue.

The above proposal is but one I have to suggest. If elected, I pledge to serve you on the district level as your needs from the local level are communicated to me from you. By working together, I believe I can represent you well. I solicit your support and influence in the upcoming election.

Inform Farmers How To Get Fuel

Clarification of procedures for farmers and ranchers to use in filing forms for fuel allocations were issued recently by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, Regional Administrator for the Southwest Region of the Federal Energy Office (FEO).

"First of all I want to emphasize that the farmer should make every effort to solve his problem through his individual supplier," Fowler said.

"The farmer or rancher is entitled to 100 percent of his current requirements, and his supplier should see to it that his fuel is delivered," Fowler continued.

"But I also want to emphasize this does not exempt the farmer or rancher from using conservation measures like everyone else," Fowler noted, adding the warning, "This status can be taken away just as easily as it was given if the privilege is abused."

There are two instances where a person involved in agricultural production would apply directly to the FEO regional office, using FEO Form 17:

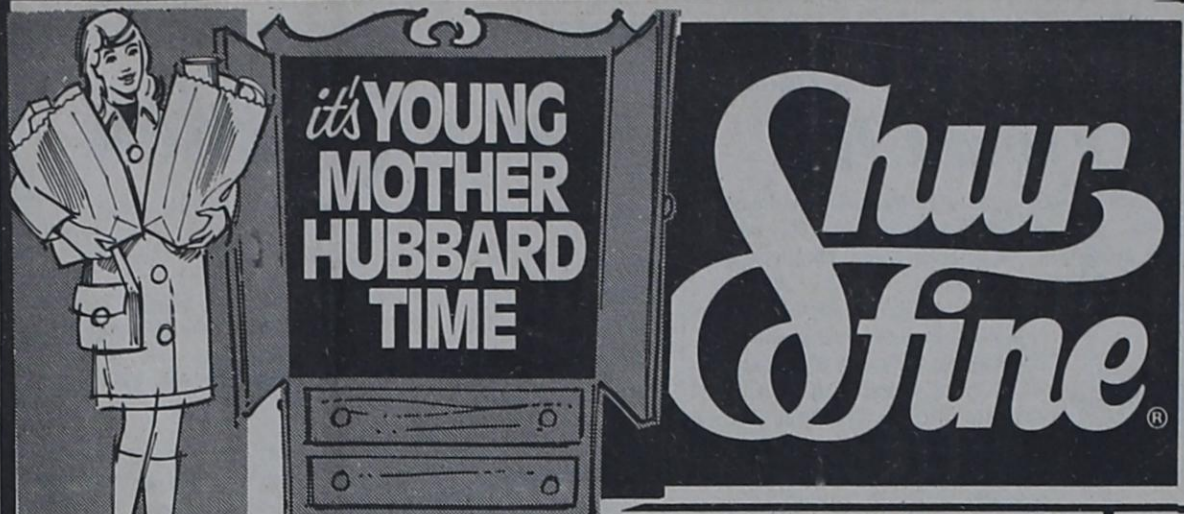
1. If he qualifies as a wholesale purchaser (he buys 20,000 gallons or more annually), and none of the suppliers he has contacted are willing to accept him as a new customer as they are obligated to do under the regulations, he has the desired supplier fill out block 12 on the FEO Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office asking that he be assigned to a supplier.
 2. If he qualifies as a wholesale purchaser, and he and his supplier cannot agree on the base period allocation volumes to be provided, he has his supplier indicate the disagreement in block 12 on the Form 17 and sends the Form 17 application to the Dallas or other appropriate regional FEO office for resolution.
- There are two instances when a person involved in agricultural production would apply directly to his state allocation office. If he encounters either of the two situations described above, but is an end-user who does not qualify as a wholesale purchaser, he would apply to the state officer on FEO Form 20 for assignment or adjustment, rather than to the regional office.

All of these situations relate to longer term actions. If in the short term, the farmer or rancher is out of fuel and is a hardship case, he contacts his state allocation office and makes application on FEO Form 20.

It is not necessary for the farmer or rancher who does not qualify as a wholesale purchaser to submit any form unless he finds himself in one of the situations described above. If his retailer or supplier asks for certification of this requirement, an ordinary letter should suffice.

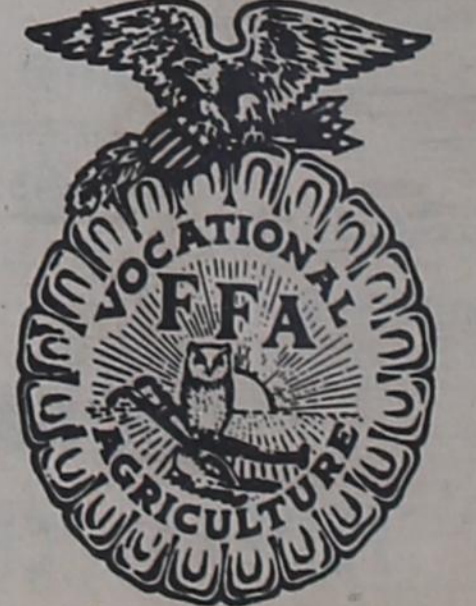
