


MAGGIE MOORE stands by an apple tree which blew down in Monday's storm.

# Trees, Fences Hit By Damaging Wind Mon.

Tornadic-type winds struck the Bovina area Monday night, causing considerable damage throughout the town. Some hard rain also fell in the immediate area, but no hail was reported.

For all of the wind the slow-moving front contained, the moisture measurement was light in comparison.

Only .4 inch of moisture was registered, according to Maggie Moore, although she was of the opinion that due to the high wind that blew while the rain was falling.

The wind damage was the main story from Monday night. Funnel clouds were spotted by weather officials just north of Friona at about 8:45 p.m. Monday, and residents there were given the "take shelter" warning. A wind gauge there registered 90 miles per hour during one gusting period.

In Bovina on Tuesday, evidence of the high wind was clearly visible.

Bleachers at the baseball field were turned on one end and wrapped around a power pole. A winch truck was being used to remove the bleachers Tuesday morning.

A large apple tree was broken off just above the ground at the residence of Tiny Moore, 7th and Avenue D, and throw over the garden chain link fence and into the yard fence some 30 feet away, damaging the corner of the shop as it went past. Apples were scattered all over the garden and yard.

Mrs. Moore said the apple tree was eight years old, was 15 feet tall and about nine inches thick at the trunk. "But I guess we were fortunate, since that wind could have blown the house down," she said.

Trees were uprooted all over

town and limbs were broken at almost every home.

Part of a sheet-iron roof was blown off, and at the home of Roy Lee Stowers, the shingles were stripped down to the boards on the front part of the home.

Fences were blown down and a large strip of fence was lying down at Gene Ezell's home at 606 Avenue I. A large portion of a

rock fence was down in the Greg McClaran back yard.

In the Danny Stanberry yard on Seventh Street, the huge limbs were lying all over the yard and looked as though someone had trimmed the trees.

Other damage noted included: a storage building from the back yard was blown up over the house and dropped in the front yard at Charlie Corn's home.

The roof was blown off Marie's Used Values.

City employees worked throughout the day on Tuesday hauling limbs and debris from yards and streets.

## City Council Has Routine Session

The City Council met on June 8 at the City Hall for their regular monthly meeting. Aldermen present were John Dixon, Leon Ware, Galen Hromas and Mayor Keith Knight.

Mayor Keith Knight called the meeting to order and John Dixon led in prayer.

The minutes were read by Doris Strawn, city administrator, and minutes were approved as read. Leon Ware made a motion to pay the bills and the motion carried.

Fire chief John Kunselman presented brochures describing generators and there was a discussion about purchasing one and where to put it. It was decided that decisions would be tabled for now and they would look for the best deal and report at the next meeting.

Kunselman passed out proposals stating that firefighters who had served for 35 years, or at the age of 65, who had served on the department 25 years would get their water for free. It was decided this would be tabled until all the councilmen were present.

Andy Garza reported that he would like to take all his workers on the city to the cemetery and work one day a week. There was a discussion and Andy asked that the councilmen talk with the cemetery

board and reports will be made at the next meeting.

Officer Gary Coleman presented a revised police procedure. He also reported on the conference he had attended in Austin last week and expressed his appreciation for the opportunity of attending the conference.

The meeting was adjourned.


Also printed on the plaque were words of her order on the coffee filter that went "round and 'round and 'round."





### Sheriff's Report

On June 2, Loy Dean Stanberry, 40, Bovina, was arrested by the Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of DWI. He pled guilty before County Judge Porter Roberts, and was fined \$250, court costs and three days in jail.

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QUESTION: Can they be planted to grain sorghum?

ANSWER: Yes, if approved.

QUESTION: Is ghost acreage milo eligible for multi-peril F.C.I.C. insurance?

ANSWER: Yes, see your agent for details.

4. The right to information about procedures in criminal investigations.

5. The right to information about procedures in the Criminal Justice System, including plea bargaining.

6. The right to tell a probation department conducting a presentencing investigation about the impact of the offense on you and your family.

7. The right to be informed about the crime victims compensation fund, the payment of certain medical expenses for victims of sexual assault, and of the availability of social service agencies that may provide assistance.

8. The right to be notified about parole proceedings.

9. The right to include information in the defendant's file to be considered by the Board of Pardons and Paroles.

10. The right to be present at all public court proceedings related to the offense, if the presiding judge approves.

Article 56 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures states: "A judge, attorney for the state, peace officer, or law enforcement agency is not liable for a failure or inability to provide a right enumerated in this article."

So isn't it nice to know that someone besides the criminal has some rights, too? As for the application for crime victims compensation fund, these are available at the Bovina Police Department, and I will be more than happy to assist anyone in completing one, if the need should ever arise.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the City of Bovina for sending me to this conference, and assuring the citizens of Bovina that should anyone ever need this information, it will be readily available.

## From The Chief's Desk

This week's topic will be crime victims compensation. You know all we hear is about how many rights the criminal has. Well, the victims of these criminals have rights, too.

I attended the Governor's Conference on Crime Victims in Austin last week, and it was really great to find out that there are several organizations around the state that protect rights of crime victims.

Victims of crime can make an application to the state, for compensation to pay doctor and hospital bills, counseling fees, and may receive \$200.00 a week for lost wages and even babysitting or day care charges.

The application goes to the Texas Industrial Accident Board for approval, which usually takes about two months, but once approved it pays back to the date of the crime. As a victim, as the guardian of a victim, or as the close relative of a victim, you have certain rights in the Texas Criminal Justice System. Among these are:

1. The right to protection from harm and threats of harm, arising from cooperation with peace officers or prosecutors.

2. The right to have your safety, and that of your family, taken into consideration when bail is set.

3. The right to be informed about court proceedings, including whether they have been canceled or
