## Council Considers Number Of Items

Bovina's City Council met in a lengthy 41/2-hour session on Thursday, December 9, in City Hall, beginning at 7 p.m.

Councilmen present were Bedford Caldwell, Ken Horn, Dickie Clayton, Vernon Estes and Mayor Tom

The minutes of previous meetings were read and accepted.

Report of the November financial summary was heard and debated, with no further action necessary. Authorization was given the City Secretary to pay bills and the session continued with a review of the current budget.

After careful consideration, the council granted a request by Southwestern Public Service Co. to provide a new outdoor lighting service to Bovina customers. The projected installations are known as Super Gard-Lites.

General interest was shown during discussion of plans to codify city ordinances, although no positive action was taken.

The complex problems inherent in applying for a federally sponsored community development grant program were reviewed, with the council expressing a desire for further exploration of the subject.

Tabled was the matter of salary increases for city employees.
Concluding consideration of a petition to close a portion of Avenue H, it was voted to approve the petition, provided proper easements can be executed for utilities.

The present police car, a 1974 Chevrolet, is said to be in poor condition, with considerable expenditure of money needed to restore it to A-1 running order. The council took no action, preferring to examine the financial possibilities of

purchasing a new vehicle. On the agenda was the matter of the "flat-rate" method of water billing. Nearly 100 per cent of water customers are charged at a per gallon rate. Some few places that do not use enough water to warrant the cost of installing and maintaining meters pay a flat rate. No change was made in the present practice

and the matter was tabled. Plans to remodel city hall came under close scrutiny. City Manager Larry Gilley is continuing discussions with local businesses which have indicated an interest in the proposed project.

Adjournment came at approximately 11:30 p.m.





Cotton crop yield adjustment, 1976--Should your 1976 cotton yield fall below 90 per cent of your expected yield for reason beyond your control, be sure to request an adjustment within 15 days after stripping and ginning is complete. Request for low yield payments also must be filed within this same 15-day period.

ACP signup, 1977--The same practices that were cost-shared in 1976 will be cost-shared in 1977. The signup, for practices to be carried out during January and February of 1977, will start on December 13 and close on December 23, 1976. Farmers should discuss their

conservation problems with the Soil Conservation Service before they apply. You need to be as accurate as possible in knowing exactly what you need and what the cost will be before applying for cost-sharing.

Cotton research and promotion referendum-Ballots for voting on this question will probably be mailed between December 13 and December 17, 1976, to eligible voters.

## Texas Roads Face Traffic Increase

More than 70,000 main cost \$4.2 billion to resurface roads and streets will wear out in the next ten years because of a 24 per cent increase in traffic, says a

Three-fourths of the rebuilt at a cost of \$1.4 state's 94,198 miles of major traffic arteries should be resurfaced or rebuilt by 1986 to handle an estimated 2.2 million more vehicles, according to The Road Information Program (TRIP) of Washington, D.C.

The research and information agency predicts that

-- Texas drivers will log a total of 100 billion miles per year, compared with 80.6 billion miles driven in 1975. -- The number of cars, trucks and buses will

increase by 23 per cent, from 9.7 million to 11.9 million.

-- Those 94,198 miles of major arteries (intercity, urban and farm-to-market roads) will carry nearly 75 per cent of all Texas traffic, even though they represent only 37 per cent of the total state mileage.

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
