Is There 'Unwritten' Constitution in U. S.?

- While prpoosals to amend the Constitution continually are being advanced, compartively little is said of the "unwritten constitution," which is perhaps almost as impor-

Making his annual business forecast, Leonard Ayres, prominent Ohio economist, points to this "unwritten constitution" as virtually having amended the written one since the depression.

Ayres points to universal acceptance of the idea that the federal government is responsible for the economic well-being of the country and its citizens. That, he considers, is an "amendment to the Constitution" more important than any of the other 21

That this is a momentous change, nobody can deny when he goes back with Ayres to President Cleveland's veto of the Texas seed bill in 1885. A severe local drouth in Texas brought forth a bill to appropriate \$10,000 to buy seed for farmers who were burned out.

Cleveland, regarded then as liberal, if not radical, vetoed the bill, saying, 'I do not believe the power and duty of the general government ought to be extended to the rlief of individual suffering which is in no manner related to-public service or benefit."

It is likely that Cleveland today would not feel so. For when "in dividual suffering" mounts to an overwhelming distinctly "related to public service or benefit." he point is, the change in attitude does in effect to either an amendment, or an addition to the "unconstitution." This is a very real part of our govwritter

r instance, as electors gather to make official the on of Franklin D. Roosevelt, there is nothing in the written Constitution to prevent them from getting together electing Joe Doakes president. Originally, the electors for whom you really voted instead of for Roosevelt or Landen, were expected to exercise their own judgment in voting for a president.

Today they would not dare vote for any but the candidate favored by popular will. But it is al lpart of the "unwritten"/rather than the written Constitution that they do

There is nothing in the Constitution to prevent a state seceding from the Union. But the bloody war of 1860-65 "amended" the "unwritten constitution" so that today no state would consider secession.

There is nothing in the written Constitution to prevent a man seeking the presidency for a third time. But so strong is the "unwritten constitutional" provision against it, that such effort would probably be foredoomed to defeat Popular resentment of the violation of tradition would assert itself.

Thus it is quite possible that if the "unwritten constitution" grows strong enough, it may become immaterial whether the written one is ever amended or not.
