THE FALL SEASON is upon us, and traditionally it is one of the finest periods of the year in this area, from

## Housing Group Is Underway

Bovina Housing Authority Chairman Billy Whitecotton told The Blade Monday morning that the Authority is moving forward but is still gathering much-needed information.

"The Authority can build any type of housing Bovina needs, single homes, duplex type homes and units for the elderly. The recent city-wide survey indicated a real need of additional, quality housing for residents with varying incomes. The tentative plans call for units for people with an annual adjusted gross income of up to \$15,000.

"Although there has been some negative comments, the Authority is determined that, whatever the final direction might be, we will construct only housing the community will be proud of. Otherwise, we just will not build.

"The units will not be solely for transient workers, as some people might believe, but will be available to school teachers, the elderly, other wage earners and those who are able to meet the income standards. They will be nice rental units."

Whitecotton said the rental complex will be administered under FmHA rules, regulations and policies. The occupants, through their rental, will be paying a fair share of all taxes, upkeep of the property and insurance. "The occupants will pay their own way," he said and added that a manager will be hired to oversee the entire operation.

"The survey showed 25 to 30 elderly persons are very interested in obtaining good housing at reasonable cost. The recently hired teachers know how hard it is to find housing here. The completion of the expansion at Missouri Beef Packers probably will increase that need and we should be ready to meet it as soon as possible. The project will not hurt present rental housing, but will supplement it."

The Authority chairman went on to say the moderate rental is possible because of the low-interest, long-term provisions of the agreement with FmHA.

"Although the survey gave us a good start, we still need to know more definitely where we stand as to prospective occupants, so we can determine the number in various categories who are still interested in the program. Anyone willing to give us such information can contact Jay Sherrill, Jane Kassahn, Don Spring, Ed Isaac, Laurence Kriegel or me. At this time there will be no need for anything other than routine questions."

## Two Arrested On Marijuana Charge

Two Parmer County residents were arraigned last week on charges of possession of marijuana over four ounces, after county and state lawmen found about 250 pounds of the illegal weed on a farm seven miles northwest of Bovina.

Houston Bartlett, 41, was arraigned on a \$5,000 bond and Barty Bartlett, 20, was held in lieu of \$7,500 bond. Both men are from the Bovina

Fenn and state officers searched in New Mexico, and later

learned the location was in Texas. Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace was notified of the case and the next day, Thursday, county lawmen and a state drug officer from Amarillo went to the Bartlett farm with a search warrant and warrant for the arrest of the younger

"We found two lids of marijuana in the house," Lovelace said. "We found some more marijuana in the attic of the garage where it was being cured out. Across the road from where Barty lives we found two rows of marijuana about threequarters of a mile long growing with corn. They must have been out there plenty because there was a well beaten path out into the field.".

Lovelace said some of the weed had already been harvested and piled up. Some of it was ruined because it had been rained on, he

Barty told officers that his father knew all about the operation, and when Houston Bartlett went to Farwell to "bail his son out" charges were also filed against him. Houston insisted that hired hands were responsible for the dope.

"It was in all shapes," Lovelace said. "There were plants, stalks, stacks, and some of it was processed."

Both men have been bound over for grand jury action, scheduled to meet in December. Both men have made bond.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977** 

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

# Lions To Sponsor Defensive Driving

A defensive driving course will be held September 27-29 for residents of the surrounding area who wish to receive a reduction in their car insurance.

The course, sponsored by the Friona Noon Lions Club will be conducted in the Friona High School cafeteria from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., and will be instructed by Department of Public Safety officer Tony Guess of Amarillo.

"Anyone taking the course will be entitled to a ten per cent reduction in their collision and liability insurance," Carrol Gatlin, chairman of the course, said. "This will be good for a three year period."

Gatlin said that on late model cars the reduction could amount to \$20 per year per car. Couples who have an extra car in the family are urged to enroll as they will both get the 10 per cent reduction if they are each the principle driver of their cars. "In other words," Gatlin said, "this is a per car-per driver course, and an opportunity for two car families to save on insurance."

Noon Lion president B.K. Buske said this course could be one of the best Lion projects in terms of time spent and money raised. He stated that 100 participants would be a worthy minimum goal to shoot for.

Gatlin said a pre-registration location would be announced later, but tentative registration fee is \$12 per person. He went on to say that the course would be worthwhile to drivers in that they will learn defensive driving procedures.

The course will be an all-classroom type program with no actual time spent driving. Persons interested in the course are asked to contact Gatlin for details.

## Sales Tax Checks Sent To Texas Cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that some 880 Texas cities have been mailed checks totaling \$57.6 million as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for

The September checks raise to \$263.6 million the total that has been rebated to the cities to date this year, up from \$229.7 million for the same period last year. This is a 14.7 per cent increase.

Bullock said the increase in sales tax collections in Texas is outpacing that of most other states, signaling the continuing vigor of the state's


